#### **Information for Bidders**

#### **Bidding**

The following means are available for placing bids:

- 1) Attending the Live Auction in Person: All bidders must register for a paddle, and new bidders must provide references at least three business days in advance of the sale.
- **2) Live Internet Bidding:** Instructions for participating as a Live Internet Bidder are provided on the page opposite.
- **3) Phone Bidding:** Bidders can be connected to the sale by phone and bid through a member of staff. Requests for phone bidding are subject to approval (please contact our office at least 24 hours before the sale). A signed Bid Form is required.
- **4) Absentee Bids.** All bids received in advance of the sale, either by mail, fax, phone, e-mail or internet, are Absentee Bids, which instruct the auctioneer to bid up to a specific amount on one or more lots in the sale. Absentee Bids sent by phone, fax or e-mail should arrive at least one hour prior to the start of the sale session. Bids entered through Live Internet Bidding will be visible to the auctioneer during the sale. Written bids should be entered legibly on the Bid Form in the sale catalogue. E-mail and internet bids should be carefully typed and double-checked. All new bidders must provide references. We recommend calling or e-mailing to confirm that Absentee Bids sent by mail, fax or e-mail have been received and entered.

#### **Pre-Sale Viewing**

Subject to availability, certain lots (except group lots) can be sent to known clients for examination. Requests must be made no later than 7 days prior to the sale. Lots must be returned on the day received. Postage/insurance costs will be invoiced.

In addition to regular viewing, clients may view lots by appointment. Our staff will be pleased to answer questions or provide additional information about lots.

#### **Expert Certification**

Individual items offered without a PF or PSE certificate dated within the past five years may be purchased subject to independent certification of genuineness and our description. Please refer to the Conditions of Sale and Grading Terms for policies governing certification.



#### Conditions of Sale (please read carefully before bidding)

The property described in this catalogue will be offered at public auction by Robert A. Siegel Auction Galleries, Inc. ("Galleries") on behalf of various consignors and itself or affiliated companies. By bidding on any lot, whether directly or by or through an agent, in person, or by telephone, facsimile or any other means, the bidder acknowledges and agrees to all of the following Conditions of Sale.

- 1. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. The term "final bid" means the last bid acknowledged by the auctioneer, which is normally the highest bid offered. The purchase price payable by the buyer will be the sum of the final bid and a commission of 15% of the final bid ("buyer's premium"), together with any sales tax, use tax or customs duties due on the sale.
- 2. The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid, to advance the bidding at his discretion and, in the event of a dispute between bidders, to determine the successful bidder, to continue the bidding or to reoffer and resell the lot in dispute. The Galleries' record of the final sale shall be conclusive.
- 3. All bids are per numbered lot in the catalogue unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to group two or more lots, to withdraw any lot or lots from the sale, or to act on behalf of the seller. The Galleries will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for the failure to execute such bids or for any errors in the execution of such bids.
- 4. Lots with numbers followed by the symbol ° are offered subject to a confidential minimum bid ("reserve"), below which the lot will not be sold. The absence of the symbol ° means that the lot is offered without a reserve. If there is no reserve, the auctioneer has sole discretion to establish a minimum opening bid and may refuse an offer of less than half of the published estimate. Any lot that does not reach its reserve or opening bid requested by the auctioneer will be announced as "passed" and excluded from the prices realized lists after the sale. The Galleries may have a direct or indirect ownership interest in any or all lots in the sale resulting from an advance of monies or goods-in-trade or a guarantee of minimum net proceeds made by the Galleries to the seller.
- 5. Subject to the exclusions listed in 5(A), the Galleries will accept the return of lots which have been misidentified or which have obvious faults that were present when the lot was in the Galleries custody, but not so noted in the lot description. All disputed lots must be received by the Galleries intact with the original packing material within 5 days of delivery to the buyer but no later than 30 days from the sale date. (5A) EXCLUSIONS: The following lots may not be returned for any reason: lots containing 10 or more items; lots from buyers who registered for the pre-sale exhibition or received lots by postal viewing, thereby having had the opportunity to inspect them before the sale; any lot described with "faults," "defects" or a specific fault may not be returned because of any secondary fault. Photographed lots may not be returned because of centering, margins, short/nibbed perforations or other factors shown in the illustrations. Lots may not be returned for any of the following reasons: the color of the item does not match the color reproduction in the sale catalogue or website listing; the description contains inaccurate information about the quantity known or reported; or a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description.
- 6. Successful bidders, unless they have established credit with the Galleries prior to the sale, must make payment in full before the lots will be delivered. Buyers not known to the Galleries must make payment in full within 3 days from the date of sale. The Galleries retains the right to demand a cash deposit from anyone prior to bidder registration and/or to demand payment at the time the lot is knocked down to the highest bidder, for any reason whatsoever. In the event that any buyer refuses or fails to make payment in cash for any lot at the time it is knocked down to him, the auctioneer reserves the right to reoffer the lot immediately for sale to the

highest bidder. Credit cards (Visa, Mastercard and Discover only) can be accepted as payment but will be subject to a 3% Convenience Fee, which will be added to the total of the entire invoice (including hammer price, buyer's premium, shipping and transit insurance charges and any applicable taxes).

- 7. If the purchase price has not been paid within the time limit specified above, nor lots taken up within 7 days from the date of sale, the lots will be resold by whatever means deemed appropriate by the Galleries, and any loss incurred from resale will be charged to the defaulting buyer. Any account more than 30 days in arrears will be subject to a late payment charge of 1½% per month as long as the account remains in arrears. Any expenses incurred in securing payment from delinquent accounts will be charged to the defaulter. A fee of \$250.00 per check will be charged for each check returned for insufficient funds.
- 8. All lots are sold as genuine. Any lot accompanied by a certificate issued by The Philatelic Foundation or by Professional Stamp Experts within 5 years of the sale date is sold "as is" and in accordance with the description on the certificate. Such lots may not be returned for any reason, including but not limited to a contrary certificate of opinion. Buyers who wish to obtain a certificate for any item that does not have a P.F. or P.S.E. certificate (dated as above) may do so, provided that the following conditions are met: (1) the purchase price must be paid in full, (2) the item must be submitted to an acceptable expertizing committee with a properly executed application form within 21 days of the sale, (3) a copy of the application form must be given to the Galleries, (4) in the event that an adverse opinion is received, the Galleries retain the right to resubmit the item on the buyer's behalf for reconsideration, without time limit or other restrictions, (5) unless written notification to the contrary is received, items submitted for certification will be considered cleared 90 days from the date of sale, and (6) in the event any item is determined to be "not as described", the buyer will be refunded the purchase price and the certification fee up to \$600.00 unless otherwise agreed.
- 9. Until paid for in full, all lots remain the property of the Galleries on behalf of the seller.
- 10. Agents executing bids on behalf of clients will be held responsible for all purchases made on behalf of clients unless otherwise arranged prior to the sale.
- 11. The buyer assumes all risk for delivery of purchased lots and agrees to pay for prescribed shipping costs. Buyers outside the U.S. are responsible for all customs duties.
- 12. The bidder consents that any action or proceeding against it may be commenced and maintained in any court within the State of New York or in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, that the courts of the State of New York and United States District Court for the Southern District of New York shall have jurisdiction with respect to the subject matter hereof and the person of the bidder. The bidder agrees not to assert any defense to any action or proceeding initiated by Galleries based upon improper venue or inconvenient forum. The bidder agrees that any action brought by the bidder shall be commenced and maintained only in a Federal Court in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York or the State Court in the county in which Galleries has its principal place of business in New York. #### **Grades, Abbreviations and Values Used in Descriptions**

