The following means are available for placing bids:

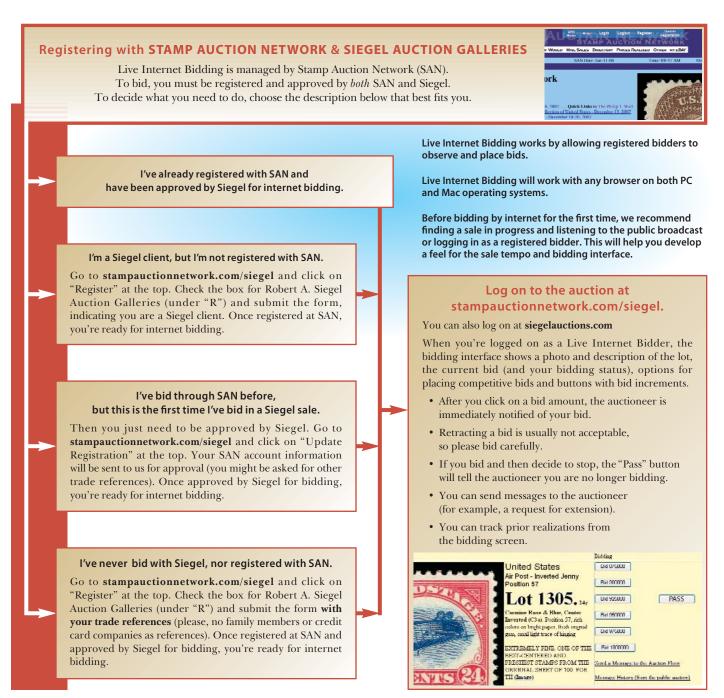

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Conditions of Sale (please read carefully before bidding)

The property described in this catalogue will be offered at public auction by Robert A. Siegel Auction Galleries, Inc. ("Galleries") on behalf of various consignors and itself or affiliated companies. By bidding on any lot, whether directly or by or through an agent, in person, or by telephone, facsimile or any other means, the bidder acknowledges and agrees to all of the following Conditions of Sale.

- 1. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. The term "final bid" means the last bid acknowledged by the auctioneer, which is normally the highest bid offered. The purchase price payable by the buyer will be the sum of the final bid and a commission of 15% of the final bid ("buyer's premium"), together with any sales tax, use tax or customs duties due on the sale.
- 2. The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid, to advance the bidding at his discretion and, in the event of a dispute between bidders, to determine the successful bidder, to continue the bidding or to reoffer and resell the lot in dispute. The Galleries' record of the final sale shall be conclusive.
- 3. All bids are per numbered lot in the catalogue unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to group two or more lots, to withdraw any lot or lots from the sale, or to act on behalf of the seller. The Galleries will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for the failure to execute such bids or for any errors in the execution of such bids.
- 4. Lots with numbers followed by the symbol ° are offered subject to a confidential minimum bid ("reserve"), below which the lot will not be sold. The absence of the symbol ° means that the lot is offered without a reserve. If there is no reserve, the auctioneer has sole discretion to establish a minimum opening bid and may refuse an offer of less than half of the published estimate. Any lot that does not reach its reserve or opening bid requested by the auctioneer will be announced as "passed" and excluded from the prices realized lists after the sale. The Galleries may have a direct or indirect ownership interest in any or all lots in the sale resulting from an advance of monies or goods-in-trade or a guarantee of minimum net proceeds made by the Galleries to the seller.
- 5. Subject to the exclusions listed in 5(A), the Galleries will accept the return of lots which have been misidentified or which have obvious faults that were present when the lot was in the Galleries' custody, but not so noted in the lot description. All disputed lots must be received by the Galleries intact with the original packing material within 5 days of delivery to the buyer but no later than 30 days from the sale date. (5A) EXCLUSIONS: The following lots may not be returned for any reason: lots containing 10 or more items; lots from buyers who registered for the pre-sale exhibition or received lots by postal viewing, thereby having had the opportunity to inspect them before the sale; any lot described with "faults," "defects" or a specific fault may not be returned because of any secondary fault. Photographed lots may not be returned because of centering, margins, short/nibbed perforations or other factors shown in the illustrations. Lots may not be returned for any of the following reasons: the color of the item does not match the color reproduction in the sale catalogue or website listing; the description contains inaccurate information about the quantity known or reported; or a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description.
- 6. Successful bidders, unless they have established credit with the Galleries prior to the sale, must make payment in full before the lots will be delivered. Buyers not known to the Galleries must make payment in full within 3 days from the date of sale. The Galleries retains the right to demand a cash deposit from anyone prior to bidder registration and/or to demand payment at the time the lot is knocked down to the highest bidder, for any reason whatsoever. In the event that any buyer refuses or fails to make payment in cash

