Conditions of Sale

The property described in this catalogue will be offered at public auction by Robert A. Siegel Auction Galleries, Inc. ("Galleries") on behalf of various consignors and itself or affiliated companies. By placing a bid on any lot, the bidder acknowledges acceptance of and will be bound to these Conditions of Sale.

1. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. The term "final bid" means the last bid acknowledged by the auctioneer, which is normally the highest bid offered. The purchase price payable by the buyer will be the sum of the final bid and a commission of 10% of the final bid ("buyer's premium"), together with any sales tax or use tax which may be due on the sale.

2. The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid, to advance the bidding at his discretion and, in the event of a dispute between bidders, to determine the successful bidder, to continue the bidding or to reoffer and resell the lot in dispute. The Galleries' record of the final sale shall be conclusive.

3. All bids are per numbered lot in the catalogue unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to group two or more lots, to withdraw any lot or lots from the sale, or to act on behalf of the seller. The Galleries will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for any errors in the execution of such bids.

4. Lot numbers followed by the symbol ° are offered subject to one or more of the following conditions: (i) the lot is subject to a minimum final bid ("reserve"), below which it will not be sold, (ii) the Galleries have advanced monies to the seller and have a financial interest in the lot, (iii) the Galleries have guaranteed the seller a minimum sale price, and (iv) the Galleries may have ownership interest in the lot, either in part or whole. The absence of the symbol ° means that the lot is offered without reserve.

5. Any lot, the description of which is obviously incorrect, is returnable, but only if the lot is returned within 14 days of receipt. All disputed lots must be returned intact with the original packing material. The following lots may not be returned for any reason: Lots containing ten or more items; lots from buyers who have registered for the pre-sale exhibition or received lots by postal viewing, thereby having had the opportunity to inspect them before the sale; any lot described with "faults" or "defects" may not be returned because of any fault or defect. No illustrated lots may be returned because of centering, margins or other factors shown in the illusrations.

6. Successful bidders, unless they have established credit with the Galleries prior to the sale, must make payment in full before the lots will be delivered. Buyers not known to the Galleries must make payment in full within three days from the date of sale. The Galleries retain the right to

demand payment at the time the lot is knocked down to the highest bidder, for any reason whatsoever. In the event that any buyer refuses or fails to make payment in cash for any lot at the time it is knocked down to him, the auctioneer reserves the right to reoffer the lot immediately for sale to the highest bidder.

7. If the purchase price has not been paid within the time limit specified above, nor lots taken up within seven days from the date of sale, the lots will be resold by whatever means deemed appropriate by the Galleries, and any loss incurred from resale will be charged to the defaulting buyer. Any account more than thirty days in arrears will be subject to a late payment charge of 11/2% per month as long as the account remains in arrears. Any expenses incurred in securing payment from delinquent accounts will be charged to the defaulter. 8. All lots are sold as genuine. Any lot which is accompanied by an expert certificate (for U.S. items, the accepted authority is The Philatelic Foundation), dated within the past five years of the sale date, is sold "as is" and in accordance with the description on the certificate. Such lots may not be returned for any reason, including but not limited to a contrary certificate of opinion obtained after the sale. Buyers who wish to obtain a certificate for any item that is not accompanied by a certificate dated within the past five years may do so, provided that the following conditions are met: (1) the purchase price must be paid in full, (2) the item must be submitted to an acceptable expertizing committee with a properly executed application form within 21 days of the sale, (3) a copy of the application form must be given to the Galleries, (4) in the event that an adverse opinion is received, the Galleries retain the right to resubmit the item on the buyer's behalf for reconsideration, without time limit or other restrictions, (5) unless written notification to the contrary is received, items submitted for certification will be considered cleared 90 days from the date of sale, and (6) in the event any item is determined to be "not as described", the buyer will be refunded the purchase price, plus interest accrued on the purchase price at the prevailing Treasury Bill Rate from the date of payment, and the certification fee up to \$100.00 unless otherwise agreed.

9. Until paid for in full, all lots remain the property of the Galleries on behalf of the seller.
10. Agents executing bids on behalf of clients will be held responsible for all purchases made on behalf of clients unless otherwise arranged prior to the sale.

11. The buyer assumes all risk for delivery of purchased lots, and agrees to pay for all out-of-pocket costs incurred in shipping.