#### **Grades and Centering**

Our descriptions contain detailed information and observations about each item's condition. We have also assigned grades to stamps and covers, which reflect our subjective assessment. For stamps, the margin width, centering and gum are described and graded according to generally-accepted standards (an approximate correlation to numeric grades is provided at right). Although we believe our grades are accurate, they are not always exactly aligned with third-party grading terms or standards for all issues. A lot may not be returned because a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description. Information from the P.S.E. Stamp Market Quarterly and P.S.E. Population Report<sup>5M</sup> is the most current available, but lots may not be returned due to errors or changes in statistics or data.

**Extremely Fine Gem (90-100):** The term "Gem" describes condition that is the finest possible for the issue. This term is equivalent to "Superb" used by grading services.

**Extremely Fine (80-90)**: Exceptionally large/wide margins or near perfect centering.

**Very Fine (70-85):** Normal-size margins for the issue and well-centered with the design a bit closer to one side. "Very Fine and choice" applies to stamps that have desirable traits such as rich color, sharp impression, freshness or clarity of cancel.

**Fine (60-70):** Smaller than usual margins or noticeably off center. Pre-1890 issues may have the design touched in places.

**Very Good (below 60):** Attractive appearance, but margins or perforations cut into the design.

#### Covers

Minor nicks, short edge tears, flap tears and slight reduction at one side are normal conditions for 19th century envelopes. Folded letters should be expected to have at least one file fold. Light cleaning of covers and small mends along the edges are accepted forms of conservation. Unusual covers may have a common stamp with a slight crease or tiny tear. These flaws exist in virtually all 19th century covers and are not always described. They are not grounds for return.

#### **Catalogue Values and Estimates**

Unless otherwise noted, the currently available *Scott Catalogue* values are quoted in dollars with a decimal point. Other catalogues are often used for foreign countries or specialized areas and are referred to by their common name: *Stanley Gibbons* (SG), *Dietz, American Air Mail Catalogue* (AAMC), *Michel, Zumstein, Facit,* etc. Estimates are indicated with an "E." and reflect our conservative valuation in dollars. Reserves will never exceed the low end of the estimate range; they will sometimes exceed Scott Catalogue value for stamps in Extremely Fine condition.

Because of certain pricing inconsistencies in the *Scott Catalogue*—for example, blocks that have no gum, the absence of premiums for Mint N.H. items, etc.—we cannot guarantee the accuracy of values quoted for multiples, specialized items and collection lots. We generally try to be conservative, but buyers may not return a lot because of a discrepancy in catalogue value due to Scott pricing inconsistencies.

### Happy 50th

HE FIRST RARITIES OF THE WORLD SALE WAS HELD BY ROBERT A. SIEGEL in 1964 and has since been held every year, making this the 50th Rarities sale. Having personally reached that birthday milestone just last year, I have great respect for anything that can last 50 years. My right knee didn't make it. Very few businesses survive half a century. I'm not even sure certain *countries* will make it 50 years.

If you are interested in seeing how the Rarities sales and the stamp market have evolved over this period of time, go to the Siegel website and look at the Rarities sales archive, where each catalogue is listed.

The 1964 inaugural sale was just 172 lots and realized \$241,000, of which \$67,000 was paid for the Inverted Jenny centerline block. The '64 Rarities sale included a horizontal pair of the China Small One-Dollar Red Revenue, which was a tough sell at \$1,600. In the same auction a set of Graf Zeppelin plate blocks brought \$1,650. Today, the China pair is worth more than a million dollars, and the Zepp plates are worth \$8,000.

The 1965 Rarities catalogue was the first to have an introduction, which became an annual tradition. Bob Siegel proudly announced that in the previous year the Siegel firm had held four \$100,000-plus auctions (a record for an American firm) and achieved the highest price for a U.S. stamp, the Boscawen provisional at \$23,000. The '65 Rarities sale showed increasing momentum in consignments, with many stellar pieces scattered throughout the little black-and-white catalogue. Color printing was seldom used in those days, and it was perfectly acceptable for a \$2 Columbian plate block of eight to be shown with five other lots on a black-and-white photo plate!

In his introduction to the 1967 Rarities sale, Bob Siegel remarked that 837 lots had been offered in the four Rarities sales (including 1967), and the gross sale total would be approximately "One Million Dollars... Surely a record shattering average for any four sessions of stamps ever sold!" It should be remembered that in those years the Siegel firm offered the Josiah K. Lilly collection, one of the greatest worldwide collections ever sold.

The Rarities sales from 1968 to the present have shown the steady growth of prices and reflect the changing tastes of collectors. My predecessors and I have always tried to offer a balanced and diverse array of material. This year, to celebrate the 50th Rarities sale, we have created "Rarities Week," with five separate catalogues presenting a tremendous variety of items, including some of the most important pieces known to philately. The star of the sales is the famous Dawson cover, bearing the  $2\phi$  and  $5\phi$  Hawaiian Missionary stamps. This spectacular Aristocrat of Philately is part of the Steven C. Walske collection, which is presented in its own catalogue and will be the starting point for Rarities Week.

We are pleased to once again collaborate with Seth Kaller, a respected autograph dealer, in bringing the first newspaper printing of the Declaration of Independence to auction. This historic document will start the 1:00 p.m. session on Tuesday, June 25.

It has been 20 years since Bob Siegel passed away. I like to think he would be pleased with how the Siegel Rarities Sale legacy has continued.



ONE OF THE FINEST OF THE EIGHT AVAILABLE COVERS BEARING A SINGLE 5-CENT HAWAIIAN MISSIONARY STAMP AND THE EARLIER OF TWO RECORDED MISSIONARY COVERS BEARING A FORWARDER'S HANDSTAMPED MARKING. THIS IS ALSO THE EARLIEST OF THE THREE RECORDED MISSIONARY COVERS ADDRESSED TO SAN FRANCISCO (ONE OF WHICH IS IN A MUSEUM COLLECTION).

Ten 5c Missionary covers are recorded in our census (http://www.siegelauctions.com/ dynamic/census/H12/H12.pdf) and the Gregory census. Included in this total are the Dawson 2c/5c cover and the 5c cover acquired by the Smithsonian National Postal Museum in the Honolulu Advertiser sale, leaving eight 5c covers for collectors. Of the 28 recorded intact Missionary covers, only two were handstamped by forwarders: the Porter & Ogden cover offered here (ex Honolulu Advertiser) and the G. D. Gilman cover offered in the Steven C. Walske collection (Sale 1045, lot 13).

