

CONDITIONS OF SALE

The property described in this catalogue will be offered at public auction by Robert A. Siegel Auction Galleries, Inc. ("Galleries") on behalf of Persis Corporation of Honolulu, Hawaii. By placing a bid on any lot, the bidder acknowledges acceptance of and will be bound to these Conditions of Sale.

- 1. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. The term "final bid" means the last bid acknowledged by the auctioneer, which is normally the highest bid offered. The purchase price payable by the buyer will be the sum of the final bid and a commission of 10% of the final bid ("buyer's premium"), together with any sales tax or use tax which may be due on the sale.
- 2. The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid, to advance the bidding at his discretion and, in the event of a dispute between bidders, to determine the successful bidder, to continue the bidding or to reoffer and resell the lot in dispute. The Galleries' record of the final sale shall be conclusive.
- 3. All bids are per numbered lot in the catalogue unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to group two or more lots, to withdraw any lot or lots from the sale, or to act on behalf of the seller. The Galleries will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for any errors in the execution of such bids.
- 4. Lot numbers followed by the symbol ° are offered subject to a minimum final bid ("reserve"), below which it will not be sold. The absence of the symbol ° means that the lot is offered without reserve.
- 5. Any lot, the description of which is obviously incorrect, is returnable, but only if the lot is returned within 14 days of receipt. All disputed lots must be returned intact with the original packing material. The following lots may not be returned for any reason: Lots containing ten or more items; lots from buyers who have registered for the pre-sale exhibition or received lots by postal viewing, thereby having had the opportunity to inspect them before the sale; any lot described with "faults" or "defects" may not be returned because of any fault or defect. No illustrated lots may be returned because of centering, margins or other factors shown in the illustrations.
- 6. Successful bidders, unless they have established credit with the Galleries prior to the sale, must make payment in full before the lots will be delivered. Buyers not known to the Galleries must make payment in full within three days from the date of sale. The Galleries retain the right to demand payment at the time the lot is knocked down to the highest bidder, for any reason whatsoever. In the event that any buyer refuses or fails to make payment in cash for any lot at the time it is knocked down to him, the auctioneer

reserves the right to reoffer the lot immediately for sale to the highest bidder.

- 7. If the purchase price has not been paid within the time limit specified above, nor lots taken up within seven days from the date of sale, the lots will be resold by whatever means deemed appropriate by the Galleries, and any loss incurred from resale will be charged to the defaulting buyer. Any account more than thirty days in arrears will be subject to a late payment charge of 1½% per month as long as the account remains in arrears. Any expenses incurred in securing payment from delinquent accounts will be charged to the defaulter.
- 8. All lots are sold as genuine. Any lot which is accompanied by a certificate from The Philatelic Foundation, dated within the past five years of the sale date, is sold "as is" and in accordance with the description on the certificate. Such lots may not be returned for any reason, including but not limited to a contrary certificate of opinion obtained after the sale. Buyers who wish to obtain a certificate for any item that is not accompanied by a certificate dated within the past five years may do so, provided that the following conditions are met: (1) the purchase price must be paid in full, (2) the item must be submitted to an acceptable expertizing committee with a properly executed application form within 21 days of the sale, (3) a copy of the application form must be given to the Galleries, (4) in the event that an adverse opinion is received, the Galleries retain the right to resubmit the item on the buyer's behalf for reconsideration, without time limit or other restrictions, (5) unless written notification to the contrary is received, items submitted for certification will be considered cleared 90 days from the date of sale, and (6) in the event any item is determined to be "not as described", the buyer will be refunded the purchase price, plus interest accrued on the purchase price at the prevailing Treasury Bill Rate from the date of payment, and the certification fee up to \$100.00 unless otherwise agreed.
- 9. Until paid for in full, all lots remain the property of Persis Corporation.
- 10. Agents executing bids on behalf of clients will be held responsible for all purchases made on behalf of clients unless otherwise arranged prior to the sale.
- 11. The buyer assumes all risk for delivery of purchased lots, and agrees to pay for all out-of-pocket costs incurred in shipping.

TERMS AND ABBREVIATIONS

Centering

The width of margins and the centering of the design within perforations are graded in strict accordance with the Scott Standard Postage Stamp Catalogue standards. The following grades are used:

Extremely Fine (EF): Exceptionally large margins or near perfect centering, used to describe stamps which are of superior grade for the issue.

Very Fine (VF): Normal size margins for the issue and well-centered with design a bit closer to one side. Please note that this grade is superior to the one on which Scott Catalogue retail prices are based.

Fine (F): Imperforate stamps may have smaller than usual margins and perforated stamps will be noticeably off-center. Issues before 1890 may have the design touched in places. If used, fairly lightly cancelled.

Very Good (VG): Attractive appearance, but margins or perforations may cut into.

Good (G): Average off-centered example with slight faults. This condition is generally acceptable for multiples and rarities.

Gum

Stamps issued before 1900 should not be expected to have original gum unless specifically stated in the description. 20th Century issues may be expected to have original gum unless described otherwise. Terms used to describe the condition of gum are as follows:

Mint: As issued by the post office and never hinged.

Original Gum (O.G.): Stamp retains full original gum showing slight disturbance caused by previous hinge, which may be present or entirely removed. Early 19th century stamps should be expected to show crackling and toning in gum, which occurs naturally over time.

Part Original Gum: Up to half of the gum is missing, but the remaining portion is original.

Disturbed Original Gum: The gum is original to the stamp, but has been noticeably affected by hinge removal and/or humidity, mount glazing, etc.

Hinge Mark: Noticeable area where hinge has been removed and gum has been redistributed. Stamps described with hinge marks may not be returned because of gum disturbance.

Hinge Remnant (H.R.): All or part of hinge remaining affixed to gum.

Covers

Minor nicks, tears and slight reduction from opening are to be expected in 19th century covers. Folded letters normally have tears in the reverse and file folds, which will not be mentioned unless they affect the stamps or markings. Light cleaning of covers is an accepted form of conservation and is not grounds for return of a lot. The terms "Extremely Fine", etc., are meant to convey the overall appearance of cover, not the condition of an individual stamp.

Catalogue Values and Estimates

Unless otherwise noted, all stamps are catalogued according to the *Scott 1995 U.S. Specialized Catalogue*. Catalogue values are indicated by decimal figures in the right column (for example, "175.00"). Stamps in extremely fine quality and items for which catalogue values are not available have been given estimate ranges (for example "E. 750-1,000"). Lots offered subject to a reserve will never be reserved for more than the estimate (usually a fraction of the estimate).

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Thurston Twigg-Smith and The Honolulu Advertiser Collection

THE 1,878 LOTS PRESENTED IN THIS THREE-VOLUME SET OF CATALOGUES is the entire Hawaii stamp and postal history collection known worldwide as *The Honolulu Advertiser* Collection. It is the product of a half-century spent acquiring and studying Hawaii's early letters, postal markings, stamps and examples of their usage on mail. It is, in the opinion of many respected philatelists, the greatest collection of a single country's stamps ever formed.


The Advertiser collection, as it has been called throughout the years, is owned by a corporation but was assembled by Thurston Twigg-Smith, whose purpose has been, and continues to be, to preserve this part of Hawaii's history. Mr. Twigg-Smith is the fifth of seven generations of his family to live on the Islands. His great-great-grandparents were the Reverend Asa Thurston and his wife, Lucy Goodale Thurston, whose letters documenting the 1820 arrival and life of the missionaries in Hawaii will be found in Part 2 of this sale. His grandfather, Lorrin A. Thurston, was a principal proponent of annexation to the United States and publisher of the newspaper that is known today as *The Honolulu Advertiser*. Lorrin A. Thurston's portrait actually appears on the 1896 Official Issue (offered in Part 3). The newspaper's founder, Henry M. Whitney, was Hawaii's first postmaster, who issued the Missionaries in 1851 and, after resigning and starting the *Advertiser*, printed the first issue of Numerals at the paper's office in 1859. We wonder if any other stamp collector has ever been so closely affiliated with the history of his collecting subject, as Mr. Twigg-Smith is with Hawaiian postal history.

Thurston Twigg-Smith was born in Honolulu on August 17, 1921, the oldest son of the late Mrs. Margaret Thurston and the late artist William Twigg-Smith. He has a brother David. A sister, Mrs John Honl, of Kailua-Kona, died in 1971. He graduated from Punahou School and Yale University, receiving a degree in mechanical engineering in 1942.

Mr. Twigg-Smith was a captain in the field artillery in five European campaigns in World War II, leaving active duty as a major in 1946. After the war, he helped organize the Hawaii National Guard and served as a lieutenant-colonel, commanding the 483rd Field Artillery Battalion, HNG, until his resignation in 1954.

His current business activities include Chairman & CEO and a director of Persis Corporation, a Honolulu-based investment company; Chairman of *The Honolulu Advertiser*; and director, Atalanta/Sosnoff Capital Corporation (New York).

Mr. Twigg-Smith is a trustee of The Contemporary Museum, Punahou School, the

Honolulu Academy of Arts, and the McInerny Foundation, all in Honolulu; Old Sturbridge Village in Massachusetts; The Museum of Contemporary Art in Los Angeles; the Yale Art Gallery in New Haven; and The Philatelic Foundation, Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture, and Whitney Museum of American Art, all in New York. He was instrumental in the development of The Contemporary

Museum from a corporate gallery to a full-fledged public museum on its own site in Honolulu. He has also been a director and past President of Hawaiian Mission Children's Society and numerous organizations dedicted to cultural activities on the Islands.

THE CREATION OF A TRULY COMPREHENSIVE collection of Hawaii was accomplished by Mr. Twigg-Smith with the help of the late Alfred J. Ostheimer III, whose formidable Hawaii holding became the cornerstone of the *Advertiser* collection in 1970. Over many years both Mr. Twigg-Smith and Mr. Ostheimer received the professional assistance of the Weills of New Orleans, Raymond and his late brother, Roger. In his Foreword to this sale (page viii), Raymond H. Weill provides his personal insight into the formation and sale of the *Advertiser* collection.

At the beginning of the 20th century, the most important collections of Hawaii belonged to Count Philipp la Renotiere von Ferrary (sold 1921-25), George H. Worthington (sold 1917-18) and Henry J. Crocker (sold privately by his heirs to Frank C. Atherton between 1912 and 1927). Hawaii collections of somewhat lesser importance were in the hands of Henry J. Duveen,

William Wolters and Henry J. Crocker's brother, William. During the period dating from the time of the Ferrary sales until just after World War II, the major Hawaii collections were assembled by Alfred H. Caspary, Ferrars H. Tows, and Admiral Frederic R. Harris. A significant part of the Atherton collection—including much of Henry J. Crocker's studies—was donated to the Honolulu Academy of Arts in 1927. Alfred F. Lichtenstein, Maurice Burrus and Theodore Champion also built impressive Hawaii collections during this period of intense collecting activity from 1921 until the war's end.

Beginning in 1947—the year of Lichtenstein's unexpected death—the flow of Hawaiian material was reversed, and a buyer's market emerged. The Tows collection reached the market through auction in 1948. In 1949 Admiral Harris died, and his collection was sold at auction in 1954. One year later, Caspary died, and in 1957 his Hawaii collection was sold. The Burrus auction was held in 1963, followed by the Lichtenstein auction in 1966 and the private sale of Emmerson Krug's Hawaii through our firm during the same period. In April 1967 our firm sold the Middendorf (Sale 316) and Lilly Hawaii collections, marking the last of the major Hawaii sales during this remarkable period of turnover. By 1968 the majority of Hawaiian material owned before 1950 had passed to new owners, including Alfred J. Ostheimer III, Thurston Twigg-Smith and the Weills of New Orleans. The key Hawaiian Missionaries held by Mr. Phillips, the Weills' client, were sold to Mr. Ostheimer in 1970, and, soon after, the entire Ostheimer collection, together with Twigg-Smith's personal collection, were amalgamated into the *Advertiser* collection. A few years later the Atherton holdings at The Honolulu Academy of Arts were acquired by the *Advertiser*, creating the largest and most valuable Hawaii collection ever assembled.

Since the corporate collection's beginning in 1970, every offering of Hawaii has been carefully screened by Mr. Twigg-Smith, and items needed for the collection have been acquired—cost always being a secondary consideration. Under the direction of Mr. Twigg-Smith, with professional guidance from the Weills, and with the curatorial skills of Mary M. Mitsuda, the *Advertiser* collection is, today, the masterwork of philatelic acumen, scholarship and dedication.

Foreword

LONG BEFORE HE HAD DECIDED ON THE AUCTIONEER TO SELL HIS COLLECTION, Thurston Twigg-Smith bestowed a great honor upon me. He asked that I act as consultant to the firm he would later choose.

When I first met "Twigg" more than forty years ago, I recognized him as an eminently singular person.

Few collectors of any form of art have his attributes. Before he seriously proceeded to build his collection of stamps, he became a student of the subject. As his knowledge progressed, he was easily an expert in the issues of Hawaii. He knew more about the nature of this esoteric field, including market values, than did many of the professionals with whom he was dealing.

That knowledge was a prerequisite in putting together The Honolulu Advertiser collection.

For lack of any other word I can select, Thurston Twigg-Smith has what in a great writer would be called "style." He undertook to analyze the early issues—how they were produced, their usage, and the historical facts related to their manufacture. His objective was not commercial. While his investment probably will prove a wise one, the monetary gain was never a consideration. Twigg's principal aim was to reconstruct and preserve the postal history of his homeland. If, indeed, there is a financial gain, it was neither calculated nor planned.

Twigg's forebears were among the earliest missionaries to settle in Hawaii. The founder of the *Advertiser*, H. M. Whitney, was Hawaii's first Postmaster General and produced the very stamps used in that early period.

My late brother, Roger, and I, from the inception of our business, dealt with stamps that youngsters prized. But as well, we devoted much of our activities to working with collectors who formed many of the greatest collections of the past half century. Some are not known and others have names familiar in philately—W. L. Moody III, S. D. Bechtel, J. K. Lilly, Ryohei Ishikawa and, one of the greatest of all, "Mr. Phillips." Adding Thurston Twigg-Smith to this list is a special compliment to the Weill brothers. Twigg is, of course, in the "greatest" class.

Even before Twigg was becoming an avid collector of Hawaii we were leading buyers when the best Hawaii holdings came on the market. Included were those of Admiral Harris, Tows, Caspary and Burrus. Bidding when these great collections were sold was not highly competitive, as it is today, so the Weills were easily able to acquire much of the very best Hawaiian material.

The 2c/5c Missionary cover (lot 9) was acquired by us in the Caspary sale of October 8, 1957, for \$25,000. After passing through the hands of Mr. Phillips and Alfred J. Ostheimer III, it went into Twigg's albums. We bought the unique unused 2c Missionary (lot 11) in the Burrus sale on May 23, 1963, for \$41,000. It then followed the same sales route as the 2c/5c cover. On November 7, 1995, both of these fantastic pieces will go to auction at the Hotel Pierre in New York City. Philately may feel relieved to know that these two treasures, along with the entire collection, will be offered to bidders. Were the property to go to an institution, regardless of how worthy, it would forever be unavailable to the collector.

The number of Missionary examples being offered in the first session may represent the most valuable group of postage stamps ever offered in a single sale. However, the average collector should not be disillusioned. Most of us are not candidates for items of such value, regardless of our budget. Hawaii issued more than one hundred major varieties and only a very few of them are rare. As well as the rarities, this collection consists of many modestly priced stamps, so that the average collector—most collectors—will find stamps of interest.

Much credit should be given to J. Fred Westerberg, whose book, *Plating the Hawaiian Numerals*, published in 1968, brought these issues into the limelight. Before his work's appearance there were not many serious collectors of the Numerals. But now they are widely collected. The Siegel organization and, in particular, Scott Trepel, deserve praise for their elaboration in the write-up of the Numerals; and much of the detail of the descriptions is due to the studies of Thurston Twigg-Smith. Fred Westerberg would be very happy were he with us and able to view the Siegel sale catalogues. We can easily describe the three volumes as the successor to Meyer-Harris.

More than a word should be said about the role of the curator of *The Honolulu Advertiser* collection, Mary M. Mitsuda. I think Mary knows from memory almost every stamp and cover. In October of 1993 when the collection was appraised by three professionals, including me, Mary Mitsuda was invaluable in acquainting us with album after album and seemed to be familiar with everything without reference to the inventory.

I also was asked to write a foreword to the September 1993 sale catalogue of the Ryohei Ishikawa United States collection. The property realized nearly ten million dollars. In the foreword I predicted that, "It will be described fifty years from now as the most outstanding single philatelic event of the 20th century."

I must now amend my belief; fifty years from now Ryo's and Twigg's collections will be described as the most outstanding philatelic events of the 20th century.

The Missionaries—Hawaii's First Stamps

FROM THE TIME THE MISSIONARIES ARRIVED IN 1820 until the Kingdom of Hawaii established its first postal system in 1850, the conveyance of mail was arranged privately between the correspondent and a ship captain who would agree to carry letters to the appropriate port of call. There were no post offices in Hawaii, but one could entrust mail to forwarding agents who were engaged in commerce and familiar with maritime activity—firms such as Makee, Anthon & Co., Thomas Spencer, and Porter & Ogden. Prepayment of postage was impossible and the amount due was collected from the addressee.

As Hawaii and the United States approached the second half of the 19th century, regular postal service became necessary to facilitate communication between the Islands and the U.S. continent. The Gold Rush and settlement of California established San Francisco as a major port and opened a new

path for U.S.-Hawaiian mails. By the end of 1849 arrangements had been made between Honolulu and San Francisco to provide for the regular exchange of mail. In December 1850 the Hawaiian government created the first official post office and established postage rates on inbound and outbound mail (inter-island mail was carried free until 1859).




FIGURE 3. The announcement of the Missionary issue (above) and the offices of *The Polynesian*. (Courtesy Bishop Museum).

The first postmaster of Hawaii, Henry M. Whitney (Figure 2), was authorized in June 1851 by the privy council to issue stamps to prepay the new rates. This royal decree, signed by Kamehameha III, is shown in Figure 1. Whitney used the printing press at the office of the government newspaper, *The Polynesian*, to print the first issue, known to philatelists as the Missionaries (Figure 3).

The Missionaries were issued in three denominations that prepaid the rates within Hawaii and the United States:

2c for newspapers to the U.S.;

5c for the Hawaiian postage;

13c for the rate to the U.S. East Coast (5c Hawaiian, 2c ship fee, and 6c transcontinental U.S. postage).

The dual nature of the 13c stamps—comprising the postage of two different countries—is most remarkable and makes them, in part, United States postage stamps. The second version of 13c Missionaries clarifies this point with the legend at top that reads "H.I. & U.S. Postage." Whitney was compelled to make this change in April 1852 when patrons complained that the first 13c "Hawaiian Postage" stamps were ambiguous to them and to post offices in the United States.

The Missionaries were issued on October 1, 1851, and remained in use as Hawaii's only postage stamps until the Kamehameha III issue was placed on sale in May 1853. The Missionaries continued to be used in 1853 and 1854, and examples have been found dated as late as March 1856, when the 5c Kamehameha III stamps first began to run out. The earliest dated Missionary is a fragment adhering to a December 30, 1851, folded letter datelined at Kahului and addressed to Connecticut (see Appendix I, 3-I-COV-135). At this date it appears that the cancellers ordered by Whitney in May 1851 had still not arrived; this December

1851 cover has no Hawaiian markings other than a pen cancel tying the Missionary, and all known circular datestamps are dated from 1852.

The Missionaries were printed on a small hand-operated press. The designs were created by assembling type and ornaments into two nearly-identical subjects, called clichés. Sheets of an unknown number of stamps were made by making multiple impressions from these two clichés. The positioning of the clichés was a mystery until the 1905 discovery of the Dawson cover bearing a strip of three 13c "Hawaiian Postage" Missionaries (lot 29), which proved beyond doubt the relative positions of the two types. The Tapling collection at the British Library still shows the two types reversed, conforming to the pre-1905 body of knowledge.

In Figure 4 we illustrate both types in their correct positions for each of the four settings of Missionaries. Although the 2c is classified by philatelists as Hawaii Number 1, the first setting was probably the 5c stamp. The small "n" of "Cents" (a font of smaller dimensions) appears on Type II of the 5c, but not on the 2c or 13c subjects. It has been the consensus among philatelists that this flaw was corrected when the type was changed for the 2c and 13c printings. Another flaw unique to one setting is the missing period after "U" of "U.S." in Type II of Scott 4, the fourth setting. It is interesting that the consistent variation between Types I and II—the indentation of the letter "P" of "Postage" in Type I—remained throughout all four settings, even after the complete revision of the top label in the fourth setting (Scott 4).







FIGURE 5. Ornaments used on the Missionaries, seen on an 1853 receipt from the tax collector in Stow, Mass. (lot 31).

The ornaments surrounding the numeral value come from a stock font sold by several 19th century type foundries. An example of the identical ornaments is shown in Figure 5. Remarkably, these ornaments show very little change between settings.

The ink used to print in the Missionaries is a consistent shade of cold metallic blue. The paper is called *pelure* and has a very thin tissue-like texture. Without gum it is soft and flexible, but prone to tears. With gum it can become brittle. For these reasons 90% of all Missionaries have faults to some degree, and more than 60% have serious defects or repairs. Examples of Missionaries have been found as fragments or with pieces missing *before* they were cancelled in Honolulu, proving that the peculiar paper was difficult to handle even at the time of issue. One wonders if the unusually stout card stock used for the 1853 Kamehameha III issue was specifically requested by Whitney as a reaction to his experience with the Missionaries.

Looking at the census in Appendix I, we find that approximately 14% (28 stamps) of all Missionaries (197 in total) are known unused. Of the 2c, only one unused exam-

ple is recorded. Twelve 5c Missionaries are known unused. Seven 13c Scott 3 and eight 13c Scott 4 Missionaries are recorded unused. Only five of the 28 unused Missionaries are sound.






FIGURE 6. "U.S. Postage Paid" in oval (1852-1853) and modified "Postage Paid" version used in 1859 on the Numerals.

The 169 used Missionaries in our census are classified by cancellation. The Hawaiian cancellations found on Missionaries are shown in Figure 6. We have excluded the San Francisco and Boston markings found on some Missionaries because they are not of Hawaiian origin.

The earliest cancellations were applied by pen (black or red) or crayon (always in red). The blue "PAID" in italics, found on two examples of the 13c Scott 3, including a cover without any other Hawaiian markings, was probably used before Whitney's cancellers arrived from New York. The Sugar Cane cancel (see lots 14 and 29) appears to have been an improvised method of cancellation used briefly in February 1852. Likewise, the use of the red "U.S./POSTAGE PAID" in oval in 1852 and 1853 was evidently short-lived.

The most frequently encountered cancellations are found among the so-called *cork killer* group. These are the 7-bar grid and Large Grid of Squares, used in 1852 and 1853 on both the Missionaries and Kamehameha III issues. The 7-bar grid—used during the zenith of the Missionary issue—accounts for 29% of all cancelled Missionaries. The Large Grid of Squares is found on 12% of cancelled Missionaries, a declining percentage as the Kamehameha III issue dominated after May 1853.

There are 32 Missionary stamps extant on covers, but the actual count of collectable covers is lower when we exclude multiples and the one small fragment. There are only 28 individual covers, including the Reichspost Museum's, leaving only 27 available to collectors. The *Advertiser* collection holds **eleven** of the Missionary covers, highlighted by the unique 2c cover.



Statistical Analysis of The Missionaries

THIS ANALYSIS PROVIDES A COMPREHENSIVE VIEW OF THE MISSIONARIES by category and reveals the pattern of usage based on cancellations. The tables and charts summarize the quantities in our census (Appendix I). Table A below shows the numbers by stamp and category (Unused, Cancelled, On Piece, On Cover) and by condition/availability (Sound, Minor Faults, Defective, Repaired, Museum Ownership). Table B on the opposite page shows the numbers for each cancellation—arranged in approximate chronological order—with a further breakdown by stamp.




Ten 5c Missionary covers are recorded in our census (Appendix I), including the Dawson cover (lot 9) bearing the 2c Missionary, which leaves only nine 5c covers for all practical purposes. Of the nine, one is a front only with a repaired stamp, and two others have repaired stamps. All of the remaining six covers have stamps with slight faults or, in the case of the one sound example, the frameline is cut into at one side. This cover is one of the finest.

Only three Missionary covers are addressed to San Francisco as their final destination, each franked with the 5c stamp. The "Ship 6" handstamp was applied to each incoming cover by the San Francisco post office to indicate the correct postage due for a ship letter delivered within the port of entry. The 2c ship captain's fee was paid in cash, presumably in advance at Honolulu. This letter was carried on the *Excel*, which left Honolulu on January 22, 1853, and arrived in San Francisco on February 16 (Gregory).

The writer of this letter, A. H. Spencer, started the East Maui Plantation on the island of Maui in 1849, in partnership with Dr. Robert W. Wood, a physician and capitalist who invested heavily in Hawaii's sugar industry. In his letter, Spencer makes several interesting comments: "[My family] came out in the R. B. Forbes arrived last Jany. They made the passage in one Hundred day the quickest passage ever made [around the Horn]. . . Have you escaped all the destructive fires that San Francisco has been scourged with. . . The greatest trouble with the planters is the uncertainty of the market and the large duty we are obliged to pay. If they could annex the Islands we should then be in the market. . . This is but a small speck in the world and it is very dull times. . . I have just heard of the Election of Pierce & King and Horatio Seymour Gov. of New York also the death of Daniel Webster."

Ten 5c Missionary covers are recorded in our census (Appendix I), including the Dawson cover (lot 9) bearing the 2c Missionary—essentially leaving nine 5c covers for collectors. The three known covers to San Francisco are present in the *Advertiser* collection, this being the earliest use. Of the 29 recorded Missionary covers, only two were handstamped by forwarders in Hawaii: the Porter & Ogden cover offered here, and the G. D. Gilman (Lahaina) cover (Census No. 2-I-COV-70).

