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

- 1. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. The term "final bid" means the last bid acknowledged by the auctioneer, which is normally the highest bid offered. The purchase price payable by the buyer will be the sum of the final bid and a commission of 10% of the final bid ("buyer's premium"), together with any sales tax or use tax which may be due on the sale.
- 2. The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid, to advance the bidding at his discretion and, in the event of a dispute between bidders, to determine the successful bidder, to continue the bidding or to reoffer and resell the lot in dispute. The Galleries' record of the final sale shall be conclusive.
- 3. All bids are per numbered lot in the catalogue unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to group two or more lots, to withdraw any lot or lots from the sale, or to act on behalf of the seller. Lot numbers followed by the symbol ° are offered subject to one or more of the following conditions: (i) the lot is subject to a minimum final bid ("reserve"), below which it will not be sold, (ii) the Galleries have advanced monies to the seller and have a financial interest in the lot, (iii) the Galleries have guaranteed the seller a minimum sale price, and (iv) the Galleries may have ownership interest in the lot, either in part or whole. The absence of the symbol ° means that the lot is offered without reserve.
- 5. Any lot, the description of which is obviously incorrect, is returnable, but only if the lot is returned within 14 days of receipt. All disputed lots must be returned intact with the original packing material. Definition of Terms

Autograph Letter Signed (ALS): A complete or large part of manuscript letter with signature, entirely in the hand of the person identified.

Typed Letter Signed (TLS): A mechanically typed letter with the autograph signature of the person identified.

Letter Signed (LS): A manuscript letter written in another hand, which bears the autograph of the person identified.

Autograph Document Signed (ADS): A manuscript document with signature, entirely in the hand of the person identified.

Document Signed (DS): A document, either printed or in another's hand, which bears the autograph signature of the person identified.

Autograph Endorsement Signed (AES): An endorsement with signature, entirely in the hand of the person identified.

Autograph Note Signed (ANS): A note or endorsement with signature, entirely in the hand of the person identified.

Autograph Musical Quotation Signed (AMQS): Same as above.

Signed: The autograph signature of the person identified, unless otherwise indicated (autopen, secretarial signature, etc.)

Condition

Documents and letters should be expected to have folds, staple holes or minor defects caused by previous mounting. Photographs may have creases at corners or mount remnants on back. Such faults will be described when they affect the text or signature.


George Washington. LS, datelined "Headquarters West Point Aug. 31th 1779", to Governor George Clinton, written entirely in the hand of Alexander Hamilton: "I have the honor to enclose the copy of a letter of yesterday from Major General Heath, which, as it relates to a matter of civil concern, I think it my duty to your Excellency. In a letter of the 20th from General Sullivan he sends me the copy of one from General Clinton, by which and by what he mentions himself, the junction was to have been formed the next day. Lt. Col. Pawling did not join at Anaquaga nor had he been heard of. I have the honor to be With the greatest respect and esteem your most obed. servant. G. Washington." Toned, with some separations at folds, otherwise Fine. Frontier raids from Tories and Indians required Washington to send General John Sullivan on a mission which nothing less than the "total destruction and devastation" of the Iroquois settlements. Docketing by Clinton notes that Washington enclosed a "letter from Genl. Heath respecting plunderers at the lines."(Photo) E. 16,000-18,000




George Washington. Signature ("G. Washington") on 1787 document authorizing payment from the Potomac Company to Col. William Darke for \$1000, additionally signed by three other members of the company, docketing on back by Darke, separated at central fold and recently rejoined by Scotch tape on back only, just touching large "G" at top, Fine. Col. Darke was a captain in the Revolution, captured at Germantown, later served with officers sent to the Virginia Convention to ratify the Federal Constitution(Photo) E. 7,000-9,000





Judges of equal rank. . . Neither Mrs. Harrison or myself can go to Kentucky at present it is out the question-I am told that the Legislature of your state will meet in this month. To it I must have recourse & will by the next mail transmit a Petition to Governor Bloomfield requesting him to lay it before the Legislature in which I will shew the hardship & injustice of the Present law," etc.

