75 Years and Counting



Your kind favor of the 29th ultimo came to hand whilst I was confined to my bed with a severe case of fever, was laid by, and never brought to my view until yesterday, which is the only apology for my not acknowledging it sooner-I was seriously attack'd from which I am slowly recovering-have not been out of the House for three weeks.

I am happy to find you put a just construction upon my views as to the merchants deal-When a class of men or politicians are [sic] spoken of, it is always the majority, & the minority are [sic] the exception-for instance where Banks violate their charters by over issues, it can only be the majority of directors that are [sic] censurable who rule the board, not the minority whose voice are [sic] against it. But good will grow out of the evils that have swept over our country-Banks will be brought to conduct their bus[i]ness within proper Banking principles-the government being separated from all Banks will be a godsend to the Banks, as well as the people. The great evil to both are [sic], any connection with either, and the most experienced, and talented directors of our Banks, here, are in favor of the perpetual divorce of all Banks and the Government-This will give stability to the Banks and the influx of specie by the revenue which is daily receiving & daily disbursing will I give a sufficient metalic [sic] correction for the wants of labour, and the stability and security of the Banks, whilst they are left free to supply the wants of commerce founded upon the just principles of credit, whilst it will prevent over issues to wild speculators-the bane of all countries.

I wrote your House on the receipt of your letter by express mail, notifying you that by the first rise of water our cotton would be shipped to your House[.] I began to apprehend that the offer of eleven cents were from a source not very friendly to your House, and was intended to monopolies [sic, monopolize] all the cotton in this neighbourhood-they have been disappointed, and as I am now advised, all the crops in this neighbourhood, will go to your House, & risque [sic,risk] the markett [sic] at Neworleans.

Our cotton goes to Nashville to day, and will be shipped to your House on bo[a]rd the Allen Kerksman-Eighty Bales marked A.J. averaging by our patent Ballance [sic] a little better than 500lbs each-Twenty three Bales marked L.Y. and No.r from one to twenty; three, by our neighbours-(last years crop) but said by A. Jackson jun. to be a good lott [sic], two Bales not as good as the balance [sic]-These you will please direct, in the amount of bales to be separated from those A.J. altho the amount of bales are [sic] to be remmitted [sic] to A. Jackson Senr. and junier [sic].


The memorandum for supplies inclosed in the letter addressed to Messrs M. White & Co, you will please direct to be filled & sent so soon as our letter reaches you-as to the sales, when [sell?] you are left to your judgt. having full confidence that you will do for the best and we will be content.

The Tennessee mon[e]y is in bad repute-Therefore when the cotton is sold we will expect to receive Louisiana money, or that of Eastern funds, either the Metropolis Bank of Washington City, or Banks in good credit in Baltimore, Philadelphia, or New-York-If an exchange for one thousand dollars of Tennessee notes can be affected [sic, effected] on the sale of the cotton at the proper discount, we can use that sum here in payment of debts[.]


I cannot close this letter without my thanks for all your kindness to me, and particularly for your continued

friendship and good good [sic] wishes,—
The present you propose will be accepted, with the kindest recollection of the donor; and with the hope that we will have the pleasure of seeing you, the ensuing summer, at the Hermitage where you will receive a hearty welcome, not only by me, but all my Hous[e]hold.

With my kind salutations to you & yours believe me[.]

Andrew Jackson. 2pp autograph letter signed as President, datelined "Washington D.C. December 12, 1836" and addressed to Dr. James Weatherspoon, contents reads (in part): "I am sure that the postmaster is not to blame in this matter. If you look into the Globe you will find he acts with energy, by imposing heavy fines on all delinquent contractors, for every failure by them in delivering the mails agreeable to their specific contracts. The post office Department, by the energy of its talented head, & the system adopted by him, is now in a prosperous condition and he is now about extending its facilities to every part of the Union, when its improved financial means will authorize, and the wants of the public require. . . There has been a severe inroad upon my health lately, by a Hemmorhage from my lungs. The Doctor says he took upwards of 60 oz. blood from me. . .", pristine condition

VERY FINE. A REMARKABLE AUTOGRAPH LETTER SIGNED BY ANDREW JACKSON, DEFENDING THE POSTMASTER AND COMMENTING ON THE STATE OF EXPANSION OF THE POST OFFICE.

