



Information for Bidders

Bidding

The following means are available for placing bids:

- 1) Attending the Live Auction in Person: All bidders must register for a paddle, and new bidders must provide references at least three business days in advance of the sale.
- **2) Live Internet Bidding:** Instructions for participating as a Live Internet Bidder are provided on the page opposite.
- **3) Phone Bidding:** Bidders can be connected to the sale by phone and bid through a member of staff. Requests for phone bidding are subject to approval (please contact our office at least 24 hours before the sale). A signed Bid Form is required.
- 4) Absentee Bids. All bids received in advance of the sale, either by mail, fax, phone, e-mail or internet, are Absentee Bids, which instruct the auctioneer to bid up to a specific amount on one or more lots in the sale. Absentee Bids sent by phone, fax or e-mail should arrive at least one hour prior to the start of the sale session. Bids entered through Live Internet Bidding will be visible to the auctioneer during the sale. Written bids should be entered legibly on the Bid Form in the sale catalogue. E-mail and internet bids should be carefully typed and double-checked. All new bidders must provide references. We recommend calling or e-mailing to confirm that Absentee Bids sent by mail, fax or e-mail have been received and entered.

Pre-Sale Viewing

Subject to availability, certain lots (except group lots) can be sent to known clients for examination. Requests must be made no later than 7 days prior to the sale. Lots must be returned on the day received. Postage/insurance costs will be invoiced.

In addition to regular viewing, clients may view lots by appointment. Our staff will be pleased to answer questions or provide additional information about lots.

Expert Certification

Individual items offered without a PF or PSE certificate dated within the past five years may be purchased subject to independent certification of genuineness and our description. Please refer to the Conditions of Sale and Grading Terms for policies governing certification.

Shipping and Delivery

Procedures and charges for shipping lots are printed on the back of the Bid Form. Bidders are responsible for all prescribed shipping charges and any applicable sales tax or customs duties.



Conditions of Sale (please read carefully before bidding)

THE PROPERTY DESCRIBED IN THIS CATALOGUE WILL BE OFFERED AT PUBLIC AUCTION BY ROBERT A. SIEGEL AUCTION GALLERIES, INC. ("GALLERIES") ON BEHALF OF VARIOUS CONSIGNORS AND ITSELF OR AFFILIATED COMPANIES. BY BIDDING ON ANY LOT, WHETHER DIRECTLY OR BY OR THROUGH AN AGENT, IN PERSON, OR BY TELEPHONE, FACSIMILE OR ANY OTHER MEANS, THE BIDDER ACKNOWLEDGES AND AGREES TO ALL OF THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS OF SALE.

- 1. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. The term "final bid" means the last bid acknowledged by the auctioneer, which is normally the highest bid offered. The purchase price payable by the buyer will be the sum of the final bid and a commission of 15% of the final bid ("buyer's premium"), together with any sales tax, use tax or customs duties due on the sale.
- 2. The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid, to advance the bidding at his discretion and, in the event of a dispute, to determine the successful bidder, to continue the bidding or to reoffer and resell the lot in dispute. The Galleries' record of the final sale shall be conclusive.
- 3. All bids are per numbered lot in the catalogue unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to group two or more lots, to withdraw any lot or lots from the sale, or to act on behalf of the seller. The Galleries will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for the failure to execute such bids or for any errors in the execution of such bids.
- 4. Lots with numbers followed by the symbol ° are offered subject to a confidential minimum bid ("reserve"), below which the lot will not be sold. The absence of the symbol ° means that the lot is offered without a reserve. If there is no reserve, the auctioneer has sole discretion to establish a minimum opening bid and may refuse an offer of less than half of the published estimate. Any lot that does not reach its reserve or opening bid requested by the auctioneer will be announced as "passed" and excluded from the prices realized lists after the sale. The Galleries may have a direct or indirect ownership interest in any or all lots in the sale resulting from an advance of monies or goods-in-trade or a guarantee of minimum net proceeds made by the Galleries to the seller.
- 5. Subject to the exclusions listed in 5(A), the Galleries will accept the return of lots which have been misidentified or which have obvious faults that were present when the lot was in the Galleries' custody, but not so noted in the lot description. All disputed lots must be received by the Galleries intact with the original packing material within 5 days of delivery to the buyer but no later than 30 days from the sale date. (5A) EXCLUSIONS: The following lots may not be returned for any reason, or may not be returned for the reasons stated: i) lots containing 10 or more items; ii) lots from buyers who registered for the pre-sale exhibition or received lots by postal viewing, thereby having had the opportunity to inspect them before the sale; iii) any lot described with "faults," "defects" or a specific fault may not be returned because of any secondary fault; iv) photographed lots may not be returned because of centering, margins, short/nibbed perforations or other factors shown in the illustrations; v) the color of the item does not match the color reproduction in the sale catalogue or website listing; vi) the description contains inaccurate information about the quantity known or reported; or vii) a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description.
- 6. Successful bidders, unless they have established credit with the Galleries prior to the sale, must make payment in full before the lots will be delivered. Buyers not known to the Galleries must make payment in full within 3 days from the date of sale. The Galleries retains the right to demand a cash deposit from anyone prior to bidder registration and/or to demand payment at the time the lot is knocked down to the highest bidder, for any reason whatsoever. In the event that any buyer refuses or fails to make payment in cash for any lot at the time it is knocked down to him, the auctioneer reserves the right to reoffer the lot immediately for sale to the highest bidder. Credit cards (Visa, Mastercard and Discover only) can be accepted as payment but will be subject to a 3% Convenience Fee, which will be added to the total of the entire invoice (including hammer price, buyer's premium, shipping and transit insurance charges and any applicable taxes).