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Terms and Abbreviations Used in Descriptions

Centering

The width of margins and the centering of the design within perforations are graded in strict accordance with the Scott Standard Postage Stamp Catalogue standards. The following grades are used:

Extremely Fine (EF): Exceptionally large margins or near perfect centering, used to describe stamps which are of superior grade for the issue.

Very Fine (VF): Normal size margins for the issue and well-centered with design a bit closer to one side.

Fine (F): Imperforate stamps may have smaller than usual margins and perforated stamps will be noticeably off-center. Issues before 1890 may have the design touched in places. If used, fairly lightly cancelled.

Very Good (VG): Attractive appearance, but margins or perforations may cut into.

Good (G): Average off-centered example with slight faults. This condition is generally acceptable for multiples and rarities.

Gum

Stamps issued before 1900 should not be expected to have original gum unless specifically stated in the description. 20th Century issues may be expected to have original gum unless described otherwise. Terms used to describe the condition of gum are as follows:

Mint: As issued by the post office and never hinged.

Original Gum (O.G.): Stamp retains full original gum showing slight disturbance caused by previous hinge, which may be present or entirely removed. Early 19th century stamps should be expected to show crackling and toning in gum, which occurs naturally over time.

Part Original Gum: Up to half of the gum is missing, but the remaining portion is original.

Disturbed Original Gum: The gum is original to the stamp, but has been noticeably affected by hinge removal and/or humidity, mount glazing, etc.

Hinge Mark: Noticeable area where hinge has been removed and gum has been redistributed. Stamps described with hinge marks may not be returned because of gum disturbance.

Hinge Remnant (H.R.): All or part of hinge remaining affixed to gum.

Covers

Minor nicks, tears and slight reduction from opening are to be expected in 19th century covers. Folded letters normally have tears in the reverse and file folds, which will not be mentioned unless they affect the stamps or markings. Light cleaning of covers is an accepted form of conservation and is not grounds for return of a lot. The terms "Extremely Fine", etc., are meant to convey the overall appearance of cover, not the condition of an individual stamp.

Catalogue Values and Estimates

Unless otherwise noted, U.S. stamps are catalogued according to the Scott 1996 U.S. Specialized Catalogue or Volume 1 (previous editions have been used to catalogue certain Special Printings). Scott 1996 or 1997 Volumes 1-5 have been used for British and foreign stamps. The 1996 Stanley Gibbons British Commonwealth Catalogue and other foreign catalogues are cited where appropriate.

Catalogue values are indicated by decimal figures in the right column (for example, "175.00"). Stamps in extremely fine quality and items for which catalogue values are not available have been given estimate ranges (for example "E. 750-1,000"). Lots offered subject to a reserve will never be reserved for more than the estimate (usually a fraction of the estimate).

ALS ("Amelia"), in pencil, one page, 8½ x 11 in., dated May 10, 1921 on her father's law office stationery, to her close friend Lloyd Royer: "Dear Lloyd—I don't know what message Dad wanted Neta to transmit to you about your coming over to inspect his latest acquirement of a sort but in any case Peter Barnes passed on it and there is nothing to be done with the facilities at hand so please do not bother to come. I think Dad imagines all mechanically inclined gentlemen like to play with broken down automobiles. I didn't know Neta had left and I am afraid the neighbor is shocked at my writing to you. Amelia." 


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

Amelia Earhart. ALS ("Am.E.", 1½pp, dated November 22, 1924, to close friend Lloyd Royer: "Dear Lloyd—Our letters crossed again. If the offer for \$1500 cash is real I think we'd better take it. You have the necessary papers. From the face that the trucking season is due for its stark time soon and from what I gather of conditions in building in Calif. I should imagine this is a good time to sell. The last letter was mailed before I put the [?] in so you may not get it promptly. I am writing in much haste. Adios A.M.E." Accompanied by original envelope addressed entirely in her hand and franked with 8c Green, 1923 Air Post (C4) strip of three. In an effort to raise money to buy a plane built by Bert Kinner, she went into the photography business with another young woman, Jean Brandreth. When this proved unprofitable, she bought an old Moreland truck and hauled gravel for a construction company. 