The Postmaster General under Jackson at this time was Amos Kendall. He remained Postmaster General into Van Buren's presidency as well. He improved accounting procedures, and extended the railroad mail service...... E. 6,000-8,000

VERY FINE. A RARE OPPORTUNITY TO ACQUIRE TWO SIGNATURES OF WILLIAM HENRY HARRISON — ONE AS A FREE FRANK AND ONE ON A MILITARY LETTER IN HIS HAND.

Only two free franks are recorded during Harrison's term as President, as he died approximately one month after taking office. Harrison's military endorsement is a desirable form of his "free frank". E. 5,000-7,500


At this time Lincoln had been President for a little over five months. The addressee, David Davis, who later became Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court (1862-77), presided over the eighth judicial circuit in Illinois, where Lincoln practiced law. Judge Davis was a close friend and political ally of Lincoln. He successfully managed Lincoln's campaign to secure the Republican nomination for president in the 1860 campaign. E. 15,000-20,000

10° Mary Todd Lincoln. Widow of assassinated President Abraham Lincoln, free frank "Mary Lincoln" on mourning cover addressed in her hand to David Davis at the U.S. Supreme Court in Washington D.C., bold strike of "Chicago Ill. Jan. 16" circular datestamp with day slug inverted

FRESH AND VERY FINE. A RARE MOURNING COVER FREE FRANKED BY MARY TODD LINCOLN, WIDOW OF THE MARTYRED PRESIDENT.

In May 1865, Mary Todd Lincoln and her sons, Robert and Tad, left Washington D.C. for Chicago, where they resided until leaving for Europe in 1868. During this difficult time, Mary attempted without success to sell her clothing through merchants in New York City. The addressee, David Davis, was appointed by President Abraham Lincoln as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States (1862-77). The style of Chicago postmark points to a date of mailing in 1866 or 1867...... E. 5,000-7,500




Lincoln was inaugurated on March 4, 1861. The clear docketing indicates that this was sent in January of that year. The recipient, Simon Cameron, was a contender for the position of President at the Republican convention that nominated Lincoln. He was appointed by Lincoln as Secretary of War, but his aggressive measures conflicted with Lincoln's policies. Cameron resigned the position and was immediately appointed Minister to Russia, where his influence helped to secure that nation's friendship during the Civil War...... E. 4,000-5,000







- 1776, Congressional Post. Folded cover addressed to Richard Henry Lee in Philadelphia, with sender's four-line instructions "To be forwarded from Fredericksbg. Post Office by the Northward Post", ms. "3.8" rate, archival notation that letter was dated Apr. 1776, silked on both sides, otherwise Fine, scarce war-period usage to this Founder and Signer of the Declaration of Independence, if the April 1776 date is correct, this letter was mailed during the first session of the Second Continental Congress.... 

Pendleton" to Lee at York Pa., both covers silked, still Fine, these are extremely rare manuscript markings from Fredericksburg to Lee while attending the Second Continental Congress session at York (Sep. 30, 1777- June 27, 1778), the Nov. 1777 "Free" cover is from Edmund Pendleton, a prominent Virginian who in 1752 was elected to the House of Burgesses and then elected a representative to each of five successive Virginia conventions (he was elected president of the last two), he attended the Continental Congress' of 1774 and 1775 while serving as President of Virginia Committee of Safety. In March of 1777 Pendleton fell from his horse and dislocated his hip. This crippled him for the rest of his life though he continued to serve with the aid of crutches. He had been elected Speaker of the first House of Delegates the preceding year and though unable to attend the first 1777 session, the speakership was held for him until he recovered enough to return the following September.............(Photo Ex) E. 1,500-2,000





The St. Louis "Bears" were issued by Postmaster John M. Wimer from November 1845 until the first United States General Issue became available in July 1847. The stamps were issued in three denominations—5c, 10c and 20c—and were sold at a premium over face value to pay the costs of printing. All of the stamps were printed from a single copper plate of six subjects (2 x 3) engraved by J. M. Kershaw. The plate underwent two significant modifications. Philatelists identify each state of the plate as Plates 1, 2 and 3, but in fact the same piece of metal was used in each state.