for any lot at the time it is knocked down to him, the auctioneer reserves the right to reoffer the lot immediately for sale to the highest bidder. **Credit cards are not accepted as payment.**

- 7. If the purchase price has not been paid within the time limit specified above, nor lots taken up within 7 days from the date of sale, the lots will be resold by whatever means deemed appropriate by the Galleries, and any loss incurred from resale will be charged to the defaulting buyer. Any account more than 30 days in arrears will be subject to a late payment charge of 1½% per month as long as the account remains in arrears. Any expenses incurred in securing payment from delinquent accounts will be charged to the defaulter. A fee of \$250.00 per check will be charged for each check returned for insufficient funds.
- 8. All lots are sold as genuine. Any lot accompanied by a certificate issued by The Philatelic Foundation within 5 years of the sale date or by Professional Stamp Experts since January 2004 is sold "as is" and in accordance with the description on the certificate. Such lots may not be returned for any reason, including but not **limited to a contrary certificate of opinion.** Buyers who wish to obtain a certificate for any item that does not have a P.F. or P.S.E. certificate (dated as above) may do so, provided that the following conditions are met: (1) the purchase price must be paid in full, (2) the item must be submitted to an acceptable expertizing committee with a properly executed application form within 21 days of the sale, (3) a copy of the application form must be given to the Galleries, (4) in the event that an adverse opinion is received, the Galleries retain the right to resubmit the item on the buyer's behalf for reconsideration, without time limit or other restrictions, (5) unless written notification to the contrary is received, items submitted for certification will be considered cleared 90 days from the date of sale, and (6) in the event any item is determined to be "not as described", the buyer will be refunded the purchase price and the certification fee up to \$600.00 unless otherwise agreed.
- 9. Until paid for in full, all lots remain the property of the Galleries on behalf of the seller.
- 10. Agents executing bids on behalf of clients will be held responsible for all purchases made on behalf of clients unless otherwise arranged prior to the sale.
- 11. The buyer assumes all risk for delivery of purchased lots and agrees to pay for prescribed shipping costs. Buyers outside the U.S. are responsible for all customs duties.
- 12. The bidder consents that any action or proceeding against it may be commenced and maintained in any court within the State of New York or in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, that the courts of the State of New York and United States District Court for the Southern District of New York shall have jurisdiction with respect to the subject matter hereof and the person of the bidder. Grades, Abbreviations and Values Used in Descriptions

Grades and Centering

Our descriptions contain detailed information and observations about each item's condition. We have also assigned grades to stamps and covers, which reflect our subjective assessment. For stamps, the margin width, centering and gum are described and graded according to generally-accepted standards (an approximate correlation to numeric grades is provided at right). Although we believe our grades are accurate, they are not always exactly aligned with third-party grading terms or standards for all issues. A lot may not be returned because a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description. Information from the P.S.E. Stamp Market Quarterly and P.S.E. Population Report^{5M} is the most current available, but lots may not be returned due to errors or changes in statistics or data.

Extremely Fine Gem (90-100): The term "Gem" describes condition that is the finest possible for the issue. This term is equivalent to "Superb" used by grading services.

Extremely Fine (80-90): Exceptionally large/wide margins or near perfect centering.