Campbell's children had contested his will on the grounds that their father was mentally incompetent. 
COLONIAL AND REVOLUTIONARY WAR

[Stamp Act]. ALS. 2pp, datelined "St. James Dec. 15, 1765," from William Seymour 89 Conway, Aide de camp to King George III to Cadwallader Colden, Royal Lt. Governor of New York, expressing the unhappiness of His Majesty at the recent failures of Colden to uphold the Stamp Act: "His Majesty was extremely sensitive of the delicacy & difficulty of your situation & very willing to make every possible allowance & to suppose it owing more to necessity than want of firmness in you that the unjustifiable demands of the people met with so much compliance. The unanimous advice of the council & the concurrent opinion of the commander in chief of His Majesty's forces are a stronger justification of your surrendering the stamps to the majistrates than any assessment that suggests itself at this distance, but there is one circumstance in your conduct which neither His Majesty nor his servants can at all approve which is that you should upon any protestation have been induced to a declaration & promise of taking no step till Sir Henry Moore should arrive. It is not comprehended upon what principle you could take upon you thus to suspend the power of government till the arrival of the Governor—the power & authority of government was certainly fully & completely in your hands. . . You had no right to do & considering too that in the council of the 31st Oct. you had solemnly engaged to do your utmost for the observation of the act. It will require very strong reasons indeed to justify your engaging yourself within a few days after to do nothing toward the execution of that same act when a change of circumstances might make it practicable." etc. On Oct. 7, the Stamp Act Congress, made up of 28 delegates from nine colonies, met in New York. On Nov. 1, demonstrators had torched Colden's coach along with images of the governor and Satan, in addition to threatening to hang him from the nearest sign post. The next day the Lt. Governor had turned over the stamps to the New York common council; Very Fine, an important Revolutionary War related document E. 500-600

Lincoln's Army in besieging Savannah—the Garrison have by the last Accts. made a vigorous defense and seem determin'd to defend the place to the last extremety. His Britannick Majesties Ship the Experiment Sir James Wallace of 50 Guns after being dismasted in a gale of Wind, with the Ariel of 20 Guns Several Transports Store Ships & a number of other prizes have been taken by the Fleet of our Great & good Ally to the great joy of every true friend to America." 
MILITARY, WESTERN AND INDIAN RELATED