On Plate 1 there were three 5c subjects in the vertical column at left (we refer to the positions on the sheet, which are mirrored on the plate) and three 10c subjects at right. To fill the need for 20c stamps, the denominations on two of the 5c subjects (Positions 1 and 3) were burnished out and reengraved with "20", creating Plate 2. After some time the two 5c values were restored by burnishing out the "20" and reengraving "5", which is Plate 3. The three 10c subjects were untouched throughout the modifications to Positions 1 and 3. The 5c Position 5 was slightly altered on Plate 3 by adding a large dot to the inside of the ball at the bottom of the "5".

The pending availability of adhesive "Post-Office Stamps", as they were called, was first announced in St. Louis in the St. Louis Republican on November 5, 1845, advising readers that stamps "will be sold." In the November 13 edition of the same paper, it was announced that Postmaster John M. Wimer would "furnish nine ten-cent stamps and eighteen five-cent stamps for one dollar, the difference being required to pay for the printing of the stamps." The earliest documented use of a St. Louis provisional stamp is November 13, 1845, only three days prior to the date of this cover. It is possible that November 13 was the first day the "Bears" stamps were put on sale, presuming that the announcement was placed in the newspaper to coincide with the stamps' availability. In any event, it is almost certain that the cover offered here is a "first week" use of the "Bears".

Five large groups of St. Louis "Bears" have been discovered during the past 132 years. In 1869 J. W. Scott acquired a correspondence bearing 50 of the 5c, 100 of the 10c and three 20c stamps, probably all of which have been removed from their original covers. In 1880 the Riggs correspondence produced 20 examples of the 5c and 10c. In 1889 the J. & J. Stuart correspondence provided 25 examples of the 5c and 10c, most on Pelure paper. The huge "Louisville" find in 1895, salvaged by a janitor who was burning papers, yielded 75 of the 5c, 46 of the 10c and 16 of the 20c, including se-tenant multiples that revealed the plate layout and proved the authenticity of the 20c stamps, which had been in question since 1869. All of the stamps in the Louisville, but many of the stamps were later removed. Additional material from the Tyler & Rutherford correspondence surfaced around 1902 and was acquired by C. H. Mekeel. In 1912 the first portion of the Charnley & Whelen correspondence reached philatelists, which provided another six of the 5c, 61 of the 10c and 16 of the 20c. Additional Charnley & Whelen covers were sold over the next three decades.

The two largest St. Louis "Bears" correspondences were addressed to Tyler & Rutherford in Louisville, a distance under 300 miles, and to Charnley & Whelen in Philadelphia, a distance over 300 miles. The postage rates in effect during that period were 5c for any distance under 300 miles and 10c for 300 miles and over. Our comprehensive census information on the St. Louis "Bears" contains three covers paying the 50c rate. This is the only one paying the rate solely by 10c stamps, and the only one with the 10c on Greenish, 11X2. The covers paying the 50c rate are: 1) 2 x 11X3 used with 11X5 on May 21, 1846, folded letter to Charnley & Whelen, Philadelphia, ex Boker and Weill sale; 2) 11X5 used with 2 x 11X6 on May 28, 1846, folded letter to same correspondence; and 3) the cover offered here. A fourth cover, bearing a vertical strip of three and a vertical pair of the 10c on Gray Lilac, 11X5, was in the original Charnley & Whelen correspondence, but it has since had the stamps removed and is no longer intact. In fact, the survival of this cover bearing five Very Fine to Extremely Fine lightly-cancelled St. Louis 10c "Bears" is miraculous, considering how many stamps were removed from covers in the major finds.