This letter was carried on the Zoe, which departed Honolulu on September 11, 1852, and arrived in San Francisco on October 2. This is one of the few Missionary covers correctly endorsed with the ship's name, "Per 'Zoe", reflecting the sender's familiarity with sailing schedules. In this brief letter from Porter & Ogden, they acknowledge the favor of Dupuy & Foulkes in forwarding two letters addressed to them and offer to reciprocate. The "Ship 6" marking indicates the correct postage due for a ship letter addressed to the port of entry.

Porter & Ogden was an English firm of importing and commission merchants. Their Honolulu office was a two-story building, which was the birth place of Honolulu's first English newspaper, The Sandwich Islands Gazette, in 1836. On August 11, 1854, two years after this letter was mailed, Porter shot himself at his residence over difficulties with a Hawaiian woman. Following Porter's death the business was continued in the name of Frederick Ogden.

In CONGRESS, July 4, 1776.

A Declaration by the Reprefentatives of the United States of America, in General Congress afembled.

The First Newspaper Printing, the Second Publication in Any Form and the First to Closely Follow Thomas Jefferson's Style

Benjamin Towne's *Pennsylvania Evening Post* was the first newspaper to print the Declaration of Independence. Towne's Saturday, July 6, publication was preceded only by the broadside that went to John Dunlap's press on July 4 (published on July 5), and beat Dunlap's own newspaper, *The Pennsylvania Packet*, by two days. Towne was thus the second person to print the Declaration in any form, and, while the words are the same, his typesetting is markedly different from that of the official Dunlap version. The significance of the differences are explored in the separate catalogue (Sale 1046).

Because they preserve the text of the Declaration as first written and read, July 1776 printings like this are, in a way, even more original than the "original" engrossed manuscript, the prized treasure in the National Archives. When most Americans picture the Declaration, they envision the manuscript signed by John Hancock and 55 others, and titled "The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America." But this is not an image of the document that was penned and signed on July 4, 1776. The Declaration could not have been given that title when it passed: the vote was one shy of the desired unanimity because New York's delegates followed their state's specific instructions and abstained. On July 4 (as seen in this newspaper), the document was titled "A Declaration By the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress assembled" and was signed only by Continental Congress President John Hancock and Secretary Charles Thomson.

The *Pennsylvania Evening Post* was distributed far and wide, even by members of the Continental Congress. "I have this Moment folded up a Magazine, and an Evening Post," John Adams wrote to Abigail on July 7, "and sent it off, by an Express, who could not wait for me to write a single Line." As witnessed by Adams, this rare paper reflects the experience of everyday Americans as they read news of independence for the first time during that momentous July of 1776.

Declaration issues of *The Pennsylvania Evening Post* are rare—our census locates sixteen institutional and three privately held copies—including this lot. Our search of major auction records finds only six sales. Excluding second appearances, this is one of only four copies we have found recorded on the market in a little over 100 years.

By 1820 the original Declaration of Independence already showed signs of age and wear from handling. John Quincy Adams, then Secretary of State, commissioned William J. Stone to engrave the first facsimile—an exact copy—on a copper plate. In 1823, Congress ordered 200 official copies printed on vellum. All subsequent exact facsimiles of the Declaration descend from the Stone plate. This Force printing is the second edition, preserving the best representation of the Declaration as the manuscript looked over 150 years ago.


#### 1869 PICTORIAL ISSUE SAFETY PAPER ESSAYS

The 1869 Safety Paper essays are among the most beautiful and sought after essays or proofs in United States philately. They are also rare, with only approximately 100 different designs known. Nearly all are believed to be unique, with a few exceptions. Little is known about their production, but they were most likely one of the various experiments in stamp reuse prevention concurrent with grilled stamp production from 1867 to 1871. Clarence Brazer, the foremost student of essays and proofs in the 20th Century, noted they were probably essayed after George T. Jones' proposal of July 20, 1868 (Jon W. Rose, *United States Postage Stamps of 1869*).

Four face-different designs were used to produce the Safety Paper essays – the unadopted 5c Washington, 10c Lincoln and 30c Burgoyne essays, as well as the 15c Ty. III design later used for the 1875 Re-Issue. The distinguishing characteristics of the essays and the basis for their Scott numbers are the lathe-turned security underprints, many with designs used in banknote production. 25 different underprint types are recorded – four are unique to the 15c essays and 21 are found with a mix of the other three vignette designs, some in more than one color.

The offering here, by an anonymous collector, represents the largest number of these rare essays ever offered at public auction. Not even the famed Brazer, Finkelburg or Juhring collections contained the range of examples offered here. The 64 different essays that follow represent 22 of the 25 known underprint types and approximately 60% of the total recorded Safety Paper essays extant. This is a truly once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for the essay and proof or 1869 collector.

The Spanish Royal Order of Oct. 24, 1784, mandated that ship registers containing a list of their cargo be sent prepaid in the sealed mail boxes that travelled with the vessels. They received the same postal markings as regular correspondence. Moses Moredecai operated a line between the two main southern ports of Charleston and Savannah, and Havana, the capital of Cuba. The steamer *Isabel* ran regular bi-weekly trips on the route from October 1848 until the start of the Civil War.

She was launched in 1849 at New Albany, Indiana. At the outbreak of the Civil War she was converted to a hospital ship of the same name. Her two decks accommodated 1,000 casualties.





A VERY FINE AND REMARKABLE COVER, DEMONSTRATING THE USE OF THE 1847 ISSUE ENTIRELY OUTSIDE OF THE UNITED STATES ON MAIL BETWEEN PERU AND MEXICO, CARRIED VIA THE PACIFIC MAIL STEAM SHIP COMPANY LINE. ONLY TWO 1847 ISSUE COVERS HAVE THE "PAN. & SAN FRAN. S.S." ROUTE AGENT'S CIRCULAR DATESTAMP.

The "Pan. & San Fran. S.S." circular datestamp was used between November 1850 and June 1852 on mail handled by route agents aboard ships of the Pacific Mail Steam Ship Company. Contract mail carried by PMSS Co. was received in locked bags, but letters picked up en route were postmarked by official route agents, as evidenced by 25 recorded examples of these rare markings on covers. Only two of the covers have 1847 stamps (Wierenga census).

The two recorded 1847 Issue covers with the "Pan. & San Fran. S.S." circular datestamp both originated in Peru (one in Lima, the other in Paita) and are addressed to Barron, Forbes & Co. in Tepic, Mexico. They were both datestamped on December 4, 1851. Since the two covers followed the same journey, the following description applies to both.

This cover — with its letter, which is no longer present — was sent from Paita, Peru, in early November 1851, and carried out of the mails or inside another cover to the care of Smith & Lewis, the Panama forwarding agents. It was stamped in Panama with the strip of three 10c 1847's obtained from Amos B. Corwine, the United States mail agent in Panama. The fact that the stamps had been demonetized in the continental United States more than four months earlier apparently did not matter to Corwine. The mail was given to Gouverneur A. Ferris, the route agent on board the PMSS Co. California, which departed Panama on November 13. On its northbound run, the California evidently did not off-load the mail to Mexico at the ports of Acapulco, San Blas or Mazatlan, but carried it all the way to San Francisco, where the California arrived on December 2, carrying 179 bags of mail (Wierenga, p. 106). The 1847 covers to Mexico were postmarked by Ferris on December 4, one day before he departed on the PMSS Co. Golden Gate. On the south-bound trip, the two 1847 covers were off-loaded at San Blas and then carried to Tepic.