- 7. If the purchase price has not been paid within the time limit specified above, nor lots taken up within 7 days from the date of sale, the lots will be resold by whatever means deemed appropriate by the Galleries, and any loss incurred from resale will be charged to the defaulting buyer. Any account more than 30 days in arrears will be subject to a late payment charge of 1½% per month as long as the account remains in arrears. Any expenses incurred in securing payment from delinquent accounts will be charged to the defaulter. A fee of \$250.00 per check will be charged for each check returned for insufficient funds.
- 8. All lots are sold as genuine. Any lot accompanied by a certificate issued by The Philatelic Foundation or by Professional Stamp Experts within 5 years of the sale date is sold "as is" and in accordance with the description on the certificate. Such lots may not be returned for any reason, including but not limited to a contrary certificate of opinion. Buyers who wish to obtain a certificate for any item that does not have a P.F. or P.S.E. certificate (dated as above) may do so, provided that the following conditions are met: (1) the purchase price must be paid in full, (2) the item must be submitted to an acceptable expertizing committee with a properly executed application form within 21 days of the sale, (3) a copy of the application form must be given to the Galleries, (4) in the event that an adverse opinion is received, the Galleries retain the right to resubmit the item on the buyer's behalf for reconsideration, without time limit or other restrictions, (5) unless written notification to the contrary is received, items submitted for certification will be considered cleared 90 days from the date of sale, and (6) in the event any item is determined to be "not as described", the buyer will be refunded the purchase price and the certification fee up to \$800.00 unless otherwise agreed to in writing.
- 9. Until paid for in full, all lots remain the property of the Galleries on behalf of the seller.
- 10. Agents executing bids on behalf of clients will be held responsible for all purchases made on behalf of clients unless otherwise arranged prior to the sale.
- 11. The buyer assumes all risk for delivery of purchased lots and agrees to pay for prescribed shipping costs. Buyers who receive lots in the U.S. are obligated to pay whatever sales tax or compensating use tax might be due, and buyers outside the U.S. are responsible for all customs duties.
- 12. The bidder consents that any action or proceeding against it may be commenced and maintained in any court within the State of New York or in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, that the courts of the State of New York and United States District Court for the Southern District of New York shall have jurisdiction with respect to the subject matter hereof and the person of the bidder. The bidder agrees not to assert any defense to any action or proceeding initiated by Galleries based upon improper venue or inconvenient forum. The bidder agrees that any action brought by the bidder shall be commenced and maintained only in a Federal Court in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York or the State Court in the county in which Galleries has its principal place of business in New York. The bidder agrees not to use a public conflict resolution service and not to use any form of social media to publish comments or information about the Galleries and its employees which might harm the Galleries' reputation or business. These Conditions of Sale shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the substantive laws of the State of New York, and shall constitute an agreement that shall be binding on the parties, and their respective heirs, administrators, distributees, successors and assignees.

Grades, Abbreviations and Values Used in Descriptions

Grades and Centering

Our descriptions contain detailed information and observations about each item's condition. We have also assigned grades to stamps and covers, which reflect our subjective assessment. For stamps, the margin width, centering and gum are described and graded according to generally-accepted standards (an approximate correlation to numeric grades is provided at right). Although we believe our grades are accurate, they are not always exactly aligned with third-party grading terms or standards for all issues. A lot may not be returned because a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description. Information from the P.S.E. Stamp Market Quarterly and P.S.E. Population ReportSM is the most current available, but lots may not be returned due to errors or changes in statistics or data.

Extremely Fine Gem (90-100): The term "Gem" describes condition that is the finest possible for the issue. This term is equivalent to "Superb" used by grading services.

Extremely Fine (80-90): Exceptionally large/wide margins or near perfect centering.

Very Fine (70-85): Normal-size margins for the issue and well-centered with the design a bit closer to one side. "Very Fine and choice" applies to stamps that have desirable traits such as rich color, sharp impression, freshness or clarity of cancel.

Fine (60-70): Smaller than usual margins or noticeably off center. Pre-1890 issues may have the design touched in places.

Very Good (below 60): Attractive appearance, but margins or perforations cut into the design.

Covers

Minor nicks, short edge tears, flap tears and slight reduction at one side are normal conditions for 19th century envelopes. Folded letters should be expected to have at least one file fold. Light cleaning of covers and small mends along the edges are accepted forms of conservation. Unusual covers may have a common stamp with a slight crease or tiny tear. These flaws exist in virtually all 19th century covers and are not always described. They are not grounds for return.

Catalogue Values and Estimates

Unless otherwise noted, the currently available *Scott Catalogue* values are quoted in dollars with a decimal point. Other catalogues are often used for foreign countries or specialized areas and are referred to by their common name: *Stanley Gibbons* (SG), *Dietz, American Air Mail Catalogue* (AAMC), *Michel, Zumstein, Facit*, etc. Estimates are indicated with an "E." and reflect our conservative valuation in dollars. Reserves will never exceed the low end of the estimate range; they will sometimes exceed Scott Catalogue value for stamps in Extremely Fine condition.

Because of certain pricing inconsistencies in the *Scott Catalogue*—for example, blocks that have no gum, the absence of premiums for Mint N.H. items, etc.—we cannot guarantee the accuracy of values quoted for multiples, specialized items and collection lots. We generally try to be conservative, but buyers may not return a lot because of a discrepancy in catalogue value due to Scott pricing inconsistencies.

THE BRANDON COLLECTION OF CONFEDERATE POSTAL HISTORY

Introduction by Dr. Mark S. Brandon, M.D.

This is the collection formed by my father, Dr. Ralph Brandon. When I was young we went on trips to see state capitals, presidents' homes and Civil War battlefields. My father and I started collecting stamps in 1968. On a trip to Charlottesville, Virginia, we came upon a stamp store and decided to go in. This was the beginning of one of the greatest Confederate States collections in the world.

In a small showcase there were several letters with their corresponding envelopes, addressed in a flowing script and with stamps that were unlike any we had seen in our United States collection. The proprietor informed us that these were Confederate covers. We purchased them, took them home and framed them. They were the first thing anyone saw when entering or leaving our home.

What followed was a lifetime passion with Confederate philately. We went to countless exhibits and auctions in our effort to build a unique collection. Over time we made it a family affair, with my father and I mounting and organizing frames, and my mother using calligraphy to make the pages. This collection was exhibited many times, winning every major prize offered.

Eventually my father decided to stop exhibiting, but he continued to add to the collection to make it better. There are many one-of-a-kind items, and if there are only two or three known, there is a good chance he had them all.

Before my father passed away he was working on an eight-volume collection of manuscripts and covers that chronicled Lee's Army of Northern Virginia. The albums and material were never more than an arm's reach away.