- [The Battle of San Jacinto]. Hand-carried Aug. 14. 1836 folded letter from Monticello, Miss., from a J.E. Calhoun to his wife, with word from New Orleans: "St. Anna being taken is a fact as the report was confirmed by 3 or 4 arrivals. . . the engagement was a fortunate one for the Texans. . . 500 Mex fell & the Bal was taken prisoner while the loss on the Tex. side was about 7 killed & 20 wounded among the wounded was Houston slight I assume as he continued to command during the Battle which was very short about 10 minutes in which there was only 2 wounds Houston had two horses killed under him during the battle it was 2 or 3 days after the Battle before St. Anna was taken & then he was dressed in a common soldier's dress he has offered a treaty and to pay the expenses of the war which if ratified by the Mexican Government will close the War." - [Battle of New Orleans]. 2pp letter, 7¾ x 12½ in., from John Reid, aide to Andrew Jackson, to Maj. Abram Maury in Franklin, Tenn., he writes (in part): "Yesterday the enemy made a dead set at us. Having, in the preceding nights, erected batteries greatly advanced towards ours, they opened them upon us, as soon as the fog cleared off in the morning, in a superior style of terror. Bombs, congreves, balls, shot & grape knocked every thing over our heads & tore up everything beneath our feet. Yet, our men, unaccustomed as they were to any such exhibitions, manifested no symptoms of alarm. On the contrary, believing that the mighty parade was the prelude to an assault upon our works, they looked forward to it with the utmost anxiety, & I even say, eagerness. It is stange how soon men may become transformed!!" etc. He also mentions Jackson: "The house in which the general lodges had, yesterday, 15 or 20 balls (18 & 24 pounders) through it. I am afraid the next attempt will knock down our slender mud wall," etc.; with outer address sheet postmarked New Orleans, the latter has ballpoint pen note added by a cretinous collector, not affecting letter which is Fine, very desirable military content, accompanied by a 2,700+ word tribute to Reid from a 1816 newspaper E. 300-400
- [The Creek War]. Folded letter to Andrew Jackson from Genl. Jno. Coffee, date-lined "Tallushatche town 3rd Nov. 1813": "Owing to a large creek to pass my march was impeded, until about one hour after sun rise, this morning. We reached the town on our approach the enemy was beating their drums, they met my advance with great violence when a sharp conflict ensued, which terminated in the destruction of the enemy, how many in number I am not yet able to say. I have lost several men killed and a number wounded, shall proceed in an hour to the ten Islands," etc. He adds in a P.S.: "Since writing am told 135 killed have been found no doubt near 200 are killed." Outer sheet with docketing in the hand of Andrew Jackson: "Mjr John Head/franklin/action by/John Bradley/Deposit"; age stains, top panel missing (not affecting text or docketing), desirable content. - [Indians]. 1836 document from Columbus Miss., being a "correct Abstract of Lands claimed by Choctaw Indians under the 14th Article of Choctaw treaty of 1836" etc. and signed by Wm. Dowsing. The long list consists of names carefully written out phonetically (""Ah she te tah," "Ish to mo ho ya," etc.), minor separations at folds, otherwise unusually fresh for this, Very Fine, interesting piece....... - [Indians]. Folded letter headed "Fort Butler N.C. July 18th, 1838" and postmarked "Athens Te. Jul. 20" and written to a Maj. Abe Miller in Rockford Ill., from his brother, who writes (in part): "The Cherokees are to remain until Fall, and there (I believe) to be emigrated by John Ross their principal Chief. The Army will not have any thing to do with the emigration. Miller's comment that the Army would have nothing to do with the emigration is false; the lighthearted image of "gentleman soldiers" offering an arm to "the ladies" was almost certainly a euphemism for some form of ungentle persuasion E. 300-400
- [Florida Indian Wars], Folded letter datelined "St. Augustine Sep. 20th 1836:" 114 ⋈ from soldier who writes (in part): "You ask a great many questions about the Indians &c. &c.—I have little to say with regard to the Indians except that it is highly probable that in a few months from this time the yellow rascals will be brought to terms. The Governor of the Territory who directs everything connected with the war is making great exertions to bring it to a speedy close. 800 friendly Creek Indians and 1200 Tennessee volunteers are to join the troops now in Florida. Operations will commence about the middle of November. . .You wish to know how far I am. from the scene of War. I answer directly in the midst of it-persons have been killed by the Indians. . . a man residing on the north side of Black Creek was murdered by a party of 7 or 8 Indians. The Indians shot his wife through the neck and arm scalped her or in fact skinned her head and then as she lay on the ground seemingly dead, the Indians took a bundle of raw cotton which was near at hand covered the woman over with it. and then set fire to it., her clothes took fire but the woman lay perfectly still-dead as the Indians supposed—in this situation they left her—as soon as the Indians were out of sight she soon went to a stream bathed her head and found her way finally to Jacksonville about 20 miles off. I believe the woman is still living." etc., Outersheet with partial Georgetown Wash. postmark; few sealed tears, Fine, outstanding letter E. 300-400
- Milton Latham. Free frank as U.S. Senator from California, on cover to Capt. George Wallace, Salt Lake City, U.T. Wallace was formerly secretary to California's Governor Downey. The military presence in Utah is partly explained by periodic Indian problems, but the Lincoln administration also had serious doubts about the loyalty of Mormons to the Union. Latham himself was pro-Southern, but when it became clear that California was overwhelmingly loyal to the Union, he quickly amended his opinions; slightly reduced at R., still fresh and Very Fine, ex Grunin E. 200-250
- [Miner's Letter]. I page letter from miner Wyatt Harris at Long Bar, Oct. 2, 1858. He writes (in part): "I haven't been living at one particular place until now...working in a Blacksmith Shop, besides mining in a bank claim on the Yuba River. I have spent most of this summer rambling about in search of the new 'Eldorado of the north' I left California in June and got back in September from Fraser River. I was glad to get back to California, British America as far as I got acquinted with it, is a hard old Country Nothing but dense forrests and bleak rocks to be seen, and as for the gold on Fraser River is concerned I think it is a skace a trickle," etc., Fine................................... - Overland Mail, Via Los Angeles. Illustrated railroad propaganda envelope, handcarried to San Francisco, accompanied by two covers from Burlington Vt. with 10c Green, Ty. V (35), ms. endorsements, "Overland Los Angeles" and "Overland via St. Louis", small faults, Fine, scarce(Photo) E. 150-200
- 119° William H. Russell. DS ("Wm. H. Russell"), 2pp, 9 x 14 in., dated June 1860, this being an indemnifying bond, from Jackson County, Mo., all in ms., stating that three men are offering \$4,000 in securities to cover a \$2,000 sight draft issued by a Major Crossman at Camp Floyd, Utah Territory, that was lost in the U.S. mail. The document pledges that the financial obligation will be honored; signed on the second page by S.H. Woodson, Wm. H. Russell and Jacob Hall and witnessed by two others, clean and Fine, rare. A successful merchant and banker before forming several freighting partnerships, Russell-the "Napoleon of the West"-formed the Central Overland & Pikes Peak Express Co. in 1859. Only two months before this document was signed, he inaugurated the rapid mail service between California and the country east of the Rocky Mountains known as "The Pony Express." At a time when government mail service was slow, Russell offered a unique service: letters carried by a series of riders on horseback across the Central Route-1,966 miles in as few as eight days. Our 1994 Rarity Sale included a Russell free frank with a Running Pony marking which realized \$65,000, and while the marking obviously was a major factor in this price, Russell's signature is surprisingly difficult to obtain, particularly on a piece dated during the high watermark of his career..... 