This cover from Peru to Mexico via Panama was prepaid at the U.S. 30c Panama (Pacific Coast) rate. The stamps came from a supply of 5,000 10c 1847 Issue stamps sent to A. B. Corwine, to facilitate prepayment of U.S. postage on mail sent via Panama. They became available in Panama on July 16, 1850. Corwine's responsibilities included arranging for mail to be carried across the Isthmus of Panama, between Chagres on the Atlantic side and Panama City on the Pacific side, and to receive mail for transport on the PMSS Co. line. It is this unique circumstance of postal history that made it possible for letters to have United States stamps, but never enter a U.S. post office.

The record of 10c 1847's showing use of the stamp from Panama contains ten full covers, one piece and a strip of three off cover. Of these, eight covers bear three stamps each for the 30c Panama rate. Four covers were carried from Peru to Mexico via Panama. As noted above, only two have the "Pan. & San Fran. S.S." circular datestamp.

Corwine served as the American commissioner in Panama until Lincoln removed him from office. He was involved in the so-called 1856 Watermelon War, in which inebriated Americans in transit antagonized a local seller of watermelon by refusing to pay, leading to riots — the vendor pulled a knife, the antagonist pulled a gun, a struggle ensued, and a bystander was shot. Corwine's report of the incident was instrumental in the following short American occupation of the Isthmus, as well as payment of compensation and justification for future military actions to maintain neutrality of Panama.

VERY FINE APPEARANCE. THIS MARVELOUS COVER IS THE UNIQUE USE OF THE 1851 ONE-CENT TYPE I ON A VALENTINE. ONE OF THE GREATEST POSTAL HISTORY RARITIES OF THE 1851 ISSUE AND A SPECTACULAR CLASSIC AMERICAN COVER.

The published census compiled by Jerome S. Wagshal contains at least 98 unduplicated records of Scott 5. There are probably no more than ten examples existing outside of the Wagshal census population. Therefore, the 1c 1851 Type I is the rarest of all United States stamps issued regularly prior to the 1868 Grills.

Type Ib was produced only as an imperforate stamp. Six positions on Plate 1 Early furnished stamps qualifying as Type Ib — Positions 3-6R and 8-9R — distinguished by the complete design at top and nearly complete design at bottom. When first entered on the plate, these six positions (as well as 7R1E) had the complete design at top and bottom. However, unlike 7R, small portions of the bottoms were burnished away. These top-row positions usually have an ample top margin, but frequently the margins are close or cutting into the sides or bottom.

VERY FINE. A RARE SOUND EXAMPLE OF THE ONE-CENT CHICAGO PERFORATION. APPROXIMATELY 18 EXAMPLES OF THE ONE-CENT 1851 CHICAGO PERF ARE RECORDED.

The origin of the Chicago perforation was revealed in an article published by Jerome S. Wagshal in the Chronicle 130 (May 1986). To briefly summarize Mr. Wagshal's revelations, the inventor of the machine used to create the Chicago Perf stamps was Dr. Elijah W. Hadley, a Chicago dentist. He probably constructed the machine in 1854. Over a two-year period, beginning in November 1854, Dr. Hadley's device was offered for sale to the Post Office Department thru R. K. Swift, a prominent Chicago banker and businessman. The distinctive 12½ gauge Chicago Perf was applied to sheets of the 1c (Plates 1 Late and 2) and 3c 1851 Issue, the former being considerably rarer.

According to the updated census of Chicago Perf items compiled by W. Wilson Hulme II (Chronicle 175, Aug. 1997), approximately 18 examples of the 1c Chicago Perf have been recorded, including five used on covers. About a dozen Type II No. 7 stamps are known.

III, Position 99R2 (8).** Large to huge margins all around incl. part of adjoining stamp at right, intense shade and impression, light cancel leaves entire design and the type characteristics clearly visible, faint vertical crease at right not mentioned on accompanying certificate

EXTREMELY FINE APPEARING EXAMPLE OF THE RARE 1851 IMPERFORATE ONE-CENT TYPE III FROM POSITION 99R2. THIS POSITION PRODUCED THE BEST EXAMPLE OF TYPE III, WITH THE WIDEST BREAKS AT TOP AND BOTTOM.

Plate 2 was made in late 1855, and consists of 198 stamps that are Type II, one position that is Type III (99R2) and one that is Type IIIA (100R2).

Guide dots were used to accurately lay out the subjects on the plate. Positions 79 and 89 were transferred perfectly using their guide dots. However, the guide dot to the south-east of Position 88R2, which was used to align the single B Relief for Position 99R2, was placed far out of line, resulting in the bottom part of the A Relief being transferred into the bottom part of Position 89 (and in the margin below this position) by mistake. When the fresh entry was made in Position 99R a full transfer of the design was not possible without running into the error in Position 89R. The position was therefore short transferred at top, and apparently also at bottom, creating the finest example of Type III found on any plate (see pp. 183-184 of Neinken book).

This multiple clearly demonstrates the narrow spacing between stamps in both directions. This makes it extremely difficult to obtain examples with such wide margins.

Little is known about the "Paid" precancels on the 1c 1851 Issue. The Ashbrook book illustrates several varieties of actual and supposed precancels. Ashbrook surmises that "the markings... were printed from newspaper type. In all probability the overprinting was done in a newspaper printing plant, and the stamps were used on wrappers enclosing newspapers or more than probable, on the newspapers themselves." Ashbrook's theory was borne out by the discovery of a wrapper containing *The American Eagle* of Cleveland, dated Feb. 2, 1857 (sold in our 2004 Rarities sale).

Wilson Hulme discussed the 3c stamps with private roulettes in an article in *The 1851 Issue of United States Stamps: a Sesquicentennial Retrospective* (pp. 138-165). The three discovery copies he recorded for New York all gauge approximately 16-18 and were used in 1857. This example has a rougher gauge of roulette — called "pin perforated" by the P.F., and was used four years before the examples Hulme lists. It is possible that the separation was achieved by tearing the stamp against a printer's perforating rule.

There are no Cunard sailings which fit the New York and Calais postmark dates (the *Europa* sailed from Boston on May 20, arriving in Liverpool on May 31).



Type Ia, imperforate and perforated, only comes from 18 of the 20 positions in the bottom rows of the right and left panes of Plate 4. The 3c rate was a common rate and was often paid using horizontal strips of three of the 1c stamp. However, multiples from the bottom row of Plate 4 are extremely rare, both on and off cover. We doubt that more than two other strips on cover exist. The strip offered here is especially desirable as it has the interpane margin at right.