The "Ship 6" marking indicates the correct postage due for a ship letter addressed to the port of entry. The 2c ship captain's fee was paid in cash, presumably in advance at Honolulu. The letter was carried on the Zoe, which cleared Honolulu on September 11, 1852, and arrived in San Francisco on October 2 (Gregory). This is one of the few Missionary covers correctly endorsed with the ship's name, "Per 'Zoe", reflecting the sender's familiarity with sailing schedules. In this brief letter from Porter & Ogden, they acknowledge the favor of Dupuy & Foulkes in forwarding two letters addressed to them and offer to reciprocate.

Ten 13c "Hawaiian Postage" Missionary covers are recorded in our census (Appendix I), including the partially charred Dawson cover with a strip of three (lot 29) and another cover with a small fragment that we record for academic purposes, but cannot count among collectable examples. Only three of the eight singles on cover are completely sound; in fact, four of the eight stamps are repaired or defective. This stamp shows a clear impression of the papermaker's embossed crest, indicating that stationery of British manufacture was used.

The use of blue ink at the San Francisco post office indicates an 1852 year-date for this cover. The *Zoe* cleared Honolulu on November 22, 1852, and arrived in San Francisco on December 12, carrying 2,341 letters, the largest volume of mail in the post office's history to that date (Gregory).

The red oval "U.S./POSTAGE PAID" handstamp was used infrequently in 1852 and 1853 on outbound mail from Honolulu to the United States, as evidenced by this cover, the stampless cover to Russia (see Part 2, lot 2136), and the pair of 1853 13c

Kamehameha III stamps off cover (see Part 1, lot 76). In 1859 the device was altered by removing the "U.S." and was used exclusively to cancel Numeral Issues on inter-island mail at the Honolulu post office. A detail of this marking with and without "U.S." is shown in Figure 6. Prior to the discovery of this cover by Floyd W. Fitzpatrick, circa 1951, the oval marking was not known to exist on the Missionaries.

The addressee, Charles Finney Gulick, died in 1854 at the young age of 20. The docketing at the left side of the envelope reads, "Recd from Mr. Wilcox June 15th/52. Written on board the Esther May." The sender of this cover was Abner Wilcox, a teacher in charge of the Waioli Select School. He visited the United States with his son in 1851 and returned to Kauai on April 4, 1852. The letter in this cover (no

longer present) was evidently written en route aboard the *Esther May* (see Figure 7). The cover was carried to the United States on the *Noble*, which sailed from Honolulu on April 27, 1852, and arrived on May 15 in San Francisco (Gregory).

Ten 13c "Hawaiian Postage" Missionary covers are recorded in our census (Appendix I), including the partially charred Dawson cover with the strip of three (lot 29) and a small fragment on cover recorded for academic purposes only. Of the eight singles known on cover, only four are actually tied by a cancellation—three of which are present in the *Advertiser* collection (the cover offered here and lots 4 and 6). The stamp on this cover is the sound one among them.

This Missionary cover comes from the Reynolds correspondence, which was first described in *Mekeel's* August 19, 1923 issue. The Economist Stamp Co. was noted as the buyer, and an unnamed individual identified his great-uncle, a naval officer, as the source. Two recorded Missionary covers emanate from the Reynolds correspondence (this cover and Census No. 2-I-COV-74). The likely sender is a relation of Stephen Reynolds, a trader who was active on the islands during the 1840s and who became a plantation owner in 1849. Reynolds lost his sanity in 1855 and left the islands.

This 13c cover was carried on the Mary A. Jones from Honolulu on October 4, 1852, and arrived in San Francisco on October 26. The same voyage carried the famous 2c Missionary cover (lot 9) and another 5c Missionary cover (Census No. 2-I-COV-70). The three October 4, 1852, covers, each franked in a different manner, provide instructive evidence of the difference in treatment of Hawaiian mail at the San Francisco post office during this period. This 13c cover, fully prepaid with only Hawaiian postage, arrived with the Mary A. Jones on October 26, but was not postmarked in San Francisco until the mails were prepared for the next regular sailing via Panama-it shows the "CAL." (all upper case with period) style of datestamp in red, dated November 1, the usual first-of-the-month date for mail via Panama. The 2c cover, also fully prepaid, but with U.S. stamps affixed, arrived in San Francisco and was immediately postmarked when the mail was processed on October 27, using the "Cal." (upper/lower case) style of datestamp in black to cancel the U.S. stamps. The 5c cover, with U.S. postage unpaid, was held along with the 13c cover until November 1 for postmarking with the via-Panama mails, but received the "CAL" (all upper-case letters without period) style of datestamp in black, along with a "12" (cent) due marking, also in black. The three pieces of mail arrived together and probably went out on the same eastbound vessel via Panama, but each was handled in a different way by the San Francisco post office, depending on the franking and prepayment involved.

THE ONLY MISSIONARY AND KAMEHAMEHA III MIXED-ISSUE FRANKING EXTANT, ACCORDING TO OUR CENSUS.

The Kamehameha III stamps were delivered to Honolulu postmaster, Henry M. Whitney, in April 1853 and placed on sale in May. The Missionaries are known on covers dated as late as March 1856; thus, for a period of almost two years the Missionaries and Kamehameha III stamps were used concurrently. While there are cancellations common to both issues, only one cover with a combination franking is recorded in our census (Appendix I). There have been past references to two or three such covers, but careful analysis indicates that they were based on the same cover, the one offered here.

Another unique feature of this cover is the Southern address. Of the 29 Missionary covers in our census, only this one is addressed to a U.S. location outside of San Francisco and the Northeastern states. The cover was carried on the *Boston*, which cleared Honolulu on September 10, 1853, and arrived in San Francisco on October 5 (Gregory).

THE QUINTESSENTIAL MISSIONARY COVER, SENT FROM HAWAII TO PERSIA BY MARIA WHITNEY POGUE, THE FIRST MISSIONARY DAUGHTER BORN IN THE ISLANDS, AND BEARING A PERFECT EXAMPLE OF THE RARE 13-CENT "H.I. & U.S. POSTAGE" STAMP.

Maria Kapule Whitney Pogue (see Figure 8), the daughter of Reverend and Mrs. Samuel Whitney, was the first missionary child born in the Hawaiian Islands (b. October 18, 1820). Her brother, Henry M. Whitney, was Hawaii's first Postmaster and the printer of the Missionary stamps. Maria Whitney married John Fawcett Pogue in 1848, four years after his arrival with the Eleventh Company of missionaries. The Pogues moved from the island of Hawaii to Lahainaluna on Maui in 1851 and were stationed there until 1866.




FIGURE 10. The female seminary at Oroomiah.

A year after settling in Lahainaluna, Mrs. Pogue wrote this letter to Fidelia Fiske, her former roommate at Mount Holyoke and a missionary colleague. Miss Fiske traveled to Oroomiah in 1843 to join the missionaries working among the Nestorians, a religious group whose ancient views of Christ were regarded by other Christians as heresy. Oroomiah is located on the plain of Oroomiah east of Kurdistan in the northwest region of Persia (see map in Figure 9). It was the site of a female seminary, of which Fidelia Fiske became the first principal (see Figure 10). The letter from Mrs. Pogue is a lengthy description of news and events of missionary life and compares the Nestorian people to the indigenous Hawaiians in a less-than-favorable light: Nestorians, I think, cannot be so degraded, heathenish in all their mental, moral & physical natures [as] are the natives of these Is." Mrs. Pogue also lashes out at the Catholic missions on the Islands: ". . . if the protestant miss. fail to educate the talent of the Is. the Catholics will

not & nothing would rejoice them more than to see this school go down so that they might grasp at once all our pupils & train them for the service of their church." The letter also contains a report on the health of various missionaries, including graphic references to the symptoms of disease.

This letter made a most extraordinary journey across the globe (see map in Figure 11). It was carried from Hawaii on the Mary A. Jones, which cleared Honolulu on July 26, 1852, and arrived in San Francisco on August 15. From San Francisco the prepaid letter was sent in the mails via Panama to Boston, where it was delivered to the missionary house at 33 Pemberton Square. Arrangements were made for letters to be carried back and forth by missionaries traveling between the United States and foreign countries. This letter was carried outside of the mails by vessel across the Atlantic and into the Mediterranean Sea. The journey is described in Faith Working By Love, a memoir of Fidelia Fiske's life (Rev. Daniel T. Fiske, 1868). The ocean voyage brought the missionaries and mail to the port city of Smyrna in Turkey. From there they traveled north across the Aegean Sea to Constantinople, and, after a stop, they continued on the waters of




FIGURE 12. The plains of Oroomiah.

the Black Sea to Trebizond in northeast Turkey. At Trebizond the missionaries prepared for the arduous land-journey to Oroomiah, a distance of approximately 400 miles. Caravans of twenty horses crossed the plains and mountain passes, covering about fifteen to twenty miles per day. About mid-way, the caravan rested at Erzroom, where other missionaries were situated. Then came the last leg of the trip, the dangerous trek across the Kurdish region, which required another two weeks and exposed the missionaries to attacks from Kurds. Upon reaching Oroomiah, the villages of the plains could be seen from the surrounding mountains (see Figure 12).

This letter comes from a small group addressed to Fidelia Fiske and discovered in a sea chest in the basement of a library in Shelburne, Massachusetts, in May 1938 (Bash). Of the recorded covers from the Fiske correspondence, two are franked with Missionaries (both 13c "H.I. & U.S. Postage" stamps) and two others bear Kamehameha III stamps (see lots 86 and 103). The stamp on this letter shows a slight double "kiss" print.

There are nine 13c "H.I. & U.S. Postage" Missionary covers recorded in our census (Appendix I), including one in the Reichspost Museum. Of the eight available to collectors, only two have stamps that are sound. Five of the other known covers have repaired stamps and two have minor faults (including the museum's cover). One of the two sound examples is on the letter to Persia offered here; the other sound example is in a European collection (Census No. 4-I-COV-192).

THE ONLY RECORDED MISSIONARY COVER WITH THE RARE CROSSED-BARS FANCY CANCELLATION AND ONE OF FOUR UNREPAIRED EXAMPLES OF THE 13-CENT "H.I. & U.S. POSTAGE" STAMP ON COVER, THREE OF WHICH ARE AVAILABLE TO COLLECTORS.

Nine 13c "H.I. & U.S. Postage" Missionary covers are recorded in our census (Appendix I), including the Reichspost Museum cover that is unavailable to collectors. Five of the nine Missionary stamps on these covers have been repaired (pieces restored or repaired faults), leaving four sound or slightly faulty examples. The Reichspost Museum cover is among these four, which reduces the available number of unrepaired 13c "H.I. & U.S. Postage" Missionary stamps on covers to three: the Fiske cover to Persia (the previous lot), the cover offered here, and the Burrage cover (Census No. 4-I-COV-192).

The existence of a July 1853 cover from the Reverend Sessions correspondence, franked with the 1853 Kamehameha III issue (Caspary sale, lot 29), suggests that this Missionary cover was postmarked on April 28, 1853. This date corresponds with the sailing dates of the *Boston*, which cleared Honolulu on April 30, 1853, and arrived in San Francisco on May 26 (Gregory).

Only six Missionary stamps are recorded with the distinctive Crossed-Bars fancy cancellation, this being the only example on cover.

Hawaiian Missionaries and United States Stamps Mixed-Franking Covers



THE CELEBRATED AND UNIQUE HAWAIIAN 2-CENT MISSIONARY COVER

Both Type II, the Missionaries are free of any repairs and are essentially in very fine condition; the 2c has mostly ample to large margins with framelines complete all around except for a small nick in the upper left corner, where a tiny part of the line has been discreetly filled in on the lettersheet; the 5c has three mostly ample margins and is just touched at left, there is a short closed tear at bottom and a small part of the frameline has been filled in at bottom right. Each Missionary is tied by the 7-bar grid cancel on a bluish folded cover addressed in the hand of William Dawson to Eliza A. Dawson, care of Jacob H. Dawson, at 273 Cherry Street in New York. To the left of the stamps is a clearly struck red "Honolulu*U.S. Postage Paid*Oct. 4" (1852) circular datestamp. The Missionaries are used in combination with a horizontal pair of United States 1851 3c Brownish Carmine (11), 1852 printing from Plate 2 Late, ample margins to just slightly in at bottom left, tied by "San Francisco Cal. 27 Oct." circular datestamp, 1849-53 style with "Cal." in upper and lower case letters

THE ONLY KNOWN COVER BEARING THE HAWAIIAN 2-CENT MISSIONARY. THE RAREST AND MOST FAMOUS OF ALL HAWAIIAN AND UNITED STATES COVERS AND UNIVERSALLY RANKED AMONG THE WORLD'S MOST IMPORTANT PHILATELIC ITEMS.

On this cover the Missionary stamps prepay the 5c Hawaiian postage and 2c ship captain's fee, and the pair of United States 3c stamps prepays the 6c transcontinental rate in effect at this time.

The 2c Missionary cover does not bear a year-dated marking, but can be reliably dated to 1852. The sender, William Dawson, sailed from San Francisco to the Hawaiian Islands on the schooner Samuel Roberts, which departed on March 10, 1851. His first letter from Hawaii (see Part 2, lot 2073) was written from Lahaina on April 19, 1851, in which he remarks, "I have cast my anchor on this Island & settled down in peace after having been tossed on the timultuous Waves of Life for Thousands of Miles & have come to the end of my journey." Thus, his correspondence with family and friends back home begins in April 1851. Another Missionary cover from the Dawson find is dated February 20, 1852 (see lot 29).

Further evidence of 1852 usage is provided by the United States stamps and the San Francisco postmark. The 3c pair comes from Plate 2 Late, which is known used as early as January 1852, and the Brownish Carmine shade and impression are typical of the 1852 printings and in stark contrast to the Rose Red shades circulating in 1854. The San Francisco circular datestamp, having a wide font and the letters "Cal." in upper and lower case, came into use in 1849 and is found on covers through early 1853, but no later.

The final factor in determining the year-date is the sailing schedule. The Mary A. Jones sailed from Honolulu on October 5, 1852, the day after the postmark was applied, and arrived in San Francisco on October 26, a voyage of 21 days (Gregory). An interesting comparison can be made between the 2c Missionary cover and two other Missionary covers carried on the same voyage (see lot 5 and Census No. 2-I-COV-70, Appendix 1). In the case of the 2c mixed-franking cover—a very early use of U.S. stamps from Hawaii—the San Francisco post office felt compelled to cancel the United States stamps immediately after unpacking the mail, and they used the "Cal." device dated October 27. In the case of the other two covers, which had no U.S. stamps (one fully prepaid by a 13c Missionary, the

other with U.S. postage due), there was no such compulsion. Those two letters were held for the regular processing of mail bound for the East Coast via Panama on November 1 and were postmarked with the "CAL" style of San Francisco datestamp.

This famous 2c cover, which has been included in every list of the world's most outstanding philatelic items, often as Number One in terms of rarity, quality and usage, has a fascinating provenance that is detailed in Alvin Good's *The Life and Adventures of a Philatelist* (pages 81-82). According to Good's account, during the summer of 1905 a defunct tannery in Bridgeport, Connecticut (reported in other accounts to have been Newark, New Jersey, or New Bedford, Massachusetts), was being cleaned for conversion to a morocco factory. Some 35 years earlier the building had been abandoned, and, in feeding old papers and records into the furnace before leaving, the previous occupants had choked out the fire, leaving bundles of half-burned papers in the stove's belly. The workman now given the job of cleaning out the boiler and furnace knew something about stamps and became intrigued by the presence of old stamps on folded letters and envelopes scattered among the

charred papers. When he noticed the partially burned envelope with a strip of three 13c Missionaries (see lot 29), he dug deeper and found the folded cover bearing the 2c Missionary. Fortunately for philately, this letter escaped an incendiary fate, showing nothing more than a faint spot at left where the lettersheet was licked by the flames.

The Dawson Missionary covers were sold soon after their discovery to or through New England Stamp Company. The firm featured the 2c cover on their season's greetings card of 1905-06 as "The Rarest Cover Known to Philately." It was acquired by George H. Worthington (Figure 13), the Cleveland chicle magnate and the leading American collector of the time, for a price reported to be \$6,000. Alvin Good, the source of the 2c Missionary cover's provenance, was Worthington's philatelic secretary. A pencil note on the back indicates that the cover was purchased by Worthington in March 1905.

The entire Worthington collection was acquired privately in 1917 by Alfred F. Lichtenstein, who retained some portions of the collection and sold others through a series of auctions in 1917-18. Lichtenstein and another major collector of the time, Alfred H. Caspary, are said to have had an informal truce whereby they avoided concentrating on the same philatelic subjects. Therefore, while Lichtenstein formed his own fine, but relatively modest, collection of Hawaii, the 2c cover was released, giving Caspary the opportunity to acquire it for his formidable collection of Hawaiian classics.

When the Caspary collection was sold by H. R. Harmer in October 1957, the 2c Missionary cover was purchased by Raymond H. Weill Co. for \$25,000—a phenomenal price that was $2\frac{1}{2}$ times the realization for the Alexandria "Blue Boy" postmaster's provisional cover in an earlier Caspary sale. The Weills retained the cover in stock briefly, until a collector, Mr. Phillips, acquired it for his stellar

United States collection. In 1969 the Weills purchased the Dawson cover along with the entire Phillips holding for \$4.07 million, but it was not long before Alfred J. Ostheimer III made the cover his most significant single acquisition and the cornerstone of his Hawaii collection.


After *The Honolulu Advertiser* purchased the Ostheimer collection in 1970, the 2c Missionary cover was absent from the market during the quarter-century when important covers climbed in value. Thus, what has been described as "the most valuable and interesting of any early nineteenth century cover" (Alvin Good) and "by far the most important item in Hawaiian philately [and] one of the greatest covers in the world" (Dr. Norman S. Hubbard, "Aristocrats of Philately", *Interphil* '76 Catalogue, p. 79), will be offered at auction for the first time in 38 years.

THE CALIFORNIA PENNY POST COMPANY COVER

Noble & Haskel, Davis St., near California."; additionally franked with United States 1851 3c Yellowish Rose Red (11), early 1856 shade, ample to large margins, bright shade, cancelled and tied by the "San Francisco Cal. 21 Mar." circular datestamp in black with matching "Ship 6" clamshell-style circular rate handstamp; the envelope is fresh and clean

AN EXTRAORDINARY MIXED-FRANKING COVER, SHOWING FOUR DIFFERENT FORMS OF POSTAGE, INCLUDING A RARE HAWAIIAN MISSIONARY, THE UNITED STATES 1851 ISSUE, THE SAN FRANCISCO FANCY SHIP-LETTER DUE HANDSTAMP, AND THE RARE PREPAID ENTIRE OF THE CALIFORNIA PENNY POST COMPANY.

This remarkable cover does not carry a year-dated postmark, but it can only be a March 1856 usage. The California Penny Post Company was started by J. B. Goodwin as a city delivery post in June 1855 and, by the beginning of 1856, faced increasing pressure from a hostile San Francisco postmaster. Service ceased after approximately one year in business. The 1856 usage also ties in with sailing dates of the *Yankee*, which cleared Honolulu on March 5, 1856, and arrived in San Francisco on March 20 (Gregory).

This cover involved a complex rating structure that leaves some room for interpretation. We can be certain that the 5c Missionary stamp prepaid the Hawaiian postage and that the "Ship 6" marking corresponds to the correct rate for a ship letter delivered within the port of entry. The California Penny Post Company 5c entire represents the correct fee for delivery from the post office to the addressees, Noble & Haskel. The box number facilitated the holding of mail at the post office until the Penny Post Co. picked up letters for delivery to the addressees.

The 3c 1851 stamp was probably affixed to this entire by the sender from a supply procured in San Francisco in early 1856, possibly before being carried to Hawaii. We can speculate that the sender arrived in Honolulu, conducted his business, and used the prepaid entire by adding the Hawaiian stamp to the U.S. postage—either unaware, unconcerned or confused as to the correct prepayment of United States postage. The Honolulu post office considered the U.S. portion of postage unpaid, as it was marked with the "Hawaiian-Islands" datestamp, not "U.S. Postage Paid." On arrival in San Francisco, the post office treated the entire as an unpaid ship letter, rating it 6c due with the handstamp. Whether or not the Penny Post Co. or its patrons, Noble & Haskel, received credit for the 3c stamp is uncertain. However, considering the tension between Goodwin's local post and the San Francisco post office, no favors were likely to have been extended. There is a pencil note on back, "Found in California Penny Post files", indicating that this may have been retained by Goodwin as evidence in his fight against the post office.

The use of a Hawaiian Missionary stamp on this March 1856 cover occurs late in the Missionary issue's life, but appropriately at a time when 5c stamps were in great demand and short supply in the Islands. The April 1855 rate change in the United States effectively increased the composite rate from 13c to 17c and created an increased demand for Hawaiian 5c stamps that could be used in combination

with U.S. 12c stamps. By the beginning of 1857 the shortage of 5c stamps had reached the critical point, and supplies of 13c Kamehameha III stamps were provisionally surcharged "5" cents. In the context of the new demands and shortages created by the April 1855 rate change, the use of a 5c Missionary stamp in March 1856 is understandable.

This unique Missionary cover was acquired by the late Richard Saffin in the 1920s or 1930s in New York City's stamp district. Saffin was a reclusive collector whose extensive postal history collection, including a number of never-before-seen covers, came to the market in 1982 when his estate was sold through Christie's. The cover had been secreted for nearly seven decades and was not included in the Meyer-Harris or Bash lists of Missionaries. The cover was certified genuine by The Philatelic Foundation in 1982 and acquired by Raymond H. Weill on behalf of *The Honolulu Advertiser* collection at the auction.

Although this Missionary cover has not had time in the public eye to receive the same widespread exposure as other important philatelic rarities, it would be difficult to overstate its singular status and significance. Of the 29 Missionary covers in our census (Appendix I), only six are mixed frankings with United States stamps, including one defective example and another with a repaired stamp. In the context of worldwide mixed-franking covers, the coincidence of two nations' postage stamps and local-post franking is, to our knowledge, unique in this period and found elsewhere only among the Chinese Treaty Ports of the 1890s.

The Missionaries Off Cover



THE UNIQUE UNUSED 1851 2-CENT BLUE

11°* 1851, 2c Blue (1). Type II, Unused, full deep impression on bright fresh paper, large margins with framelines complete all around and just touched at lower left, a few spots of blue printer's ink on back, completely sound

THE ONLY KNOWN UNUSED EXAMPLE OF HAWAII'S FIRST STAMP AND THE FINEST OF THE FIFTEEN RECORDED COPIES.

This remarkable stamp appeared in the first sale of the Count Philippe de la Renotiere von Ferrary collection, held at the Hotel Drouot in Paris on June 23, 1921, under the supervision of M. G. Gilbert. In the sale this stamp was described "probablement le plus bel exemplaire qui existe de ce timbre" ("probably the most beautiful example of this stamp that exists"); the describer mistook the printer's ink on back for a light blue cancel, an error of judgment that was repeated in the Meyer-Harris book (p. 112). The 2c Missionary was purchased in the Ferrary sale by Maurice Burrus, an Alsatian tobacco magnate, for the U.S. dollar equivalent of \$14,700—the highest price ever paid for a single stamp at that time. By comparison, in subsequent Ferrary sales the Swedish 1857 3-skilling banco Yellow color error was sold for \$3,095, the Baden 1851 9-kreuzer Blue-Green color error on cover sold for \$8,087, and an unused Mauritius 1847 1-penny "Post Office" realized \$9,733.

In the Ferrary sale, the reality about this 2c Missionary stamp—that it is an unused example—was apparently obvious to the bidders and to its buyer, Maurice Burrus. When the stamp was featured in *Life* magazine's "World's Rarest Stamps" (May 3, 1954), courtesy of Burrus, it was clearly identified as unused and valued at \$20,000. The massive Burrus collection was dispersed after his death in numerous auctions in the 1960s, and the Hawaii was sold by H. R. Harmer of New York on May 27, 1963. At that sale the 2c Missionary—its unused condition confirmed by a 1963 Philatelic Foundation certificate—soared to the world-record price of \$41,000. The successful bidders, Raymond and Roger Weill, wrote at the time of the acquisition, "[The stamp] was one of the two or three sound copies of an extremely rare stamp, unique in unused condition, intriguing through ancestry, issued by an American postmaster for what is now the 50th state in the union, and almost certain to realize a record price for a single stamp."

The record sale was reported extensively in the news media, but nowhere so imaginatively as in *Life* magazine (November 29, 1963), which devoted a full page in color to proclaim, "This, pound for pound, is the most valuable substance on earth." Weighing in at a mere one two-thousandths of a troy ounce, its value was calculated at \$1,195,833,395.61 per pound.

The unused 2c Missionary was placed by the Weills in the collection of Mr. Phillips, where it joined the unique 2c Missionary cover. After acquiring the Phillips collection in 1969, the Weills sold these two stellar rarities to Alfred J. Ostheimer III.

There is a story associated with the early history of this stamp that has been reported as fact by several philatelic authors, but disputed as fiction by others. Prior to Ferrary's ownership, the stamp is said to have been owned by a Parisian collector named Gaston Leroux. The story continues that Leroux was murdered by an envious philatelic colleague, who coveted the 2c Missionary and later confessed to killing Leroux to obtain it. The Missionary earned fame in another murder-mystery story when the motion picture *Charade* was released, casting the fabled Hawaiian stamp in a starring role with Cary Grant and Audrey Hepburn (we will not tell the ending).

12° **1851, 2c Blue (1).** Type I, a completely sound copy with bright fresh color, mounted on card for protection, clear to ample margins with framelines complete except at upper left where margin is slightly irregular, vivid red "Honolulu*U.S. Postage Paid*" circular datestamp indicating that this stamp was used on a fully prepaid letter to the United States

THE FINEST USED EXAMPLE OF THE HAWAIIAN 2-CENT MISSIONARY.