- 124 [Slavery]. Remarkable pair of letters from a A.B.M. Thompson, a short-lived slave trader, one from Pittsburgh Pa., dated Nov. 2, 1860, other from St. Louis, Dec. 31st, both to his cousin in Cadiz, O .: ". . . I will kidnap some negros and take them south and sell them ask him if he would not like to go in with me tell him he can meet me at Wheeling with some of the Cadiz Black rascals, tell him I say it would be doing them a gods service to sell them," etc. On the back is an amusing P.S. regarding Presidential candidate John Bell. The other letter reads (in part): "You can say to John Thompson that I lost money on them infernal Black rascals I took them down south and was asked where they were from I told them they were from Ohio and the moment I would say from Ohio they said they would not give me a good dinner for the whole lot the southerns say Ohio negroes are not good for anything but stealing and advised me to take them back to Ohio but I concluded after trying repeatedly to sell them south to take them to Chicago and sell them to the abolitionists after taking them there they wanted to know where they were from I told them from near Wheeling Va. they said they could not do anything with wheeling Va. negroes but they were from Harrison county Ohio they would give me a trade for them as they (the Abolitionists) wanted a few Harrison County negroes to help steal from Missouri Kentucky and Virginia Knowing that this (Chicago) was my last chance I was completed to sell them to the narrow hearted Abolitionists who was so mean as to offer me one hundred dollars in Abolitionists speeches, which I was compelled to take losing their passage and other expenses I now propose sending the speeches to John Thompson for sale as that is my only chance to get my money back." - [Slavery]. 4pp letter dated Jan. 24, 1858, providing an account of slave masters on trial for a whipping a slave: "Tomorrow Ezra has a trial to attend. He's principal witness against a man for inhumanely whipping a slave. Some ladies came to his school room and begged him to interfere for they were whipping the poor woman to death. He climbed upon the fence of his yard and saw the whipping and went with the ladies with a complaint. The grand jury being in session got him indicted. After seeing the whipping with two officers who demanded to see the woman. I will not describe her appearance but the officer to her mistress that no person had right to use a dumb beast in that way. Her owner is a rich man, lives in a splendid house, has put off the trial three times. It will cost him some money if not his liberty for a while." etc., with original envelope—3c Dull Red (26) tied by "Saint Louis Mo. Jan. 27, 1858" cds, latter with small faults, Fine.................. E. 150-200

Paine of Wis., Lewis Tappan, Charles Francis Adams and others. Smith insisted that the convention should organize a political party "which should look after the political interests of all the people, white and black, male and female." etc., Very Fine E. 250-350