I hope you will enjoy this collection as much as my father did. Offering these treasured items will give other passionate collectors the opportunity to hold rare pieces of history.





"Shadows of the War" — Slavery and Conflict

British Abolition of Slave Trade. Printed circular with portions written in pen, titled "Circular Slave Trade No. 1, Foreign Office April 30, 1843", states "Sir, I herewith transmit to you for your information a copy of a treaty concluded at Santiago on the 19th of January 1839, and of an additional and explanatory Convention concluded at Santiago on the 7th of August 1841, between Her Majesty and the Republick of Chile, for the Abolition of the Slave Trade.", signed "Andrew", docketed on back, Very Fine, a wonderful historical document tracing one of the steps in the long evolution of the abolishment of the slave trade.......... Slave Auction, May 31, 1860. One-page document titled "NOTICE. 


VERY FINE ROBERT E. LEE AUTOGRAPHED FIELD COVER. A GREAT RARITY.

General Robert E. Lee's letters sent from the field were enclosed in envelopes signed "R. E. Lee Genl". The letters and other important papers were carried by military courier, usually to Richmond to another officer under Lee's command. Lee assumed command of the Army of Northern Virginia on June 1, 1862. This is the historical starting point for all of Lee's signed field covers. E. 7,500-10,000

A remarkable 2½-page autograph letter signed and dated August 13, 1861, asking the commanding general of the Confederate States army to order the return of a horse that Jackson captured at Harper's Ferry and loaned to another officer, bold signature, in excellent condition

A RARE AND FASCINATING WAR-PERIOD LETTER WRITTEN AND SIGNED BY "STONEWALL" JACKSON, CONCERNING THE RETURN OF A HORSE — "AS THE HORSE I HAVE IS TOO ROUGH FOR ME TO RIDE, AND I HAVE NOT BEEN ABLE TO PROCURE A SUITABLE ONE, I RESPECTFULLY REQUEST THAT YOU WILL GIVE AN ORDER BY THE BEARER, DIRECTING LIEUT. [BRADFORD] TO RETURN THE HORSE TO THE OFFICER FROM WHOM HE RECEIVED HIM."

The letter reads in full:

"Hd Qtr 1st Brigade, Camp Harmon, Fairfax County, Aug. 13th, 1861 Major,

I respectfully request that you will lay this communication before the General commanding. Whilst in command at Harpers Ferry I assumed the responsibility of taking from the B&O.R.R. cars an excellent lot of ten horses which I had reason to believe were destined for the use of the Federal Army at the Relay House. Subsequently I learned that the horses were from the State of Ohio. The owner insisted on being paid for his property, or else have it returned to him. As no public funds were in the hands of the Quartermasters, and believing it impolitic to permit the horses to go on, and also inexpedient not to pay for them promptly, as they were from another state, I determined to borrow the money (fifteen hundred dollars) which was effected through the assistance of friends. Two of the horses I thought of keeping under the provisions of paragraph 1030 of the Army Regulations.

Soon after I had occasion to employ Mr. Bradford, now Lieut. Bradford, on service that required an excellent horse. I directed Major John H. [sic] Harman of the Quartermasters Department to turn over to him the best horse in his possession, and Lieut. B. selected one of the two that I had thought of keeping. Though months have elapsed since the order was given, yet the horse has not been returned. A few days since I directed the officer who turned over the horse to get him back, and give the requisite receipts, but Lieut. B as I have been informed refused to give him up. Subsequently he called on me and stated that he would return the animal next day, but he failed to do. He has no claim on the horse. 

FINE APPEARANCE. A RARE EXAMPLE OF THE CONFEDERATE DEAD LETTER OFFICE HANDSTAMP ON A COVER DIVERTED AFTER THE MAIL ROUTE BETWEEN RICHMOND AND WASHINGTON D.C. WAS TERMINATED.

Northbound mail from the eastern Confederate States to the U.S. was normally carried via Richmond and Washington D.C. until May 23, 1861. The Federal military occupation of Alexandria, Virginia, closed this route on the evening of May 23, so northbound mail was diverted to the C.S.A. Dead Letter Office at Richmond from May 24 until June 1.

Fewer than ten examples of the C.S.A. Dead Letter Office marking (either type) are known. This cover is very unusual, because it originated in North Carolina before the state delegates voted for secession on May 20. It was mailed on May 11, well before the route between Richmond and Washington D.C. was closed. As a U.S. Post Office letter, it should not have been diverted to the C.S.A. Dead Letter Office. The Dead Letter Office marking is dated the day of release (August 30). Although earlier D.L.O. dates are recorded, the May 11 origin date is probably the earliest for a cover diverted to the C.S.A. Dead Letter Office.

On June 12, 1861, the U.S. suspended service at the Nashville post office, which effectively closed down the last remaining northbound mail route from the Confederate States. The Nashville postmaster continued to forward northbound mail, but letters were stopped at Louisville starting on June 13. This letter reached Louisville around June 9 and was sent on to Philadelphia; however, it was diverted to the U.S. Dead Letter Office. The U.S. 3c stamp was not recognized, and the recipient was asked to remit 3c postage in order to receive the letter.

VERY FINE. AN EXTREMELY RARE EXAMPLE OF TRANSATLANTIC MAIL RETURNED AFTER THE ROUTE BETWEEN WASHINGTON AND RICHMOND WAS CLOSED.

By the time this cover from England reached New York, the mail route between Washington D.C. and Richmond had been suspended (starting May 24), and mail from foreign countries was returned. In England the three-line "Sent Back to England" handstamp was applied to returned letters. The receipt docketing suggests it was subsequently sent by a blockade runner.

The U.S. May 27 suspension order prohibited post offices from forwarding southbound mail to disloyal Southern states. However, northbound mail continued to be sent via Louisville. Through June 6, northbound mails were forwarded to Louisville from Memphis or Nashville. From June 7 through 12, only the Nashville post office forwarded mail to Louisville, and Louisville continued to forward mail north.