Guide dots were used to accurately lay out the subjects on the plate. Positions 79 and 89 were transferred perfectly using their guide dots. However, the guide dot to the south-east of Position 88R2, which was used to align the single B Relief for Position 99R2, was placed far out of line, resulting in the bottom part of the A Relief being transferred into the bottom part of Position 89 (and in the margin below this position) by mistake. When the fresh entry was made in Position 99R a full transfer of the design was not possible without running into the error in Position 89R. The position was therefore short transferred at top, and apparently also at bottom, creating the finest example of Type III found on any plate (see pp. 183-184 of Neinken book).

Plate 2 stamps were issued imperforate from December 1855 through June 1857. Beginning in July 1857 stamps from Plates 1 Late, 2 and 4 were issued with perforations, and Plates 2 and 4 continued to produce stamps through late 1857. Plate 2 stamps are rarer perforated than in imperforate form; conversely, Plate 4 stamps are rarer imperforate than in perforated form. Perforated 99R2 stamps are of extreme rarity.

Our census, which incorporates the records of noted student Jerome S. Wagshal, the Philatelic Foundation, the Levi records and our own work, is available at our website at http://www.siege-lauctions.com/dynamic/census/21/21.pdf. Only one unused example is known, in a block. Twelve used singles are recorded, as are three on covers and two in strips, for a total of 18 known in any form. Virtually all have faults or are very off-center — only three off-cover singles and one on cover are confirmed as sound and not all have decent centering.

The first experimentally perforated stamps were delivered to the U.S. government on February 24, 1857. Seven cities were chosen for distribution. According to the *North American and United States Gazette* of February 27, "...Ninety thousand were ordered for the cities of Philadelphia and New York, and thirty thousand for New Orleans and other cities of the South and West." The earliest documented use of a perforated stamp is February 28, 1857, based on two covers from New York and the Philadelphia cover offered here. The experimental period continued until June 10, 1857, when the original six-year contract with Toppan, Carpenter expired. It was renewed on April 8, 1857, effective June 10, from which point all stamps were perforated as mandated by the new contract terms.

> The rare "Comet of 1861" design is a wonderful combination of patriotic sentiment on the meteoric rise of our nation's 16th President, who had been relatively unknown before the 1858 Lincoln-Douglas debates, and the real-world "Great Comet" of 1861. The 1861 comet was one of the brightest of the 19th century, visible to the naked eye for approximately three months, from June to August in the Northern Hemisphere, and by telescope for many months after. As such it was categorized as a "Great Comet", which generally means appearing once or less a decade. On the Fourth of July 1861, a soldier from the Second Wisconsin wrote about the comet, "We have been visited for a week past by a very large comet which at full day appears very bright and transparent; late at night the tail stretched nearly to the Zenith while the star was near the horizon." (http://civilwarwisconsin.com/campfirestories/46-great-comet-of-1861.html). Popular media used the comet as a symbol for events then unfolding, especially the impending Civil War. It appears in several political cartoons of the period, but we believe none are as beautiful or apropos as the Lincoln design on this cover.



The 5c Brown Type II is far rarer in multiples than the Orange Brown. Unlike the 1861 Orange Brown, the earlier printing in Brown was not left in Southern post offices when the issue was demonetized in August 1861. Prior to the discovery of the block of 20 in the Frelinghuysen collection, the largest recorded multiple was a block of nine (3 x 3, ex Klein) with the same portion of the imprint and plate number. A horizontal block of six is also known (creased thru bottom three stamps) as are approximately a half-dozen blocks of four.



The Dark Violet trial printing and Violet regular issue shades are often confused, and the Scott Catalogue adds to the confusion by putting the Dark Violet (the old Scott 60) in the Trial Color Proofs section as 70TCe, while the Violet gets a front seat as Scott 70c. In our opinion, there is no good reason to relegate the Dark Violet to the Trial Color Proof section. As a result, the stamp offered here is undercatalogued in relation to other 24c stamps of equal rarity. For example, Scott 70c has a value of \$35,000.00 versus Scott 70TCe at \$15,000.00.

Don Evans notes in his 1c book (p. 37) that this is known to have been printed on both horizontally and vertically laid paper. He also notes that horizontally laid paper seems to be scarcer than vertically laid, but our experience and an examination of the records of the Philatelic Foundation indicate that both are equally scarce. They are also usually found with faults.







In Brookman Volume III, pages 128-129, a complete account of the origin of the 1895 Imperforates is quoted from a column by George B. Sloane. We provide excerpts:

"At the time they appeared, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing had, but a short time previously, taken over the stamp printing contract from the American Bank Note Co. and were unfamiliar with and inexperienced in quantity production of postage stamps. Gilbert E. Jones, one of the owners of the New York Times, had rendered the Bureau invaluable technical advice and assistance in the organization of their facilities, and the Bureau desired to reward him in some way for his services. Mr. Jones was well-known collector, interested only in stamps in imperforate pairs, and when the subject was broached he suggested that, while he desired no recompense, if the Bureau could give him an imperforate pair or block of each of the stamps then in current use, for his collection, he would feel more than amply repaid."

Sloane then explains that the Bureau was restricted from presenting him with stamps from stock, but did allow him to buy regular perforated stamps on sale at the post office and exchange them for imperforates. Although the Scott Catalogue at first did not recognize the imperforates as regularly-issued stamps, from 1916 they inserted a statement "All denominations of this issue exist imperforate but they were not regularly issued in that condition".

In recent years, the Scott U.S. Specialized Catalogue moved the 1895 Imperforates to the Proof section. We feel strongly that these stamps belong with their regular-issue counterparts. Our reasoning is that the Bureau itself was responsible for releasing the stamps. The Scott Catalogue should not classify these stamps any differently than they classify other stamps released through official channels, but not regularly issued at a post office. For example, the 4c Pan-American Invert, which was never sold at the post office, but *traded* by the government for stamps they needed for the National Stamp Collection. As another example, the rare 4c and 8c Bluish Paper stamps were "released" at the post office in an illegal conspiracy between Joseph A. Steinmetz and Arthur M. Travers, an official with the Post Office Department, both of whom were indicted and convicted for their crimes. We see no difference in the historical circumstances behind the release of the 1895 Imperforates and the other examples cited.

The Sloane article also provides the original quantities of 1895 Imperforates released: 1c—900; 2c—500; 3c to 8c—300 each; 10c—400; 15c to \$5.00—100 each. The vast majority of stamps have been divided into pairs over the years. This offering is an extraordinary opportunity to acquire a set of all denominations of imprint and plate number strips of these major 19th Century rarities, which we believe will eventually earn their way back to the front of the Scott Catalogue, where they belong.

The \$1.00 stamp issued for the Trans-Mississippi Exposition was based on an image of cattle in a storm in an engraving by C. O. Murray, a copy of which was loaned to the Bureau of Engraving and Printing by Mrs. C. B. Johnson. The engraving was used as a trademark by an American cattle company, but the image originated in an oil painting by J. A. MacWhirter entitled "The Vanguard", which depicts cattle in the West Highlands of Scotland. The Post Office Department was embarrassed when the painting was identified as the property of the Lord Blyworth, who was sent a formal apology and philatelic memento through the British Ambassador. The memento, a proof item, was donated to the Royal Philatelic Society by Lord Blysworth and hangs today on the walls of the Royal.