From Chagres on the Atlantic side it was probably carried by the U.S. Mail Steamship Company's *Georgia*, departing January 28 (there was also a January 27th sailing of the *Empire City*).

The so-called Retaliatory Period resulted from Great Britain's effort to maintain its monopoly on transatlantic mail carriage through the subsidized Cunard steamship line, which operated without competition from 1840 through 1846. In response to the emergence of subsidized American packets in 1847, the British issued an order (effective June 9, 1847) authorizing its receiving offices to collect the usual British packet postage on letters delivered by American mail steamers. The order effectively treated prepaid American packet letters arriving in England as if they had been sent unpaid, and the British collected sea postage from the addressee when no service had been rendered.

The United States vehemently protested the British order through diplomatic channels, but efforts to persuade the government to rescind the anti-American postal tariff were unsuccessful. In December 1847, U.S. Postmaster General Cave Johnson petitioned Congress for power to levy like charges on mail carried by British steamers to or from the United States, but he was not authorized to do so until June 1848. On all Cunard sailings from June 24, 1848 (the *Caledonia* from Liverpool) through December 31, 1848 (the *Europa* arriving at New York), American packet postage was charged whether or not one of the American vessels was used. Beginning with the departure of the *Europa* from New York on January 10, 1849, earlier rates were restored, and soon after the new U.S.-British treaty rate was effected.

This cover to Belgium reflects the dispute between Great Britain and the United States, because it had to be carried to Liverpool for further transit to Ostend and Gand, Belgium. The well-informed sender designated the sailing of the Cunarder *Niagara* from Boston and prepaid 10c domestic postage plus the 24c British packet rate (1c overpayment). The letter originated in Charleston and was put on the Spofford & Teleston Line's *Northerner*, a contract mail steamer bound for New York. On arrival in New York it entered the foreign-mail office as a fully-prepaid letter. On arrival at Liverpool, the American prepayment was ignored, and "1/8" (one shilling, eight pence) for British packet service was debited to Belgium. This amount, re-stated as 20 decimes Belgian currency plus 4 decimes internal postage, was collected from the addressee (approximately 48c).

This remarkable cover, bearing both first issues of the United States — including a strip of the 10c — was discussed in detail in Ashbrook's *Special Service* (Photograph No. 60) and is signed by him on back. It has at various times been described as one of the most important and valuable covers in classic American philately.

The published census compiled by Jerome S. Wagshal contains 90 unduplicated records of Scott 5. There are probably no more than ten examples existing outside of the Wagshal census population. Therefore, the 1c 1851 Type I is the rarest of all United States stamps issued regularly prior to the 1868 Grills.

Only 22 covers bearing Scott No. 5 are recorded in the Wagshal census. Of these, some may have been soaked off of their covers to satisfy collector demand for singles.

According to Ashbrook and Neinken, Plate 3 is believed to have been made in March or April 1856, possibly to replace the defective Plate 2 and/or to meet the increased demand for stamps concurrent with the April 1855 change in postal regulations requiring prepayment of postage. For an unknown reason — possibly a severe defect that arose in the plate — very few stamps were printed from the new Plate 3 before it was retired, and surviving examples are rare.

Plate 3 comprised Type II stamps exclusively. Early impressions are found with a distinctive mottling or ink film caused by ink remaining on the plate after it had been wiped. The absence of mottling on this stamp indicates it is a later impression.

With respect to Plate 3 stamps such as this, which can be plated with certainty, Neinken wrote (p. 220): "The fact is that in this day and age, if a stamp has been plated as a Plate 3 position, and this plating is substantiated by a knowledgeable student or a Philatelic Foundation certificate, the Plate 3 stamp realizes far more in auction sales, or when purchased from a dealer, even though it has no definite Plate 3 characteristics. There is only one certain way to identify a stamp as being printed from Plate 3, and that is to definitely plate the position."

Plate 3 stamps have always been highly respected and enthusiastically collected, especially examples that show one or more of the distinctive features (surface cracks, mottling or Prussian Blue color). However, searching thru past sales of major 1c 1851 collections — Chase, Emerson, Fleckenstein, Newbury, Ishikawa and Cipolla — it is obvious that very few Plate 3 stamps rival the condition of this stamp.