With the resignation of W. D. McNish as Nashville's Federal postmaster on June 12 and the withdrawal of the U.S. mail agent from this route, Louisville held the mails still being sent north by the discontinued post office at Nashville. On June 24, Dr. John J. Speed, the postmaster at Louisville, was advised to forward letters from the South to the loyal states after removing postage. With approximately 5,000 such letters accumulating at Louisville by this date, Postmaster Speed employed a more practical means of invalidating postage by creating the "Southn. Letter Unpaid" handstamp.

There are 29 "Southern Letter Unpaid" covers recorded in the *Special Routes* book (No. 25 has been deleted as a fake since publication). The covers without the Louisville datestamp were released from Louisville on June 25. Two covers are recorded from Charleston, both dated June 11 (the other has the Louisville June 26 datestamp).

VERY FINE. A REMARKABLE USE OF THE EXTREMELY RARE "ILLEGAL STAMP" MARKING APPLIED AT NEW ORLEANS. THIS COVER ORIGINATED FROM EX-CONFEDERATE GENERAL WALTER H. STEVENS' WIFE IN VERA CRUZ AFTER THE WAR.

Based on the docketing, this undoubtedly originated from the wife of Confederate General Walter H. Stevens. After the Civil War, Stevens went to Mexico, where he was superintendent and engineer for the Mexican Imperial Railroad, a railroad line planned by Emperor Maximilian I of Mexico to run between Vera Cruz and Mexico City, Mexico. Stevens died of yellow fever at Vera Cruz on November 12, 1867. This was mailed either in December 1866, before he died, or in 1867, shortly after his death. The notation "Politeness of Col. Geo. H. Sweet" refers to Colonel George Henry Sweet, the former Confederate officer who commanded Camp Ford prison camp in Texas and toured Mexico in 1866 after the war.

VERY FINE. AN IMPORTANT ADAMS EXPRESS COMPANY COVER SENT DURING THE TRANSITION FROM THE PRECURSOR PERIOD TO ADVERTISED ACROSS-THE-LINES SERVICE IN MID-JUNE 1861. THIS IS THE ONLY RECORDED EXAMPLE OF CIVIL WAR EXPRESS MAIL DIVERTED TO THE UNITED STATES DEAD LETTER OFFICE

On June 15, 1861, the American Letter Express Co. was the first to advertise its across-the-lines service. On June 22 the Adams Express Co. and M. D. Whiteside advertised their competing express services. Express covers carried across the lines by Adams prior to the first advertisements are evidence that service pre-dated the announced commencement date. These are known as Precursor express covers (see *Special Route*, Chapter 3).

This cover is a remarkable use of Adams across-the-lines service right at the transition from the Precursor period to advertised service. It was mailed from Nashville on June 15 and datestamped by the Nashville post office and by Adams Nashville office on the same day. This is one full week before the June 22 commencement date advertised by Adams. Obviously, Adams was moving letters between Louisville and Nashville earlier than announced in their North-South express ads, and one of the letter enclosures in this cover mentions using Adams due to the interruption of regular mails. Another example from this transitional period is the cover addressed to Louisville with the Adams Vicksburgh, Mississippi, office oval dated June 11 (lot 58 in this sale).

On the cover offered here, the 5c C.S.A. postage was paid in Nashville, but the U.S. 3c entire was considered invalid by the U.S. post office once it entered the mails (at Louisville or possibly further north). At this early date, there must have been some confusion about how to prepay U.S. postage once the letter crossed the lines. In this case, it was determined to be unpaid and sent to the U.S. Dead Letter Office. It was marked "Due 3 cts" and released July 16 (the date of the U.S. Dead Letter Office oval). The *Special Routes* book describes this cover as the only recorded example of an express cover that was diverted to the U.S. Dead Letter office (pages 36-37).

The enclosures in this cover were written by a Mr. E. Holcomb and Ginie Warren (daughter of the addressee, Hannah L. Warren). Holcomb states "If you do not get any further letters from our dear Ginie shortly, don't be uneasy. So much information is sent to our enemies by private letters to friends, falling into the hands of treacherous agents & postmasters, that our government has resolved to stop mails between here & the North altogether, untill we shall have given Lincolns Hessians two or three more whippings..." Ginie, who decided to remain in the South, mentions that "all letters coming from the South are sent to the dead letter office" and informs her mother that "We must take advantage of Adams Express and send them through with an increase of twenty five cents postage on the original three..." In closing Ginie proclaims, "I would rather remain in the South and take the fate of the South... I love my home too, my native state is the dearest spot on earth, but the South is the land of my adoption."

Red oval datestamp lightly inked but clearly struck on 3c Red on Buff Star Die entire (U27), bold strikes of Vicksburgh "Paid" straightline and "10" in circle handstamps, manuscript "Paid 2/- F. N. Hammett (?) PM" over embossed stamp, addressed to J. Watson Barr in Louisville Ky., Barr was a pro-Union abolitionist who later served as a U.S. federal judge

VERY FINE. THE ONLY RECORDED EXAMPLE OF THE ADAMS EXPRESS COMPANY VICKSBURG OFFICE DATESTAMP AND A REMARKABLE SOUTH-TO-NORTH EXPRESS COVER WITH AN ENDORSEMENT OF THE VICKSBURG POSTAL CLERK.

Frank N. Hammett is listed in the 1860 Vicksburg city directory as a clerk in the post office. He later served as a sergeant in the Army of Northern Virginia, 48th Mississippi Regiment, Company G, and was among the officers who surrendered at Appomattox Court House in April 1865. This cover appears to be addressed and endorsed entirely in Hammett's hand, including the "Paid 2/-" (2 bits, or 25c) express rate notation. It is not known if Hammett was employed by the Adams Express Company.

This is the only Adams Vicksburg express office cover recorded in the *Special Routes* census (N-PRE-22). Because it pre-dates the first Adams advertisements for across-the-lines service, it is classified as a Precursor period cover. However, the elements present in this cover — the Adams datestamp, C.S.A. and U.S. postage, and use across the lines from Nashville to Louisville — are no different than any of the covers dated onward from June 15.