Very Fine (70-85): Normal-size margins for the issue and well-centered with the design a bit closer to one side. "Very Fine and choice" applies to stamps that have desirable traits such as rich color, sharp impression, freshness or clarity of cancel.

Fine (60-70): Smaller than usual margins or noticeably off center. Pre-1890 issues may have the design touched in places.

Very Good (below 60): Attractive appearance, but margins or perforations cut into the design.

Covers

Minor nicks, short edge tears, flap tears and slight reduction at one side are normal conditions for 19th century envelopes. Folded letters should be expected to have at least one file fold. Light cleaning of covers and small mends along the edges are accepted forms of conservation. Unusual covers may have a common stamp with a slight crease or tiny tear. These flaws exist in virtually all 19th century covers and are not always described. They are not grounds for return.

Catalogue Values and Estimates

Unless otherwise noted, the currently available *Scott Catalogue* values are quoted in dollars with a decimal point. Other catalogues are often used for foreign countries or specialized areas and are referred to by their common name: *Stanley Gibbons* (SG), *Dietz, American Air Mail Catalogue* (AAMC), *Michel, Zumstein, Facit*, etc. Estimates are indicated with an "E." and reflect our conservative valuation in dollars. Reserves will never exceed the low end of the estimate range; they will sometimes exceed Scott Catalogue value for stamps in Extremely Fine condition.

Because of certain pricing inconsistencies in the *Scott Catalogue*—for example, blocks that have no gum, the absence of premiums for Mint N.H. items, etc.—we cannot guarantee the accuracy of values quoted for multiples, specialized items and collection lots. We generally try to be conservative, but buyers may not return a lot because of a discrepancy in catalogue value due to Scott pricing inconsistencies.

EXTREMELY FINE. AN EXCEEDINGLY RARE UNITED STATES AND DANISH WEST INDIES MIXED-FRANKING COVER FROM THE DOMINICAN REPUBLIC, WITH BOTH STAMPS APPLIED AT ORIGIN TO PAY THE COMBINED POSTAGE FROM ST. THOMAS TO NEW YORK. WITHOUT QUESTION ONE OF THE FINEST MIXED-FRANKING COVERS OF THE BANK NOTE ISSUE PERIOD.

The combination of a United States 10c stamp (paying the blanket steamship rate) and Danish West Indies 3c stamp (paying internal D.W.I. postage) is amply represented by covers in the 1865 to 1868 Issue period. U.S.-D.W.I. mixed frankings with the 1869 Issue are almost non-existent; the only fully confirmed example realized \$115,000 hammer in our sale of the Coulter collection (Sale 911, lot 187). U.S.-D.W.I. mixed frankings are also found in the Bank Note Issue period, with most of the recorded examples showing a combination of the D.W.I. 1866 3c Carmine Issue. Only a few mixed-franking covers are known with the D.W.I. 1874 3c Numeral Issue. The reduction of the U.S. blanket ship rate from 10c to 5c was effected on July 1, 1875, concurrent with the inception of the General Postal Union 5c rate among member countries. The cover offered here was stamped at Puerto Plata on August 6, 1875. Technically, it only required 5c U.S. postage, but the sender was probably unaware of the rate change in the United States and affixed the customary 3c and 10c combination.

VERY FINE APPEARANCE. AN EXTREMELY RARE MIXED-FRANKING COVER FROM CUBA TO BUENOS AIRES VIA ST. THOMAS AND RIO DE JANEIRO. ALTHOUGH THIS COVER NEVER TOUCHED UNITED STATES SOIL, IT REQUIRED 10-CENT POSTAGE FOR TRANSPORT ON A UNITED STATES AND BRAZIL MAIL STEAMSHIP COMPANY VESSEL FROM ST. THOMAS TO RIO DE JANEIRO. A FASCINATING USE OF THE BANK NOTE ISSUE.