Our census of 2c Missionaries (Appendix I) shows that, of the fifteen recorded examples (four of which are in museums), only two sound stamps exist off cover—the unique unused copy (previous lot) and the beautifully cancelled stamp offered here. All of the other twelve off-cover used 2c Missionaries are defective or repaired. Only one other bears this Honolulu cancel (Census No. 1-I-CAN-3, Appendix I), but on that repaired example the marking is struck so faintly that it is indiscernible.

This stamp first appeared at public auction in the second sale of the Count Philippe de la Renotiere von Ferrary collection, held at the Hotel Drouot in Paris on October 13-15, 1921, under the supervision of M. G. Gilbert. In Stamps of Fame (p. 99 and 105) the Williams brothers cite a reference to a complete set of Hawaiian Missionaries in the Judge Frederick A. Philbrick collection, which they identify as Ferrary's probable source of this 2c Missionary. The Philbrick collection, which Ferrary acquired in 1882, was reputed to be the finest in England at that time and formed an important foundation for Ferrary's collecting efforts (Bierman, World's Greatest Stamp Collectors).

At the Ferrary sale, this stamp realized the equivalent of \$7,710, a price comparable to the \$8,394 paid for the ex-Philbrick Mauritius 1p and 2p "Post Office" piece in the same sale. The buyer was Theodore Champion, who acquired the 2c Missionary for his own collection. There is no further record of the stamp until the November 16, 1966, sale of Hawaii held by H. R. Harmer of New York, on behalf of Louise Boyd Dale, daughter of Alfred F. Lichtenstein. The offering is described as "Including the original collection formed by the late Alfred F. Lichtenstein, Offered without reserve by order of his daughter." In this auction the 2c Missionary—Lichtenstein's only example—realized \$30,000, selling to Raymond H. Weill Co. of New Orleans. The stamp was placed in the collection of Mr. Phillips, alongside the unused 2c Missionary and the cover. After the Weills acquired the Phillips collection in 1969 for \$4.07 million, the stamp was held in stock until 1970 when it was sold to Thurston Twigg-Smith.

Illustrated in *Smithsonian* magazine and *Rare Stamps*, L. N. and M. Williams (p. 25). Ex Ferrary (probably from Philbrick collection), Champion, Lichtenstein, Mr. Phillips, Twigg-Smith. Census No. 1-I-CAN-4. Other census references: Meyer-Harris 7, Brewster 1-I-Used-1. With 1995 P.F. certificate. Scott value for a repaired example with the usual black cancel is \$175,000.00. E. 150,000-200,000

13° **1851, 2c Blue (1).** Type II, a superb-appearing example with rich color and impression, large margins on all sides showing portions of framelines from adjoining stamps at left (space between two clichés) and right (gutter between impressions), cancelled by Large Grid of Squares. With respect to condition, we quote Herbert A. Bloch's description of this stamp in the 1957 Caspary sale: "A piece at top, which was torn off when the stamp was found, has been replaced in its original position without any repair in the philatelic sense of the word. Despite this fault a magnificent copy of this classic world rarity. . ."

ONE OF THE FINEST-APPEARING EXAMPLES OF THE 2-CENT MISSIONARY, OF WHICH ONLY FIFTEEN EXAMPLES ARE RECORDED AND ELEVEN ARE AVAILABLE OUTSIDE MUSEUMS.

The fourteen off-cover examples of the 2c Missionary in our census (Appendix I) include four stamps held by museums and only two sound copies (both offered in the previous two lots). The stamp offered here has the widest margins of any recorded 2c Missionary and is essentially intact, without any paper restoration or painting in of the design.

This 2c Missionary was brought to Ezra Cole, circa 1935, in an old leather notebook in New York City. His account of the discovery states: "This stamp was found by a lawyer friend of my father's in Brooklyn. It was in a small old red leather notebook. There were several other inexpensive stamps with it and this 2c Missionary was actually in two pieces. . .I took the notebook and the stamp up to my friend, Percy Doane, in the Tribune Building and inquired as to the genuineness of the stamp for I had never seen one. He told me that it was genuine and valuable and it could be sold even in its present condition. At some time later on, I sold it to Burger Brothers for \$4,500. They, in turn, sold it to A. H. Caspary. I never did learn how much Caspary paid for it." In the Caspary sale, the stamp realized \$5,250. It was subsequently acquired by Alfred J. Ostheimer III, whose collection helped form the basis of the *Advertiser* collection.

APART FROM THE UNIQUE COVER, THIS IS THE ONLY RECORDED USAGE OF THE 2-CENT MISSIONARY ON A PIECE OF MAIL AND THE ONLY RECORDED 2-CENT WITH THE RED "SUGAR CANE" FANCY CANCEL. IT IS ALSO THE ONLY RECORDED 13-CENT "HAWAIIAN POSTAGE" STAMP USED IN COMBINATION WITH ANOTHER MISSIONARY.

Assuming the stamps on this piece represent the entire Hawaiian franking, the only logical rate that 15c could prepay is the triple 5c Hawaiian postage. Another triple-rate Missionary usage is the strip of three 13c "Hawaiian Postage" Missionary on a partially charred cover from the Dawson correspondence (lot 29).

The stamps on both the piece and the Dawson cover are cancelled by the amorphous red blob that appears on some of the known Missionary stamps. This cancel, unique to the Hawaiian post office, has previously been identified as the Honolulu "Sunburst", but its true nature was unrecognized. We can now provide empirical evidence that the device used to make this cancellation was a cut piece of sugar cane. Figure 14 shows the results of our own experiment in stamping the end of a cleanly cut, freshly inked sugar cane. The fibers leave the same speckled pattern, and the cane makes a handy cancelling device. Based on this experiment and the absence of any other plausible theory, we have coined the term "Sugar Cane Cancel" for these impressions.

There is an interesting relationship between the Missionary piece offered here and the Dawson cover in lot 29. This piece bears the San Francisco datestamp of March 15—although no year-date is present, it is almost certainly 1852. The charred Dawson cover has part of a faint red San Francisco datestamp at lower left and a clearly struck Honolulu February 20 datestamp, which is an 1852 year-date. The two pieces of mail were probably postmarked in Honolulu on the same day or very close to one another. The Honolulu February 20 date ties in with three 1852 sailing departure dates: the *Maid of Julpha* (cleared Feb. 24, arrived Mar. 22), the *Eagle* (cleared Feb. 25, arrived Mar. 26), and the *Noble* (cleared Feb. 25, arrived Mar. 16) [Gregory]. Apart from these two dated pieces, there are ten off-cover Missionaries with the Sugar Cane cancel, all 13c "Hawaiian Postage" stamps (see Appendix I), indicating that its use pre-dated the 13c "H.I. & U.S. Postage" issue of April 1852 and that it was not used on 5c rate covers at all.

The history of this unique piece can be traced back to Henry J. Duveen, whose collection was sold privately through Charles J. Phillips from 1922 to 1926. After the Duveen dispersal the piece found its way into Alfred H. Caspary's collection. Caspary, though careful in his selection of philatelic material, was less fastidious in his curatorship and is reputed to have kept his material in a rather haphazard fashion. Several contemporary accounts confirm that Caspary carelessly placed a beverage glass on the 2c Missionary piece. As the moisture condensed, the thin pelure paper of the Missionaries curled and tore. Caspary, horrified by the consequences, gave the piece back to Warren H. Colson, the dealer from whom he acquired it, and never spoke of the matter again. Colson had the stamps expertly restored and sold the piece to Philipp Kosack. When the Kosack Missionaries were sold, an unidentified English collector purchased the piece, and, after his holding was dispersed, the piece became part of the Admiral Frederic R. Harris collection.

THE ONLY RECORDED SOUND UNUSED EXAMPLE. ONLY THREE OF THE TWELVE RECORDED UNUSED 5-CENT MISSIONARIES ARE FREE OF REPAIRS AND AVAILABLE TO COLLECTORS.

Of the twelve unused 5c Missionaries in our census (Appendix I), two copies are in the Tapling Collection at the British Library—whether or not they are repaired is moot to collectors, since they are unavailable. Of the ten unused copies available to collectors, seven are repaired and two have minor faults, leaving this example as the only sound unused 5c Missionary.

EXTREMELY FINE APPEARANCE AND THE ONLY RECORDED MISSIONARY WITH A BOSTON POSTMARK.

The Missionaries are infrequently found cancelled with part of the circular datestamp of San Francisco, where mail from Hawaii was normally routed. It is unclear to us how this singular example of a Missionary received a Boston datestamp. The possibilities are: a) that the stamp was affixed to a redirected letter and coincidentally cancelled at Boston; b) that the letter originated in the northeastern United States and was mailed to Hawaii with the 5c Missionary to prepay the Hawaiian postage on incoming mail (other examples of such usage are recorded); or c) that the letter was sent from Hawaii and, for some reason, was placed into the U.S. mails at the port of Boston.

AN EXTREMELY FINE AND SOUND USED EXAMPLE OF THIS RARITY. PROBABLY FEWER THAN FIVE SOUND 5-CENT MISSIONARIES, USED OR UNUSED, ARE AVAILABLE TO COLLECTORS.

Sound 5c Missionaries are widely perceived to be extremely rare. This perception is confirmed by the actual numbers in our census (Appendix I). Of the 61 5c Missionaries we record, three are in museum collections. Ten of the 58 available to collectors are on covers, leaving 48 stamps off cover or on piece. Ten of the available off-cover copies are unused (only one of which, lot 15, is sound). The 38 available used examples off cover or on piece include just three stamps that we think are sound: the 5c on piece (ex Ishikawa, Census No. 2-I-PCE-65) and two other stamps cancelled in black (2-II-CAN-59) and red (this example, the finer of the two). Of the remaining 35, at least 27 have verified defects or repairs.

EXCEPTIONALLY FINE CONDITION FOR A MISSIONARY AND A CHOICE EXAMPLE OF THE 5-CENT TYPE II SHOWING THE SMALL-SIZE "N" IN "CENTS".

Of the 61 5c Missionaries recorded in our census (Appendix I), only fourteen off-cover stamps are available to collectors without repairs or serious defects, including eleven used examples. This Type II stamp shows the distinctive small "n" in "Cents", a font characteristic of the 5c Missionary that indicates this value was the first setting of the Missionary printings (the other values show the "n" in the correct size).

A VERY FINE 13-CENT "HAWAIIAN POSTAGE" MISSIONARY. ONLY SEVEN UNUSED EXAMPLES ARE RECORDED, OF WHICH ONLY THREE ARE FREE OF REPAIRS.

There are 70 copies of the 13c "Hawaiian Postage" Missionary recorded in our census (Appendix I), including six stamps in the British Library and Reichspost Museum collections. Seven examples are thought to be unused, of which four have portions of design painted in. Only three can be considered sound or with minor faults, including this stamp.

A VERY FINE UNUSED EXAMPLE OF THE 13-CENT "HAWAIIAN POSTAGE" MISSIONARY.

There are seven unused examples of the 13c "Hawaiian Postage" Missionary recorded in our census (Appendix I), including four that have repairs. Although we count this stamp among the repaired examples, the sealed tear is very minor and does not involve any paper restoration or painting in of the design—the other three repaired copies have paper addition and repainting.

Of the 51 used off-cover examples of the 13c "Hawaiian Postage" Missionary in our census (Appendix I), only nine were cancelled in Honolulu by the circular datestamp without an obliterating cancel, including a copy in the Tapling Collection at the British Library and one small fragment on a piece that is recorded for academic purposes only. With the exception of the piece (Census No. 3-I-PCE-134) from our 1993 Rarities of the World sale, bearing a superb and sound stamp, the stamp offered here is far superior to most of the other known examples. The minor faults detailed in our description do not seriously detract from its appearance.

VERY FINE APPEARANCE AND EXTREMELY RARE CANCELLED BY THE RED SAN FRANCISCO DATESTAMP.

Of the different Missionaries, the 13c "Hawaiian Postage" has the widest variety of cancellations—Honolulu used, in approximate chronological order: black pen cancels ("X" or crossed lines); red manuscript (squiggles and crossed lines); blue italic "PAID"; the red Sugar Cane cancel; the red "U.S. Postage Paid" in oval and the Honolulu datestamp; and segmented corks in different styles (7-bar grid, Large Grid of Squares, Small Grid of Rectangles). In this instance, the orange-red circular datestamp was struck across the lower right corner, probably by chance as the post office was processing prepaid mail for the next trip via Panama. The magenta manuscript cancel visible on this stamp in the Admiral Harris sale was removed before its next appearance at auction. The magenta pen cancel indicates a very early use of the stamp.

EXTREMELY FINE UNUSED EXAMPLE OF THE FINAL MISSIONARY ISSUE. ONLY SEVEN COPIES ARE AVAILABLE IN UNUSED CONDITION, AND THIS MAGNIFICENT STAMP HAS BUT ONE POTENTIAL RIVAL.

Eight unused examples of the 13c "H.I. & U.S. Postage" Missionary are recorded in our census (Appendix I), including the ostensibly unused stamp in the Tapling collection at the British Library. Of the seven copies available to collectors, at least four have verified repairs or serious defects, and a fifth has minor faults. There is only one potential rival to the superb unused stamp offered here—the huge-margined Type II stamp last seen publicly in the 1939 William H. Crocker auction and described in that sale catalogue as sound, but with no subsequent verification.

Our census of 13c "H.I. & U.S. Postage" Missionaries (Appendix I) records eight unused examples, including the ostensibly unused stamp in the Tapling collection at the British Library. This example is relatively attractive without any repainting of the design.

A RARE AND UNLISTED VARIETY OF THE TYPOGRAPHED MISSIONARY ISSUE.

Only four Missionaries are known to show the doubling effect of a "kiss" print—one is a 13c "Hawaiian Postage" issue from the Adm. Harris collection, and the others are 13c "H.I. & U.S. Postage" issues (see also lots 7 and 25). While not classified as a true double impression, in which two distinct and complete impressions are made, a "kiss" print results from the sheet of paper touching the inked type during the printing of multiple impressions.

Only eight unused 13c "H.I. & U.S. Postage" Missionaries are recorded in our census (Appendix I), including the ostensibly unused stamp in the Tapling collection at the British Library. This example shows an average degree of repairing.

VERY FINE AND THE FINER OF THE TWO RECORDED SOUND USED 13-CENT "H.I. & U.S. POSTAGE" MISSIONARY STAMPS OFF COVER.

There are 51 examples of the 13c "H.I. & U.S. Postage" Missionary in our census (Appendix I). Only 34 used stamps are recorded off cover or on piece, and about two-thirds of these are repaired or in museum collections. Of those unrepaired copies that remain in private hands, only two sound used examples are recorded: the stamp offered here and the cut-in, slightly toned example, ex Potts, Moody and Krug (Census No. 4-II-CAN-176). Thus, for the collector of sound used classics, this is a rarity among rarities.

ONE OF THE FINEST OF THE 32 USED OFF-COVER EXAMPLES OF THIS MISSIONARY STAMP AVAILABLE TO COLLECTORS.

There are 34 used off-cover 13c "H.I. & U.S. Postage" Missionaries in our census (Appendix I), including two in the Tapling collection at the British Library. Of the 32 used copies remaining in private hands, only fourteen are not repaired or seriously defective. This stamp has relatively minor flaws, even among the select group.

THE ONLY RECORDED INTACT MULTIPLE, ON OR OFF COVER, OF ANY MISSIONARY STAMP, PROVIDING RIGOROUS PROOF OF THE ARRANGEMENT OF THE TWO TYPESET CLICHES.

This remarkable survivor comes from the famous Dawson find, from which the celebrated 2c Missionary cover emerged unscathed. This triple-rate cover with the unique strip of three was less fortunate. The charring has affected the front of the envelope and the strip has been partially restored with repainting of approximately half of the lefthand stamp, the upper third and a wedge-shaped piece of the center stamp, and the lower right corner of the righthand stamp. The cancellation has been added or touched up in places. Out of respect to this cover's provenance, the envelope has never been restored, but this could be accomplished by a skilled paper restorer.

The full story of the Dawson find is told in the description of lot 9, the famous 2c Missionary cover. The origin of the Sugar Cane cancellation and the relationship between this cover and the 2c and 13c Missionaries on piece are described in lot 14. Sailing records indicate that this cover was carried on one of three February 1852 voyages from Honolulu to San Francisco: the *Maid of Julpha* (cleared Feb. 23, arrived Mar. 22), *Eagle* (cleared Feb. 25, arrived Mar. 26), or the *Noble* (cleared Feb. 25, arrived Mar. 16) [Gregory]..

The triple rate was fully prepaid by the strip, inclusive of United States postage $(3 \times 5c \text{ Hawaiian} = 15c \text{ plus } 3 \times 6c \text{ U.S.} = 18c \text{ for a total of } 33c)$. The 2c ship captain's fee was overpaid by 4c because each 13c stamp included 2c for the ship captain, but this was charged per letter, not per rate.

The strip shows the perfect alignment of Types I and II at left, representing the correct cliché positions, and the shifted position of Type I at right from the adjoining impression.

This pair was part of Henry J. Crocker's plating study of the Missionaries, which also included the strip on cover in the previous lot. Together they represent the only known multiples of the Missionaries.

Little is known of the origin of this pair, though it is possible that it, too, emanated from the Dawson find and was removed from a damaged cover. The two positions show an interesting skewed alignment of the framelines. Type II has the characteristic missing period after the "U" of "U.S."

Kamehameha III Issues

Kamehameha III Issues

THE FIRST PRINTING IN THIS SERIES OF FOURTEEN STAMPS (including the 1857 Provisional, Re-Issues and Official Imitations) was ordered by Postmaster Henry M. Whitney and issued in May 1853. The last of the series, the Official Imitation, was printed in 1889 and overprinted in 1892. Both the 5c and 13c denominations picture a three-quarter bust of King Kamehameha III. Because the first issue was engraved and printed in Boston, it is sometimes called the Boston Engraved issue.

1853 FIRST PRINTING (Scott 5 and 6)

The plates of twenty subjects were engraved by Nathaniel Dearborn in Boston, and the stamps were printed by Dearborn or possibly another printer named Holland. They went on sale in Honolulu in May 1853. The 5c stamp was printed in dark blue on very thick white paper (.005 inches) and prepaid the Hawaiian single letter rate on U.S.-Hawaiian mail. The 13c was printed in a deep orange-red on equally thick paper with a slightly yellowish cast and prepaid the composite rate of 5c Hawaiian, 2c ship fee and 6c U.S. transcontinental rate (until March 31, 1855). Multiples of the First Printing are extremely rare; the largest 5c multiple, unused or used, is a pair (lots 34, 41 and 81), and only three blocks of the 13c (possibly four) are known, including the record-size blocks of eight and twelve that were cut from the same sheet (lots 56 and 57). The 5c is of about equal scarcity in unused or used condition. Genuinely used 13c stamps are much rarer than unused examples and considerably rarer than the 5c stamp, despite the Scott Catalogue quotes, which value the 5c more highly.

1857 MANUSCRIPT PROVISIONAL SURCHARGE (Scott 7)

Following the increase in the U.S. transcontinental rate from 6c to 10c on April 1, 1855, the 13c Kamehameha III stamp could no longer prepay the full postage from Hawaii to the U.S. East Coast, the rate having increased from 13c to 17c. In consequence, the patrons of Hawaii's postal system began using 5c stamps plus 12c U.S. stamps, or 13c plus 4c cash, or, when both denominations were available, 5c and 13c Kamehameha III stamps together. This circumstance soon depleted the supply of 5c stamps, and Postmaster Whitney's resignation in June 1856 appears to have interfered with the timely request for a second printing to replenish the dwindling supply.

In 1857 the post office in Honolulu applied a manuscript "5" to the ample supply of 13c Kamehameha III stamps to create provisional 5c values. Dated examples indicate that the provisionals were issued in January 1857 and were no longer circulating after August 1857. There are two earlier provisional overprints known to philatelists: in late 1845 the U.S. City Despatch Post carrier service in New York City surcharged stamps with a large red "2", and, in 1855 the post office in Cuba issued revalued provisionals. In Honolulu the overprint was applied by hand to each stamp in the sheet. Three distinctive types of "5" surcharges can be distinguished: Type I has a long flag at top; Type II has a short flag; and Type III has a loop at the bottom of the vertical stroke.

No multiples, used or unused, are known. Seventeen covers with the manuscript provisional surcharge are recorded, two of which are contained in the *Advertiser* collection (lots 103 and 104).

1857 SECOND 5-CENT PRINTING (Scott 8)

During Postmaster Joseph Jackson's term he was responsible for the Second Printing of the 5c Kamehameha III stamp and the first Numeral issue in August 1859. He died in office on August 14, 1859.

The second shipment of 5c stamps was placed on sale sometime in mid-1857 and remained available for use until 1862, even after the Third Printing was in circulation. The paper used for the Second Printing was white and thinner than the previous issue, measuring approximately .002 to .003 inches in thickness. The shade of blue is lighter and slightly more greenish that the deep blue of the First Printing.

The Second Printing stamps are more common in used condition than are the First or Third Printings; they are scarcer unused. Multiples are very rare—there are no recorded blocks, and the largest pieces, unused or used, are strips of four (lots 105 and 109). Even pairs of this stamp are very rare, with only four examples recorded on cover. The Second Printing was the most extensively

used Kamehameha III stamp, and covers are known dated as late as June 1862 (lot 126). The stamp is not known bisected, although a number of rates, including the introduction of the 2c inter-island rate in 1859, might have created the need for a split usage. The relatively long period of use spanned three separate issues of United States stamps—the 1851 imperforates, 1857 perforated and 1861 issues—all of which were available in Hawaii and are found in mixed frankings with the 5c Second Printing.

There are a few recorded Second Printing stamps that show a distinct double impression (lots 115 and 116).

1861 THIRD 5-CENT PRINTING (Scott 9)

The supply of 5c Kamehameha III stamps was depleted again by late 1860. Postmaster Alvah K. Clark ordered another 20,000 on March 12, 1861. The paper used for this issue was thinner than the Second Printing paper—measuring .0017 to .002 inches thick—and it was bluish, not white. The Third Printing stamps were probably distributed in late 1861 (see lot 145).

The 5c Kamehameha III stamps were still in use in early 1866. Despite their availability over a four-year period and the fact that no other 5c issues were available until 1865, Third Printing stamps are relatively common in unused condition, but they are very scarce used, on or off cover. There is no satisfactory explanation for the disproportionate number of unused stamps versus used stamps from the Third Printing, and we believe that further research will yield new knowledge about the quantities printed and issued. We think it is possible that Postmaster Kalakaua, who replaced Jackson, ordered more 5c Kamehameha III stamps in 1864. His order for the new 5c Kamehameha V stamps was placed on April 25, 1865, but a March 6, 1865, letter from Kalakaua to Postmaster Coney at Hilo states: "Your order for 5c Hawaiian and 5c U.S. stamps I am unable to furnish, being entirely out of them and having been obliged to send to the United States for a fresh supply..." The timing of this ambiguous statement has led some researchers to conclude that Kalakaua was referring to the new Kamehameha V stamps (Scott 32); others have determined that he was referring to an additional printing from the old Kamehameha III plate. The examples found on very thin, strongly blued paper with original gum—which seem to exist in an unusually large number—are likely candidates for this undocumented printing.

1867-68 FOURTH PRINTING—RE-ISSUES (Scott 10, 11, 10S, 11Sa and 11Sb)

By the mid-1860s stamp collecting was gaining popularity and stamp dealers began their efforts to secure supplies of popular issues to meet demand. The stamps of the exotic Hawaiian Islands were in great demand but relatively small supply. In late 1867 or early 1868 the Honolulu post office authorized a re-issue of the 5c and 13c Kamehameha III stamps. The original plates were used, but the colors and papers were noticeably different from the three earlier printings.

There was no postal need for the Fourth Printing. It was intended to fill the needs of stamp collectors and, after the initial supply was released, the balance was overprinted "Specimen" to prevent postal usage—three types of overprints are recognized by Scott. The re-issues, with and without overprints, were sold at face value until 1896 and are found used on philatelically-inspired covers. In 1896 the remainders were destroyed.

Multiples of the 5c are not uncommon. The 13c Scott 11 is very rare in block form.

1889 OFFICIAL IMITATIONS (Scott 10R, 11R, 10RS and 11RS)

As late as December 1887 the Honolulu postmaster, F. Wundenberg, ordered an additional printing of the 5c and 13c Kamehameha III stamps. A previous postmaster, A. P. Brickwood, had defaced the original plates, thus requiring Wundenberg to send the original 5c die to American Bank Note Company in New York, so that they could create new plates. By retouching the 5c die and re-engraving a new 13c die, ABNCo. was able to produce plates that closely imitated the original issue. 10,000 of each value in blue and orange-red colors were sent to Honolulu and placed on sale on September 6, 1889. On August 19, 1892, the remaining supply was overprinted "Reprint" in black by the Robert Grieve Publishing Company of Honolulu. On January 18, 1897, the remainders were destroyed. Only 3,635 copies of Scott 10R and 10R-S, and only 1,696 copies of 11R and 11R-S had been sold in more than eight years. An additional cache of 1889 imitations, with a large "Specimen" overprint, reached the market when the ABNCo. archives were dispersed in 1990.

This and the block of eight in the following lot were cut from the same pane and were seen together in the Ferrars H. Tows collection sold by Carl E. Pelander in October 1948. After the Tows auction, the pieces were sold to Alfred H. Caspary (block of eight) and Admiral Frederic R. Harris. (block of twelve). When the Harris and Caspary collections were sold in 1954 and 1957, respectively, no one seized the opportunity to reunite the two. The larger block from the Harris sale went to Harold Leavitt, a California collector, and the small block from Caspary went to Josiah K. Lilly. After the Lilly collection was sold by our firm in 1967, the two blocks were finally reunited and acquired by Alfred J. Ostheimer III. Seen together again for the first time since the 1948 Tows sale, it is observed that someone, presumably Caspary, trimmed off a small part of the sheet margin of the smaller block.


THE ONLY RECORDED COVER BEARING A PAIR OR ANY MULTIPLE OF THE 1853 5-CENT KAMEHAMEHA III FIRST PRINTING.