This and two other covers are the earliest examples of mail sent from Ligon's Tobacco Warehouse in Richmond, where Union captives from First Manassas were held by Confederates. The three covers are *Special Routes* Census Nos. N-AD-53 (the cover offered here — Richmond Aug. 3, Adams Louisville Aug. 6, Louisville post office Aug. 7), N-AD-55 (letter dated July 24, Richmond date unclear, Adams Louisville and post office Aug. 7), and N-AD-56 (Richmond Aug. 4, Adams Louisville and post office Aug. 7). The three covers were datestamped at the Adams Louisville office on two different days, but placed into the mails on the same day, August 7.

Nashville is one of the few Confederate towns or cities from which Adams Express across-the-lines covers with adhesive Postmasters' Provisional stamps are known (Memphis, Mobile, Nashville and New Orleans). Eight are recorded with the 5c or 10c Nashville adhesive provisional and U.S. stamps used together (a ninth Adams cover has the 10c stamp used alone). Two of the 5c combination covers, as well as the cover offered here, are from the Knowles correspondence to Rhode Island. This cover is interesting, because it was datestamped by the Adams office on July 18, one day prior to the issuance of Postmaster McNish's 5c and 10c provisional stamps. Since the stamps were not yet available, the cover was simply handstamped "Postage Paid."

As this letter shows, Adams would affix U.S. stamps at Louisville before placing them into the U.S. post office. In this case, the stamps were postmarked at Louisville, but on arrival in New York they were not recognized, and the letter was marked 6c postage due. The writer mentions an enclosure to be forwarded to Havana, which explains the double rate for weight.

The *Special Routes* census lists three across-the-lines express covers with the 12c 1859 Issue. Two are quadruple 3c rates with a single 12c stamp (N-AD-17 and N-AD-32). The third is addressed to France with the 12c used with other 1857 Issue values (N-AD-65), which realized \$185,000 hammer in our Sale 981 (lot 4123).

The cover has been torn in half down the center and through the 3c pair. In addition, much of the bottom stamp of the 3c pair was torn off, apparently to reveal the "10" rate handstamp. For the purpose of improving its appearance, document repair tape has been used to seal the tear, and the back of the cover bearing the Harndens label has been folded up for display. Considering that this extraordinary express cover is the only recorded example of its kind, collectors are advised to overlook the condition factors.

Adams Express Company retained the Harnden name at certain offices in Georgia, because of the Harnden firm's reputation there. The Harnden oval handstamps used at Macon and Savannah are very rare. This cover was evidently sent by Adams (Harnden) messenger from Americus, Georgia, to the office at Louisville. As required by regulations, Confederate postage was prepaid. The Adams office at Louisville correctly applied new stamps — it is not clear why the letter was re-rated 6c rather than 3c — and they put it into the regular Federal mails for New York City.

EXTREMELY FINE. THE FINEST OF ONLY SEVEN RECORDED EXAMPLES OF THE ADAMS BALTIMORE OFFICE DATESTAMP, OF WHICH THREE WERE DATESTAMPED AT THE ADAMS OFFICE IN AUGUSTA. A WONDERFUL COMBINATION OF MARKINGS.

The cover offered here is an early and rare example of routing through Augusta with the Augusta office's oval datestamp used in conjunction with the Baltimore origin marking. Only three such covers are recorded in the *Special Routes* book (Census Nos. S-AD-13, 16 and 20). Notations on Adams covers from Baltimore, such as the "Signatures enclosed" on this cover, are believed to indicate a form of censorship on mail from this city where there was strong pro-secession sentiment.

The *Special Routes* census lists three across-the-lines covers from Boston (Nos. S-AD-18, 54 and 66). This fourth cover from the Antrim collection was apparently acquired by Dr. Brandon through private treaty and was not recorded in the *Special Routes* census. It is unusual in that there are no markings applied at Louisville or Nashville. An earlier Adams Boston office cover, dated July 6 and addressed to Greenwood Tenn., entered the C.S.A. mails at Memphis. Later covers (August 2 and 9) entered the mails at Nashville. This cover, dated July 11, was apparently carried by Adams to Richmond and never entered the C.S.A. mails, which explains the absence of C.S.A. postage. The Adams ads in northern newspapers stated that letters had to be enclosed in 3c stamped envelopes, and the rate was 35c, which included Confederate postage.

Only a few covers are recorded with this combination of Adams office markings. This cover was sent during the early period when Adams southbound mail was not postmarked at Louisville or Nashville. In this case, it was carried in the Adams network to Augusta and entered the C.S.A. mails there.

The Adams New York oval handstamp is extremely rare, and collectors should be aware that a number of clever fakes were handled by John A. Fox, which have only recently been properly identified. Genuine strikes are much rarer than the auction record would indicate.

The American Letter Express Company advertised its across-the-lines mail service with a basic rate of 15c. Their instructions stated: "Enclosing 15 cents in money. This prepays all expenses to its destination. The rates here given are for letters not exceeding half ounce in weight... Do not use U.S. stamps or stamped envelopes, they are valueless when coming from the Confederate States."

Evidently some letters were received without the requisite prepayment, and these were delivered to the recipient postage due. Only two examples of the postage due label prepared by American Letter Express are recorded in the *Special Routes* book — this cover and one addressed to France. They were both postmarked at Louisville on August 15 (the book mis-dates this cover as August 16). It is possible that the label was only used on one batch of mail forwarded from Nashville and was thereafter discontinued as impractical.

But he joined the Confederate Army in May 1861 and sold the paper to C. R. Hanleiter and George W. Adair, who merged it with their Gate City Guardian, keeping the new name. By the time the paper stopped publication in 1864, Hanleiter had been replaced by J. Henley Smith (source: Wikipedia).



The Hanging Lincoln design is widely recognized as the most distinctive of all Civil War patriotics. In this extraordinary cartoon, President Lincoln is hanging upside down from a tree limb, with his symbolic axe and fence rail tied around his neck. The caption reads "Abe Lincoln the destroyer. He once split Rails. Now he has split the Union." To the left and right is the caption "The penalty of disregarding the constitution. Impeached, deposed, Tried and convicted" (there is a spelling correction from "diposed" to "deposed"). Standing beside Lincoln is a mustachioed Winfield Scott, labeled "Old Fuss n Feathers", dropping his sword and exclaiming "My glory is gone for ever." On the ground is the Union flag, captioned "The stars and stripes lie in the dust, Never to rise." A star at left has the caption "The southern star is rising" and the Confederate 11-star flag towers above with the caption "The stars and bars shall for ever wave triumphant." Along the bottom is the imprint "Copyright claimed. HM & WC Box 417 Nashville Tenn." Despite continuing investigation, we have been unable to uncover the identify of the publishers "HM & WC."