A few covers sent by Sama, Sotolongo & Co. in Havana to correspondents in Buenos Aires show the unusual routing via St. Thomas and Rio de Janeiro. The company evidently arranged for its letters to be carried on a Spanish packet outside the mails from Havana to St. Thomas, which explains the absence of Cuban postmarks. This letter entered the mails through the St. Thomas post office. Danish West Indies postage was paid in cash, and the U.S. and Great Britain stamps were left uncancelled. The only way for mail to reach Rio de Janeiro from St. Thomas was on a regular U.S. & Brazil Mail Steamship Co. sailing, which required 10c U.S. postage (in this case, paid by the stamp affixed in Havana). This was carried from St. Thomas on the Merrimack, arriving at Rio around November 9, 1871. On arrival at Rio, the letter was handed over to the British Post Office, which applied the "C83" cancel and sent it by a Pacific Steam Navigation Co. vessel to Buenos Aires. A similar cover is pictured and explained in the Danish West Indies book, pages 91 and 146.

This cover was sent from Peru to the United States by British Mail via Panama, then by American Packet. The composite postage was 10c to Peru (internal), 6p to Great Britain (from Callao to Panama) and 5c to the U.S. (reduced blanket ship rate, effective July 1, 1875). In the absence of stamps, the 6p British postage was debited with the equivalent "12" cents due marking. However, since the U.S. had to settle accounts with Great Britain in specie, but collected postage due in currency, a 2c premium was charged for currency depreciation. The 14c due was added to the 5c ship rate, for a total of 19c due, against which the 10c stamp was credited, leaving a balance of 9c due.

The sender of this cover, Charles S. Rand, served in Peru as a director of the Public Works and Development Company formed in March 1874. Rand was the author of *The Railroads of Peru*, published in 1873 and still in print today (an original edition accompanies the cover offered in this lot). The cover is addressed in Rand's hand to Lucius L. Hubbard, a prominent geologist, mineralogist and bibliophile living in Boston at the time.

This cover was sent from Peru to the United States by British Mail via Panama, then by American Packet. The composite postage for a quadruple-rate letter would be 40 centavos to Peru (4 x 10c internal rate), 24 pence to Great Britain (4 x 6p rate from Callao to Panama) and 20 cents to the U.S. (4 x 5c reduced blanket ship rate, effective July 1, 1875). In the absence of stamps, the 24p British postage was debited with the equivalent "48" cents due marking. Since the U.S. had to settle accounts with Great Britain in specie, but collected postage due in currency, a premium was normally charged for currency depreciation (2c more than the 12c to G.B.). If the usual depreciated currency premium had been applied to this cover, the G.B.-U.S. postage would have been 4 x 14c = 56c (G.B.) plus 4 x 5c = 20c (U.S.), for a total of 76c, minus the 45c prepayment, leaving a balance of 31c due. However, the "73 [-] 45/28" calculation on the back and the "Due 28" on the front show that the postal clerk calculated postage in a different way. He must have added 48c (as stated) and 25c (5 x 5c ship rate) for a total of 73c, without a premium for currency depreciation. The clerk then subtracted the 45c prepayment in U.S. stamps and arrived at 28c due.

Mixed frankings with a Peru 10c stamp and U.S. 10c or 5c stamp are rare enough, but the use of 15c and 30c high value Bank Note stamps from Peru, in combination with a multiple of the Peru 10c Llama Issue, is almost certainly uniquely represented by this cover. Specialists in British Post Offices Abroad will also recognize and appreciate the great rarity of the "48" due marking, reported to be the only known example of this quadruple-rate handstamp, which was applied in transit at Panama.

Although U.S.-G.B. mixed-franking covers from Peru are seen from the Bank Note Issue period, very few covers exist with all three postage components prepaid in stamps. The circle of wedges cancel is one of the last of the non-standard types to be used by the New York foreign-mail office (the steel duplex devices came into use in 1877).

The composite postage was 6p to Great Britain (from Valparaiso to Panama), 5c to the U.S. (reduced blanket ship rate, effective July 1, 1875), and 5c from the U.S. to England (standard GPU/UPU rate).