This cover comes from the Archer correspondence, which includes the unique Missionary/Kamehameha mixed franking offered as lot 6 in this sale. The cover does not have a year-date, but was probably carried in 1856 on the *Yankee*, which cleared Honolulu on September 4 and arrived in San Francisco on September 21. The San Francisco datestamp does not show the day clearly, but it was probably postmarked on or about the first of the month when the next Panama sailing was set to depart. The small red pencil "32c" accurately reflects the necessary postage for a double-rate letter (2 x 5c Hawaiian = 10c, plus 2 x 10c U.S. = 20c, plus the 2c ship captain's fee), but the use of two 12c stamps involved a 2c overpayment.

By September 1856 the Honolulu post office was beginning to run short of 5c stamps, as a consequence of the April 1855 rate change, which increased the Hawaii-U.S. rate from 13c to 17c and created greater demand for 5c-plus-12c frankings. This pair is the only recorded multiple of the 5c First Printing (Scott 5) on cover.

A REMARKABLE MIXED FRANKING, PRECISELY PREPAYING THE HAWAIIAN 5-CENT RATE, THE UNITED STATES 20-CENT DOUBLE RATE, AND THE 2-CENT SHIP CAPTAIN'S FEE.

There is evidence on this cover indicating that when it left the post office at Hilo, there was additional Hawaiian postage affixed, which was removed at Honolulu, and, in its place, the two United States stamps were affixed. Beneath the 10c and 12c stamps are scuffs in the envelope, of the size and shape that would result if other stamps were peeled off. The scuffs were not there when the address was written (the letter "n" of "Munson" is affected), but were there before the U.S. stamps were affixed and then cancelled at the San Francisco post office (the datestamps are impressed over the scuffs). The Honolulu "U.S. Postage Paid" marking confirms that the letter was fully prepaid at Hilo, probably with two 13c Kamehameha III stamps, which, together with the 5c Kamehameha III, would make up 31c of the necessary 32c postage (the other 1c paid in cash). The use of 10c and 12c values on the same cover is rare—in this case, the precise U.S. postage was 22c (2 x 10c postage plus 2c ship fee).

THE FINEST OF THE FIVE COVERS KNOWN TO US WITH A SINGLE 13-CENT KAMEHAMEHA III STAMP USED BY ITSELF PRIOR TO APRIL 1855, PAYING THE SHORT-LIVED RATE FOR WHICH IT WAS CREATED.

Our records contain just five examples of the 13c Kamehameha III stamp used by itself—without any secondary franking—on covers dated prior to the United States April 1855 rate change. This rate change effectively increased the Hawaiian rate to the U.S. East Coast from 13c to 17c, thereby eliminating the purpose for which this stamp was originally created. During the period from May 1853 until April 1855, the practice of affixing United States stamps to Hawaiian mail became more regular. Only two of the five solitary 13c covers have the stamp tied by any marking, and this is the finest of all five covers.

Though the Scott Catalogue values 13c mixed-franking covers more highly than this single franking, it is well-known among specialists that this usage is far rarer than any other. In fact, the Meyer-Harris book illustrates this cover on page 29 and states (p. 31): "Since the custom of adding United States stamps was begun very soon after the "Boston Engraved" issue came into use, covers with a 13c engraved and without any United States stamps are even rarer than 'Missionary' covers."

A REMARKABLE MIXED-FRANKING LETTER, MAILED BY MARIA WHITNEY POGUE—THE FIRST MISSIONARY CHILD BORN IN HAWAII—TO HER SCHOOLMATE FROM MOUNT HOLYOKE, FIDELIA FISKE, WHO WAS WORKING AMONG THE NESTORIANS IN PERSIA.

A complete background of the Pogue-Fiske correspondence is provided in the description to lot 7, the 13c Missionary cover to Persia. This letter, written in June 1854, adds another chapter to the fascinating story.

The rates that applied to the earlier Missionary cover were still in effect at the time this June 1854 letter was mailed—5c Hawaiian, 6c U.S. postage and 2c ship captain's fee. However, by this time the Missionaries had been superseded by the Kamehameha III issue (though the two issues were used concurrently), and the practice of affixing United States stamps on letters at the Honolulu post office had become more regular. *Paste-overs*, as they are termed, were one means of showing full prepayment of the U.S. rate. Perhaps a half-dozen covers are known franked in this manner.

An interesting feature of this letter is the manuscript note at the top of the address panel: "overland Contple 12 Octe 54", which, based on the route to Oroomiah described in Fidelia Fiske's biography (see pages 31-33), indicates "Overland via Constantinople (Turkey)." Where and by whom this route marking was applied is not known, but the letter was probably carried from Boston to Smyrna, then by water to Constantinople. Whether the land-journey commenced at Constantinople or, as described in Fiske's biography, from Trebizond in northeast Turkey, is uncertain.

The letter itself discusses missionary life and problems of health. Mrs. Pogue writes with remarkable candor, "The increase of foreigners increases fearfully the amount of sin committed & we are appalled to think & see what is going on around us—The ravages of small-pox last year—you probably have heard of it—will nigh sweep off the nation—nothing but the most strenuous efforts & the most strick tabus kept the disease out from any part of the Is. It is remarkable that the disease was introduced first probably by a sailor's intercourse with a prostitute at Honolulu & that that class of persons were the greatest sufferers. Wherever persons of bad character were found there we were sure to hear of the disease & most of the abandoned were carried off by it." Fidelia Fiske received this letter and, according to docketing in her hand, answered it on April 29, 1855.

ONE OF THE FINEST OF THE FEW RECORDED EXAMPLES OF THIS MIXED FRANKING AND ESPECIALLY DESIRABLE WITH THE ALL OF THE STAMPS VISIBLE.

In the period following the April 1855 rate change, which increased the Hawaii-U.S. rate from 13c to 17c, letters are found franked with 5c and 13c Kamehameha III stamps used together to prepay the new rate. It is believed that all of the surviving covers (six confirmed) with these 5c-plus-13c mixed frankings originated in Hilo; however, one cannot conclude that they were limited to Hilo, because there is the strong possibility that other outlying post offices forwarded letters to Honolulu with similar frankings, but the covers have not survived.

It is not known whether the Hawaiian stamps overpaid the rate by 1c or the 13c stamps were sold for 12c each. The latter seems more likely, given the financial prudence of the missionaries and the existence of official correspondence indicating that 13c stamps were sold for lower rates at times during this period. When the letters were received in Honolulu, they were usually franked with United States stamps. For collectors the more desirable arrangement of stamps is displayed on this cover, rather than the paste-overs.

A FINE AND EXTREMELY RARE FRANKING, COMBINING BOTH KAMEHAMEHA III ISSUES AFTER THE APRIL 1855 RATE CHANGE RENDERED OBSOLETE THE 13-CENT'S ORIGINAL PURPOSE.


Following the increase from 6c to 10c in the U.S. transcontinental rate on April 1, 1855, the 13c Kamehameha III stamp could no longer prepay postage from Hawaii to the U.S. East Coast, the rate having increased from 13c to 17c. In consequence the patrons of Hawaii's postal system began using 5c stamps plus 12c U.S. stamps, or 13c stamps plus 4c cash, or, in this case, 5c and 13c stamps together. Whether the last franking method involved overpayment, or the 13c stamps were sold for 12c each, has never been clearly established, though written official communications indicate that at times the 13c stamps were sold for reduced rates. Surviving covers with such combinations—at least six of which are recorded—all originate at Hilo, but other outlying offices might also have forwarded letters to Honolulu with similar frankings.

During the period dating from April 1855 it was already a regular practice to affix U.S. postage stamps to outbound letters on which the U.S. rate had been prepaid. This is a remarkable example of a fully-prepaid letter, on which no U.S. stamps were affixed. The red San Francisco datestamp with "Paid 12" confirms that the letter never carried U.S. stamps.

Based on the content of these letters, we know that the Hilo postmaster, B. Pitman, mailed three sequential letters to the same addressee, each containing installment bills of exchange for proceeds from the ship *Ontario*. This December 13, 1855, folded letter, the subsequent December 23 folded letter (the following lot), and an earlier December 7 letter (ex Rust and sold in our Sale 681, lot 591) comprise the three letters. In addition, Pitman also wrote from Hilo to Mrs. Sally Pitman in Boston on May 13, 1856.

The three December letters were forwarded from Hilo to Honolulu over a two-week period, but they remained at the Honolulu office until the *Yankee* was cleared for departure on January 3, 1856, arriving in San Francisco on January 17. On this and the earlier letter, each of the 13c Kamehameha III stamps was used (presumably with cash) to prepay the 17c rate. On the final letter (the following lot), the postmaster had a 5c Kamehameha III stamp and used the two together. We can be certain that the U.S. 12c stamps were affixed in Honolulu, because the last cover is a paste-over usage, and the red Honolulu datestamp just ties the 12c together with the Hawaiian stamps. Evidently the addressee, W. R. Post, had moved from Sag Harbor to Southampton, and the three letters were forwarded on the same day, February 18, postage due 3c each.

The correspondence was preserved and sold intact to one of the earliest American cover collectors, John F. Seybold. After the Seybold collection was dispersed, the covers went separate ways into the collections of Knapp (Dec. 13), West (Dec. 23) and Tows (Dec. 7). Two of the three have been reunited in the *Advertiser* collection.

THE THIRD AND LAST OF THE POSTMASTER PITMAN COVERS TO SAG HARBOR, BEARING BOTH KAMEHAMEHA III ISSUES IN A MIXED FRANKING WITH THE UNITED STATES 12-CENT 1851 ISSUE.

The background of this correspondence and the rates involved are given in the description for the previous lot. Of the three Pitman covers sent from Hilo in December 1855, only this cover has both the 5c and 13c Kamehameha III issues, which were affixed when the cover was forwarded from the Hilo post office to Honolulu. A later cover from Pitman to Mrs. Sally Pitman (May 1856) also has the 5c-plus-13c mixed franking with a 12c 1851 applied in Honolulu.

The fact that the 12c stamp on this cover is tied by the red Honolulu datestamp confirms beyond question that the U.S. stamp was affixed in Hawaii, not in San Francisco. It is known that the Hawaiian post offices were supplied with United States stamps.

The trio of Pitman covers was sold intact to John F. Seybold, one of the earliest American collectors of covers. When the Seybold collection was dispersed, the three covers went into the Knapp, Tows and West collections. This cover was William West's, and, after his collection was sold at auction, it went to Admiral Harris and eventually to Philip G. Rust.

A VERY CHOICE AND BEAUTIFUL SIDE-BY-SIDE MIXED FRANKING FROM HILO DURING THE PERIOD IN WHICH IMPROVISED USE OF THE 13-CENT KAMEHAMEHA III STAMP TOOK MANY VARIED FORMS.

Among the methods of prepayment available to patrons after the April 1855 rate change was the use of a single 13c Kamehameha III stamp plus 4c in cash. This variation and others seem to have originated from the Hilo post office, judging from the surviving covers, but it is also possible that other outlying post offices forwarded mail to Honolulu with similar frankings, examples of which have not survived. In any case, presuming that the U.S. stamp was not affixed until the letter was processed at Honolulu, the Hilo office must have had a way of indicating to the Honolulu office that letters such as this had been fully prepaid, despite the presence of only a 13c stamp. Perhaps the mail was bundled and tagged according to prepayment.

This remarkable letter is one of seventeen recorded covers bearing the rare 5c on 13c Kamehameha III provisional stamp, issued between January and August 1857 to compensate for a shortage of 5c Kamehameha III stamps throughout the islands. Only five of the seventeen covers are franked with the United States 10c 1855 Issue, and only this 5c provisional cover is addressed to Persia.

The unusual feature of this cover, apart from its destination, is the method in which prepayment of the ship captain's fee was handled. Other covers from this period are franked with 12c United States postage, sufficient in value to cover the 2c fee. On this cover the Hawaiian stamp and U.S. 10c stamp were affixed, presumably at Lahaina, and the letter was forwarded to Honolulu. The small red pencil "2" is identical in style and appearance to rate notations found on other covers and almost certainly was applied in Hawaii, presumably at the Lahaina

office, to indicate 2c prepayment. The unsolved mystery of this cover is the origin of the red "PAID" handstamp and large magenta "2". The shade and texture of the orange-red ink are identical to those of the Honolulu datestamp impression, but this type of "Paid" marking is not known to have been used in Hawaii. On the other hand, it is typical of San Francisco "Paid" handstamps, but these were usually applied to incoming prepaid letters during the 1851-55 period and no later than May 1856. A search of covers from Hawaii through San Francisco, dated after May 1856, turned up no other example of this style of marking, which appears to have been replaced by a larger "PAID 12" handstamp in June 1856. Logically, it makes sense that the "Paid" and "2" markings would have been applied in Honolulu to indicate to the San Francisco post office that the full U.S. rate, including 2c ship captain's fee, had been prepaid in Hawaii under the usual accounting arrangement. Had the letter only been partially prepaid, we would expect to see the "Honolulu*Hawaiian Islands*" datestamp used and other markings to indicate postage was due from the addressee. If we are correct in surmising that the "Paid" marking is of Hawaiian origin, then the San Francisco post office chose not to postmark the letter at all, sending it out on the April 5th eastbound sailing via Panama. Two other 5c provisional covers are recorded with the same date in Honolulu (March 11, 1857), and they undoubtedly traveled east in the mails with this letter.

For a complete background of the Pogue-Fiske correspondence, please refer to the description of lot 7 (pages 31-33). Fidelia Fiske returned to the United States in 1858, departing Oroomiah soon after she replied to this letter from her missionary colleague and former Mount Holyoke roommate, Maria Whitney Pogue. In this letter, Mrs. Pogue makes frequent references to other prominent missionaries and an interesting commentary on the evils of indenturing Chinese laborers—so-called "coolies"—calling it "a system somewhat akin to slavery—too much so I think."

The Pogue-Fiske letters were discovered in May 1938 in a sea chest in the basement of a library in Shelburne, Massachusetts (see lots 7 and 86). Spencer Anderson, a dealer, dispersed the group to various collectors; this cover is ex Ostheimer. With 1938 A.P.S. certificate signed by Klemann, Bartels and Barrett

Six of the seventeen recorded 5c provisional covers were carried on this trip of the *Vaquero*, which stopped at Honolulu on its way from Australia and carried two bags of mail when it cleared Honolulu on June 27, 1857. She returned to safe harbor with a broken mast and left again on June 29 with additional mail, arriving in San Francisco on July 16 (Gregory). The Coan correspondence yielded four of the seventeen recorded 5c provisional covers, including two forwarded usages (the other may be found in the Caspary sale, lot 50).

Assuming that the San Francisco datestamp reads August 15, 1861 (only the day and year are clear), this cover was probably carried on the *Speedwell*, which cleared Honolulu on July 22 and arrived in San Francisco on August 14.

Our records contain just four examples of Civil War patriotic stationery used from Hawaii. This is the earliest usage, the only mixed franking, and the only U.S. 1857 Issue franking. The others are: a 12c 1861 on Standing Liberty red-and-blue patriotic cover postmarked at Honolulu on April 18, 1863; and two small red-and-blue patriotic emblem covers used between islands, each with a 2c Kamehameha IV stamp. Other examples, if any, must be extremely rare.



Numeral Issues

Numeral Issues

THE NUMERALS—HAWAII'S FIRST STAMPS FOR LOCAL AND INTER-ISLAND POSTAGE—were issued to post offices in July 1859 as "temporary" stamps until regular 1c and 2c stamps could be issued. They became necessary when the privy council authorized the first postage charges on local and inter-island mail, which, prior to August 1, 1859, was carried free of charge by schooners plying the waters between islands. Far from being temporary, the Numerals maintained a prominent position in Hawaii's postal history for a period of seven years. The Numerals encompass fifteen major Scott numbers and were printed from at least 29 different plates (see Table D). They have been the subject of philatelic study for more than a century, but many questions still remain unanswered.

The extensive plating analysis by the late J. F. Westerberg, published in 1968, greatly expanded our knowledge of the Numerals and laid the foundation for continued study. We have used Westerberg's platings as the basis for our descriptions in this section. New information and theories have been included with the hope that others will try to solve the mysteries that remain. In particular, the early printings in Blue pose some challenging questions (for more details, please see the next section titled "The Early Printings of The Numerals").


To interpret our descriptions and understand some of the theories of Numeral printings, the reader will want to become familiar with the method of Numeral issue production, including terms used to describe various elements of the stamps and plates.

Numerals were printed on a small hand-operated Ruggle's card press. The early printings were made at the offices of Henry M. Whitney's newspaper, the *Pacific Commercial Advertiser*. Plate 3-B was used by another printer in 1859, and subsequent printings beginning with Plate 3-C were made at the Government Printing Office. It is known that certain Numerals, and possibly all, were printed in sheets of 50 from plates containing 10 subjects. The denomination (Numeral) was changed at least twelve times between 1859 and 1865—each change constitutes a new setting. For each setting there was at least one plate, and as many as eight, each of which is distinguishable from the other by certain characteristics of the font or differences in the ink or paper color. As plates were modified, the individual subjects were sometimes moved from one position to another. However, the subject itself retained certain basic characteristics. Philatelists have been able to trace the movement of subjects between plates and to reconstruct the relative positions of the ten subjects on most of the plates.

The following terms are used to describe the Numerals:

Gutter	Vertical space between columns on plate, not to be confused with straddle-pane margin between two impressions on sheet
Plate	Arrangement of 10 subjects in the plate, showing typo- graphic characteristics that distinguish each subject from those of any other plate
Position	Relative location of subject on plate of 10
Rule	The thick or thin lines surrounding the design and numeral
Setting	Used to describe a plate revised by inserting a new denomination in the subjects
Straddle- Pane Margin	Vertical space between two impressions from plate on a sheet, not to be confused with gutter margin between two columns on plate
Tête-Bêche	A pair or multiple with columns inverted in relation to each other, resulting from print-and-turn production
Type	Classification of a subject according to characteristics that remain relatively constant from one plate to another (I, II,

FIGURE 15. Parts of a Numeral pane



WESTERBERG CENSUS OF NUMERALS



The rarity of Numerals varies from stamp to stamp and from used to unused condition. In the graph above we have charted the quantities from Westerberg's 1970 census of Numerals. Although additional examples have since been found, the relative rarity of different Scott numbers and of used versus unused condition is probably reflected accurately in this chart. Of the different issues, the extreme scarcity of Scott 14 and 17 (the rarest Numeral) is apparent. Also, the rarity of used examples of Scott 12, 15, 18, 19, 20 and 23-26, relative to unused examples, is clear. In this respect, the used Numerals in this sale, particularly the used copies of Scott 18, 19, 20 and 23, are noteworthy.

The Early Printings of The Numerals

WESTERBERG IDENTIFIED FIVE PLATES USED TO PRINT THE EARLY NUMERALS in **V** Blue (Scott 12 and 13): these were his Plates 1-A, 2-A, 2-B, 3-A and 3-B. In assigning types to plates and their relative positions, Westerberg concentrated on the typographic characteristics of the stamps. After studying the mass of material in the Advertiser collection, we have reached a few conclusions that differ with Westerberg's. In fairness to his valuable pioneering work, we should note that he did not have frequent and easy access to the actual stamps and could not observe physical characteristics, such as color, paper, impression and multiples.

The principal determinations we have made are these:

- There were two additional plates of the 2c Light Blue (Scott 13) in Setting 1. We will call these Plates 1-B and 1-C. In evidence of Plate 1-B we offer the Staggered Block (see lot 198), which we believe is a straddle-pane multiple, contrary to Westerberg's judgment. In evidence of Plate 1-C we offer the Crocker block of six (see lot 197), which we think is a normally configured block, not a straddle-pane multiple as Westerberg believed. The 2c Comma after "Cents" (Plate 1-A, Ty. X) and 2c Dropped Period after "Cents" (Plate 1-B, Ty. IX) varieties were not seen by Westerberg and provide further evidence of at least three plates for the 2c Numerals from Setting 1 (see lots 195-196 and p. 142).
- In Plates 1-B and 1-C, the columns were transposed from their positions in Plate 1-A as shown in Westerberg's book. We think Plate 1-A (as Westerberg arranged it) was used in early July 1859 to print the first Numerals in Dark Blue (Scott 13a—see lots 188-196). Plates 1-B and 1-C were used to print additional 2c stamps in July 1859.
- The gutter width varied from plate to plate in the Numeral printings: Plate 1-A had 4mm between columns; Plate 1-B had at least 15mm between columns (Staggered Block); and Plate 1-C had 4mm between columns (Crocker block). Likewise, the early plates used to print the 1c in Blue (Scott 12) had gutters of varying width.
- The shades and paper distinguish one printing from another. The First Printing (Plate 1-A) was in Dark Blue on grayish white paper with a strong show-thru image on back. Plates 1-B and 1-C were printed in a pastel blue on white semi-opaque paper with very little show-thru image on back. Subsequent 2c printings from Plates 3-A and 3-B were in Blue on thin paper with a strong show-thru image on back.
- These findings are by no means conclusive. We have attempted to describe the early Numerals in this sale with as much detail as possible to allow others the opportunity to classify the printings as they deem proper. Only one point is certain: The enigmatic early printings of Numerals will continue to challenge collectors.

Based on the Westerberg plating study of the early Numerals, this Type X-III pair is a straddle-pane multiple from position 2 of the left pane and 1 of the right pane. However, we believe that Westerberg's plating does not account for all of the printings and that the vertical rows were transposed in certain printings. If we are correct, then this could be a normal pair with 4mm gutter between rows.

However, if the vertical rows were transposed in this printing, then this pair comes from Positions 8 and 10.

This remarkable cover shows an extremely early use of the Numeral issue. There are no other covers known with 2c stamps of Plate 1-A, the first setting, and this example shows the characteristics we attribute to the First Printing—the Dark Blue shade and strong impression, and, in this Type X position, the Comma after "Cents" variety.

The cover is also interesting from a postal history perspective. With the introduction of inter-island postage rates and adhesive stamps, postmasters were instructed to "cross the Hawaiian stamps. . .in ink" pending the distribution of cancelling devices. This is one of the few "Kau" post office markings and the only one on cover. The Kau postmaster, Rev. W. C. Shipman, routed his mail through Hilo from January 1856 to September 1860, after which time the post office sent mails directly between Honolulu and Kau. On this cover, the Hilo office cancelled the stamp a second time with its oval "Collector's Office" handstamp.

The addressee, Levi Haalela, was a prominent chief and member of the House of Nobles under Kamehameha III and IV. His wife was a granddaughter of Kamehameha I and owned large pieces of property, including a portion of the land where the Hawaii State Capitol now stands.

This block was used by Henry J. Crocker and J. F. Westerberg as crucial evidence in support of their independent plating analyses, but each one came to a different conclusion. Crocker saw this block as the normal configuration of types arranged on the plate, occupying positions 5-6/7-8/9-10, the lower three rows of the pane (see Figure 16). Westerberg concluded that the Staggered Block (lot 198) reflected the normal plate configuration (albeit misaligned) and that the Crocker block was a straddle-pane multiple, with the lefthand column from Positions 6/8/10 of one pane and the righthand column from Positions 5/7/9 of another pane, both of which were impressed 4mm apart on the sheet (see Figure 17).



Based on our research and analysis, we think that Crocker and Westerberg were both right and wrong in their conclusions. Crocker correctly identified this as a normal block, but misidentified the other four positions above. Westerberg was incorrect when he identified this as a straddle-pane block and the Staggered Block as a normal multiple, but he was probably correct in assigning positions to the types for one or more of the earliest printings from Plate 1-A and the later printings from Plates 3-A and 3-B.

Based on evidence we have observed, there were at least three Plate 1 configurations (Plates 1-A, 1-B and 1-C). Westerberg's Plate 1-A arrangement is probably correct if applied to the very first printing in Dark Blue, in which the Type X (Pos. 2) stamp has the Comma after "Cents" variety (lots 195-196), and the Type III (Pos. 1) stamp is found with a papermaker's embossed crest, which should appear only on Position 1 (lot 189).

In two printings subsequent to Plate 1-A, the columns were transposed (see the following lot). This block reflects the configuration of the plate that we call Plate 1-C, which we have positioned after the plate represented by the Staggered Block, in which the columns were more than 14mm apart, and the Type IX (Pos. 10) has the dropped period after "Cents" (see description for lot 198, Figure 12). This dropped period was corrected when Plate 1-C was configured, and the gutter between columns was reduced to 4mm.

Using our Plate 1-A, 1-B and 1-C arrangement, the pieces of evidence fit into place, and the difference in shades, impressions and paper of the many stamps that Westerberg groups together under Plate 1-A is reasonably explained. There were probably three printings from Plate 1, possibly alternating with at least one 1c Plate 2-A printing.



As a crucial piece of evidence in Westerberg's plating analysis, this block was judged by him to be a normally-configured multiple with an abnormal misalignment of the two columns. In this respect we believe that Westerberg erred. The two columns are very different in color and impression—the lefthand stamps being lightly inked, while the righthand stamps are fully inked. Furthermore, it is virtually impossible for two columns of type locked into a press bed to slip out of alignment by 8mm.

In our opinion, this block and its long-since-separated fifth adjoining stamp prove that Plate 1-A (as arranged by Westerberg) was used for the first printing in Dark Blue, then reconfigured with the two columns transposed from their positions—creating, in essence, a new plate (1-B). This block, the Crocker block of six (previous lot) and a number of other stamps with similar shades and on the same semi-opaque paper (with minimal show-thru image on back) probably come from early printings from the plates we call 1-B and 1-C.

We can distinguish between the plates used for this Staggered Block and the Crocker block, because of a variety found in one and not the other. A fifth stamp was removed from the Staggered Block after the Worthington collection was dispersed (see Figure 18). The stamp is Type IX from below the lefthand vertical pair (Position 10). This stamp was separated from the block and appears in the Tows sale (lot 379), the Caspary sale (lot 92), and the Lilly sale (lot 152). It is a variety not mentioned by Westerberg, showing the period after "Cents" dropped. This variety, which does not conform to Westerberg's plating, is evidence that there was another plate. Because of the difference in gutter width between the Staggered Block and the Crocker Block, and the fact that Type IX (bottom right stamp) does not show the dropped period in the Crocker block, as it does in the fifth stamp from the Staggered Block, we can safely say that there were at least two additional plates (1-B and 1-C).