Also included is an ALS of **Benjamin Parke**, a congressman & friend who fought with Harrison at Tippecanoe, dated Oct. 1812 with integral address leaf with a second Vincennes ms. postmark. It discusses matters connected with those discussed in Harrison's letter, but also the early stages of the War of 1812. Parke explains that he is handling Harrison's affairs while the Governor is "...at or near Fort Defiance on the Miami of the Lake...This town has become a military Port and the Governors House is converted into a Fort- the inhabitants of this Territory, altho few people have been killed, have suffered prodigiously...about two thousand mounted men under General Hopkins marched a few days since from the place into the Indian Country. Pope writes (in part): "I have read with profound interest & satisfaction your very thorough and exhaustive analysis of McClellan's report as published in the N.Y. Times & I may safely congratulate the Army and the country that the character and conduct of the military & political anti-Christ of the U.S. are being thus made manifest. If you continue the series as you have begun it McClellan's neck will be broken." This letter is followed by an ALS of Hitchcock's dated March 28th from Washington, accepting his congratulations but giving credit for the Times article to a Mr. Wm. Swinton, who interviewed Hitchcock: "I talked freely with him and made some suggestions to him. I went even a little further and permitted him to see and to use some few written notes of mine, touching [on] the causes of the detention of McDowell & c, ... History will give you the credit of beating the rebel army in front of Washington so far as your own plans and arrangements were concerned. You beat them, at any rate, but would have crushed them had your orders been obeyed. McClellans entire merit consisted in organizing the freshly raised troops, as they arrived here in the beginning of the war. The moment he attempted to handle the troops, he proved himself entirely unequal to the task. I hope this is the worst that can be said of him, for it is painful to suspect anything beyond that." etc. In a third ALS, dated April 4th, Pope thanks Hitchcock for his "flattering view" and goes on to say, "I may at least assert with confidence that whatever mistake was made in that campaign, I, at least, did the best I knew how to do... 449 [Confederate Army of Pensacola]. Secretary's copy of Genl. Adley H. Gladden's report to Maj. G.G. Garner, headed, "Head Quarters 1st Brigade Army of Pensacola" 51/2pp, 73/4 x 12½ in., a lively account from this recently formed brigade (Oct. 22nd), of the U.S. steamers Niagara and Hartford joining Fort Pickens in bombarding Forts McRae and Barancas in Pensacola Bay ("the shots and shells thrown by the enemy were the most destructive of modern invention"), etc. Though Boatner identifies the Hartford as the Richmond and states they attacked the Confederate Time as she entered the harbor, and that Bragg considered abandoning McRae, this report by Gladden makes no mention of the Time (or for that matter Genl. Bragg) and notes, "The efficiency of our soldiery and the strength of our fortification were not only unimpaired but had been increased by the experience. . . of this memorable bombardment...Our forts and batteries were manned by troops recently culled from the precincts of civil life and but lately instructed in the manner of artillery. Yet when encountered by what the opposing commander styles 'the best artillery Regiment in the world' the conquer a silence and convert an arrogant enemy into a foe so spiritless as not to accept a challenge to continue the engagement." Genl. Gladden died at Shiloh a few months later. The Army of Pensacola was brought north by Bragg for that campaign, and ceased to exist on Mar. 13, 1862. Pensacola was abandoned by the Confederates in May of that year. Very Fine, a rare document from this short-lived Floridian army E. 600-800

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

- [Confederate Diary]. 5 x 71/4 in., original marbled paper covers, 53 numbered pages, 454 balance of book never used, an entertaining account by Wm. Lee Edwards, an educated and well-to-do Norfolk Va. civilian who was arrested on Feb. 10, 1864 "by an officer and two negro soldiers of the United States Army," and after being held in a warehouse prison, was "convicted of assault with intent to kill," and sentenced to one year at hard labor. After a brief period he was offered a clerical job in the jail by a Capt. Nutting despite having refused to take the oath of allegiance. The diary was begun Nov. 27, 1864, and breaks off abruptly, Dec. 29th. A number of entries are long and all are carefully written in a attractive hand, with names and ranks consistently noted; the most interesting is the story of prisoner sentenced to death for desertion-"not giving him quite 24 hours, to repent of his past sins, which are undoubtedly many & great." Edwards gives a 6 page account leading up to his arrest, and describes in detail the manner of his death: "at the word Fire, seven balls take effect upon his person, three entering his heart three his abdomen and one entering his throat, killing him instantly," etc. There are also accounts of a warehouse fire with the firemen too drunk to put it out; two prisoners getting married; a visit from the British Consul; the tale of a local con man who stole money under the pretext of raising money for a gift for Genl. Butler, etc. The last entry is the surprise return of Capt. Nutting, who had been transferred, captured, and managed to escape from a prison in Columbia S.C.; some paper loss to spine otherwise intact, pages and ink quite fresh, a most unusual Confederate document, offered for the first time E. 1,000-1,500
- Memoirs of a Texas Soldier. 32pp carbon typescript, 13 x 8½ in., minor corrections in 455 pencil, by W.G. Davenport (1845-1924), written 1914-15 in New Mexico. Synopsis of events in Texas leading up to the enlistment of his father, uncle and himself, written as memories occured to him, Davenport begins with a detailed account of the retreat and hardships of Hood's army after Franklin and Nashville, walking to Alabama while caring for his father and uncle (both wounded at the Battle of Franklin), being captured and sent to Camp Douglas, lengthy description of prison life, cruelty of Yankees, etc. He then describes the earlier part of the war: defending West Texas from Indians, chasing thieves & looters, scouting & skirmishes in Miss. with great description of close fighting in Port Gibson, being shot in the head, vignettes of fellow soldiers (ie: "His horse had been shot down under him at short range and while he was tangled in some way the yank who had killed the horse hit him over the head with his gun and ordered him to surrender. His answer was 'Damn you, you killed my horse and I will kill you' and with that he shot the yank dead, unsaddled his horse and carried his saddle away. After he started to leave his horse looked at him and nickered and then [the] man turned and went back to the horse and stayed with until he died. Bill Posey was his name. . . [he] was in a barber shop for a shave when the yanks fired into the stable, had lather on his face and was partly shaved when he went into the fight," etc.), meeting General Hood as they crossed a river ("Boys, it is all my fault, you did your best,"), cutting rail & telegraph lines for Bedford Forrest, reporting to the latter at Columbia Tenn. on the skirmish line with bullets & shells flying and the General's comment, "It's getting warm here,"; etc., an exciting, detailed account, includes a 1956 letter from Harold G. Smith, his grandson, who gave this manuscript as a gift to a Civil War collector. Apparently unpublished, offered for the first time at auction É. 600-800