The 6c U.S.-Hawaii treaty rate (Jul. 1, 1870, to Dec. 31, 1881) required the sender in Hawaii to affix only a Hawaiian stamp on a letter addressed to a place within the United States. The addressee, Clara Moseley, was the daughter of Hiram Bingham Moseley, a descendent of Rev. Hiram Bingham, one of the Pioneer Company of Missionaries. The sender's decision to affix U.S. and Hawaiian 6c stamps could have been a misinterpretation of the rate requirements, although this seems unlikely eight years into the Convention period. It is also possible that the letter was over the half-ounce weight limit, and the U.S. stamp was added to pay the additional rate.







A similar cover from the Laarman correspondence was illustrated and described in an article by George E. Hargest ("New Light on the Operation of the Dockside Offices", *Chronicle*, May 1971, pp. 103-105). Hargest states: "In May 1874 the only published rate to the Netherlands was a 10 cent rate by direct closed mail via England. Letters by this route bear no British markings. Although existing U.S.-British conventions provided a 10 cent rate by British mail, regulations did not authorize its use. The markings on this cover, however, indicate that the dockside office sent it in a supplementary British mail, i.e., by an unauthorized route, at an unannounced 'phantom' rate." Each of the four recorded British Mail "Phantom Rate" covers to Holland has two 10c stamps, one of which paid for Supplementary Mail service. All four covers have a "6" credit marking crossed out and re-rated "5", which we cannot explain, since the correct credit to England was 6c. The covers are dated Aug. 13, 1873, May 16, Aug. 29 and Sep. 12, 1874...... E. 2,000-3,000

This cover was sent by the Boston firm of Baker & Morrill to Captain Erastus B. Chase during the journey of the *Radiant* from 1868 to 1871. A copy of Captain Chase's account book, including this trip, can be found at http://www.liveauctioneers.com/item/8040812. Additional papers are located in the G. W. The 24c 1870 Grilled Issue (Scott 142) was available concurrently with the ungrilled 24c issue (Scott 153). The 12c and 24c stamps with the H Grill almost always have weak or part grill impressions. The 24c has long been recognized as the rarest of the 1870 Grilled Issue (without distinguishing between the H and I Grills), and only one other 24c stamp on cover has previously been identified with a grill. It is used with the 3c 1870 on a large domestic courthouse cover with stains around the stamps that was last offered in the Bruce G. Daniels Nov. 5-6, 1953, sale of the James E. Hughes collection (lot 599, signed on back by Dr. Carroll Chase). The cover offered here comes from a correspondence that came to light more recently, and the 24c shows several clearly-defined points from the bottom right corner of the grill, just behind the neck of Winfield Scott's bust. The wide imperforate inter-pane margin at right indicates this stamp came from one of the right vertical column positions in the left pane (sheets were divided into panes). If the sheets were divided into panes of 100 before grilling, then this stamp from the right outer edge of the pane would be more likely to pick up grill points from the right outer edge of the grill.

The 34c British Mail rate to Singapore included 4c retained by the United States for postage to England and 30c credited to Great Britain for postage to Singapore within the British mail system. Based on the Boston Sep. 13 and London Sep. 27 postmark dates, this cover was carried on the North German Lloyd's *Hansa*, departing New York on Sep. 14, and arriving at Southampton on Sep. 27, 1871.

The 15c stamp pays the 7c Closed Mail rate to Germany via England and the 8c registry fee. This rate was reduced to 6c in October 1871, and the earliest documented use of the 15c Grill is in June 1870 (although the stamp became available in April 1870). The New York May 22 and German Jun. 6 postmark dates point to three possible sailings in May 1870 or 1871. Very few covers are known with the 15c 1870 Grilled Issue, this being one of the most colorful and unusual.

The 13c Direct Mail rate to Denmark via Bremen or Hamburg was based on the 10c Direct Mail rate to Germany, to which the fractional "2½" cents credit to the North German Union was added for postage to Denmark (re-stated as 1 sgr in Germany). When the Direct Mail rate to Germany was reduced from 10c to 7c, effective July 1, 1870, the corresponding rate to Denmark was reduced by an equal amount (from 13c to 10c).