Type III is defined by breaks in the outer lines at both top and bottom. Many Type III stamps have breaks that were created or enlarged by plate wear. Since the wear occurred over a period of time, a majority of stamps of this type (both unused and used) have small breaks in at least one line. The most notable exception is Position 99R2. According to the Neinken book, "The 99R2 stamp is a fresh entry, that was short transferred both at top and bottom, over an original entry that had been erased. . . The reason that 99R2 is the finest example of Type III is because of its very short transfer at top and at bottom, giving us the wide breaks in these lines." (p. 184).







So-called swing positions began as Type IIIa with the outer line at bottom complete, but as the plate was used, the bottom line wore and a portion disappeared, thus becoming Type III. Therefore, this block, a late impression including two swing positions — 81-82L4 — is correctly identified as a Type III-III/Ia-Ia combination.

As evidence of its rarity, the Neinken plating shows only one other set of positions that can yield this block — Positions 84-85/94-95R4. Neinken also illustrates what he describes as the only known complete pane of Plate 4, and it is a right pane (p. 268). Neinken's comment about a comparable block being in our 1969 Rarities sale is not quite correct, because that block was imperforate.

The contract with Toppan, Carpenter & Co. for printing the postage stamps of the 1857 Issue expired on June 10, 1861. A new contract was made with the National Bank Note Co. The designs were changed and the old issue was demonetized, as large stocks of some denominations remained on hand in the seceded post offices of the South.

An elaborate plan was devised for phasing out the old and issuing the new stamps, which were not ready until mid-August 1861. To begin, supplies were issued to major post offices. Then, the post office would advertise to exchange the old for the new. Finally, after a short exchange period, the old stamps would no longer be recognized as valid postage.

Philadelphia was one of the first to receive the new stamps, and so the 1857 Issue was demonetized by that post office earlier than at many others. The "Old Stamps Not Recognized" marking was applied, and postage was marked as due. Covers are known bearing this handstamp dated as early as August 26. The other known 3c/Blood's combination is a restored front used on August 27. The sender of this cover may not have realized that the old issue was no longer valid for use in Philadelphia, as it was still being used at other post offices.



Our search of old auction catalogues and the records of the Philatelic Foundation yielded only ten unused examples of Scott 28A. Of these, only three have been described as having any gum whatsoever. Brown Collection by Harmer, Rooke & Co. in 1941 where described as "full original gum"; it was offered in the 1968 Rarities sale and again as part of the A. T. Seymour Collection (Siegel Sale 373, Apr. 23, 1970, lot 35) where described as "large part original gum"; 2) the "Ambassador" copy (Siegel Sale 300, Apr. 27, 1966, lot 45A), described as part original gum, also ex Argentum (Siegel Sale 807, Feb. 23, 1999, lot 76) where described as "unused (traces of gum)"; and 3) the Caspary/Lilly copy, described in both catalogues as full original gum but with light horizontal crease.



The most comprehensive census of Scott 65e has been compiled by Jim Zollweg. This rare variety is known with the image on back inverted, as well as rightside up, leading to the conclusion that more than one sheet was released to the public. Used copies have been found in both configurations. Mr. Zollweg records three unused and eleven used copies of Scott 65e. All three unused examples originate from the strip of three offered in the Lilly sale. The third stamp, originally to the right (as viewed from the back), continues the downwards shift of the impression on back, and is not as complete as the two offered here.

The only other multiple of a printed on both sides variety is the unused plate block of six of Scott 94d. A used pair of Scott 158k was offered in our 1967 Rarities sale, but it is believed to have been broken.

It is not widely known that the late Marc Haas, who amassed one of the largest and most valuable U.S. cover collections of all time, also collected classic U.S. stamps in superb used condition. It is our theory that two grilling machines were used simultaneously, and that one of the machines was converted from the D to E Grill in early 1868, only a day or so after sheets of 2c stamps were first run through the D-equipped machine. The earliest documented usages of the 2c D Grill (2/15/68) and 3c E Grill (2/12/68) are very close, and the great rarity of 2c D Grills, relative to all other regular-production grills, bears out this theory.