FIGURE 19. Tête-bêche arrangement of types.

This example is one of the finest strikes of the Lahaina Custom House seal on a Numeral cover. It is impressed in a crisp dark blue ink with every detail of the full-rigged ship showing at center. This marking was used by Cornelius S. Bartow, the Lahaina postmaster, before he received cancelling devices ordered through the Honolulu post office. In a letter of record to the postmaster general, he refers to this provisional cancellation: "Did you order a stamp for the department of this place? It seems to me to be very necessary, as I am now compelled to use the Custom House seal."

Melchers & Co., a Bremen commission merchant, established a branch in Honolulu in the 1850's, and in 1857 a young man named F. A. Schaefer came from Germany to join the firm as a clerk. Schaefer later bought out Melchers and, as later covers demonstrate, began forwarding mail under the name of F. A. Schaefer & Co.

Because mail-forwarders were entrusted primarily with letters sent between the islands and other countries, the use of inter-island stamps in conjunction with forwarder markings was extremely limited. In evidence of such usage we know of just two Numeral covers, of which only this example received a handstamped forwarder's marking before being placed into the mails for inter-island transport to Kauai. The Caspary collection contained a 2c Blue Numeral cover with a manuscript notation on back indicating that Waterhouse & Co. forwarded the letter.

The Melchers & Co. handstamp was recorded from this cover after the Meyer-Harris listing was compiled. Only this one example is known.

The postmaster at Lahaina, Cornelius S. Bartow, ordered cancelling devices through the Honolulu post office and followed this request with a letter (recorded by Randall E. Burt), in which he states, "Did you order a stamp for the department of this place? It seems to me very necessary, as I am now compelled to use the Custon House seal." The marking was usually struck in an oily greenish-blue ink, which left very poor impressions. A few strikes are known in this deep blue ink, this being the clearest of all (see also lot 287).

The Rev. Sereno Edwards Bishop was the son of the Rev. Artemas and Elizabeth Bishop, missionaries of the Second Company. Rev. Bishop was the Seaman's Chaplain at Lahaina from 1853 to 1862, the period in which this cover was mailed, evidently while he was visiting Honolulu.

We first record this cover selling in the November 1942 Percy Doane auction of Part V of the Col. Edward H. R. Green collection. We do not know from whom Col. Green acquired the cover (it was not part of the Worthington Hawaii sold at auction). The cover was acquired by Admiral Frederic R. Harris in the Green sale. Adm. Harris died in 1949, and his Hawaii was sold through Harmer, Rooke in 1954. In the first part (sold in April), Alfred H. Caspary purchased the Lahaina cover, which was one of his last acquisitions before he died one year later. In the Caspary sale the late Herbert J. Bloch described this item as "One of the outstanding covers known of this issue and possibly unique with the variety." It was sold either at the Caspary sale or sometime after to Louise Boyd Dale, who placed it in her own collection of Hawaii—separate and distinct from the Alfred F. Lichtenstein collection sold by H. R. Harmer in 1966. When the Dale-Lichtenstein Foundation liquidated its philatelic holdings through Harmers in 1989, the Lahaina cover appeared as the undisputed highlight of the Hawaii.



From July 1863 the United States postage for printed matter (open circulars, newspapers, etc.) was 2c. The rate from Hawaii remained at 2c. In this instance, we have a large part of a newspaper wrapper, franked with the correct combination of 2c U.S. and 2c Hawaiian postage. The 1863 2c Black on Gray Blue Numeral is scarce unused and extremely rare in used condition—we know of no examples on cover—and the mixed franking for this rate is unique within the entire Numeral Issue.

Whether it is a proof (no Numeral proofs are known) or an issued stamp (no other examples are known, unused or used), we cannot say.

THE ONLY RECORDED USE OF THE NUMERAL ISSUE ON A COVER DESTINED BEYOND THE BORDERS OF THE UNITED STATES.

This cover left Honolulu on October 7, 1865, aboard the *D. C. Murray*, arriving in San Francisco on October 27. The sender, whose style of manuscript indicates someone of European origin, was very specific in detailing the route intended for this letter. At upper left are instructions, "per D. C. Murray to Sanfrancisco/"Steamerline to New York/German Steamerline from New York." The three U.S. 10c stamps prepaid the 28c rate for Prussian Closed Mail and the 2c ship captain's fee..

Our records show no other example of a Numeral stamp used on cover to a destination outside of Hawaii or the United States. Although such usage was perfectly acceptable, as demonstrated by this cover, there must have been circumstances that resulted in the extreme rarity of surviving examples. We can think of two. The 1c and 2c Numerals were used almost exclusively on inter-island mail, and the 5c Numeral was not issued until late 1864 or early 1865 when a shortage of 5c stamps necessitated their provisional usage. Until this point it would be very unlikely that any 1c or 2c Numeral stamp would find its way on a cover sent to or through the United States, and, by 1864-65, when the 5c Numeral was printed, the Numerals were very popular with stamp collectors in Europe. Any cover reaching Europe that happened to display a 5c Numeral would be prone to assault from a philatelist looking to procure an exotic Hawaiian Numeral for his stamp album. Thus, we have in this cover a rare survivor of circumstance.


In our records there is a cover front from the Catholic Mission correspondence with an 1863 1c Numeral, but no other complete cover with any of the 1c Numeral stamps, which were intended for inter-island newspapers and saw very limited use. This cover is properly franked for the 5c Hawaiian rate and originated in Hilo, based on the use of the black square grid in 1866.

When found, the left edge of the cover had been cut off and the bottom was roughly opened. The left 10mm of the envelope and part of another 2c stamp have been added to improve the appearance. The bottom edge has been reduced slightly for the same reason. There is some minor toning, but overall the cover is quite attractive and the 1c Numeral is Extremely Fine. Viewed from the back of the address panel, embossment from the corner of the strongly impressed grid can be seen behind the 1c stamp, confirming that the stamp originated on this cover.



APPENDIX I Census of The Missionaries

COMPILED BY SCOTT R. TREPEL

THE PURPOSE OF ANY CENSUS IS TO GAIN NEW PERSPECTIVES through the analysis of a large and diverse body of things or people. The occasion of the *Advertiser* sale has given us reason to update the excellent census work on Missionary stamps previously undertaken by the late John K. Bash and by Geoffrey Brewster. The last count of Missionaries was tallied by Mr. Brewster, who published a list of 171 Missionaries, without photographs, in *Possessions*. He offered the prediction that, as additional examples were added to the record, the count would approach 200. We have arrived at a total of 197 stamps, on and off cover, just three short of Brewster's prescient forecast.

To make this census more useful to philatelists, we have used a somewhat unconventional method of arrangement and included significant data and a photograph with each listing. The stamps and covers are divided into two sections: Unused, Cancelled and On Piece examples in Section 1; examples On Cover in Section 2. Each stamp has been assigned a census identification number as follows:



The off-cover examples in Section 1 are sorted 1) by Scott number, 2) by category, and 3) stamps in CAN category are sub-sorted by cancellation (see page xiii for illustrations of cancellations). The covers in Section 2 are sorted 1) by Scott number and 2) by origin date. Therefore, the user may take any stamp or cover and locate its proper place within the census or determine that it is an unlisted Missionary. For example, a 5c stamp cancelled by the 7-bar Grid can be compared with the fifteen 5c similarly-cancelled stamps grouped together in the census.

Each stamp has also been categorized by condition. The reliance on past auction catalogue descriptions or observations from old photographs and photocopies has probably caused some errors. Likewise, the subjectivity in classifying "Minor Faults" versus "Defective" versus "Repaired" must be excused as bad science. Minor faults in Missionaries are limited to small tears, thin spots, small mends in the paper (without any paper addition or repainting) and/or corner defects that would be regarded as serious in normal issues but are typical of these fragile pelure-paper stamps. Defective copies have pieces missing (possibly mended), large tears and small touched-up parts of the design—these are generally stamps in need of restoration. Finally, the Repaired category applies to any Missionary to which paper or part of the design has been added or painted in to restore the stamp to its original appearance. Approximately 48% of all Missionaries fall into the Repaired category.

The novel feature of this census is the inclusion of photographs and ownership history. Users will find it much easier to match examples to the entries in this census, and the visual overview might lead to new and interesting perspectives. We apologize for the poor reproduction quality of the illustrations, which in some cases are third-generation copies. However, they are usable and may be improved simply by pasting in better illustrations as they become available.

We are especially grateful to Raymond H. Weill and Thurston Twigg-Smith for sharing their knowledge of provenance for so many of the Missionaries, and to William T. Crowe and The Philatelic Foundation for assistance in compiling information and photographs from their records. Acknowledgment of assistance is also given to the following individuals and firms: Bruce Hazelton, Guido Craveri, and Galeria Filatelica de Barcelona. Special thanks to Mary M. Mitsuda for her editorial guidance.

TERMS AND ABBREVIATIONS

Centering

The width of margins and the centering of the design within perforations are graded in strict accordance with the Scott Standard Postage Stamp Catalogue standards. The following grades are used:

Extremely Fine (EF): Exceptionally large margins or near perfect centering, used to describe stamps which are of superior grade for the issue.

Very Fine (VF): Normal size margins for the issue and well-centered with design a bit closer to one side. Please note that this grade is superior to the one on which Scott Catalogue retail prices are based.

Fine (F): Imperforate stamps may have smaller than usual margins and perforated stamps will be noticeably off-center. Issues before 1890 may have the design touched in places. If used, fairly lightly cancelled.

Very Good (VG): Attractive appearance, but margins or perforations may cut into.

Good (G): Average off-centered example with slight faults. This condition is generally acceptable for multiples and rarities.

Gum

Stamps issued before 1900 should not be expected to have original gum unless specifically stated in the description. 20th Century issues may be expected to have original gum unless described otherwise. Terms used to describe the condition of gum are as follows:

Mint: As issued by the post office and never hinged.

Original Gum (O.G.): Stamp retains full original gum showing slight disturbance caused by previous hinge, which may be present or entirely removed. Early 19th century stamps should be expected to show crackling and toning in gum, which occurs naturally over time.

Part Original Gum: Up to half of the gum is missing, but the remaining portion is original.

Disturbed Original Gum: The gum is original to the stamp, but has been noticeably affected by hinge removal and/or humidity, mount glazing, etc.

Hinge Mark: Noticeable area where hinge has been removed and gum has been redistributed. Stamps described with hinge marks may not be returned because of gum disturbance.

Hinge Remnant (H.R.): All or part of hinge remaining affixed to gum.

Covers

Minor nicks, tears and slight reduction from opening are to be expected in 19th century covers. Folded letters normally have tears in the reverse and file folds, which will not be mentioned unless they affect the stamps or markings. Light cleaning of covers is an accepted form of conservation and is not grounds for return of a lot. The terms "Extremely Fine", etc., are meant to convey the overall appearance of cover, not the condition of an individual stamp.

Catalogue Values and Estimates

Unless otherwise noted, all stamps are catalogued according to the *Scott 1995 U.S. Specialized Catalogue*. Catalogue values are indicated by decimal figures in the right column (for example, "175.00"). Stamps in extremely fine quality and items for which catalogue values are not available have been given estimate ranges (for example "E. 750-1,000"). Lots offered subject to a reserve will never be reserved for more than the estimate (usually a fraction of the estimate).

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Hawaii's Early Letters and Covers

THE SECOND PART OF THE HONOLULU ADVERTISER COLLECTION is devoted exclusively to letters and covers. It is this section of the collection that best conveys the human experience of Hawaii's settlers.

The diversity of postal communication between the years 1819 and 1850 is reflected within the sections of this sale titled, *Historical Letters and Stampless Covers* and *The Forwarders*, which encompass all of the items dated prior to 1850 and some of those dated afterward with relevance to these particular subjects. It is a fact beyond argument that this segment of the *Advertiser* collection is the most comprehensive gathering of early Hawaiian historical letters and covers extant today or at any point in the past. Viewed together, these items tell the story of Hawaii's written communication, starting from the missionaries' maiden voyage.

We begin with the earliest missionary letters written in 1819 on board the brigantine *Thaddeus* as she carried the first group of missionaries, the Pioneer Company. The collection continues with the earliest known missionary cover from Hawaii, an 1820 letter from Sybil Bingham containing a vivid account of the group's first impressions of the Islands. From this point the *Advertiser* collection has attempted to show an outbound cover for each year until 1850 (only six years are missing). This group displays examples of the routes and markings associated with mail prior to the establishment of Hawaii's first post office. Of great historical significance are the letters written by missionaries and merchants, giving first-hand accounts of many events that shaped Hawaii's history.

Prior to the establishment of the first Hawaiian post office in 1850, mails were carried to and from the Islands through private agreements reached between correspondents and captains of ships. Before San Francisco became a port of entry, mail was routed around Cape Horn or via Mexico. Bags of mail carried from Hawaii were delivered to the post office at the first port of call, and the letters were marked by the receiving office with their datestamp and the appropriate postage due. The captain received 2c per letter in accordance with the longstanding United States ship-letter laws. In Hawaii, during the early years from 1820 to 1850, the situation was considerably more disorganized. Upon arrival "the mail matter was usually poured from the bags etc. onto the floor of the counting room of the consignee of the vessel, or of the Harbor Master's office, and those expecting letters gathered around the pile to assist in 'overhauling' or 'sorting,' picking out their own, and passing over their shoulders the letters &c of those standing in the outer circles." (Kuykendall, Vol. 2, p. 28). An attempt to bring the situation under control was made in 1846 and finalized by the end of 1849, which culminated in the establishment of the first Hawaiian post office in 1850.

To facilitate mail conveyance, before and after the post office began operation, the government newspaper office and private firms acted as mail forwarders. These forwarders were businessmen engaged in commercial maritime activity and were familiar with sailing schedules. As a service they would accept mail (in addition to valuable parcels and freight) and choose the earliest and best route for conveyance. To indicate and advertise this service, markings were applied in manuscript or with a handstamp. The mail-forwarding agents appear to have emerged in the 1840s, and some of them continued to handle mail through the turn of the century. There are 21 known forwarders who are represented by at least one surviving cover—the *Advertiser* collection contains at least one of each, and displays the variety of markings associated with four of the most active firms.

With the creation of a formal Hawaiian postal system in 1850 came the need for postal markings. The earliest Hawaiian-postmarked cover in the collection has a manuscript marking applied at the small outlying office of Wailuku in May 1850—this office and a few others resulted from the Organic Acts of 1846. The first postal marking used under the authority of the Honolulu post office established in 1850 is the two-line marking, consisting of the post office name, "Honolulu, Hawaii", and the date beneath. It was first used in November 1850, and examples are known dated through June 1851. Postmaster Whitney ordered circular postmarking devices in a letter to J. W. Gregory dated May 22, 1851; based on this letter and the absence of the circular markings on covers dated through the end of 1851, we can surmise that the devices were not received and put into use until the very end of 1851 or early 1852.

The Hawaiian Postal Markings section of this sale catalogue covers the period dating from 1850, during which time mail could be sent postage due or prepaid without stamps. The stampless covers in this part of the collection are as fascinating for their markings, rates and routes (as well as content) as are the stamped covers of the same period. We find the rare Europe-bound covers in this part of the sale, including the extraordinary prepaid cover to Addafer, Russia—what is now known as Adavere, Estonia. The covers are followed by a section of Hawaiian post office documents and mail of an official character.

The Kingdom of Hawaii was ruled by the monarchy until Queen Liliuokalani's abdication in 1893. To represent this very significant part of Hawaii's history, the *Advertiser* collection displays documents and covers signed by Kamehameha III and his successors to the throne, as well as other members of the royal family and government.

The agreement forged between Hawaii and the United States provided for an accounting relationship between the post offices in Honolulu and San Francisco, which permitted the post offices in Hawaii to sell stamps received on consignment from the United States. While Hawaii's government remained sovereign, its post office was clearly and inexorably linked to the United States. In the section of sale, *United States Stamps Used To and From Hawaii*, there are covers bearing only United States stamps in prepayment of postage (mixed frankings will be found in the Hawaiian Steam Service section of Part 2 and in the relevant Hawaiian stamp sections of Parts 1 and 3). There are some extraordinary and rare or unique usages among these items.

With the inauguration of the first U.S.-Hawaii contract mail service in 1867, the two postal administrations moved closer to the treaty that was finalized in 1870. Covers bearing the distinctive marking "Hawaiian Steam Service" have been grouped together at the end of Part 2.

In presenting this part of *The Honolulu Advertiser* collection, we have emphasized the historical content of the letters as much as the philatelic or postal significance. The lengthy transcripts (including Lucy Goodale Thurston's monumental journal) were accomplished by Mary M. Mitsuda, curator of the collection, and her invaluable contribution to the historical record is only partially presented in this catalogue. An expanded version is planned for release in computer format later this year.

The Hawaiian Post Office 1850-1900



MISSIONARIES' CORRESPONDENCE AND EARLY HAWAIIAN LETTERS

In Chronological Order

2001° "On Board the brig. Thaddeus, Dec. 15, 1819." Dateline on 11/2pp folded letter to Deacon Abner Goodale in Marlborough, Mass., from his daughter Lucy Goodale Thurston, wife of the Reverend Asa Thurston, both members of the Pioneer Company of missionaries, sent out by the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions on Oct. 23, 1819. Fighting headwinds en route, their ship sighted the Mary 2° south of the equator. The two ships hove to and this hastily written letter along with other mail was given to the Mary's captain. Mrs. Thurston writes (in full): "My dear, dear Father, Brothers & Sisters. A vessel is in sight bound as we suppose to beloved America. Forgive me that I have not prepared letters to send you ere this. My journal, my prayers, my waking & sleeping moments are witnesses for me, that you are not forgotten—that you are remembered with lively & increasing affection. O forget not Lucy entered on a life, replete with trials & privations. Yet grieve not on my account. Although I sometimes keenly feel a separation from friends, yet Heaven comforts me. I do not, I have never seen the moment when I regretted my determination to spend my days in heathen lands. Mr. Thurston is to me all I could wish—tender, kind, & sympathizing. My health has been better than I had even dared to anticipate. Feel not anxious on my account. The family are at present in pretty good health. Sisters Loomas [sic], & Holman have suffered much from seasickness—it is even now seldom they can sit at table. I was confined with it three days to my bed; but in a week was pretty much recovered from it. Mrs. Chamberlain for the first few weeks had a great trial with her babe. She supported it with much patience & fortitude. The child is now well, running about the deck. Mrs. Chamberlain requests that the information you receive respecting us, should be communicated to her friends at Hopkinton. We passed the line day before yesterday. The weather is not more oppressive than with you at midsummer; the sun being in the southern tropic. Much of the way we have had head winds of course slow progress. We are now 29 deg. W. Long. 2 deg. South Latitude-My dear friends, remember me fervently & frequently before the throne of grace. Write to me, & engage my friends to do the same, you cannot conceive how much a line from any one with whom I have ever associated, would gladden my heart. Remember me very affectionately to all my dear friends how do their kindnesses cause my heart to swell with gratitude. Farewell, my much loved relatives, an affectionate farewell, Lucy G. Thurston. I am all in agitation, & know not what I have written. do excuse it." Address panel with faint red Boston cds, matching "SHIP" and ms. "8" rate, a similar letter written by another missionary, the Rev. Hiram Bingham, is in the archives of the Mission Children's Society in Honolulu

THE EARLIEST KNOWN MISSIONARY LETTER, WRITTEN 57 DAYS OUT OF BOSTON EN ROUTE TO HAWAII.

Lettersheet with toning and two tears at top, otherwise Fine, very rare and of incalculable importance to a postal study of Hawaii. An entry in Lucy Thurston's journal (lot 2010) indicates this letter was published in *The Concord Observer*, a copy of which was in her hands when she wrote this mixed reaction in May 1821: "I perused it with a tear. In writing to friends I feel a satisfaction. But let not their partiality cause them to give my writings to the public. All important facts will be given them through the medium of the public journal. After being pleased in the situation which I now occupy, I dare not say Never let my writing be read in manuscript; but this I say, I shall forever feel unwilling to have any pass before the public, without their being first read & approved by the Pru. Com.—& then it cannot but be attended with a sacrifice of my own personal feelings."

"On Board the Brig Thaddeus, Dec. 21, 1819. Lat. 18 deg. S. Long. 35 deg. W." Dateline on hand-carried three-page folded cover from Lucy Thurston to her father, Deacon Abner Goodale, in Marlborough, Mass. She writes (in part): "Forever separated from my much loved paternal home, & forever separated, to, from every former associate & dear friend, I do rejoice that there is a medium of intercourse, through which I may unfold my feelings to that dear parent, whose unparalleled kindnesses have crowned the morning of my days. . . . Last week I wrote you a few hasty lines; here I will give you a more explicit account of myself, & those with whom I am connected. Soon after we put forth to sea, ere we lost of American shores, sickness obliged me to repair to my couch. To this I was confined for three successive days & nights. The rest of the family were in similar circumstances, so that we were alike incapable of personally sympathising with, or administering to each others want. Chests, Trunks, bundles, bags, &c. &c. were piled into our little room six ft. square, until no place was left on the floor for the sole of one's foot. Two thirds of the way they were built up considerable higher than the berth, & for a space they extended to the height of the room. With such narrow limits & such confined air, it might well have been compared to a dungeon. . . . The third day the whole family were able to go up on deck. Could you have beheld the scene exhibited, while you pitied, you must have smiled. Beside a boat, & hogsheads, & barrels, & tubs, & cables & c. with which the deck was filled, here were to be seen a dog & cats, & hens, & ducks, & pigs, & forty three persons; while our whole family, with the exception of the natives, were all under the horrors of seasickness. Some thrown on their matresses, others seated in clusters, lounging one upon another, & here & there individuals, leaning on the railing, or supporting themselves by hanging upon a rope. When the hour for refreshment arrives, a pot of soup is brought & placed on deck. A circle gather around it, & seat themselves like a group of children. Those who retain their seats are not neglected. Look which way you will, you see them sipping broth or picking bones. In this rude manner we were obliged to eat for several days." etc. She also describes the daily routine of prayers, singing and meals (with Sunday including public services on deck and religious meetings in the cabin), the kindness and civility of captain and crew, etc. The letter ends with a Christmas Day postscript: "Brother Nathan, your quinces proved very acceptable. We ate them up raw. To several in sickness they were great comforts. They ever reminded me of an absent brother, & his unnumbered kindnesses. Dec. 25. was religiously observed as the anniversary of the birth of the Savior. In the evening brother Brigham preached in the cabin. A hymn was sung composed on the occasion by Mr. Conant, one of the officers."; some toning, small paper loss at edges, neither affecting address

2003° "Hannaloorah, Woahoo, June 27, 1820." Dateline on folded letter Mrs. Fanny Howell in Canandaigua, N.Y., from Sybil Bingham, a member of the Pioneer Company of missionaries to the Sandwich Islands, who arrived on the Thaddeus in April 1820, cover hand-carried to Massachusetts, entering the mails there. The contents are mostly complete, consisting of both sides of one 8 x 10 in. sheet and two large pieces of a second sheet. Mrs. Bingham writes (in part): "Here upon heathen ground, seated in my straw thatched cottage, the waters of 18,000 miles rolling between us, I take up for a reperusal your affectionate, your precious farewell to me, received just at the eve of my departure from my much beloved country. I seem to hear the kind voice, and almost feel the affectionate grasp which, to me, so many times, said, you have a place within my doors and within my heart. ... By the Ship Mary, Capt. Smith, Boston, spoken on our passage Dec. 15th we made communications home. Since then we have made none, except by the whale ship, L'iagle, Capt. Starbuck, London, which has not yet left these seas. By the Mary, I sent several letters, but could not but regret that I had none prepared for you, and some others, to whom I felt in haste to write. There was no time for any thing after seeing her. She passed by at full sail, just giving her name and whither she was bound, and had there not been much dispatch on the part of our Capt. in setting off a boat, we should have grieved many days with letters on our hands. You can hardly think what animation that little occurrence excited." After describing the voyage as "pleasant & rapid" before experiencing severe gales, mountainous waves and her own failing health, they reach the Islands: "Our Divine Supporter carried us through, and on the morning of the 30th March, allowed the joyful sound, 'land ho,' 'Owhyhee: bold mountains in sight,' to cheer our hearts, and the sight to gladden our eyes. yes, cheered & gladdened we were. But, O,-my friend, the conflicting emotions which struggled in our bosoms-who can tell! Was it our beloved country? Did the spires of the temples of our God rise to view? Could anticipation glide over a few hours & bring to our arms the friends of our hearts, with their pleasant homes, their restoring cordials for sinking nature, their tender sympathies, kind caresses & cheering voices? Ah, no! Weak & exhausted with a long voyage, far from beloved country, far from

the temples of our GOD, we gazed upon the dark land over which hung Sable clouds, fit emblems of its moral darkness, we thought of its rude inhabitants, with no pleasant homes, no christian sympathies, no tender charities to bestow at their unusual vistants.—We thought too of the hour when, perhaps, solitary and alone, without condoling friends, one must commit the dear remains of a soothing wife, another of an affectionate husband, to this pagan dust, or from heathen barbarity be denied the last sad comfort. . . . We approached the Island on the Northeast side, passed round to the west & anchored, the 4th of April, in Kirooah bay. It presented a varied appearance. In some parts, fertile plains, between the high mountain and the shore, running streams, groves of coconuts, bananas, & were pleasant to the eyes. When again, ragged rocks, huge cliffs projecting into the sea or terminating in beds of lava which, in former times, had run down from their lofty summits, changed the scene, and almost struck terror in the beholder." etc. Address panel with red "Boston Ms. Mar. 22" (1821) cds and manuscript rate partly faded, though with no indication of ship fee (this may have been carried as a favor by a crew member)


THE EARLIEST KNOWN HAWAIIAN LETTER WITH POSTAL MARKINGS AND THE EARLIEST KNOWN MISSIONARY LETTER AFTER THIS PIONEER COMPANY'S ARRIVAL.