When they realized the find they had made they lost no time in removing the stamps from the circulars and thus saved them to philately."

Hege, so this stamp actually depicts a living person in violation of the law.



# 1923 2-CENT HARDING MEMORIAL ISSUE ROTARY PRINTING, PERFORATED 11

#### THE LARGEST RECORDED MULTIPLE

Warren G. Harding, the 29th President, died in San Francisco on August 2, 1923, during a cross-country "Voyage of Understanding". Several people suggested a Harding memorial stamp, printed in black, and it was rushed into production. The first flat plate Perf 11 stamps (Scott 610) were issued on September 1, 1923, in his home town of Marion, Ohio, followed less than two weeks later by the rotary press Perf 10 stamps (Scott 612) on September 12.

The 2c Harding Rotary Perf 11 stamp — combining the rotary press printing with the perforation gauge used for the flat plate printing — was discovered in 1938 by Leslie Lewis of the New York firm, Stanley Gibbons Inc. Gary Griffith presents his hypothesis in *United States Stamps 1922-26* that rotary-printed sheets of 400 were first reduced to panes of 100 and then fed through the 11-gauge perforating machine normally used for flat plate sheets. This method explains the existence of a straight-edge on Scott 613. Production quality and quantity was very low, due to the rotary press stamps' natural tendency to curl, and the use of the flat plate perforator for the slightly different-sized rotary printing.

For the first approximately 70 years that this issue was known, the largest multiples recorded were two pairs, one of which has been broken into two singles. The discovery of this strip by a Harding specialist created a sensation in the philatelic press before it was first auctioned by Matthew Bennett in 2007. In the process of expertizing the strip, the discoverer went to the National Postal Museum to study the eight proof sheets (3,200 stamps) pulled from the plates that were used for the rotary press printings. 



The *Buffalo Balloon* stamp, designed by John B. Lillard and engraved by John H. Snively, was printed by Wheeler Brothers Printers in Nashville, Tennessee. Only 300 were printed in têtebêche arrangement from a single die. The stamps were intended for use on a balloon flight from Nashville to Gallatin, Tennessee, which took place on June 18, 1877. Of the 300 that were printed, Lillard wrote that only 23 were used.

Based on previous examples we have handled, at least some of the *Buffalo Balloon* stamps were exposed to moisture around the time they were printed. This accounts for the fact that only two of the tête-bêche pairs certified by the Philatelic Foundation are potentially sound. The others are mostly thinned or scuffed in one corner where they were stuck together. This pair, with minor scuffs on one stamp is among the better condition examples extant.



# THE NEWLY DISCOVERED NAVY DEPARTMENT COVERS FROM THE COMMODORE CALDWELL CORRESPONDENCE



Commodore Charles H. B. Caldwell (1823-1877)

Commodore Charles H. B. Caldwell (1823-1877) was the commander of the U.S. Navy's South Atlantic Station, commanding the flagship U.S.S. *Richmond* from 1876 to 1877. As an officer during the Civil War, commanding the U.S.S. *Itasca* in the Gulf Blockading Squadron, Caldwell captured the Confederate schooner *Lizzie Weston* off Florida in January 1862 en route to Jamaica with a cargo of cotton. An obituary (included with lot) describes his heroics in the subsequent campaign to capture New Orleans in April 1862:

He personally commanded and directed the hazardous operation of cutting the chains across the Mississippi, between the forts, under heavy fire, which opened the way for Farragut in his memorable passage of the batteries.

This action was memorialized in a drawing by M. J. Burns of Lt. Caldwell cutting the chains, which appeared in Scribner's *Popular History of the United States* in 1898 (page 11). In late 1862, Caldwell commanded the U.S.S. *Essex* in the Union Mortar Flotilla, which opened the bombardment of the Confederate works at Port Hudson, Louisiana.

The Navy Department covers to Commodore Caldwell originate from the commander's son, Henry, who served as secretary aboard the *Richmond*. Henry kept a staff journal in 1876 and 1877 which recorded weather, location, and other information. A few photocopied pages of the journal accompany this lot. The journal abruptly ends in August 1877, close to the time of his father's death. Henry took the covers off the *Richmond*, and they remained with him until his death in 1906. The covers then passed to Henry's younger brother, the descendents of whom retained them until now.



Our records contain five 10c Scarlet covers as follows: 1) Jul. 19, 1844 Boyd's delivery date in NYC, sent from Cleveland with Scarlet 96L4 and Pomeroy's 117L1, ex Worthington, Hollowbush, Hall (Siegel Sale 830, lot 369); 2) Sep. 28, 1844, folded letter from Buffalo to Miller & Co., NYC, double rate, stamp tied by ms., ex Caspary, Golden (Siegel Sale 817, lot 1304) and Kuphal (Siegel Sale 925, lot 1036; 3) Oct. 4, 1844, folded letter from Monroe Mich. to Dwight Johnson, NYC, with Scarlet 96L4 and Pomeroy's 117L1, ex Perry, Schwartz; 4) [Date unknown] 1844, folded letter from [origin unknown] to Willet P. Ward, NYC, with Scarlet 96L4 and Pomeroy's 117L1, Sloane's records; and 5) [Date unknown] 1844, folded cover from [origin unknown] to Mrs. Jane Bruce, Boston Mass., the cover offered here, ex Petri. The three combination frankings each bear a Pomeroy's stamp, affixed by Wells to credit Pomeroy with their share of the prepaid postage.

The "Paid" in oval handstamp was a standard marking used by Wells, Fargo & Company, but its function on Pony Express covers is not completely understood. The "Paid" oval is recorded on nine Pony Express covers carried during Phase II (Interim Phase) from April 1 to June 30, 1861 (FKW census). An additional five covers carried during Phase III (July-October 1861) have the same "Paid" oval. The fact that certain covers have the adhesive Pony Express stamp affixed over the "Paid" indicates that it was applied to those envelopes prior to being stamped for the Pony service.

The FKW census recorded 37 covers with the \$2.00 Red First Issue. This cover left San Francisco on June 29 and arrived in St. Joseph after a 12-day trip. Four days later, on July 15, it reached Washington Townsend (1813-1894), a prominent West Chester Pa. lawyer and prosecuting attorney for Chester County, as well as deputy attorney under the Pennsylvania State Attorney General. He served as a delegate to both Whig and Republican presidential conventions and later served as a Republican member of Congress from 1869 to 1877.

This cover was carried on the trip that departed San Francisco on Wednesday, September 11, 1861, and arrived at Atchison on September 23. The Pony Express stamp pays the government contract rate of \$1 per half-ounce, and the shift to Atchison as the point of entry into the U.S. mails was due to Confederate military incursions into central Missouri in September 1861.