In June 1861 he retired from politics.







John Anthony Quitman was born in Rhinebeck N.Y., settled in Mississippi and became active in politics. As president of the Mississippi State Senate he filled in as governor for just over a month. He distinguished himself in the Mexican-American War, where he turned down Sam Houston's offer to make him his second in command. He was appointed the rank of Brigadier General of Volunteers and then Major General in the regular army. After the fall of Mexico City, General Scott named Quitman military governor of Mexico City for the remainder of the occupation. He was elected governor of Mississippi in 1850, but resigned to defend himself against violations of neutrality laws for his support of Narciso Lopez's failed expedition to liberate Cuba. He was also an early fire-eater, who advocated secession starting in the 1850's.

According to the *Dictionary of American Naval Fighting Ships*, the *General Quitman* is believed to have been built at New Albany, Ind. in 1859 for a New Orleans ship owner. It was "one of the best and most powerful boats on the river" in 1862 and one of the last to escape from the city on April 24, evacuating upriver "a good many ladies, some officers, and some ordnance stores." The *General Quitman* continued to serve the Confederate Army as a troop and supply ship on the western rivers until war's end. It passed to private ownership and sank at New Texas Landing, near Morganza, La., on October 23, 1868.





According to the Emory University website, the Georgia State Assembly granted a charter for Atlanta Medical College in 1854, and classes started the following year. The first building was erected in 1859 on the site now occupied by Grady Memorial Hospital. Following a series of mergers, in 1915 the school became Emory University School of Medicine.

The sender of this cover (Thomas S. Powell, according to the docketing) was hired in 1857 as professor of obstetrics and he soon criticized some of the business practices of the newly-founded school. He was instrumental in obtaining \$5,000 in donations from the city in 1866, but was released from the faculty soon after when he complained that none of the funds were earmarked for charity. He went on to found Southern Medical College in Atlanta, which eventually merged with Atlanta Medical College.

The absence of a mail-registration system in the Confederacy made it necessary to use express companies to transmit valuable letters. Postage was required on all express letters, but the Act of April 1862 changed the law from allowing adhesive stamps to requiring stamped envelopes, which of course the government did not provide. The calculated effect of this regulation was a ban on private express mail, but surviving covers show that the companies continued to carry letters.

This cover is remarkable because the scarce 10c Rose Lithograph is used, and it is date-stamped on July 1, 1862, the first day of the new 10c rate, which the stamp prepays. This cover was carried on the Georgia Railroad between Augusta and Atlanta, entirely outside of the Confederate postal system.

Two have 10c Hoyer & Ludwig stamps (Dec. 18 and 22 express datestamps), one has the Montgomery postmaster's handstamped provisional (Oct. 25), and the other two have 5c Green Lithograph stamps (Nov. 29 without the smaller circle and Dec. 12 — the cover offered here). The presence of post office markings on these covers, including datestamps dated the day *before* the Southern Express datestamp, indicates that the Southern Express agent (D. H. Brooks) made arrangements with the post office to carry mail after it had been properly prepaid and postmarked.





The destination, Monroe (Walton County), lies about 40 miles northeast of Lithonia (De Kalb County). Lithonia was situated on the Georgia Railroad, between Augusta and Atlanta, and had a population of about 250 residents at the beginning of the war.

Other than this cover, which was discovered before 1925 and appears to be genuine, there is no evidence or record of the existence of a company called White's Southern Express. It was either a small one-man express enterprise or someone named White was handling mail for the Southern Express Company on the Georgia Railroad route. The Act of April 1862, effective June 1, prohibited private express companies from carrying letters unless they were enclosed in stamped envelopes (not adhesive, but actual printed envelopes), but of course the government never supplied envelopes. The apparent intent was to stop express companies from carrying mail, but they continued to do so despite the ban, as evidenced by surviving covers.





This cover was postmarked on August 29, 1864, at Shreveport, Louisiana, the location of the Confederate States Trans-Mississippi Department. It is dated about three months after the Union's Red River Campaign (March 10-May 22, 1864) against the Confederate forces along the Red River in Louisiana. The campaign was a dismal failure for the Federal army, and the outcome basically ended the military career of Major General Nathaniel P. Banks.

At this point in the war, eastbound Trans-Mississippi mail had to cross via *ad hoc* secondary routes further south near Simmsport and Red River Landing. The unusual combination of stamps on this cover and the presence of pen cancels on the 5c Lithographs, but not the 10c Engraved stamps, suggests that it was brought to the Shreveport post office with only 10c postage (the two 5c stamps), and the additional 30c postage (three 10c stamps) was applied there to make up the required 40c rate for government express service across the river. Further supporting this theory is the presence of writing (in a different hand than address) under the 10c pair, which we cannot read but probably indicates the need for additional postage. Thus, this is probably a "held for postage" cover, with the stamps applied at two different points in time.

VERY FINE PIECE. AN EXTRAORDINARY CONFEDERATE FRANKING WITH FOUR HALVES OF TWO BISECTED 20-CENT GENERAL ISSUE STAMPS PAYING THE 40-CENT TRANS-MISSISSIPPI EXPRESS RATE.

The writing of the sender's route directive very closely matches the writing on a cover from the Dr. Starr correspondence, which was sent from Tyler, Texas (Siegel Sale 1016, lot 579). The logical explanation for this cover is that the sender prepared bisects for the prevailing 10c rate, but used four of them to pay the 40c Trans-Mississippi Express rate on this piece of mail.

VERY FINE. AN EXTREMELY RARE AND UNUSUAL TRANS-MISSISSIPPI EXPRESS COVER ADDRESSED TO A CONFEDERATE MILITARY INSTALLATION IN ARKANSAS.