Outer lettersheet and contents aged, small edge nicks and tiny splits, still one of the indispensible pieces of Hawaiian postal history. Ex Baker, Ishikawa, illustrated in Meyer-Harris (p. 6)...... E. 15,000-20,000

2004° "Kirooah, Owhyhee, August 31, 1820." Dateline on closely written four-page letter from Lucy Thurston to her sister, Mrs. Persis G. Parkhurst. Much of the letter is devoted to describing their daily routine and living quarters, first mentioning that "Mr. Thurston has of late been busily employed in making a piece of furniture which if less elegant, is to us no less valuable than would be an American settee. To this, with a light stain, he has added still another comfort; that of attaching arms & rockers to our chair. It is the only one we have; & to save ourselves the inconvenience of bringing up the long form to a round table & then supplying the deficiency by piling boxes one above another, out of the refuse of his materials, he has made some very comfortable seats to place round the table;—they bear a strong resemblance to American milking stools. Still another convenience I am about to be in possession of—it is a cocoanut shell joined to a wooden tube in a manner to form a pretty funnel. For supper & breakfast beside tea and coffee, our table is furnished with the simple, yet good and nourishing food, potatoes & milk. This is a luxury we have not enjoyed till a short time since." She includes a lengthy and appealing description of their house and some observations on the natives: "This people are a noble race of beings but they are now in a most degraded state. In a bathing place but a few rods from our door, we daily see them of all ages, & of both sexes, sporting in the water in a state of perfect nudity. With the exception of the lowest class of people, who are called to labour, they spend their whole time sleeping, eating, drinking, smoking & playing." etc. Also included is a 60-line hymn copied from her husband's journal, "Lines composed by one of the Mission family" which features such stanzas as "While doubling that Cape which is the dread of the seaman/The winds were propitious though sometimes were high/Yet they drove us the swifter to that distant haven/Where pagans engulfed in idolatry lie." etc. Without outer lettersheet, ms. "Received May 1821" in corner; some toning and small edge wear, still Fine, outstanding content.....

2005° "From the Sandwich Isles. Favored by Capt. Bennet, Volunteer." Manuscript endorsement on October 16, 1820, folded letter from Lucy Goodale Thurston to her father, Deacon Abner Goodale, in Marlborough, Mass., and containing "extracts from my journal," from August 27 to October 16, 1820, on each side of two 8 x 131/4 in. sheets. She writes (in part): "Aug. 28. Mr. T. & brother Loomis today visited the spot where the battle was fought three or four months before our arrival. It is several miles from this place. About fifty were killed. Stones were piled up over some of them, while the bones of others lay strewed upon the ground. Sept. 2. Our hearts were cheered by the return of the king, who had been absent more than a month. His arrival was announced by eleven guns, which were answered from the fort. He then came on shore, called at our door, & gave us a friendly salutation. I had the curious pleasure of joining noses with four of the queens. Good brother Thomas has had a trying time during his absence. The heat was intense, the vessel completely filled with natives, & their provisions very short. Sept. 21. A week since, while instructing the children, a native, intoxicated with liquor, came in. I soon found my situation perilous. After vigorous exertions, I was obliged to quit the house & door yard. Where shall I go?—Whither fly for safety?—Mr. T. was in his school at the king's. It was a quarter of a mile distant, & the way lined with men. They may offer indignities. But there is no alternative. Fear added wings to my speed & I was soon without the reach of the destroyer. He pursued me but a few steps, threw after me one or two clubs & went his way. I returned to the house with my heart filled with sorrow, & my flesh with trembling. The young prince now ran & told Thomas, who communicated the alarm to Mr. T. In fifteen minutes the house was filled. Mr. T. came followed by his whole school, & their numerous train of attendants. They found me bathed in tears. The queens were very sympathising; with moistened eyes they would tenderly embrace me, join noses & say 'Nooenooe allohah,' that is, I love you much. In a short time after, the man returned. Formerly, his standing among this people was very high; he was worshipped as a god. At his presence the people all fell prostate. But now his conduct drew from Mr. T. a command to retreat from the door yard. This he refused; when with the assistance of a cane, Mr. T. quickly left him in the highway." etc. There are also comments about the King's drinking habits, visits from various ship captains including one with news that Indians from the Northwest coast "having heard that white people had come out to these islands, asked why they could not as well come & instruct them." Address leaf with red "Boston Ms. Jun. 1" cds and matching "SHIP" handstamp, faint ms. "8" (6c from Boston to Marlborough plus 2c ship captain's fee); aging, waterstaining, and small paper loss in journal—worthy of restoration—a rare and early Hawaiian manuscript giving a first-hand account of an early hostile

2006° "Woahoo Oct. 8th 1821." Folded letter from the Reverend Asa Thurston to his father-in-law, Abner Goodale, with ms. "Edgartown Ms. Mar. 13" postmark and "Ship 12-" rate (10c from Martha's Vineyard plus 2c ship captain's fee) The threepage letter includes the announcement of the birth of their daughter Persis Thurston: "True we have had trials, great, long continued &, in many respects, peculiar— They have tried our patience, but we trust, they have not diminished our zeal or caused to forget or neglect the great work in which we are engaged. The Great Lord of missions has been with us to guide, strengthen & comfort us. In the midsts of all our trials & disappointments we have frequent occasions to sing of mercy. On the morning of the 28th Sept. we had reason to speak of special favor. Through the interposition of the supporting & delivering hand of our heavenly Father, Lucy was made the joyful mother of a fine little daughter, & we wept & prayed & rejoiced together over this new accession to our comforts & cares." He also mentions Lucy's poor health—the absence of a doctor and "those kinds of medicine which she used when in America beneath her father's roof." (By the next day he's able to report her improvement.) Address panel with ms. "By Capt. Allen Ship Moro Nantuck" in corner. The ship endorsement is confirmed by an entry in Lucy Thurston's journal (Lot 2010) for November 20, 1822. Even at this late date, they had no knowledge of the ship's safe arrival (. . . "it is now & then suggested that she

"By the Ship Globe Capt. Gardner, Nantucket." Endorsement on folded letter from Lucy Thurston to her father in Marlborough, ms. "Edgartown Ms. May 8" (1822) postmark and "Ship 27" for double rate as indicated by ms. "2 sheets" in Mrs. Thurston's hand. This contained a seven-page installment of Lucy's Thurston's journal, begun May 5, 1821, and ends, for the time being, on November 24. Headed "Journal Continued", she writes (in part): "16. Waked this morning by the canon's roar. The day has closed in which the memory of Tamahamaha is cherished, & his honors celebrated. Great preparations have been made, a royal feast provided, & an exhibition made of all the splendors of an uncultivated heathen court. In the midst of many thousands two tables were spread for the entertainment of the king, principal chiefs, capts. & officers in port, residents, & the mission family. At the king's request a clergyman was seated at each table. . . . 17. A visit this morning from the king & others of the royal family. He continues to view the house with the smile of satisfaction—wishes to have us send to America to have one brought out for him. He wants one three stories high; one story to devote to the worship of God, as bye & bye he intends to pray. It seems to us very desirable that this his request should be gratified by our American friends. . ..31. This afternoon most of the family accepted an invitation to take tea on board Capt. Grime's vessel. The several Capts. in port were of the company. We made a pleasant visit & a sweet repast on good American food. It was crowned with a very rich cake made in America previous to their embarkation, more than two hundred days ago. . . .[June] 23. Thomas Hopoo very sick of the dysentery. Medicine seems to have no effect, & unless relief is immediately obtained, his case will be truly alarming. When I think of the departure of this devoted youth, my heart seems to say, stay, dear brother, stay, nor leave your countrymen to die in their sins, & sink in eternal death. ... 18. Hitherto the labors of instruction have been divided. Br. & Sister L. Sister B. & myself have each had our scholars. They are now all entrusted to my care, about thirty in number. They make a pleasant school. One class of natives have their daily lessons in the Testament, which is interpreted to the school. Every ear is open, & every eye seems fixed; & while the sacred page is read, here & there is heard to drop from the lips, A-lo-ha, a-lo-ha e-no- That is, I love it, I love it very much. Precious to me have been the hours thus spent. I can reckon them among the happiest of my life. . . Aug. 14. An English vessel from Valparaizo bound to Calcutta arrived in port. Today Capt. Templeton called on us. Uninformed respecting the present state of the Islands, he knew not but he should be exposed to danger. How agreeably surprised, then, to find that here was society, & that here the beams of science had begun to dawn." etc. The final entry notes the enclosure of a lock of hair "cut from Persis's tender head." Contradicting the example of the previous letter, the Edgartown postmaster rated this at 80 to 150 miles (121/2c); toning and some minor soiling, Fine E. 6,000-8,000 and rare.....



"Oahu, Sandwich Islands, Aug. 9, 1822." Dateline on four-page folded letter from Lucy Thurston to Abner Goodale in Marlborough, hastily written at 11 p.m. with her child sleeping by her side, and which begins: "Captain Decovin, ship America, bound to New York by the way of Canton, sails from this port tomorrow morning," etc. Contents refer to a visit from a member of the London Missionary Society "with nine christian Tahaitans," and some discussion of teaching: "The principal characters of the nation almost without exception, together with many of their people are now acquiring the first rudiments of their own language. It is now no time for inactivity. Every man, woman & child pertaining to this establishment has more or less to do with the business of instruction. Even our little boy, George, seven years of age, has his little school consisting of three great men, chiefs of an inferior order, to which he manfully & with much pleasure repairs twice a day." etc. Address panel with red "New-York Feb. 17" cds and matching "SHIP" handstamp, ms. "20½" (150 to 400 miles rate plus 2c ship fee), Fine and rare

"Oahu (Waahoo) Sand. I. Oct. 8, 1822." Four-page folded letter from Elisha Loomis, the missionary printer who arrived with the Pioneer Company of missionaries, to his brother, Chester, the postmaster of Rushville, N.Y., acknowledging a letter from him, sent Dec. 3, 1821. He notes that the Reverend Bingham for the last two months has been preaching in the Hawaiian language; that a second edition of 2,000 copies "our Spelling Book" is being printed, and regrets not having the time to learn the language himself. The address panel is postmarked "Edgartown Ms. March 28" in ms. with an additional "Ship Free" in Loomis's hand and endorsed "Pr. Ship Spermo Capt. Bunker Nantucket", light soiling, Fine and desirable. In January 1822, the missionaries' first publication, a 16-page spelling and reading pamphlet, was printed in an editon of 500 copies. Over the next few years the printing office, with the help of native apprentices, issued a number of pamphlets, primers and scripture tracts, in addition to a translation of the Bible which was finally completed by May 10, 1839, ex Ishikawa....... The Hawaiian Journal of Lucy Goodale Thurston. 60 pages, mostly 8 x 9¾ in., sent in four installments, with entries dated: January 1, 1820, to July 10, 1820 (15pp); October 17, 1820, to May 4, 1821 (15pp); November 26, 1821, to November 22, 1822 (14pp); and June 1823 to September 8, 1824 (16pp). The next-to-last installment includes the original outer lettersheet addressed to her father, Abner Goodale, with "New-Bedford Ms. Apr. 16" cds in black and matching "SHIP" handstamp, ms. "89½" rate with additional "1¾ oz" in the same hand, ms. "6 sheets" and endorsed "Ship Balaena, Capt. Gardner, Nantucket"

LUCY THURSTON SHARES WITH HER FAMILY A COPY OF HER HAWAIIAN JOURNAL.

Datelined, "On Board the Brig Thaddeus, Jan. 1, [1820]," ("1819" is mistakenly written), Lucy addresses her father, brothers and sisters: "We experience so little variety on our passage I have hitherto neglected keeping a journal for the perusal of my friends. But standing on the threshold of a new year, reviewing the feelings and events of the past, a reviving sense of my obligations to my beloved relations urges me to the pen. Receive the following pages as a testimony of my affection & gratitude. I shall frequently & familiarly love to address my own dear family & tell them all the joys & sorrows, the hopes & fears, which alternately usurp the sway in my bosom."

The following are excerpts from the journal entries (dates indicated):

Jan. 6. Thursday Night. On board Brig Thaddeus it is now a drery, trying time. Since Tuesday morning we have made no progress. The foaming surges mount on high, & leave low vales behind them, while the swelling wave is frequently felt on deck with all its violence. Night before last a rude wave tore some boards from the side of the vessel, & passing across the deck, threw the Captain several times from side to side, & threatened to wash him overboard. Sister Bingham at that moment was passing the foot of the stairs from the cabin to her own room, when the water poured down upon her & gave her a complete showering. In brother Whitney's room it came in several inches deep. It is very inconvenient spreading a table. Twice we have been obliged to have food handed round. The two last nights we have slept but little, as the violent rocking of the vessel caused it to be an almost constant labor to prevent being thrown from the berth. Now while I am writing, Mr. Thurston is asleep on the couch, & has with a cord actually confined himself to the side of the vessel, in order to enjoy a little repose. Such are my accomodations, that in the most rolling time, I can write without the least difficulty. I sit leaning against the ceiling; on one side the berth is my support, on the other the writing desk which is confined to the side of the room. Since being on the water fear & anxiety has been as much a stranger to my breast, as when I dwelt beneath the paternal roof. In contemplating the perfections of that God, who is with us both on our right hand & on our left, I find peace & tranquility.

Jan. 25. After having been out ninety four days, & witnessed nothing but floating barques like our own, some monsters of the deep, the expansive ocean, & the wide spread heavens, I cannot describe to you the joyful emotions, which the sight of land has this day produced. We have a fair view of Terra del Fuego on the right, & Staten Land on the left. Look on the map & you will see where we are, 54 deg. South Lat. & 63 deg. W. Long. The vessel will lie too until the morning as the Captain views it dangerous passing the Strait in the night, from the liability of meeting a gale in this tempestuous region.

Jan.27. Yesterday we entered the Strait of le Maire, 15 miles wide. The scene before us was interesting & sublime. On either side was a long continued range of mountains; the tops of some were covered with snow, while others reached to the clouds. But what most interested my feelings, was the discovery of a smoke on the island of Terra del Fuego. Through spy glasses two men could be discovered near it. Whether they were natives or mariners shipwrecked, we know not; nor could it

be ascertained without much labor & danger—I gazed on the prospect before me with mingled emotions. On these barren lands, in this frozen region, are inhabitants—they are heathen.

For several hours this morning we had a favorable breeze to waft us on, when we were suddenly becalmed & carried back thirty miles by a strong current, which runs through those straits. Our situation seemed to be manifestly dangerous. Destitute of a wind to carry us on, we lay in a tumultuous ocean, exposed to raging tempests & furious hurricanes, with rocks both on our right hand & on our left. Concern was visible in the Captain's countenance. But God, after making us feel our dependence, showed himself to be a hearer of prayer, by sending us a prosperous gale soon after our evening sacrifice.

Jan. 28. Cape Horn has just appeared in sight. On account of storms it is seldom seen by those who traverse this ocean. The Captain himself never before beheld it. The sun rises 15 min. before 4, & sets 15 min. past 8. Daylight continues all night. The weather is very cool. I dress in flannel, & generally keep between a pair of rose blankets, which make me as warm as I wish. some of the sisters suffer with the cold, who are situated near the companion way, it being constantly kept open. I have not even seen any fire, since I left America.

Jan. 29. By a strong wind we have been driven fifty or sixty miles east. sails were taken down, & we were drifted before the wind. Here I am day after day tossed on these far distant dangerous seas. I feel tired & exhausted. The incessant & violent rocking of the vessel, retards the improvement of my health, & keeps me here laid prostrate upon my couch. O the luxury in feeble health, of reclining on a bed with tranquility & ease. But I must not, I will not repine.

March 11. This afternoon one of the officers, Mr. Thurston, brother Bingham, & two of the native youths went into the water to bathe. But one hour after they came out, a shark was caught. It was a kind eager for human flesh. When first observed, it was approaching a sailor, who was painting the outside of the vessel, his feet hanging down in the waer. He himself was ignorant of his danger, until he received the alarm from one of our family. When caught, it seized hold of a hand stick of wood so violently, as to break out several of his teeth; and, continuing his grasp, by this means suffered himself in part to be drawn up into the vessel. A large bone was found in his stomach, thrown overboard at the time those friends were in the water. Its extended jaws sufficient to embrace a man's head, is now hanging up in a conspicuous place in the vessel. How it makes the blood thrill through my veins, when I think of the danger to which they were exposed. But as matter of encouragement, amidst all the perils, which may await us in a savage land, may it strengthen my faith & confidence in Him, who has this day been their Preserver.

March 20. Euclid's Elements of Geometry is now my principal study. It is my privilege to find a faithful instructor in a tender husband, & while seeking my present happiness & usefulness, he allures me on to brighter worlds & leads the way." When I gave my hand to Mr. Thurston & came out from my father's house, I felt assured of the care & friendship of one precious friend. But my expectations in this respect have been more than realised, my happiness greater than I had ever dared to ask. Evry revolving week gives me fresh experience of increasing kindness & attention, & additional strength to a tie, the most slender & indissoluble. To be connected with such a husband, such a family, & engaged in such an object, is of all situations in life such as I choose.

March 30. Thursday Noon. We are now approaching the shores, & are permitted to gaze on the island of Owhyhee. Joy sparkles in every eye, gratitude & animating hopes seem to fill every heart. The dear native youth particularly Thomas & Honora are all animation, scarcely seeking the refreshment either of sleep or food. Good brother Thomas, although he sat up all night that he might enjoy a glim-

mering view of his native country, at breakfast after eating half a meal, begged to be excused "that he might go & see where his father lived." We have now a full view of Mount Mowno Roa. Its top being covered with snow produces a novel appearance in this equatorial region. It is some of the highest land in the world, & can be seen forty or fifty leagues at sea, in clear weather. It is a volcano, which sometimes burns with incredible fury—As we have been pleasantly sailing, round within two or three miles of the northern shores of the island, with mingled emotions & an inexpressible interest, have we gazed on their villages & fields.

At Night. This afternoon the Captain sent ashore to learn where the king was. The messengers soon returned, bringing the following interesting facts; that Tammahamaah was dead; that the idols of the Sandwich islands were no more; that men & women ate together.

March 31. At four this morning the Captain sent ashore with an invitation for Krimokoo the principal chief of the islands, & his wife to come on board. At two oclock afternoon the boat returned. Brother Ruggles & Thomas who accompanied it brought new intelligence. They visited one of their Morai's, saw its walls & temples in ruins, saw the ashes of idols, & the bones of human victimes which had been offered in sacrifice to their gods. Since the king's death, which took place May 8, 1819, there has been war in Owhyhee. It was occasioned respecting abolishing the custom of men's & women's eating separately. Krimokoo, in favor of having the custom abolished, fought against a superior force, & proved victorious. About one hundred fell in battle; many were wounded. Even women presented themselves on both sides, & took an active part in the field of slaughter. All is now tranquility throughout the islands. They made an interesting visit to the queen, who kindly sent some fresh fish to the ladies. Krimokoo was not at home. He is expected in the morning.

April 1. Several of the canoes arrived this morning, filled with the almost naked natives—of both sexes. The women generally wear a square piece of native cloth wrapped round them, which reaches from their hips to the calves of their legs. They sometimes wear a piece over their shoulders similar to a shawl, but most commonly go without it. The males wear a very narrow strip round their loins. Neither the men or women wear any covering upon their heads. There is so much novelty in seeing white females & children, that we are viewed with a great deal of interest. As I was looking out at the cabin window to see a canoe of chattering natives, with animated countenances they approached, & gave me a plaintain. In return I then threw out several bits for the wihena's. Two of the number, as if tenaceous of their claim, with great avidity snatched it from off the water & again repeated, Mite Wihena. About ten some of the first characters of the isles arrived. Krimokoo first came on board, dressed in the manner & appearing with all the dignity of an American gentleman. He was first introduced to br. Bingham & Mr. Thurston, with whom he shook hands in a most cordial manner. He then turned to the ladies whom while yet at a distance he respectfully bowed, came near & presented each his hand, four women followd, two queens widows of the late Tammahammy & Krimokoo's two wives. They each very affectionately presented us with their left hand, & took seats with us. Thomas kindly regarding our feelings, vesterday sudgested it to them that they put on garments to come on board. Of these they have a great profusion, but do not make use of them on account of their being so burdensome in this warm climate. I should like to describe to you their dress & appearance. The first queen, whose weight is about four hundred & fifty appeared in a calico gown, but after a little time had elapsed, it was thrown off, & her dress consisted of a stripped gingham shirt, with ten thicknesses of native cloth wound twice round her. The other queen nearly as large, had one a velvet gown trimmed round the bottom with gold lace; a pretty wreath of yellow feathers round her head, two strings of beads on her neck, & two rings on her fingers. One of the other women had on a white shirt, some native cloth wound

round her of most beautiful colors, red & yellow, & a yellow wreath round her head. The other a rich gown, partly silk. They had most elegant flybrushes, made of feathers with handles of whalebone & turtle shell, composed of many hundred pieces. What I have mentioned was every article about them. Every one of them had scars on their faces, where they had tortured themselves with hot irons at the death of friends. But a short time elapsed before they became tired of their seats. One of the queens arose & sat down on the floor. Another stretched herself upon her face on the bench. Matrasses were then brought & laid down on which they might recline in their own way. Krimokoo dined with our family. The women declined. After we arose they sat down & had their own provisions brought onraw fish & poa. They soon dropped knives & forks, making use of their fingers as a substitute. Their poa is made of tarrow roots. They have three kinds; one thick enough to take up with one finger-another requires two, & the third three fingers. Their manner of eating mostly resembles that of children's four years of age, when seated by themselves under no restraint. At four they left us in a most friendly manner, giving us the parting hand.

April 4. This morning the vessel anchored. The queen assumed a new appearance. In addition to her white dress, her person was decorated with a lace cap, having on it a wreath of roses, & a lace half handkerchief in the square of which was a most elegant sprig of various colors. These were presents from some American friends. When she went ashore, she was received by hundreds with a shout. she was accompanied by the Captain br. B. Mr. T. & Thomas. As they approached the shore, they found his Majesty the king, with two of his wives bathing in the water. They first went & visited a Marai, & saw four forsaken gods of a horrid appearance. They then went to the king's house, & found him in a native dress eating dinner with his five wives, two of whom are his sisters; & one the former wife of his father.

April 7. The regal family dined with us. In addition to a native dress, the king had a string of gold upon his neck, & a piece of silk tied loosely about him. He appears friendly, but gives no decisive answer respecting the reception of the mission.

April 8. After having been on the water twenty four weeks, I again set foot on land, accompanied by Mr. T. brother & sister B. We had no sooner reached the shore than a multitude of natives swarmed around us, each eager to catch a view of female faces. Many years since, this part of the island was deluged by an eruption from a volcanic mountain. Huge masses of lava are here to be seen, some as it run in liquid streams. Yet here on these dry & barren shores is the place selected for the seat of government. We visited the king's palace. Ten or fifteeen armed men stood without. And although it was ten or eleven oclock in the forenoon, we found him, on whom devolves the government of a nation, three or four of his chiefs, & five or six of his attendants prostrate on their mats wrapped in midnight slumbers.

April 10. This is an eventful trying period. The king consents to receive the mission, but is solicitous that we should all land at this p[lace]. For such a family with six months washing on hand to sit down on a spot where water must be brought several miles on the backs of men, & the land utterly incapable of cultivation—what can be done! The brethren have all gone ashore to see the king, & if possible, obtain permission for the family to go to Woahoo, leaving only one or two couple here, & one or two of the native youth.

Mr. Thurston, Dr. Holman, Thomas Hopoo, & William Tennooe, being designated as the persons to land on these shores, on the evening of April 12th we bade adieu to Brig Thaddeus & our dear friends. Painful, indeed, was the separation from that beloved family, in whose bosom I had hoped to experience the pleasures & trials of a missionary life. Capt Blanchard & br. Bingham accompanied us. In a village at a little distance from the shore, we were introduced to a humble cottage, thatched with leaves, consisting of one room, & two windows made by cutting away the thatching. Here we found our effects brought from the Brig, but not one thing was, or could be set up until the house was thoroughly cleaned. At ten our friends

bade us an affectionate farewell. After imploring divine protection, we sought accommodations for the night.

May 2. Capt. Starbuck & Best, from England, who have been here several days bade us an affectionate adieu. They have treated us with a great deal of respect, attention & kindness. I will enumerate the presents we have received from them. Two beaver bonnets, a large earthern plate with a tin cover, sixteen plates, ten cups & saucers, two tumblers, two wine glasses, two chairs, one hundred Holland made quills, one quire paper, superfine royal, one sauce pan, ten lbs. butter, twenty three bottles of wine, porter, ale, & vinegar. Thus God raises us up friends in this land of strangers, & causes our cup to overflow with blessings. Mr. T. last sabbath preached on board one of their vessels.

May 16. Upward of four weeks elapsed after landing before we obtained any water for washing. The clothes we dirtied on the voyage were sent with the family to Woahoo for washing. Every other effort for obtaining water proved unsuccessful, & there was at present no alternative, but having our washing done at Woahoo or avail ourselves of the following accommodations. To have our water brought sometimes two, & sometimes five miles in gourd shells on the backs of men, our wood transported two or three miles in the same manner, our clothes boiled in a saucepan & ironed with one flat. I have just completed my first washing & ironing & after coping with all its attendant difficulties, find my clothes to look very well.

About twelve last night we were aroused from our slumbers by fire as a few rods from us several houses were in flames. For a few minutes our fears were greatly excited lest ours should share a similar fate. The king dispatched men, charging them to secure our goods, whatever became of the houses of others. Five houses were burnt, when the fire was extinguished. These thatched cottages are as liable to take fire as a haystack, & beside the people are most careless with fire. Many times have I seen their lighted match lying on the dry hay within their huts, while they were preparing their pipes for smoking.