The 2c D Grill is notorious for poor centering. In terms of surviving stamps, only three or four are sound, lightly cancelled and grade Extremely Fine. The stamp offered here rivals the Zoellner and Morris stamps from previous Siegel sales, and it has the added attraction of a colored cancel, which is rarely seen on a 2c D Grill.





In Brookman Volume III, pages 128-129, a complete account of the origin of the 1895 Imperforates is quoted from a column by George B. Sloane. We provide excerpts:

"At the time they appeared, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing had, but a short time previously, taken over the stamp printing contract from the American Bank Note Co. and were unfamiliar with and inexperienced in quantity production of postage stamps. Gilbert E. Jones, one of the owners of the New York Times, had rendered the Bureau invaluable technical advice and assistance in the organization of their facilities, and the Bureau desired to reward him in some way for his services. Mr. Jones was well-known collector, interested only in stamps in imperforate pairs, and when the subject was broached he suggested that, while he desired no recompense, if the Bureau could give him an imperforate pair or block of each of the stamps then in current use, for his collection, he would feel more than amply repaid."

Sloane then explains that the Bureau was restricted from presenting him with stamps from stock, but did allow him to buy regular perforated stamps on sale at the post office and exchange them for imperforates. Although the Scott Catalogue at first did not recognize the imperforates as regularly-issued stamps, from 1916 they inserted a statement "All denominations of this issue exists imperforate but they were not regularly issued in that condition".


In recent years, the Scott U.S. Specialized Catalogue moved the 1895 Imperforates to the Proof section. We feel strongly that these stamps belong with their regular-issue counterparts. Our reasoning is that the Bureau itself was responsible for releasing the stamps. The Scott Catalogue should not classify these stamps any differently than they classify other stamps released through official channels, but not regularly issued at a post office. For example, the 4c Pan-American Invert, which was never sold at the post office, but *traded* by the government for stamps they needed for the National Stamp Collection. As another example, the rare 4c and 8c Bluish Paper stamps were "released" at the post office in an illegal conspiracy between Joseph A. Steinmetz and Arthur M. Travers, an official with the Post Office Department, both of whom were indicted and convicted for their crimes. We see no difference in the historical circumstances behind the release of the 1895 Imperforates and the other examples cited.

The Orangeburg coil stamps' use on third-class mail, and the fact that philatelists were generally unaware of their production accounts for their rarity.



This remarkable stamp is the subject of an article in *Opinions III*, published by the Philatelic Foundation. In the article, author George Brett postulates that the image on back, from plate no. 8995, was either a makeready or a rejected print. The paper was then reused as an economy measure, probably also as a makeready when plate 9009 was used a few days later. This was a common practice. However, due to poor quality controls the sheet made it past the examiners and was issued. The author notes that the dates of printing can be narrowed down due to the presence of the plate numbers. Plate 8995 was used between Aug. 28 and Sep. 3, 1918. Plate 9009 was used between Aug. 30 and Sep. 3, 1918. September 1 was a Sunday and September 2 was a Labor Day holiday, so the number of days on which it could have been printed is quite small.



The 1c Green, Scott 594, is waste from a horizontal rotary printing used to make coils. At the beginning or end of a coil-stamp print run from the 170-subject rotary plates, some leading or trailing paper was produced that was too short for rolling into 500-stamp rolls. In 1919 the Bureau devised a plan to salvage this waste by perforating and cutting the sheets into panes. They were put through the 11-gauge flat-plate perforator in use at the time, giving the sheets full perforations on all sides. In 1923 coil waste from the new 1c and 2c rotary production was turned into stamps later classified as Scott 578-579 and 594-595. These were the last of the coil-waste issues. The existence of Scott 594 was not reported until four months after the final sheets were delivered, and the 1c Rotary Perf 11 was soon recognized as one of the rarest United States stamps.