Congress awarded the mail contract along the Central Route to the Overland Mail Company on March 12, 1861, effective July 1. The contract paid \$1,000,000 per year for mail/passenger service along the Central Route and required the company "...during the continuance of their Contract, or until completion of The Overland telegraph, to run a Pony Express semi-weekly at a Schedule time of ten days eight months of the year and twelve days four months of the year..." This period of operation is known as Phase III, which corresponds to Rate Period 4 (July 1-October 26, 1861). During this period, Wells, Fargo & Co. issued new stamps and envelopes to reflect the agreed-upon government contract rate of \$1 per half-ounce for the Pony Express. In addition, Wells, Fargo & Co. charged a fee for service in California (10c if a franked envelope was used, 25c if not) and U.S. postage (10c per half-ounce).

On September 3, 1861, the Hannibal & St. Joseph Railroad experienced a horrific tragedy when bushwhackers burned a bridge over the Platte River, causing a derailment that killed between 17 and 20 people and injured 100 more in the "Platte Bridge Railroad Tragedy." Starting with the Pony Express mail that left San Francisco on September 11, 1861 (ET-134, arriving September 23, which carried the cover offered here), the entry point for mail became Atchison. The FKW census records 25 covers sent thru Atchison, including one with the Pony Express stamp missing. Two others are known used on this same trip.

Commencing July 1, 1861, the Pony Express was authorized by Congress to carry mail at the rate of \$1.00 per half ounce. An additional fee was charged by Wells, Fargo & Co. to carry mail from San Francisco to the western terminus at Placerville, which is represented by the printed frank on this entire. The contract also stipulated the mandatory U.S. postage charge of 10c per half ounce. This cover beautifully combines all three postage elements and was carried on the fourth eastbound Pony Express trip after the new rates and stamps were introduced. Although the Scott Catalogue lists the July 1861 issue Pony Express stamps (143L3-143L6) with other private post issues, we wish to emphasize that these stamps were issued under the terms of a government mail contract; therefore, they have semi-official status.







EXTREMELY FINE. ARGUABLY THE FINEST OF THE ELEVEN 2-CENT MEMPHIS PROVISIONAL COVERS KNOWN TO US. A MAGNIFICENT AND VERY RARE EXAMPLE OF THIS QUINTESSENTIAL SOUTHERN POSTMASTER'S PROVISIONAL.

Matthew Campbell Gallaway (1820-1898), a colorful newspaper editor and aide-de-camp to General Nathan Bedford Forrest, was the Memphis Confederate postmaster who issued adhesive stamps and press-printed envelopes until Memphis fell to Federal forces in June 1862. Gallaway was often referred to as "Colonel," but military records show that he was paroled on May 10, 1865, as a 1st Lieutenant and Acting A.D.C. on General Forrest's staff (www.fold3.com). In August 1866 Gallaway, after resuming his position as editor of the *Avalanche*, was shot through the hand in a murder attempt by a United States tax collector named G. W. Wood (*New York Times*, Aug. 26, 1866). Gallaway survived and continued working as a newspaper editor until his retirement in 1887. He lived another decade, almost long enough to experience the arrival of the 20th century.

Samuel Mosby is believed to have been co-owner of Mosby & Anderson Storage, listed in the 1859 Memphis City Directory. The business was located on Union between Second and Third Streets (where the Hotel Peabody is today). (http://msgw.org/desoto/bios/mosby.html).

We have attempted to verify and locate images for each of the Memphis 2c provisional covers listed in the census by Billy Matz (Confederate Philatelist, Mar. 1967) and the Hart survey in the Crown book. We have located images for 11 of the 13 covers listed. Two of the covers are addressed to James Street Esq. in Memphis and apparently have never been publicly offered (they were shown to us by the owner). One of the Street covers has an illegible datestamp, and the stamp on the other is tied by the target cancel. We assume that the dates in the Matz census (Aug. 2 and Oct. 7, 1861) were taken from the letters in these two covers, because we cannot find any other covers addressed to James Street. The two covers which we have been unable to verify with photographs are: "November 10, 1861; to Rev. Thomas Taylor, Newcastle, Tenn." — this entry is apparently based on the Charles J. Phillips census, which identifies the cover as coming from the Manning collection, but a cover addressed to another post office would require 5c unless it was a circular rate. We would like to see a photograph of this cover. (From the Frank Hart survey): "H. C. Crane has Hon. J. G. Ham, Gov. of Tennessee, Nashville, Tenn." — again, it seems odd that this cover is addressed to another post office. We would like to see a photograph of this cover.



This letter from Oskar Aichel follows earlier letters known from his correspondence (see Siegel Sale 988, lot 164). Oskar describes how he is "well pleased with Havana...exceedingly healthy...making good progress in establishing my name, indeed much more than I, at first could expect." He goes on to state that he has eight pupils, four of which cover his expenses (possibly as an art teacher). This contrasts sharply with a letter he wrote the previous December, in which he describes the difficulty of finding work at reasonable wages and characterizes locals as "those mis-trusting vicious creoles."

The exact sequence of handling for this cover and letter is difficult to determine, but after originating in Havana, it most likely was carried in an outer envelope (discarded) addressed to DeBow in Mobile Ala. From there it was franked with the 10c Confederate stamp and put into the mails as addressed, to Columbus Miss. Evidently, LeBlanc was not there, so the letter was opened (the "unsealed" part of the note) and the return address instructions (to Leon Serè in the text of the letter) were used to get the letter to Augusta. Serè added the "unsealed" note at Augusta upon its arrival on Nov. 7. We are grateful to Steven C. Walske for his interpretation.

An entry from the Louisiana State University library provides a picture of LeBlanc's activities during the war: "LeBlanc, C.E. Papers, Mss. 1315, 1864-1865 [Columbus, Mississippi]. Location: Reel 12, Confederate Military Manuscripts, Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge: This collection consists of six items, papers, 1864-1865, of C. E. LeBlanc, deputy Confederate government agent for the purchase of cotton. Papers concern the sale of certain Confederate property in Columbus, Mississippi, and its subsequent confiscation by a U.S. Treasury agent. Additional items include a promissory note, a contract for the delivery of cotton, and a broadside announcing a lecture to be presented by J. D. B. DeBow in Columbus, Mississippi."

James D. B. DeBow, to whose care this cover was directed, was an American publisher and slavery advocate best known for his influential magazine *DeBow's Review*. A resident of New Orleans, DeBow was exiled to Mobile after the capture of New Orleans in April 1861. He later became one of the founding members of the Louisiana Relief Committee.

Similar to the experience of towns in Puerto Rico at the end of the Spanish-American War, severe shortages of stamps were experienced in Cuba at the end of 1898. The shortage was dealt with initially by using revenue stamps as postage in some locations, but as even these adhesives ran out, provisional issues were needed. The best known provisionals are the Cuba Puerto Principe issue, and in Puerto Rico, the Ponce and Coamo issues (see lots 434-444 in this sale).