All in Stuart's hand (32 signed "J.E.B.", one in full, one unsigned), with a wonderful preface, "This Album" datelined "Camp Stuart Texas Feby. 17th 1855" and which reads (in full): "This album is the sacred repository of a few contributions original and selected by some of my college companions while a student at Emory & Henry College Virginia, as pledges of their esteem when the owner left its halls to enter the Military Academy at West Point N.Y. in 1850. Since that time it has not been used exclusively as an album but as sketch book, and a place for jotting down some of the offspring of his own pen suggested by different circumstances and occasions, and also the receptacle of a few selections, suiting his fancy. As such it is a book private in its character and personal in its object. Stuart's poems are typical of a college-educated young man—effusive, melancholy, and filled with the usual archaic diction, but his occasional use of military imagery and the numerous references to the women in his life make these something more than of just passing interest to today's readers. Titles include "A Prayer," "To -" (An acrostic which spells out the name of Mary Custis Lee), "The Mesmeriser" ("Respectfully dedicated to Miss Minnie B. of West Point"), "Lines in Answer to a Valentine supposed to be written by Miss Agnes L.", "The Advent of Furlough," "Lines Written on Leaving the States for Texas," "To Miss Mary Joyner Kerr of N. Carolina," "The Dream of Youth (To his Sister Victoria)," "To Miss Emily of West Point," "Lines sent to a Lady with a box of prunes," "Lines Respectfully dedicated to Miss XXXX"—A Tale of Romance"), "To Mary," "Lines For a Lady's Album in St. Louis," "To Bettie" [see next lot], "Lines Respectfully inscribed to the Misses Crockett of Bowling Green Virginia," "To the One I Love," etc. There is also an 8page poem, "West Point," dedicated to Mary Custis Lee, some prose and an interesting note, written in minute script over a brownish stain: "My Blood Mar. 8, 1855." In addition there are more than twenty pages of entries by friends and relatives, including a dedication in verse by Jno. S. Cocke ("This volume is a consecrated thing"), a watercolor by future Union General Alexander Webb, "To Jim on leaving College," "To my friend J.E.B. 
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

I met Stuart about 12 o'clock today with his horse in a foam, having just escaped from the enemy losing his hat, haversack, & Chaswell Dabney was with him & shared the same fate coming off without bridle, saddle, or sword. They took to the woods so that as William went down the road he had, I fear, no one to warn him of the position of the enemy and may have fallen into their hands. . . As I write I can see Genl. Lee talking to Genl. Jackson which is a sight many people would like to see—I never saw Genl. Lee before. He is a very handsome man & has as fine a face as I have ever seen." etc. Other parts of the letter deal with Blackford's concerns over security ("I fear the Generals taking too many into their confidence") after being turned back at Culpepper C.H. by Union forces ("their foiling a scheme which I felt sure would succeed."), Very Fine, a rare account of J.E.B. Writing on U.S. Senate stationery to a newspaper editor, he replies to General Sherman's statement regarding a letter written by Jefferson Davis to a southern senator, threatening the cocercion of any state that would attempt to leave the Confederacy. Vance writes (in part): "Every letter ever written to me, on a political topic by President Davis is to be found faithfully copied in the official letter-books of the Executive Dept. of North Carolina. Those letter-books were taken from me by Genl. Sherman's troops at the closing of the war and are now in possession of the War Department in this City. Aside from these letter books Genl. Sherman never saw any letter addressed to me by President Davis. Although I have not seen those books and read their contents in almost twenty years, I am quite sure that no such letter can be found them. I could not have forgotten such a letter had it been received by me. The suggestion therefore, that I am the person referred to in Genl. Shermans statement is entirely untrue. . . alleging that I was in bitter hostility, whilst Governor of North Carolina, to be administration of Mr. Davis, is based also upon a misrepresentation of the facts. It is well known by those acquainted with the history of those times, that my differences with Mr. Davis were purely in regard to matters of detail, and that I supported him in his efforts to maintain the confederacy with all the zeal that I could command and all the power of the State which I could bring to bear." Vance quotes from a letter Davis wrote him: "I feel grateful to you for the cordial manner in which you have sustained every proposition connected with the public defense." He encloses a printed copy of this letter, and concludes: "I do not wish to pose as a martyr to the circumstances of those times or as one ready to turn upon his associates after defeat. I desire to eke my full share of responsibility for everything I did and said during those unhappy times. Great as were the abilities, and high as were the courage and faithfulness of Mr. Davis, I have no disposition to load him with all the misfortunes of defeat." 