There are today fewer than 100 confirmed examples of Scott 594. The first major find of this stamp was made in 1934 by Ernest E. Fairbanks, who retrieved nine pairs (18 stamps, one or two damaged) on nine separate covers that were returned by the post office years earlier from a bulk mailing. All were postmarked at New York City on October 4, 1924. The nine Fairbanks covers were cut down into pieces, and today there are perhaps five or six of these pieces intact. According to a survey of the Levi records and The Philatelic Foundation patient records, there are four Scott 594 usages. Two are postcards, each bearing a single stamp, cancelled at New York City on March 25 and October 16(?), 1924. A pair on cover (an envelope) is cancelled at New York City on October 13, 1924. The second cover (offered here) is a circular-rate unsealed envelope cancelled at New York City in 1924, but the machine postmark is dateless, as normal for third-class mail.

The stamp on this cover ranks among the four best-centered copies of Scott 594 that exist in any condition. It is the finest of the four recorded usages and the only single franking on an envelope. The perfs cut into the top of the pair on the other known envelope.

The 2c Yorktown was issued on October 19, 1931, to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the surrender of General Cornwallis to General Washington at Yorktown. Because previous Revolutionary War stamps had honored our allies from Germany and Poland, it was suggested that the French should be honored with the new issue. Rochambeau and DeGrasse were selected in recognition of their contribution to Washington's victory at Yorktown.

There were two distinct printings of this issue, using different plate layouts. The first employed 100-subject plates for both the frame and vignette. However, due to problems with paper shrinkage the vignettes were difficult to align to the frame, resulting in excessive waste. The second printing was made from a 100-subject plate for the frame, but a 50-subject plate was used for printing the vignette. This allowed for greater control, thereby significantly reducing waste.

The imperforate-vertically error occurred during production from the second plate configuration. We know this because different plate numbers were used for the first and second layouts. We also know that only one pane of 50, rather than a sheet of 100, was produced with vertical rows of perforations missing, because the perforations were applied after the sheets of 100 with the frame impression were divided into panes of 50 for the second press run. Therefore, we can be reasonably certain that this top plate number multiple is unique.

This plate block and the following two lots are difficult to value in the Scott Catalogue. The error is priced as a horizontal pair, but obviously the pane of five stamps per row divides into two pairs and one single per row. Furthermore, the Scott Catalogue lists but does not price the plate number block of six. Therefore, a significant Scott premium should be assigned to this multiple. We have quoted Scott Retail for four Mint N.H. pairs (leaving two singles unaccounted for) and without any premium for the plate block.......



According to *The Prexies* by Roland Rustad, in a report in the *American Philatelist* President Franklin Roosevelt was presented with two 30c sheets, one in this Deep Blue shade and the other in Ultramarine. He chose the Ultramarine for the issued stamp, and the Blue sheet was taken back to the Bureau of Engraving and Printing for destruction. A block of four was saved for President Roosevelt, a known stamp collector. Since then, other examples in the Deep Blue shade have surfaced. The sheet was printed from a subject of 400 divided into four panes of 100, and it is likely that this remarkable pane comes from the original sheet.

According to Jenny by George Amick (Amos Press, 1986), the original pane of 100 inverted "Jenny" stamps was purchased by William T. Robey on May 14, 1918, one day after the stamp was placed on sale. Robey bought the sheet for its \$24 face value at the New York Avenue Post Office window in Washington, D.C. Soon after, the sheet was sold to Col. Edward H. R. Green through Eugene Klein, a Philadelphia stamp dealer. Green paid \$20,000 for the sheet, then instructed Klein to divide it into singles and blocks, and to sell all but a few key position blocks.

It is well-known among stamp specialists and professionals that examples of this stamp come in different grades of freshness and condition. Many of the original 100 stamps were mistreated by collectors during the years, despite the stamps' rarity and value. Colonel Green himself allowed moisture to affect some of the stamps he retained. Other examples have become slightly toned from improper storage and climatic conditions. Hinge removal has caused thins and creases in numerous stamps, and at least seven have been "lost" to philately—or nearly so as in the case of the copy swept up in a vacuum cleaner. This example is remarkable for its pristine state of preservation and for its centering, which only a few stamps in the original sheet can approach (almost all of the others have disturbed gum or faults).