July 9. Sabbath Day. . . . George Tamaree's father, is very solicitous that a teacher should be sent to Atooi. He says by and by they will have a sabbath, read the bible, & sing the praises of God as they do in America. Brother Whitney & Ruggles accompanied George to his father's. When they arrived, he was reclining on a sofa. As soon as George entered he arose, clasped him in his arms & kissed him. The tears flowed down his cheecks—neither were able to speak for half an hour. After they became a little composed, the king enquired who the brethren were. George introduced them as his driends, who came from America to accompany him home. He then embraced them in the same manner, that he had done his son. George explained their object to him, with which he appeared extremely gratified, said if they would stay with him he would be a father to them, & they should be his children. He is very fond of George, has made him a great chief, & says that he loves him more than his other children. During their stay they were treated with increasing kindness, & when they left him, he wept like a child—My dear friends,

I do rejoice that I have been brought to this heathen land. The animating hope that the standard of the cross will here be erected, cheers my heart, & reconciles me to a life of privations & trials. Today a little precious meeting was holden at the kings; Mr. T. for the first time preached through the medium of an interpeter. The words of his text were "I have a message from God unto thee." The king & family listened with attention And when they were brought before the throne of everlasting mercy, they presented themselves on their knees-Where is cousin Goodell? Tell me, will he not come out to these islands. Could it be, how it would rejoice my heart. I have not yet relinquished the hope of again seeing his face in the flesh. I want to thank him & my other friends for their kindnesses to me. They often excite in my heart sensations tender & grateful. Think not that a final farewell to the much loved land of my nativity, has made me forgetful of home, or diminished my attachment to friends. No, a voyage of eighteen thousand miles, & a situation among strangers in a strangeland, serve to draw more closely those tender ties, which unite my heart to theirs. Away here in this land of darkness, cut off from cultivated society, I shall rank letters from America among my highest sources of happiness. Let me then have large communications. I shall enter into your concerns with a lively interest.

"Waimea Aug. 13, 1832." Dateline on closely written four-page folded letter from Betsey Lyons, wife of Reverend Lorenzo Lyons, to her sister-in-law in Colrain, Mass., a few weeks after their arrival. She describes the death of Kaahumanu, "one of the bright examples of christian piety. . . She died in faith, leaving the whole nation to lament her loss. . . The funeral was attended with all due solemnity. All the vessels in the harbor wore their colours half mast, and cannons were fired at intervals during the day. The forts also had theirs half mast and minute guns were fired while the procession was preceeding to the tomb and to the church. The coffin was splendid being covered with crimson velvet with brass ornaments and inscription. Over the bier were thrown feathered cloaks of different glaring hues. The chiefs were dressed in black and the missionaries attended in half mourning also a respectable company of foreigners with badges of mourning, she was desposited in the same tomb with the late king and queen, who died in England." There is also her description of a five-day ocean trip from Honolulu to Kailua: "The distance from Honolulu to our station is about 250 miles and to give you some idea of the pleasure we take during the sea voyages from one station to another you may fancy to your self a native brigg whose slacked & torn rigging, mended sails and dirty deck and cabin show that if it has not undergone the ravages of time it is worse for the care of these unused to the work of managing such a complicated piece of workmanship as a vessel. On its deck in the cabin and steerage you may see besides dogs, cats, goats, fowls and between 200 or 300 native with all their filth, smoking "poe" colabasaes [sic] on the after part of the deck we spread our matresses, and as seasickness comes on, here we lay ourselves down," etc.; address panel with red "New Bedford Mass. "Kailua, Island of Hawaii, April 16, 1832." Dateline on four-page folded letter from Lucy Goodale Thurston to Milliscent Goodale in Marlborough, Mass., and which was completed October 7, 1832. The contents are mostly devoted to a dramatic description of giving birth to her daughter Mary during a voyage between Maui and Hawaii on the brig Waverly. She writes (in part): "I thought of the precious names of home, physician, sister & the tears rushed into my eyes. But thinking them unreasonable, when every thing depended on my own exertions, I checked the impulse, & returned them to their sockets. Yet in bringing my mind to my circumstances there was a struggle. I called to mind the duty & the privilege of laying myself with childlike simplicity & submission, into the hands of my heavenly Father & await his will. Tried to do so & there was peace. I spent a short time only on deck before I awoke one of the natives to signify to Mr. Thurston, that I wished to return, & bid him pass on & awake Mr. Bishop. He met us in the cabin. I then said to them I am called upon in this place to ask the aid of you all. Mr. Bishop proposed opium until reaching Lahaina. I answered, no, it is too late, & if my apprehensions are just, no time is to be lost. The first embarassment that met our way, was that we were in utter darkness; for during the fore part of the night, we had trimmed & replenished, trimmed & replenished the only lamp we could find in the vessel, till we left off in despair with the light extinct. Now one more effort was made, & our flickering taper appeared as if invigorated by sleep. . . . In the mean time Mr. Ruggles repaired with the children to the deck. Mr. Thurston & Mr. Bishop alone remained. Every thing was in due order & in one half hour from the time a general movement was made, infant cries from the cabin apprised even our own natives on deck of what was passing below. They fell upon a mother's ears, yet scarce was I informed of the danger, that its breath might be stopped on the very threshhold of life, when the lamp expired, & its cries ceased together. A lamp, a lamp. It was passed up on deck-renewed, returned, & a spark still more precious again lighted up. The child was safe, but the mother's life was soon felt to be in jeopardy. Never before had I so much reason to feel, that I had reached the isthmus which lies between this & the invisible world. I collected my thoughts to die. But after the lapse of a few hours this train of feeling was suddenly exchanged for those still more overpowering of unmixed gratitude. All was safe. "Honolulu Jan. 2, 1834." Dateline on three-page folded letter from Mary K. Attention to instruction is rather indifferent, attendance upon the means of grace has considerably diminished. Our chapel is not filled as formerly. . Many that were considered moral are now openly vicious. The ships that touch here are visited in companies by profligate females. Iniquity abounds. 2018° "Honolulu February 16th 1835." Dateline on four-page folded letter from Levi Chamberlain to his sister-in-law in Bath, New York, replying to her account dated Mar. 10, 1834, of "the distressing accident which befell my brother-your beloved husband" and which did not reach him until January 1835, along with an additional letter from August which report his brother's death. Chamberlain's consoling letter tries to keep in mind that nearly a year has passed, but the overall effect is still one of Old Testament gloom; the additional six months which passed before it was received could not have helped. The great delay in news, inherent in these around-the-Horn voyages, is dealt with matter-of-factly: "I was gratifed that you told me the number of your children and gave me their names. Some of them I had learned before—others were new to me. I shall be glad to know more about them, and I wish you to tell me their ages, and write out their names in full. . . Four-page folded letter with cross-writing on two pages, from Betsey Lyons to her sister, Emily Curtis Bliss, in Elbridge, N.Y., as she and her husband, Reverend Isaac Bliss, were about to sail for Hawaii as members of the Eighth Company of missionaries. With the infrequency of sailings, Betsey was still adding to this letter in July. It finally left Hawaii on October 31, 1836, on the whaler Superior, which arrived in New London April 23, 1837, after Isaac and Emily had left. Forwarded to her husband's family in Warsaw, Illinois, it arrived June 8, 1837. By this time both the Lyon's new son, Luke, so proudly announced in this letter, and his mother, the writer Betsey, had died. Ironically, there are some observations on native mothers and the custom of "hanai": "I am happy to see an improvement in some of the mothers with regard to managing their children. But they cleave to heathenish practices such as giving away their children as soon as they are born & before frequently. Had I time I would now give you an instance of the first scholar in my school, a little girl who has gone 60 miles on foot to obtain the child which she had begged of a member of the church of Kailua a month or so before its birth. This woman has had 4 children before & given them all away. This has been the practice of the higher chiefs. Chiefs never used to nurse their own children. An uncle & aunt have gone with this little girl & they have taken a nurse with them for the child & intend to bring it back with them. The great probability is that it will die on the road. This is not an uncommon instance." etc. The Blisses reached Honolulu on April 9, 1837, and were met by a weakened and dispirited Betsey, who within days became seriously ill, dying on May 14th. Dateline on four-page folded letter from Betsey Lyons to her parents in Elbridge, New York; like the previous letter (lot 2019), this left Hawaii on the whaler Superior on October 31st and was also forwarded to Illinois, arriving on June 8, 1837, after her death. The letter, describing her work and filled with joy and spiritual fervor, records the death of two mission children, Emily Green and David Lyman; outer sheet with red "New London Ct. Apr. 23" cds with matching "SHIP" handstamp, same ms. rates, with forwarding charges totaled to 45¾c, internal separations, still Fine.......Not illustrated E. 750-1,000
- 2022° "Journal April 29th 1837." Portion of a letter from Dr. Seth Andrews to his parents in Pittsford, N.Y., in the form of a journal (four pages extant, probably half), beginning with his trip to Kauai in a native schooner to attend to the wife of the Reverend Peter Gulick at Koloa: "30. We were not much sea sick until late this morning and began to congratulate ourselves that we should escape but coming into rough water our hopes were soon blasted. We spent the day upon deck vomiting repeatedly; notwithstanding our weak state we were obliged to support our umbrella to protect us from the burning sun. The cabin was so perfumed with bilge water that we could not endure it." etc. In blessed contrast is the final long entry, a visit to Manoa on June 9th with Dr. Judd: "Manoa was the favorite residence of the distinguished chief Kaahumanuu. It is situated in a lovely valley open at one side to the sea, on all the other sides it is surrounded by high & precipitous mountains. Their steep sides, often almost perpendicular, are partially covered with soil and trees are thinly scattered here & there. The rugged lava often appearing in perpendicular walls is festooned with several species of convolvulus in full bloom & other creeping plants. Numerous ravines are deeply cut in the sides & are wild & romantic in the extreme."; address panel with light Boston cds in red with matching "SHIP" handstamp and ms. "391/2" rate; some separations and Scotch tape stains, and, despite the absence of the middle sheet, this is still a readable and valuable record by Dr.
- 2023° "Kailua Oct. 2, 1838. Dateline on four-page folded letter from Dr. Seth Andrews to his parents in Pittsford, N.Y., describing the "severe and dangerous illness" of Lucy Thurston which began as "a slight attack of palsy of the right side," before becoming "alarmingly prostrated so that we had little expectation that she could survive the day; she was however in a measure relieved by the use of stimulants. . . She required my constant watch perhaps to guard against the sinking turns to which she was subject." He also describes in detail the removal of a tumor from an 18-month old boy, "about the size of a hens egg, situated upon the cheek crowding the nose aside, & shutting up the eye. I first saw the child 10 months before on my journey from Hilo; the tumour increased much. The operation seemed necessary, but the tumour lay so near the lachrymal sac & duct, that I feared some complication with those organs might defeat the operation. At best it must be tedious & distressing to the little patient. I determined to operate. Mr. Forbes assisted me, with natives to hold him. I dissected the tumour nearly from its bed but found as I feared that it was so intimately connected with the lachrymal organs that I could not remove it entirely; I then laid it open & discovered the lachrymal sac in the bottom of the tumour which was filled with a serous fluid; of course it was out of the question to remove the whole sac (sac of the tumour) I cut it off as near the lacrymal sac as possible, after which I dressed the wound. Little or no febrile irritation followed, the wound healed up as readily as could have been expected. The face is somewhat disfigured by the scar and the distortion of the nose, but much improved. The distortion of the nose will probably disappear in some measure at least as the child grows." On another page he explains that the description of the operation "is written with the black substance from the ink fish. Two species are abundant here." (This section shows an oxidation and slight fading noticeably different from the rest of the letter.) Address panel with light New Bedford Mass. cds in red with matching "SHIP" handstamp and blue ms. "52" for double 25c rate plus 2c ship fee, docketed "Recd April 1839", tear at top right with old Scotch tape stain, Very Good, excel-

"Kailua, Hawaii, Oct. 4th 1838." Four-page letter from Persis Thurston to her cousin Lucy, written "at the midnight hour," describing the near-fatal illness of her 2024° mother: "Our family have lately been called to drink deep of the cup of affliction. We have been called to stand around the sick bed of our beloved mother, and to view her as standing on the very borders of eternity. Five weeks since she was attacked with a paralytic affliction she betook herself to her couch, and applied to the Dr. for medical advice. He cupped and bled her several times. . . . Dr. and Mrs. Andrews left their home that evening, and remained here with mother for three weeks, watching over, and administering to her wants with the love and solicitude of an own brother and sister. . . . Powerful remedies were used, but apparently without effect. We then had no expectation that she would ever revive again. The scenes of that afternoon were the most solemn and affecting we have ever witnessed. To be so suddenly called to part with a mother, no more to see her face in the flesh, no more to receive her pious instructions, and maternal admonitions, was a trial almost too great for us to bear." etc. The letter ends with news of her mother's slow recovery, and with this note scribbled in the margin: "A vessel now here sails for Oahu today. A whale ship is there to leave for the United States in a few days." Fine, affecting content.....

2025° "Per Brig Thomas Perkins Via Cape Horn." Scarce manuscript endorsement on four-page folded letter datelined "Honolulu Oahu Dec. 19th 1839" from Charlotte Knapp—who with her husband Horton, a teacher, were members of the Eighth Company of missionaries-to Hannah Knapp in Roundhill, Conn. She writes (in part): "We have boarders besides a great deal of company, which is one of the duties of missionaries residing at this station and from which those living at out stations are almost entirely free. Strangers are almost constantly arriving from one place and another to whom we must extend our hospitalities. . . . I have been told that there are more than 60 scientific men connected with the exploring expedition that is expected here in March. Three gentlemen arrived from the Columbia River last week who crossed the Rocky Mountains and expect to return by way of Cape Horn. . . . We have had quite an interesting account from Ascension Island from Capt. Joy. A foreigner residing there wrote a letter by him to Mr. Diell Seaman's Chaplain here requesting him to send them a minister as soon as possible for they felt that they had souls to save." etc. Address panel with partly struck "SHIP" in red, no townmark, ms. "12" rate, pencil docketing indicates April 30th. If this letter actually went on the Thomas Perkins, it did not sail until January 6-a trip of slightly less than four months, and a remarkably quick one; light staining on face and tiny tear at bottom, otherwise Fine, intriguing usage, ex Harris, Ishikawa, illustrated in Meyer-Harris (p.5)..... "Kailua Feb. 8, 1840." Dateline on three-page folded letter from Dr. Seth Andrews to his parents in Pittsford, N.Y., describing a ship wreck: "Supplies for families on Maui & for two or three stations on this Island including Kailua were put on board a native vessel to be delivered to several families. The vessel was detained by rough weather until her food ran low when the Capt. most foolhardily anchored off the north shore of Maui under a bold precipitous shore to obtain food; while there a wind arose blowing directly in shore, the anchor was got up with intention of getting to sea, but she went directly on shore in a tremendous surf & in a few moments was dashed in pieces." He then describes in detail what was lost, including a small library and letters from families ("all that could be found of them was mush,") and adds, "[We] were daily expecting to welcome a bountiful package of letters from our dear friends. the Lord has ordered otherwise & we do not murmur. Perhaps we were looking too much to earthly sources for our happiness & our heavenly Father would give us a gentle admonition." He also notes that "This wreck has given an illustration of the change in the character of this people. When the brethren arrived at the spot they did not find the natives rifling boxes & barrels. . .but kindly engaged in preserving & drying what the waves had spared.") etc.; back of cover with partial strike of Vera Cruz prepaid cds (legible examples in this collection include the word "Franqueado"), address panel with light red New York cds and ms. "2034" rate; old tape

"Sand. Isl. Hawaii Kailua June 25th 1840." Dateline on closely written four-page folded letter from Parnelly Andrews to a Miss Winston in Pittsford, N.Y. She writes about the ship wreck previously mentioned by her husband (see lot 2026) and hopes her friends and family will re-write their letters. There is also an interesting description of a native girl Mrs. Andrews met at a meeting: "Her only garment was an under garment of unbleached cotton, probably having done faithful service for several weeks without being subjected to the destructive process of washing. Over her shoulders hung the tattered remnant of a native kapa. Her hair long & stiff did not look as tho' it had been combed in a week. . . the remains of her dinner were adhering to her hands & face. . . . But this case is not selected for its novelty, no, it is a specimen of the common appearance of Sand. I. females, tho' often they wear merely a piece of kapa wrapped around the body instead of a garment. But then there are many who have one or more good silk or calico dresses & when a garment becomes old & torn, they if able to purchase a new one, put it on one & thus sometimes wear four or five garments or portions of them, at once. No matter for the tassels & fringes which adorn the bottom of their clothes. Rags, even so unclean are no disparagement to Sand. Islanders. Except a few individuals including the high Chiefs & even some of those their appearance is often disgusting & excessive." etc. This left on the bark Flora August 3rd with the Bingham and Thurston families and did not arrive in New York until Feb. 4, 1841, where it was postmarked the next day and rated "20¾"; small tears and light soiling, Fine..............Not illustrated E. 300-400

2030° "Waimea Sept. 24, 1841." Dateline on an important four-page folded letter from the Reverend Lorenzo Lyons to his father-in-law, Simeon Curtis, regarding the abusive behavior of Curtis's son-in-law, the Reverend Isaac Bliss: "From his very first arrival at the Islands I perceived that he did not treat his wife kindly. He used expressions which were unkind. I perceived too that it was a great mistake that he ever became a missionary. He has conducted [himself] in such a manner during the last two years as to destroy my confidence in his missionary character. Your daughter will tell you how she has been treated by him, & that too in my own house. His character as a husband & as a missionary, has been examined by the Mission. They were on the point of sending him home at once. But they wished to exercise mildness in his case so they gave him the privilege of asking permission to return to America. . .. He has expressed penitence, & perhaps he has manifested such a feeling in the presence of some. . . . I have been an eyewitness of his conduct but not an eyewitness of his penitence. . . . This will not excuse him for fastening the bedroom door against his wife, G forbidding her to enter until she had performed a most unreasonable request—this will not excuse him for calling his wife a liar. . .this will not excuse him for seizing her with violent hands & carrying her upstairs, in the midst of her cries for help." etc. He also reports the birth of his son, Albert Brown Lyons, and recalls his first, late wife, Betsey Curtis: "Yes, it was 4 years since I had seen the grave that contains the relics of our beloved Betsey. As I thought of the past, many pleasing & painful recollections crowded into my mind. but she will rise again, a glorious form." Address panel with red "New Bedford Ms. Mar. 1" cds with matching "SHIP" handstamp and ms. "27" rate, Very Fine. The Bliss episode is described at length in Paths of Duty, a study of missionary wives by

2031° "Waimea Nov. 5th 1841." Dateline on four-page folded letter from Dr. Seth Andrews to his parents. He mentions a visit to the Reverend Elias Bond and his family in Kohala, and gives a long description of Kauai. The rest of the letter shows the doctor's mixed feelings regarding the sincerity of the natives, referring to "the dark side of native character" and ends with this lament: "The catholics are making some progress. By the grace of god our church numbers generally stand fast. By holding up French men-of-war, in terrorism, they tyrannize over the chiefs & keep them in constant fear of bringing down French vengeance. Under the cover of French guns they are as impudent a set of fellows as you will find in any land. I once accidently met of them at Gov. Adams in his presence & that of Kekanhiohi, the prime minister and had some conversation with them, but they became so angry, that I thought it best to say but little, by way of keeping cool. The Gov. afterwards said that if he had not been present they would have torn me in pieces." Address panel with red "Salem Mass Apr. 21" cds and matching "SHIP" handstamp, red ms. "203/4", forwarded from Pittsford, N.Y., to Armada, Michigan, with readdressing and postage in blue ms. and totaling 45%; the endorsement, "Favor of Mr. Castle", refers to Samuel Northrup Castle, Asst. Superintendent of Secular Affairs for the Mission, who, after the death of his wife, returned to the U.S. with his daughter Mary. They sailed on the William Gray, which left Honolulu December 2, 1841, arriving at Boston, Apr. 20, 1842. If this letter did not reach Castle in time, it may have been taken directly by whalers; cover with tiny edge tears, still Fine, a particularly attractive usage from the Andrews correspondence E. 600-800

- 2032° "Kailua Dec. 1841." Dateline on four-page folded letter with additional crosswriting on two pages, from Dr. Seth Andrews to his parents in Armada, Michigan, in a cheerful frame of mind after receiving a letter from them. He gives a description of the fruits available on the Islands, the animals they own, etc. But then he reports the death of the Thurston's daughter, Lucy, in Brooklyn, New York, at the age of 18 (Mrs. Thurston had brought her children to the U.S. for the purpose of continuing the education of the eldest three). "Even when Lucy lay in her coffin & all the remaining children were sick around her, & subsequently when two were brought to the borders of the grave & in relation to our hope had almost fled, [Mrs. Thurston's] letters show that she was calm & prepared for any emergency." Dr. Andrews notes with professional pride the attendence of four physicians during Lucy's illness, free of charge; address panel with clear "Warren R.I. Jun. 27" cds and matching "SHIP" handstamp, ms. "52" (double 25c rate for over 400 miles plus ship captain's fee), small paper loss not affecting text to any significant degree and light soiling, still Fine

"Honolulu S.I. Jany 19/44" Dateline on four-page folded letter to Danbury, Conn., completed February 26th, written by Amos Starr Cooke, who, with this wife, headed a school in Honolulu for the children of the higher chiefs (which from 1846 on was known as the "Royal School"): "We are fed & clothed & have nought to think of but our precious children & the souls by whom we are surrounded. Alas! that we feel & do so little for them! Our interesting scholars share the largest in our sympathy & efforts & prayers. But none of them are yet converted. They can converse intelligibly in English—read—write—cypher—parse—spell—study Geography—sing—drawing (linear) -2 boys play flute & two girls play on a piano forte. . . but all this avails us nothing comparatively, while we see them exposed to the damnation of hell. . ." etc. Rev. Cooke also describes the visit of a French man-of-war, the take-over of the Society Islands by France, a trip around Oahu, and some observations on the recognition of the independence of the Islands: "Alas that that mission [Society Islands] should be exposed to the tender mercies of Catholics. It had nearly been so with our mission, had not God interfered & sent an embassy to England, France & U.S. to secure the independence of this Hawaiian nation. God's dealings with this mission & nation have ever been almost miraculous. . . . We are daily looking for intelligence from that embassy by way of Mexico & also for an English Consular general in the person of Genl. Miller, a gentleman who visited the islands some 15 years since. The Year 1843 will ever be a memorable one in the annals of this nation & not much less the present year when the Ambassadors shall return, & changes be made, upon a more sure foundation in the Laws & Legislation thereof of this more than ever interesting group. And, not many years will elapse before those now composing our family will be exerting a great influence for good, or for evil, upon the sophisticated dwellers in these islands of the Pacific." etc. He also mentions the arrival of Admiral Richard

- 2036° "Kailua Feb. 8, 1845." Dateline on closely written four-page folded letter from Parnelly Andrews to her mother-in-law, who in a previous letter wondered if the Andrews children could be left in the care of Christian natives. Parnelly replies, "I have not yet seen the S. Islander with whom I would willingly trust Geo. alone 15 minutes. The standard of propriety is so low among them. . . . There is no subject upon which parents & children, brothers & sisters, male & female, will not converse with equal freedom. When a birth takes place it is still common for friends & neighbors, old & young, children & all, to be present. For the expression of their thoughts they have no refined language, no circumlocution, but instead, their words are accompanied with the most expressive gestures, so that even if children do not understand the native tongue, much could be learned by merely looking at them when engaged in conversation. . . tho' G. understands but very few words, & those such as we are obliged to use often in giving directions to domestics, yet we do not allow him to be in the room. We called Kealoha a good girl, & she is, as good as I have been acquainted with among natives. I took almost endless pains to instruct her in the rules of propriety as also did Mrs. T. & P. & L. still she will to this hour, just as soon engage in conversation with a room full of men upon subjects which civilized reputable females would never think of speaking upon in any circumstances." etc. A portion of the letter includes an affectionate message from George to his grandmother describing his baby sister (who died a few months later); address leaf with bold red "New Bedford Ms. Sep. 3" cds and matching "SHIP" handstamp, ms. "12" rate written over what appears to be an erased "27"—put there out of habit as the new postal rates had taken effect on July 1st, and a reminder to the Andrews family in Michigan that they saved 15c;

"Kailua Apr. 14, 1846." Dateline on four-page folded letter from Dr. Seth Andrews to his parents in Armada, Michigan, and completed on July 8th. In the meantime, on his birthday, June 24th, he announces the birth of his fourth child, Charles Thurston Andrews; by the 26th, Charles is afflicted with the dysentery that had earlier killed his two sisters and would eventually take his mother's life and his own, at age two. The letter also mentions making a pump to draw water from the cellar, and describes the mixed blessing of receiving letters from America in quantity (and trying to answer them with one eye on sailing dates), and some observations on Dr. Judd: "The King is now surrounded by a considerable number of foreign officers in various capacities. Doct. Judd is at the head of finance under the new organization & is perhaps the most influential of the company. He is much spoken evil of by many & you may see something of it in the papers. do not however credit all you see from anonymous correspondents of Am. papers. I have the most perfect confidence in Doct. J.s character & his sincere desire to do the best in his power for the nation." Address panel with same bold red "New-York 12cts Ship 1 Feb." cds as the letter to his brother, both of them carried on the ship Niantic on August 11th; minor soiling, Fine



"Waimea Hawaii Sept. 7, 1846." Dateline on $3\frac{1}{2}$ pp folded letter from a lonely Reverend Lorenzo Lyons to his brother in Montrose, Pa.: "We are social beings & sympathetic beings—but sociality & sympathy need to be cultivated—& the means of cultivating them must be used—or else we degenerate into stoics. You are surrounded with society—& perhaps an excess of it.. leads you to sigh for solitude. But when you get sick of society remember your solitary brother on the Sandwich Islands. He has a wife to be sure & a few children & they form about all the civilized & profitable society he enjoys. If you only realized what solitude means—& what it is to be deprived of good & cheerful society—you would know better the value I place on anything that shows there are other beings in the world asides myself and family." etc.; this left Honolulu aboard the bark Angola on Oct. 3rd, address panel with light strikes of Boston cds in red, matching "SHIP" and "7" handstamp for the less-than-300 miles rate to Montrose plus 2c ship fee, ms. docketing shows a Feb. 10, 1847 receiving date, Fine .. Not illustrated E. 400-500