Davis may be caught with some others and savaged in the same way in retaliation...We hard A Johnson has been inaugerated [sic] but we lack confidence in him since the 4th of Mar it is said he has been drinking hard We were not quite satisfied with the terms of liberalality [sic] that was given to Lee and his army," etc. The second letter says (in part): "I was glad to here that you were all well after so long a march through so much water you say that some of the boys say that the next generation of Yanks will be web-footed... Let the People of every State & Territory take the responsibility which justly belongs to them of making rules for their internal regulations- enjoy their benefits and suffer the consequences. To do so would prevent a continual dragging before Congress of their love of contention which as so often aroused there and throughout the whole country a spirit that has seriously threatened the disolution of Union. It is greatly regretted that philanthropists have so much mistaken the way to benefit the Slave. Their efforts & contentions generally well designed have been upon unconstitutional and anti republican grounds, and in every conflict they have lost much and gained nothing... The chains of slavery are at this time heavier and stronger than they were twenty five years ago. . . I must therefore hold that the General Government should be guiltless of sanctioning slavery in the Territories." etc., Fine E. 1,000-1,500

- 468 Union Feelings in Philadelphia. Two letters in Apr. 1861, describing men wearing red white & blue cravats, threatening to burn college for not flying the Union flag, etc., includes tiny drawing of a lizard presumably copied from a anti-secession envelope—the second letter contains a cruder version of it; Fine E. 100-150

- The Letters of Jacob Dannaker. 12 letters from this Pa. private to his family in Philadelphia, Oct. 1861-Feb. 25, 1865, details of camp life, recovering from wounds (apparently at Gettysburg), bitter comment about the abolitionist Wendell Phillips' lecture: "...you can tell pop that I don't believe a word of it he don't give our genls or president any praise at all he is as bad as the copperheads all he thinks of is the nigger and I say the nigger is not the equal of a white man he says either he is or Gen. Banks is a fool I think he (Phillips) is a damn fool and old Abe is worth a dozen of him so you need not send me any more of his lectures for he wants to make a nigger better than a white man he says Antietam and Gettysburg were fruitless victories I say he is a liar," etc. Attractively mounted with original envelopes, Fine group E. 300-500
- The Eldridge Letters. Large group of approx. 65, mostly between Dr. E.J. Eldridge, a surgeon in General H. Cobb's brigade (and later Genl. Ray recorded the death of Stonewall Jackson, saw the removal of Genl. Warren by Sheridan, worked under Burnside, Meade and his hero Genl. Grant. He predicts Sherman's march, Lee's defeat, the end of the war by 1865 and prophetically notes that "there will be an even greater rebellion" to finally settle the social and economic issues of the Union. There are detailed descriptions of battlefield carnage, dragging off the dead and wounded, etc. He was at Gettysburg, Chancellorville, the siege of Petersburg, the tunnel explosion, etc., many letters with original envelopes, Very Fine, one man's complete record of his war service E. 2,500-3,000
- The Rice Family Papers. 12 letters of this Confederate family, includes letters to son Henry while he was at Hampden Sidney College, one warning him not to get involved in a student parole exchange, discussion of Northern war expenses, extortion in the country, death of Genl.