CIVIL WAR DIARIES

248 [Confederate Diary]. 78pp, 3³/₄ x 5³/₄, by an anonymous Missourian who was a Paymaster and at one time on the staff of Genl. Bowen. Written in minute but readable hand, it begins with him on the run from Feds in Missouri after a battle at Mt. Zion in Dec. 1861: "Our men & boys were hunted down like wolves throughout northern Missouri during its entire winter & succeeding spring. I also, of course, had to share a like fate. From wood to wood, prairie to prairie, county to county, they hunted me." At one point he is captured and then bribes the Federal officer with a \$10 bill to let him go. He writes: "Left Audrian Co. in co. with Lieu. Joseph Carr for the south to join the army & fight our way back to our homes." The writer, while not fighting on the front lines, was deeply committed to the Confederacy. Well-educated, he gives a good sense of the day by day activities of the administrative arm of the military in Arkansas and Mississippi, though near the end of the diary (May 1863), a certain bitterness is evident: "It is said Pres. Davis will be reviewing us to morrow. If he comes to dismiss 3/4 of our army officers & choose new ones, even if compelled to do so blind folded, to thrust an equal proportion of qr. masters, commissaries, contractors & surgeons who are sucking the very life blood from the heart of the government, then he may do some good." First page of diary appears to be missing, otherwise intact, original calfskin covers, Fine, desirable and rare E. 1,000-1,500

- 949 [Diaries]. Two volumes, 50pp and 28pp respectively, written by Sgt. Augustus S. Thompson of Co. B, 112th Reg. Ill. Vols., dates Aug. 17, 1863-Oct. 1, 1863, May 12, 1864-Jan. 23, 1865 and Feb. 7, 1865-June 20, 1865. Short but lively entries throughout, Sgt. Thompson describes battle outside Cleveland, Tenn. by overwhelming rebel forces, Battle of Resaca, Ga., Atlanta campaign including recording death of Genl. McPherson, rumor of capture & death of Genl. Hardee, battle of Atlanta, destruction of railroads, fall campaign in Tenn., fearful of Forrest, fighting at Columbia, battle of Franklin, Nashville, campaign in North Carolina, ironclads shelling Ft. Anderson, surrender of Lee, troops celebrating, assassination of Lincoln, surrender of Johnson, review of troops in Washington by Sherman, Grant, Meade, capture of Jeff Davis, etc. Virtually every entry has something of interest: Thompson, avoiding the usual descriptions of weather and making coffee, gives the impression of nearly non-stop fighting. Diaries with original leather covers, has become separated in volume one but is otherwise intact, written in pen and pencil, in a very readable hand-includes several pages of post-war business entries (not included in page count), Fine and desirable..... - [Diary]. 3¾ x 5½ in., 14pp, written in pencil by unidentified Union soldier in North Carolina, Dec. 1862—Feb. 1863, describes attacking rebel line—130 prisoners and re-capturing two guns "the rebs captured from us at Bull run"; two marching soldiers felled by one shot, rebel sharpshooter hitting water dipper being shared by two "23d boys"; boarding steamer; New England style snow storm; sending home \$27 by Adams Express, etc. The last entry is "fish for dinner"—as there were blank pages available to the writer, he may have been killed by a sharpshooter that evening or the next day; wear and soiling but with original cardboard covers.......

Nothing to excite the modern reader, but French wrote in a good neat hand, and as the weather descriptions and street names and visits to friends begin to accumulate, one is entertained. Smiths carpet, made pretty faces to some F.F.V. females, and found the moral status of Richmond society about that of New Orleans when we entered that city. Reports to day from there confirm my experience elsewhere, that woman becomes fearfully demoralized by war, and that good sescesh women, F.F.V.s in society, are the first to attend to all the little wants of Yankee officers. I need not tell you what you can better read in the papers about the city. Its glory and shame have passed with history, and it has become the mecca of America, judging from the crowds flocking there—wish you would visit me and we will take a 'cuss-ory' view of this relic of Jeff-dom. . . Hold on a minute-there's a row-10 o'clock P.M. We were just startled by heavy firing down the river and thought the 'gorilliers' might be trying to raid it a little in the rear, but our dispatch boat brings the glorious news that Lee and his army have surrendered and everybody is giving vent to his joy through gunpowder. Surely the game is about up and you need not expect any more hard fighting. If you could only see the earthworks and fortifications about Richmond and Petersburg, you would agree with everybody that Grant has out-generaled Lee. Perhaps they will now send our vessel to Washington yard as she cannot go to sea. 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