This stamp was originally part of a block of four owned by stamp dealer Eugene Klein. It was inherited by Klein's daughter who sold it to Robert A. Siegel. Mr. Siegel sold it to Raymond H. Weill, who placed it with two different anonymous collectors before being asked to break it into singles. This single was sold by Mr. Weill to a Mr. Hoover in 1975, who sold it at auction in 1985 to West Coast collector Bruce McNall. Mr. McNall partly paid for it with an exchange for Position 3. It was last offered in our sale of the Zoellner collection, selling for \$192,500 (with the buyer's premium) to a private collector. The stamp is now offered to the market for the first time with a P.S.E. graded certificate, confirming in numeric terms what we have always subjectively stated, that no finer example of the celebrated Inverted "Jenny" can be obtained.



The Buffalo Balloon stamp, designed by John F. B. Lillard and engraved by John H. Snively, was printed by Wheeler Brothers Printers in Nashville, Tennessee. Only 300 were printed in tête-bêche arrangement from a single die. The stamps were intended for use on a balloon flight from Nashville to Gallatin, Tennessee, which took place on June 18, 1877. Of the 300 that were printed, only 23 were used.

Based on previous examples we have handled, at least some of the Buffalo Balloon stamps were exposed to moisture around the time they were printed. This accounts for the fact that only two of the eleven tête-bêche pairs certified by the Philatelic Foundation are sound. The others are mostly thinned in one corner where they were stuck together. It is likely that the example offered here suffered the same fate, and has original gum which is slightly disturbed.

Little is known about these special printings. An article in a 1938 edition of *The Philatelic Gazette* reproduces a letter from the War Department's Bureau of Insular Affairs regarding an inquiry into these special printings. The letter notes that "In May 1907, the bureau had printed one hundred sets of each denomination of stamps formerly used in the Philippines — that is United States stamps surcharged across their face with the word 'Philippines'. These stamps were printed at the suggestion of the United States Post Office Department for the purpose of supplying requests, which were then frequent, for specimen Philippine stamps. Of the one hundred sets printed, seventy-five were delivered to the Post Office Department for distribution, and I am unable to say whether that department now has any of them". According to the article, the 75 sets received by the Post Office department were turned over, intact, to the National Postal Museum.



The first Pence Issues of Canada were printed by the New York firm of Rawdon, Wright, Hatch & Edson, the same firm that printed the New York Postmaster's Provisional and United States 5c and 10c 1847 Issue. The Pence issues, and particularly the 12-pence, show the same fine quality of engraving that distinguishes the U.S. 1847 Issue. The stamps were printed early in 1851 (12p issued June 14), at the same time that RWH&E's contract for providing United States stamps was coming to an end. The 12-pence plate proved difficult for RWH&E. Faulty impressions were laid out twice before the third and final entries, resulting in many positions showing re-entries.

The 1851 12-pence stamp was issued for prepayment of the basic letter rate to Newfoundland, Bermuda and the West Indies, but its value — stated in pence rather than "one shilling" to avoid confusion — also corresponded to the double 6p rate to the United States and certain other countries. However, its use was very limited and, according to Boggs, only 1,450 were sold. The balance of the 51,000 printed was destroyed. 80,000.00







This private-issue stamp appeared six months before the "Post Office" Mauritius and is the earliest stamp used in any British Colony. The stamp was issued in April 1847 to prepay the private conveyance of mails on the *Lady Mcleod* between Port of Spain and San Fernando. Details regarding the printing of this stamp have never been found, but it has been surmised that they were likely printed at the offices of the local newspaper, as were several other early British Colonial stamps and the Hawaiian Missionaries. The full story of this stamp is told on pp. 196-199 of *Stamps of Fame* by L.N. & M. Williams.