At the time this cover was mailed, the addressee, Charles Wetmore Broadfoot (1842-1919), was a 1st lieutenant and aide-de-camp on General Theophilus H. Holmes's staff at Camp Bragg in Arkansas. In 1864 he was promoted to lieutenant-colonel with the 70th Regiment, First N.C. Junior Reserves. Although the month is difficult to read in the datestamp, the "1863" year is clear, and this is an early example of the government's 40c Trans-Mississippi Express rate, which commenced in October 1863.

VERY FINE. A REMARKABLE CONFEDERATE TRANS-MISSISSIPPI EXPRESS COVER SENT BY AN OFFICER IN THE ARMY OF TENNESSEE, USING A CAPTURED UNION PATRIOTIC ENVELOPE.

The 6th Texas Infantry, known as the "Matagorda Coast Guards," was mustered into service in 1861 and served throughout the entire war. In January 1863 the 6th Texas fought in the battle of Arkansas Post (or Fort Hindman), where a large number of its members were captured, including Lieut. Holt (he was exchanged six months later). The 6th Texas was reorganized in July 1863 and transferred to the Army of Tennessee.

Another cover from Lieut. Holt — an identical Liberty and Flag captured envelope, prepaid 40c for Trans-Mississippi Express service — was mailed by him at the time of the Battle of Chickamauga, in November 1863, to his mother in Matagorda (ex Everett, Siegel Sale 754, lot 450). After the battle most of the troops involved retreated to the area around Dalton, Georgia, and spent the winter there. This cover was sent from Georgia by Lieut. Holt in early March 1864. The pair of 20c stamps is the only indication of postage on the cover, but because the datestamp does not tie the stamps and seems to be a Charlotte N.C. marking, we must offer this "as is", with no assurance that the stamps originated on the cover.

Edward H. Cushing, publisher of the *Houston Daily Telegraph*, commenced his express service after New Orleans fell to Federal forces in April 1862. In an effort to improve communications between Texas regiments in the East and their relations at home, as well as secure safe lines for news transmission, Cushing established routes with pony riders and other means of conveyance necessary to cross the Federal lines. Cushing's agents affixed labels to the backs of envelopes carried by express. These were intended to inform patrons and advertise the service. Approximately 20 examples (of all varieties) are believed to exist. This type is much rarer than the larger labels.

Arthur H. Edey enlisted as a Private in Co. A, 5th Regiment, Texas Infantry, on July 19, 1861, at Houston. He was detailed as agent for the regiment in Richmond on Feb. 7, 1862, and in that capacity provided mail service between members of the regiment serving east of the Mississippi and their correspondents back home. The earliest of the eight recorded Edey's Express covers is dated June 1862, and the latest is October 1862. Edey was wounded and captured at Gettysburg on July 2, 1863, and sent to Fort Wood, New York Harbor. He was paroled on April 15, 1865.

THE BACKS. EDEY'S EXPRESS OPERATED BRIEFLY FROM JUNE UNTIL LATE OCTOBER 1862.

This cover was sent by Tacitus T. Clay, who was promoted to captain in the 5th Texas Regiment in October 1861 and served as acting lieutenant-colonel and colonel at various times during 1863 and 1864. Clay was wounded at Gaines' Mill, the Wilderness, and Darbytown Road — as a result of his injuries at Darbytown, Clay's leg was amputated. E. 2,000-3,000

VERY FINE. THIS IS ONE OF FOUR RECORDED COVERS CARRIED BY ONE OF THE ARKANSAS EXPRESSES, AND IT IS THE ONLY COVER WITH PROOF OF HANDLING BY BARKSDALE'S EXPRESS.

This cover was the subject of an article by Francis J. Crown Jr. ("A New Private Express Cover", *Confederate Philatelist*, Jul-Sep. 2007, No. 354). We will draw on that article for this catalogue entry.

The sender, Capt. Alexander E. Spence, served in Company B (Clark County Volunteers), 1st Arkansas Infantry. Spence was promoted to captain on January 20, 1863. The expressman, J. M. Barksdale, was enlisted on Aug. 4, 1861, at Crane Creek, Missouri, and served in Company H, 2nd Arkansas Mounted Rifles. He was wounded on Mar. 7, 1862, at Elk Horn Ark and discharged on Dec. 17, 1862.

The following is an excerpt from Mark Christ's book *Getting Used to Being Shot At: The Spence Family Civil War Letters*: "Noted Arkansas jurist Uriah M. Rose, on a trip to Richmond in his capacity as the official historiographer of the state's Confederate government, met Barksdale. He described the courier thus: 'I had for a companion during my journey across the Mississippi River a most worthy and agreeable person, whose name was Barksdale; a resident of the State of Mississippi, a private enlisted in the Southern Army, then detailed to carry letters back and forth across the Mississippi River for officers and soldiers in the field. He was a very excellent and a very sensible person, and had a perfect knowledge of every foot of the way. Every one was glad to see him coming, as they expected to receive letters by him from their friends and relatives who were in daily peril of their lives, or from loved ones at home. Every one on the road knew him, and, so kind and obliging was he in disposition, that everyone seemed to be his friend. He was probably thirty-five years old, was not highly educated, but had a sound judgment about men and things, joined with simple and agreeable manners."

The Barksdale Express began operating no later than the summer of 1863 and was still carrying mail in late 1864. Barksdale carried mail from Arkansas soldiers in Reynolds' Arkansas Brigade to Washington, Arkansas, where they were posted in the Confederate mail. The express charge for a letter to Arkansas (westbound) was \$1.00, as noted on the cover offered here. Mail from Arkansas to the soldiers (eastbound) was apparently carried free.

ONLY FOUR COVERS ARE KNOWN THAT WERE CARRIED BY ONE OF THE ARKANSAS EXPRESS OPERATIONS ACROSS THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER. THIS IS THE ONLY ONE WITH A BLACK'S EXPRESS ENDORSEMENT.

Elias W. Black was a soldier in the 4th Arkansas Regiment who was discharged for disability in June 1862. He operated an express between Arkansas and McNair's Arkansas Brigade of the Army of Tennessee. He charged \$1.00 on letters to Arkansas, but return letters were apparently free. He carried his westbound letters to Washington, Arkansas, where he sent them onward in the Confederate mails. Return letters to the Brigade were sent under cover to his attention at Hampton, Arkansas (see Stefan T. Jaronski, "Another Private Trans-Mississippi Express Service Uncovered", *Confederate Philatelist*, No. 241). Certain covers from the Spence correspondence previously thought to have been carried by E. W. Black are now attributed to Barksdale's Express (see lot 553).