- 2040° "Honolulu Jan. 16, 1847 Island of Oahu." Dateline on five-page folded letter from Dr. Seth Andrews to his parents in Armada, Michigan, and which shows him in a playful frame of mind despite the recent death of his wife, Parnelly. A portion of the letter is a copy of a journal set in rhyme (with helpful footnotes) supposedly composed by his six-month old son, Charles Thurston, though the real author appears to have been Mary Howe Thurston (described by the doctor as his son's amanuensis): "My father dear,/Aunt Thurston here,/Does think that I/ To write should try;/ So the first time,/I write in rhyme." etc. He also includes a copy of a letter from his eldest child, George Pierce, written at Kailua while his father was in Maui ("Some mornings we feel sleepy & don't get up till six. This morning we did a little better & got up at 20 minutes past four"). There is brief reference to his depression ("If my letters had a speedy passage you may by this time have received the intelligence of my affliction. You will weep with me but I am thankful you know not the depths of the wound."). He also notes how this letter will travel ("a ship is soon to sail for U.S. via China") while referring to an earlier letter to his brother Charles ("If the Mexicans don't take her"); address panel with partial "New-York 12cts Ship Jul. 13" cds in red, minor edge wear,





2045° "Honolulu, June 14, 1851." Dateline on folded letter to Sandwich, N.H., from the Reverend John Emerson, a member of the Fifth Company, to his sister, Mrs. B.E. Hoyte. Written an hour before Samuel Castle was to sail, he says (in part): "If you see the Anti-Slavery papers you will see that Bro. Jonathan [sic] S. Green of Makawao on Maui is the Hero of the Sandwich Isls. for every good work especially in his efforts to emancipate this people & procure for them lands &c. &c. Now be it known unto you & you may whisper it unto the ears of your husband if you choose—that I two years since accepting a commission from the Hawaiian Govt to sell to Native Sandwich Islanders all the Govt. lands in Waialua at least 20,000 acres—be it known further that I have sold about all of these lands to poor natives at the moderate price of from 25c to \$50 per acre but most of it at a price not exceeding 50 cts. Yes & where Bro. Greene has sinned once in selling land to natives I have sinned four times for I have sold to about four times as many as he has if I am rightly informed. Br. G. gets praise at home I get most hearty curses from foreigners. . . . if I would see my people industrious & civilized, they must own lands, flocks & herds & become each a man for himself." etc. There is also an interesting remark about images: "Now had we a Daguerreotype artist here I assure you if he was not extravagant in his demands we would try & get all on to one piece of plate for you to see us." In suggesting she and her husband visit the Islands, he says in closing: "I think it would make you both young again & give you enough to think of all the rest of your lives." Address leaf with ms. "Politeness of S.N. Castle Esq." (In 1851, Mr. Castle was released from the A.B.C.F.M. and went into the mercantile business with Amos Cooke under the name of Castle and Cooke.) While this letter was in his keeping, the postal rates changed—this was mailed at the 10c rate for unpaid letters sent over 3,000 miles, on July 15. The unusually detailed docketing includes documenting the travel time ("35 days to California/38 days from there here/73"), etc., Fine. Emerson's description of government land sales refers to the practice of fee-simple ownership for Hawaiian subjects, begun experimentally in 1846 (even before a new law was passed) and based on proposals of Dr. Gerrit Judd as Minister of the Interior, which included the appointment of a land commission and a review of the whole system of land tenures..... E. 400-500

Inter-Island Usage: Maui to Oahu. Four-page folded letter datelined "Lahaina July 1st, 1823" from Clarissa Lyman Richards, wife of the Reverend William Richards, to Elizabeth Bishop in "Honoruru Oahu." She writes to her friend (in part): "My dear friend enquires if I have experienced any new and unforseen missionary trials - trials that I did not anticipate when entering on the work. All that I have seen and experienced has not yet altered my previous opinion that all mankind are by nature supremely selfish. But had I embarked a few months earlier I should have been astonished at beholding on missionary ground any exhibition of a selfish and depraved heart. I am indebted to the kindness of a christian brother, one who had seen much of the world, & had been a missionary himself, for correct views on this subject as well as for much useful information. How lamentable that those who follow in the steps of apostles and martyrs exhibit so little of their spirit! I have daily distressing proof of the desperate wickedness of my own heart and the remains of that selfish disposition which is indeed the bane of spiritual enjoyment." etc.; usual toning from this correspondence, address panel separated, very early E. 1,000-1,500



Inter-Island Usage: Hawaii to Kauai. Tiny folded letter from Mrs. Louisa Ely, to Mrs. Elizabeth Bishop, dated Nov. 8, 1823, soon after the latter's arrival at Kauai ("We wish much to hear of your safe arrival & also to hear that your health is improving"), hurriedly written, "as the Brig is now getting under way"; small internal tear, Fine and very scarce, inter-island mail in this period was carried free of charge; both the Ely and Bishop families were part of the Second Company of missionaries, arriving in the spring of 1823 on the Thames................................... 

Inter-Island Usage: Hawaii to Oahu. Small folded letter from Lucy Thurston in Kailua, to Delia Stone Bishop, dated Dec. 16, 1829, recording two instances of adultery: "One of the females who came up from Oahu on board that vessel is now paying the penalty of a broken law—the Capt. her seducer. I must add still more—our own beloved Thomas Hopu is now suspended from the church, has been put in irons. . .having acknowledged himself guilty of breaking the seventh commandment. He appears a real penitent, much borne down both in body & mind. Indeed it is affecting to see him. His seducer & accomplice is one of the most interesting women of Kaawaloa, & a few weeks previous to the affair, numbered among their converts. Her husband & Delia [Hopu] were both at Oahu." etc.; lettersheet toned, otherwise Fine. 



- "Brig. Henry At Sea April 16th 1846. Lat. 000 Long. 22° 40' W." Dateline on 2065° four-page folded letter to Doylestown, Pa., from William L. Lee, future Chief Justice of Hawaii. Lee writes to a friend: "Well, we left Newburyport on the 23d Feby amid the cheers of thousands who wished us nothing but prosperity. The first three weeks of our voyage we encountered nothing but storm after storm. . . The old brig bounded and pitched like a wounded bison, and sicker than death we were cooped up in our narrow berths without the least hope of escape. For thirteen days we were knocking about in the wildest confusion without making a single knot on our course. The raging waves swept our deck continually and more than a thousand times we cried 'Good God deliver us from the sea!' At this writing, five months after his arrival, Lee at the age of 26 had already been appointed a judge: "All things move smooth as oil and I am enjoying life in the highest degree. I expected the moment I took the office of judge and connected myself with this Government that the party in opposition to Govt. would open all their artillery upon me, but to my great surprise they have not only let me rest in peace, but have praised all my acts & judicial conduct in the most flattering manner. I can assure you I have never done anything to curry favor with any one, but pursued the even tenor of my way endeavoring to keep strictly within the path of my duty, turning neither to the right or the left." He also notes that Attorney General John Ricord wishes to resign and has offered him his post. Lee became Chief Justice in 1847 and before his death in 1857 he had written or re-written most of Hawaiian law. 




FIGURE 27. "View of Honolulu...No. 4", lithograph by Paul Emmert, 1854 (Courtesy Bishop Museum).

C. Brewer & Co. Three-page folded letter datelined "Pr 'Perry' Via Sandwich Isls Port of Mazatlan 17th Nov. 1844" to Samuel Comstock in Canton. The writer, G.W.P. Bissell, begins, "The U.S. brig 'Perry' leaves today for the Sandwich Islands and I embrace the chance to write a few lines with the hope that some vessel may be going to China from the Islands." He notes the Perry has just come from China in the "short passage of 64 days." A ship's agent himself, he may have instructed the Perry's captain to give the letter to C. Brewer & Co., known as a forwarder in 1844. Inscribed "Fw'd C. Brewer & Co.", Brewer sent the letter to Bush & Co. which had a Hong Kong address, in addition to its Lahaina office. Bush forwarded it to Mr. Comstock who marked the letter, "Rec'd 17 January," presumably 1846 as receipt in 1845 would have constituted a 60-day transit from Mazatlan to Canton, an unlikely situation, especially with two transfers involved. Reed is part business (a shipment of letters & papers) and part personal, including a request to tell "Capt. 


FIGURE 28. Detail of Plate 4, Brewer and Company, S. H. Williams and Company, lithograph of Britton and Rey after drawing by Paul Emmert, 1854 (Courtesy Bishop Museum).

Is/ Mch. 23/46" from its principal, Amos Starr Cooke, to his brother and sister in Danbury, Conn., back of cover with bold red oval, "Forwarded by C.Brewer & Co.", address leaf with Vera Cruz cds and additional Pensacola Flor. cds (Sep. 12). Cooke began this letter with the hope that a ship would arrive soon, bound for Mexico; on June 3rd he announces "that a vessel sails for Masatlan today at noon, so I must hurry." He writes (in part): "there has been an arrival of an English war steamer with two masts. She remained in our harbor eight days & was visited by large number of natives & foreigners. This mission & their children were invited & so were the chiefs & scholars. To the natives & our children it was a novel sight. I think the time is not distant when we shall have steamers plying between this & other ports of the ocean & the two continents, America & Asia. The Sandwich Islands are becoming the centre of much influence & we hope that influence is growing better, as well as wider ... The Congress, Commodore Stockton, is daily expected with a new commissioner, & a new consul. We hope they will do much better than the present incumbents, who are still doing what they can to destroy the Government & foment quarrels between it & the foreign residents. Mr. Brinsmade since his return has joined with them & I trust will soon get to the end of his rope. He has fallen from his former height & will fall still lower if he does not cease his opposition to Government. Other foreigners against their own good unite with Messr. Brown, Ladd, Hooper & Brinsmade, who have no business but to find fault with Govt. . . . My position brings me in close contact with the Govt. of these Is. & if I should continue in this school I may think it to be my duty to take the oath of allegiance, & become a subject of his Majesty. But in this, I shall make haste, slowly, for at present it appears a leap in the dark." etc. Peter Brimsdale had gone to Europe for the purpose of creating a joint stock company to take over the properties & rights of Ladd & Co. of Hawaii. However, a contract with a Belgian company, also signed by Kamehameha III, ended in the ruination of Ladd & Co. and Brimsdale's humiliation; lettersheet with pre-print paper crease visible on face, still Very Fine, very rare forwarder,

Perhaps you had better seal and direct the letters to me then enclose in an envelope directed to Messr. S.N. Williams, San Francisco, then they will receive them with their own and forward them to me."; lettersheet with small internal erosion barely apparent on address panel at bottom left corner, still Very Fine, the only recorded example of this marking—one of the greatest of all Hawaiian forwarder covers, ex Ostheimer E. 5,000-6,000






FIGURE 29. Reverend Damon and family.





S.C. Damon. Three-page folded letter to Philadelphia with ms. "forwarded by S.C. Damon Honolulu." The Reverend Samuel Damon was pastor of Bethel Union Church, Seamen's chapel, and provided various services for sailors who sought his help. The writer, M.M. Martin, had signed on the whaling ship from Hell: "I confess I was not prepared to find myself Leagued with a sett of men, that with few exceptions, were fit subjects for a Prison, and as they had all left Home to escape the Penalty for some Crime committed by them, I found it impossible to convince them that I was not forced to leave on the same account." He then describes being robbed, being in debt to the captain, who "commenced shortening our allowance, until we had not sufficient to eat. This of course produced discontent and at last the whole ships company went aft & complained. After some little conversation with us he would up by say if we did not like it, we could go where we could get better & be d-d.' I took him at his word. . . the man really appeared as if he had gone crazy, as he commenced quarreling with his officers, cussing them and calling them all the worthless scoundrels & c." He notes in a P.S.: "You will direct your letter to the care of C. Brewer & Co. Honolulu Oahu Sandwich Islands. By the Overland Mail," etc.; address leaf with ms. 


FIGURE 30. Detail of Plate 4, Makee, Anthon and Company building, lithograph of Britton and Rey after drawing by Paul Emmert, 1854 (Courtesy Bishop Museum).





FIGURE 31. Detail of Plate 4. Thomas Spencer's building, lithograph of Britton and Rey after drawing by Paul Emmert, 1854 (Courtesy Bishop Museum).

SCARBOROUGH & CO. MAZATLAN", partial Mexican datestamp of October 26 also on back, red "New-York Ship Jan. 13" receiving cds, forwarded to Michigan and re-rated to "45¾." Contents include comments on school, politics, religion ("The churches in general remain much as when I wrote last i.e. exhibiting no unusual interest in religion") and an important description of Kapiolani: "Another chief has fallen. Kapiolani the widow of Naihe, applied to me in March last to examine tumour in her breast which had been growing for some months. It proved to be a cancer. I of course prepared an operation as it did not appear to have advanced so far as to present an unfavorable case. As I could command no medical council here & not willing if it could be avoided to assume the responsibility of operating alone I advised her to go to Honolulu to Doct. Judd. Doct. J. in the presence of a physician resident at H. removed the breast. The wound healed speedily and she was on the point of sailing for another island to attend the national assembly of which she had been just appointed a member when she was attacked with erysipelas of which she died in a few days. She was one of the brightest ornaments of this nation, both as a christian and in point of civilization." etc.; some silking at folds and tiny filled-in area of Pittsford cds, waterstains affect address panel only slightly, otherwise a Fine and rare usage. The route via Mazatlan and Vera Cruz came into heavy use from 1842 to 1848 when it was discovered that it could shorten the transit time by as much as four months, although this letter, not leaving until Aug. 5th, on the Joseph Peabody, took 82 days just to reach Vera Cruz E. 5,000-6,000

We think the Island will derive much advantage from this mania for Gold Digging, by taking from us a certain kind of population of no very reputable character as well as creating a demand for our surplus stock of mdze. The whaling fleet will congregate here from fear of desertion of their crews on the coast, and the impossibility of recruiting there while the excitement lasts." etc. Sent via China, this letter was charged 2 shillings for the Hawaii to Liverpool postage, and 2 shilling for the transatlantic transit, with 4 shillings collected in Boston, Dec. 15, 1848; Very Fine, a very early description of California gold fever-and an accurate one. News of the gold discovered at John Sutter's sawmill on February 24, 1848, spread slowly; it was Mormon Elder Sam Brannan, a shrewd San Francisco businessman, who set off the rush for gold on May 12th, when he was heard shouting in public, "Gold! Gold! Gold from the American River!" after having spent weeks quietly buying up large quantities of any merchandise miners would need. Ex Tows, Ishikawa E. 4.000-5.000



HAWAIIAN STAMPLESS POSTAL MARKINGS

In Chronological Order



- Wailuku P.O./May 31. Manuscript postmark in two lines with matching "Free" on folded letter datelined "Makawao May 30, 1850" from D.D. Baldwin to his missionary father in Lahaina. The Wailuku postmark, probably the earliest example extant, is in the hand of the Reverend Edward Bailey, the town's first postmaster; the "Free" was not necessary since inter- and intra-island mail was postage-free by legislative order until 1859, Very Fine and rare, ex Ostheimer E. 1,500-2,000
- Honolulu, Hawaiian Is./Nov. 16, 1850. Italic-style postmark in two straightlines in Dark Blue, beautiful bold strike on buff cover to Messrs. Both the ship Spartacus and the brig Sarah MacFarland left Honolulu on November 17, 1850, and reached San Francisco on Dec. 13th. The MacFarland was carrying Whitney's second bag of mail under the Treaty of 1849 which provided for the exchange of mails between the U.S. and Hawaii. In these early mailings the ship's fee was apparently not charged. The ms. notation on back, "*P.P. Hafen*" and date, Sept. 16, 1852, most likely refers to Petropavlovsk Hafen (Harbor). 




FIGURE 32. Portrait of the Royal family, ca. 1852. Front row: Queen Kalama, Kamehameha III, Princess Victoria Kamamalu. Back row: Kamehameha IV, Kamehameha V. H. L. Chase reproduced this print from the original daguerreotype (Courtesy Bishop Museum).








FIGURE 33. Honolulu Harbor, ca. 1860, photographed by H. L. Chase (Courtesy Bishop Museum).



A UNITED STATES 30c 1861 ISSUE COVER SENT ON THE INAUGURAL SAILING OF CONTRACT MAIL SERVICE FROM HAWAII

The California, Oregon and Mexico Steamship Co. began their steamship mail contract operation with the U.S. Post Office Department on September 5, 1867, when the *Idaho* sailed from San Francisco. Inauguration day for the service from Honolulu was September 26th, when mail was brought on board the *Idaho* for the return trip to San Francisco. Postmarked the day before, rated "30" (triple the new 10c rate to the U.S.) in red crayon with the 30c stamp placed over it, this cover was among those letters and packages which made this historic first trip; clear "San Francisco Cal. Oct. 8" double-circle and cogwheel duplex, though the clerk chose to cancel the 30c separately, unusually detailed docketing documents sailing dates and confirms its presence on the *Idaho*; some minor wear and toning, neither affecting stamp or markings, Very Fine usage—a fantastic "First Day" cover, superbly documented and surely unique with the 30c 1861....... 





TERMS AND ABBREVIATIONS

Centering

The width of margins and the centering of the design within perforations are graded in strict accordance with the Scott Standard Postage Stamp Catalogue standards. The following grades are used:

Extremely Fine (EF): Exceptionally large margins or near perfect centering, used to describe stamps which are of superior grade for the issue.

Very Fine (VF): Normal size margins for the issue and well-centered with design a bit closer to one side. Please note that this grade is superior to the one on which Scott Catalogue retail prices are based.

Fine (F): Imperforate stamps may have smaller than usual margins and perforated stamps will be noticeably off-center. Issues before 1890 may have the design touched in places. If used, fairly lightly cancelled.

Very Good (VG): Attractive appearance, but margins or perforations may cut into.

Good (G): Average off-centered example with slight faults. This condition is generally acceptable for multiples and rarities.

Gum

Stamps issued before 1900 should not be expected to have original gum unless specifically stated in the description. 20th Century issues may be expected to have original gum unless described otherwise. Terms used to describe the condition of gum are as follows:

Mint: As issued by the post office and never hinged.

Original Gum (O.G.): Stamp retains full original gum showing slight disturbance caused by previous hinge, which may be present or entirely removed. Early 19th century stamps should be expected to show crackling and toning in gum, which occurs naturally over time.

Part Original Gum: Up to half of the gum is missing, but the remaining portion is original.

Disturbed Original Gum: The gum is original to the stamp, but has been noticeably affected by hinge removal and/or humidity, mount glazing, etc.

Hinge Mark: Noticeable area where hinge has been removed and gum has been redistributed. Stamps described with hinge marks may not be returned because of gum disturbance.

Hinge Remnant (H.R.): All or part of hinge remaining affixed to gum.

Covers

Minor nicks, tears and slight reduction from opening are to be expected in 19th century covers. Folded letters normally have tears in the reverse and file folds, which will not be mentioned unless they affect the stamps or markings. Light cleaning of covers is an accepted form of conservation and is not grounds for return of a lot. The terms "Extremely Fine", etc., are meant to convey the overall appearance of cover, not the condition of an individual stamp.

Catalogue Values and Estimates

Unless otherwise noted, all stamps are catalogued according to the *Scott 1995 U.S. Specialized Catalogue*. Catalogue values are indicated by decimal figures in the right column (for example, "175.00"). Stamps in extremely fine quality and items for which catalogue values are not available have been given estimate ranges (for example "E. 750-1,000"). Lots offered subject to a reserve will never be reserved for more than the estimate (usually a fraction of the estimate).

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Hawaiian Philately from 1860 to The 20th Century

THE THIRD AND FINAL PART OF THE HONOLULU ADVERTISER COLLECTION covers the period beginning in 1860, with the essays submitted by John S. Marsh, through the early 20th Century after the Hawaiian post office became part of the United States postal system. The philatelic landscape of this period is wide and diversely populated with essays, proofs, stamps, provisional and official issues, postal stationery, revenues and a variety of postal rates and usages. It is also the period in which stamp collecting, as a hobby, grew in international popularity and greatly influenced the Hawaiian post office and the surrounding circle of philatelists.

The principal issues of the 1860-1900 period are as follows:

- 1861 Kamehameha IV (also known as the Boston Lithograph)—10 different Scott numbers, including Re-Issue (1869), Reproduction (1886), and Reprint (1889)
- 1864-1891 Royal Portraits—22 different Scott numbers covering 11 different denominations from 1c to \$1.00
- 1893 Provisional Government Overprints—Royal Portraits issues with red or black overprints (23 different Scott numbers), printed by the Hawaiian Gazette Company, a predecessor of *The Honolulu Advertiser*
- 1894-1897 Final Postal Issues (also known as the Pictorials)—9 different Scott numbers, representing the first new issues under the new government and the last issues prior to annexation
- 1896 Officials—6 different denominations of the same set, picturing Lorrin A. Thurston, publisher of *The Honolulu Advertiser*, government official and proponent of annexation, and grandfather of Thurston Twigg-Smith
- 1884-1893 Stamped Envelopes—14 different Scott numbers, all of the same design, in different denominations and colors
 - 1882-1889 Postal Cards and Paid Reply Postal Cards—13 different Scott numbers
- 1877-1913 Revenues—16 different Scott numbers, issued for payment of tax on fiscal documents
- Kahului Railroad Stamps—9 different issues (not listed in Scott), evidently used to prepay freight fees to the Kahului Railroad

The postal history of this period from 1860 to 1900 is delightfully complex, with covers displaying an enormous variety of frankings to pay the rates that evolved with changes in Hawaii and the United States. Beginning with the simple inter-island 2c rate, paid by the Kamehameha IV lithograph, the collection attempts to display at least one of every kind of franking or usage. In the Royal Portraits issues alone, this goal is not easily achieved. A careful reading of the chart in Table C (on page viii) will reveal the myriad rate changes and multi-tiered structures of U.S. and Hawaiian postage during this period. The collection comes remarkably close to achieving its objective, featuring such extraordinary examples as a mixed-franking cover to the Channel Islands with the 2c Kamehameha IV bisect (lot 3253), a mixed-issue mixed-franking cover with the U.S. 1869 10c Pictorial (lot 3262), several registered mixed-franking covers and a U.S. 1885 10c Special Delivery mixed-franking cover (lot 3279).

In subsequent postal history sections, the collection shows 19 used Wells, Fargo & Company entires, most of which are actual express usages. There are 28 different country

destinations represented in the Foreign Destinations from Hawaii section (not counting other destinations represented elsewhere in the collection). These are followed by more than 20 fumigated covers mailed during the quarantine periods of the 1895 cholera and 1900 bubonic plague outbreaks. The registered mail covers with colorful Hawaiian frankings have been grouped together into one section. Postal stationery usages have been grouped into another section following the unused envelopes and cards.

If one has decided to collect the stamps of Hawaii, but is bound to a budget that precludes a serious pursuit of the Missionaries, Kamehameha III and Numeral issues, then this part of the Advertiser collection holds the most potential. Among these issues one may hope to acquire a true 19th century rarity (lot 3031) for the price of a U.S. 1930 Graf Zeppelin set; a colorful Hawaii and U.S. 1861 Issue mixed-franking cover (lot 3250) for the price of a fine-very fine U.S. Trans-Mississippi set; rare overprint errors for as little as \$200 and perhaps \$15,000 for the rarest basic Scott-listed stamp (lots 3324 and 3359); and, if back-of-the-book issues are your preference, the officials, postal stationery, revenues and rail-road stamps can be collected to a very high degree of specialization without spending more than a few hundred dollars per item. We encourage collectors who have expressed to us the desire to collect something new to study Part 3 of the Advertiser sale and contemplate new horizons.




FIGURE 35. Leahi, or Diamond Head from Punchbowl, ca. 1897-1901, by Frank Davey (Courtesy Bishop Museum)

1860 Essays and Kamehameha IV Issues



1860 ESSAYS

In November 1860, the Postmaster General, Alvah K. Clark, wrote to John S. Marsh in Boston to order a new supply of 5c Kamehameha III stamps and inquired at the same time about the possibility of obtaining 1c and 2c stamps for inter-island use (to replace the Numerals). Dies in three denominations (1c, 2c and 3c) were engraved and trial proofs struck from the dies, but for some reason the stamps were rejected. Instead, one year later, the lithographed 2c Kamehameha IV stamp was issued. The wide range of colors are represented in the following lots, including a few that are unlisted in Meyer-Harris.

AN OUTSTANDING AND RARE MIXED FRANKING FOR THE TWO TREATY RATES IN EFFECT BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES, HAWAII AND GREAT BRITAIN.

The July 1, 1870, treaty rate required a 6c stamp, which was not issued in Honolulu until February 14, 1871. For nearly eight months this circumstance resulted in frequent use of the 2c Kamehameha IV in strips of three, but when this practice threatened to deplete the supply of 2c stamps, letter writers resorted to the use of 2c halves with the 5c value—the only period when bisects of Hawaiian stamps were regularly permitted (other than as favors). The new 6c stamps had only been available for 16 days when this cover was mailed—the latest recorded use of this very rare franking(Photo) E. 5,000-7,500

When use of this issue was discontinued on August 12, 1898, nearly half the original printing of 10,000 was still on hand, with many of those sold going directly to dealers and collectors (later, stamps were cancelled to order to prevent their unauthorized use). Despite the numerous philatelic mailings of later Hawaiian issues, the Officials appear to have been neglected. This, combined with the small printings and light use of the high values in a very narrow time frame, accounts for the rarity of the 12c and 25c Officials. The existence of the 25c stamp on a full commercial cover is nearly miraculous—a showpiece and one of the underrated rarities of Hawaiian philately................(Photo) E. 2,000-2,500