The Gibara Provisional was the only one in use in Cuba at the same time as the Puerto Principe issues. It was not reported in the philatelic press until 1997. Only four covers are recorded (including one with 5c denomination), plus two fragments at the Cuban Postal Museum (one a 5c). The cover offered here is the only known 2c double-rate use and also the earliest known use. An article by Dr. Yamil H. Kouri on the Gibara provisional appeared in the *Collectors Club Philatelist* (Sep.-Oct. 2012, copy included). The Ponce issue has long been celebrated as the only 1898 Provisional specifically authorized by the United States Government, through Major General James H. Wilson. Along with its famous cousin, the Coamo Provisional, the Ponce is one of only two known 1898 Provisionals issued as adhesive stamps. A thorough discussion of the issue can be found in an article by Raul A. #### COAMO PROVISIONAL

The Coamo stamps were created in August 1898 during the Spanish-American War, in response to the lack of a functioning postal service and the absence of stamps in the period between the retreat of Spanish forces and the full establishment of an American military postal system. Fifty sheets of ten stamps were typeset in black on unwatermarked paper, on which was applied a brownish gum. Four different types exist based on differences in the numeral "5". The violet "F Santiago" (mayor of Coamo) handstamp was applied as a control mark to avoid counterfeits. Few of the stamps were ultimately used and only 10 covers survive.

Approximately 30 of the unused sheets were purchased by Mr. Alfred O. Tittmann, a stamp collector, on Oct. 26, 1898. Tittmann brought the sheets to the United States and Charles E. Mekeel cut up and sold many of the stamps as singles. While various writers have estimated that between six and ten sheets survive, Dr. Ronald H. Gonzalez identifies 21 different full sheets in his census, though some are from old photos and may not be genuine or may have been cut apart.



> The first knowledge in the philatelic world of the existence of the Coamo provisional stamps was most likely provided by Captain R. D. Shortly after Potts mailed his letters an article about the Coamo Provisional appeared in *Mekeel's Weekly Stamp News*. The cover offered here is the first of three sent by Potts to his wife and may have been the source of the Mekeels article. One other Potts cover also bears a pair and these two are the only Coamo covers recorded with pairs. While the stamps were not valid on mail sent outside of Puerto Rico, Potts was a collector and recognized the philatelic significance of using the Coamo Provisional on his mail. 





VERY FINE APPEARANCE. A RARE 5-CENT 1898 COAMO PROVISIONAL ISSUE USED LOCALLY ON COVER, DURING THE APPROXIMATE THREE WEEK PERIOD IN WHICH REGULAR STAMPS WERE NOT AVAILABLE. THIS IS THE EARLIEST KNOWN ON-COVER USE (SEE ALSO LOT 442).

The origin of the Coamo covers was discussed in a 1988 article in *Possessions* by Ovidio Davila. Davila states that Alfred O. Tittmann, the stamp collector who is known to have purchased the remainder sheets and brought them to the United States for sale, also obtained a number of Coamo covers with single stamps used to Ponce. He sold these covers to Mr. Robert L. Junghanns between 1920 and 1923. The six Coamo covers offered in this section come from the Junghanns collection.

Ten Coamo covers are known in total, including three which were used by Captain R. D. Potts on mail to San Francisco. Seven are known with single Coamo stamps exhibiting the proper local use within Puerto Rico during the approximate three-week period when regular stamps were not available. None of the stamps was cancelled at its origination, probably because there were no cancelling devices left in Coamo when the Spanish evacuated. The re-emergence of these covers after decades off the market has afforded the opportunity to compile an updated census of the known covers, which is available at http://www.siegelauctions.com/dynamic/census/PR 201/PR 201.pdf.

FINE APPEARING AND EXTREMELY RARE EXAMPLE OF THE 1898 PROVISIONAL HANDSTAMP FROM GUANICA EMPLOYED IN THE AFTERMATH OF THE SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR WHEN REGULAR STAMPS WERE NOT AVAILABLE. ONLY TWO EXAMPLES ARE RECORDED.

U.S. troops landed at Guanica on July 25, 1898, and moved swiftly east to Ponce, where the first military mail station was established on August 3. As with the more famous Coamo and Ponce adhesives, the Guanica Provisional was created to prepay the 5c for transmission inside Puerto Rico during the period of transition when stamps were not yet available. There are two types recorded and this is Type 2. Only two examples of this handstamp are known, the other dated Nov. 28. The inscription at top of this cover is an interesting political statement by the postmaster at Guanica, declaring the town to be part of the United States.

FINE APPEARANCE. THIS IS THE ONLY RECORDED EXAMPLE OF THE MAYAGUEZ 1898 4-CENT PROVISIONAL HANDSTAMP. A GREAT RARITY OF PUERTO RICO AND UNITED STATES POSSESSIONS PHILATELY.

As with the more famous Coamo and Ponce Provisional adhesives, the Mayaguez Provisional was created to prepay transmission of mail inside Puerto Rico during the period of transition when stamps were not yet available. Unlike the other 5c issues, this issue was oddly denominated 4c. The cover is accompanied by a letter written in Spanish from the Secretary of the Municipality of Toa Baja at the time, Mr. Jose Manuel De Loira, stating that he was present when the letter was received by the addressee and that he kept the cover as a curiosity.

A RARE EXAMPLE OF THE UTUADO MAYORALTY HANDSTAMP USED AS A PROVISIONAL AND SENT THROUGH THE LINES TO SPANISH-CONTROLLED SAN JUAN.

It is believed that in Utuado at this time, the mayor's office had control of the mail service, received payment for letters and struck the office's seal as evidence of the 5c prepayment. In the mayor's seal the coat of arms of Spain has been replaced with a star. This is also known to have been done in the towns of Camuy and Quebradillas upon arrival of American forces. When this cover was mailed in September 1898, Spanish troops still controlled San Juan. They did not complete their withdrawal until Oct. 18

# Building a Future for Britain's Postal Heritage

In 2016 a new postal museum will open in London, giving access to every British stamp issued since 1840 and 70,000+ artefacts, telling the story of how the postal system transformed world history.

The museum situated in Mount Pleasant, site of one of the largest sorting offices in Europe, will provide access to 400 years of postal, social and design history. It will include photographs, posters, vehicles, pillar boxes and a world-class stamp collection including the story behind the introduction of the Penny Black. Endorsed by the British government and Mayor of London, Boris Johnson, the museum will cost approximately £12m to build and will be housed on three floors. It will comprise a 500m<sup>2</sup> interactive exhibition area, a search room for in-depth research, 21/2 miles of Archive, digitisation studio, café, shop, hire space for talks/philatelic societies to meet and an outdoor courtyard.

#### Fundraising - Why We Need Your Help

Royal Mail and Post Office Ltd, once the largest company in the world, have part-funded the museum as well as donating a building worth £1.1m and a 999 year lease. We need to raise £3m by December 2013 in order to secure funding for the museum. It will be part of a masterplan of 700 homes, offices and retail space and will be a major destination for the study of philately and postal history.

#### **Philatelic Significance**

Philatelic material will be incorporated across the exhibition space which will be themed into different time periods. Stamps will be used in context to support the exhibits and inform the story: for example, people, events and technology. Stamps will also feature in annual, temporary exhibitions; particularly stamp designers and iconic artwork.

We have just finished cataloguing stamp artwork from 1975-1985 and we aim to digitise all our stamps to create an on-line gallery. An increased, dedicated space will allow us to purchase a larger format scanner to enable digitisation of registration sheets, giving remote access to our full philatelic collection.