It is difficult to year-date this cover, because the only marking with a year stated (Bremen boxed transit) is blurry, and the sailing data is inconclusive. In 1870 the North German Lloyd *Rhein* sailed from New York on June 25, arriving at Southampton on July 5, leaving two days to reach Bremen on July 7 (the Bremen receiving postmark date). However, in 1871 the NGL *Hermann* departed New York on June 24, arriving at Southampton on July 4. Therefore, this cover might have been correctly prepaid at 13c on June 24, 1870, or it might be overpaid 3c in 1871 (at which point the 10c rate prevailed).

The address is quite peculiar: "Ezekiel. 33.15. Copenhagen. Denmark". Our theory is that a disgruntled resident of Copenhagen wrote to the office of the Second Avenue Rail Road Company in New York City, expressing anger over the railroad scandals of the day and signing his letter "Ezekiel 33.15", a biblical reference to a passage which states "If the wicked wishes to live, the first thing he must do is to restore that which he has stolen." The railroad employee who answered the letter used "Ezekiel 33.15" as the address and mailed his reply to Copenhagen. The "PR" represents "Poste Restante", an international term for mail that is held until called for. The use of the "New York Paid All Direct" datestamp to cancel stamps is also very unusual. Black killer cancellations were almost always used at this time.

THE BASSEL CORRESPONDENCE TO EGYPT AND JAPAN

An American Soldier in Egypt

The ascent of Isma'il Pasha to the governorship of Egypt and Sudan followed a long period of turbulence in the history of Egypt during the first half of the 19th century. Born in 1830, Isma'il was the grandson of Muhammad Ali and rose to power as wali (governor) in 1863. In 1867 Isma'il was given permission to use the title Khedive, which is roughly equivalent to the British term Viceroy. The Khedive Isma'il ruled Egypt and Sudan until his removal from power in 1879. While in power, Isma'il greatly modernized Egypt and Sudan, including reforms in the postal system. However, his push for internal improvements and Egypt's war against Ethiopia put the country heavily in debt. Under pressure from foreign governments, Isma'il was deposed in 1879, and his son Tewfik assumed power.

In an effort to improve Egypt's army, Khedive Isma'il recruited a group of approximately fifty American military officers, including Union and Confederate veterans of the Civil War. Apart from their role in training the army, the Americans supervised engineering projects and conducted important mapping expeditions in the Nile River region.

Many of the men who travelled to Egypt had been recommended by General William T. Sherman. According to two New York Times articles (January 4, 1874, and August 11, 1878), the first group of officers departed for Egypt in 1869. Among them was General Charles Pomeroy Stone, a former Union officer who was appointed commander of the Egyptian army. A second group followed in 1874, including James Bassel, a West Point graduate of 1867 who served at Fort Garland in Colorado. Bassel was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel of Engineers, but served less than a year because "his unfitness for Egyptian service was apparent from the day of his arrival." After leaving Egypt he was employed in China and Japan by an American ship builder. Lieutenant-Colonel Bassel returned to the United States and ran unsuccessfully for congress in 1878.

The 7-page letter contained within this double-rate cover to Japan was written by Charles C. Upham to his friend, James Bassel, while Upham travelled through Colorado and Bassel was in the Far East, following his short-lived service in the Khedive Ismail's army. Upham's letter is full of juicy details about expeditions in Colorado and the Black Hills, as well as references to military officers, Indian confrontations, Fort Garland, etc. Upham also asks Bassel to secure Japanese coins for his collection and laments not asking for Egyptian coins when Bassel was there. The 1875 clipped newspaper articles which accompany the letter refer to the Hayden Expedition.

This was carried on the PMSS *China*, departing San Francisco on Sep. 1, 1875, and arriving in Yokohama on Sep. 26 (Frajola-Perlman-Scamp sailing tables). The 15c treaty rate to Japan was in effect for only one year, from January 1 to December 31, 1875. This is one of two recorded covers with the 24c 1870 Issue paying the treaty rate to Japan, both from the Bassel correspondence. The second cover was postmarked at Del Norte on Sep. 1 (ex Ishikawa).....