Less than five covers carried by Sturdivant are reported, all of which travelled westward across the Mississippi River into Texas. The sender, Sgt. J. S. Foscue, joined the 7th Texas Infantry on Oct. 1, 1861, at Marshall, Texas.

VERY FINE. EXTREMELY RARE EXAMPLE OF MAIL SMUGGLED FROM UNION-OCCUPIED NEW ORLEANS.

After New Orleans surrendered to Federal forces in April 1862 and with Maj. Gen. Butler's ever-tightening grip on the city, various routes and means were used to carry mail from New Orleans residents to correspondents in the Confederacy, although such communication was a criminal act. In May 1863, Gen. Nathaniel P. Banks, Butler's successor, ordered the deportation of all registered enemies of the United States residing in New Orleans (primarily those who refused to take the oath of allegiance). More than 700 families were forced to leave under miserable conditions. On May 31, 1863, the Louisiana Relief Committee was organized to provide food, shelter and medicine to the mass of refugees. Another of its functions was to maintain a covert mail route between New Orleans and Mobile. The cover offered here was probably carried out of New Orleans in mid-June 1863, during the mass deportation, but before the Louisiana Relief Committee route was formally established.

A FINE AND EXTREMELY RARE EXAMPLE OF MAIL SMUGGLED OUT OF NEW ORLEANS JUST ONE MONTH AFTER UNION FORCES CAPTURED THE CITY. ESPECIALLY DESIRABLE WITH THE MIXED-ISSUE FRANKING.

Examples of mail carried clandestinely to and from New Orleans after the occupation by Union forces in April 1862 are extremely rare. This cover pre-dates the formation of the Louisiana Relief Committee one year later. E. 2,000-3,000

VERY FINE APPEARANCE. A RARE LOUISIANA RELIEF COMMITTEE COVER FROM A CONFEDERATE PRISONER HELD AT RAMPART STREET PRISON IN OCCUPIED NEW ORLEANS TO PRATTVILLE, ALABAMA, VIA MOBILE. FROM THE PRATT PRISONER-OF-WAR CORRESPONDENCE.

The Louisiana Relief Committee was formed on May 31, 1863, by a group of expatriate New Orleans citizens in Mobile, Alabama, to alleviate the suffering of poor citizens who remained in U.S.-occupied New Orleans. With the tacit concurrence of Federal authorities in New Orleans, they arranged shipments of food and clothing to New Orleans and helped citizens leave New Orleans for the Confederate States. These "Louisiana Relief Committee at Mobile" trips between Mobile and New Orleans via Pascagoula ran along the Mississippi Sound and carried letters which were not sanctioned by the U.S. authorities. Jules C. Denis, C.S.A. provost marshal at Mobile, examined the southbound letters. The U.S. also used these trips to transmit flag-of-truce mail to and from prisoners in New Orleans.

Lieut. Merrill E. Pratt was captured at Port Hudson on July 7, 1863, and sent to Rampart Street prison before being transferred to Johnson's Island. This was mailed by him from prison in August-September 1863.


FINE APPEARANCE. THE ONLY RECORDED EXAMPLE OF MAIL THAT CIRCUMVENTED THE UNION BLOCKADE AND WAS CARRIED BY THE SOUTH-WESTERN EXPRESS COMPANY OVER THE TRANS-RIO GRANDE ROUTE. THIS REMARKABLE COVER TRAVELED FROM ENGLAND TO CONFEDERATE NORTH CAROLINA VIA ST. THOMAS, HAVANA AND TAMPICO.

The formation of the South-Western Express Company occurred shortly before it was announced in the November 24, 1860, edition of the *Houston Tri-Weeky Telegraph*. This notice describes the firm as the successor to Jones' Express. With its main offices in New Orleans and Galveston, the South-Western Express Company provided freight, package and mail express service between Texas and Louisiana, with advertised connections to other places through Adams Express Company and the Southern Express Company. Various names are listed in the ads, including J. J. McKeever, the New Orleans-based agent for Adams Express and the Southern Express Company.

On November 11, 1861, the South-Western Express Company announced, "In consequence of the blockade, and the discontinuance of mail communication with foreign countries, [the firm had] taken the necessary measures for extending its lines to Tampico, for the purpose of conveying mail matter destined for all parts of the world. The first Special Messenger will leave New Orleans Tuesday the 26th inst., at 7 o'clock, A.M." This trans-Rio Grande route was the one already used by Antonio Costa's express. Both companies took advantage of Royal Mail Steam Packet ships to circumvent the Union blockade by bringing mail to and from Mexico. In evidence of the South-Western Express Company's service is this sole-recorded example of mail that was definitely carried by them, bearing the circular datestamp applied on arrival at New Orleans.

According to the docketing, this folded cover originated on November 30 from the Liverpool-based firm of MacLean, Maris & Company, shipping and commercial agents for the firm of T. C. and B. G. Worth in Wilmington. The route directive "West India Steamer" indicates that it was sent by Royal Mail Steam Packet line. The RMSP Seine departed from Southampton on December 2, 1861, and arrived in St. Thomas on December 17. On the same day it was carried on the RMSP Clyde, which arrived in Havana on December 22, Vera Cruz on December 26 and Tampico on December 29. Based on the route described in the South-Western Express Company notices, this would have been carried from Tampico to New Orleans. The overland trip should have taken about two weeks, arriving in mid-January.

This cover is addressed to William S. Glass, who came to Texas around 1845 and became a resident of Victoria, where he remained the rest of his life. Glass, a lawyer, was appointed a receiver for the Confederate government during the Civil War, in charge of the disposal of confiscated property. This cover was probably used by the South-Western Express Company to forward a letter addressed to Glass at Victoria. We are unable to determine the year of mailing.

VERY FINE. A RARE EXAMPLE OF TRANS-RIO GRANDE MAIL CARRIED FROM MEXICO TO CONFEDERATE NEW ORLEANS VIA TEXAS AND ACROSS BERWICK'S BAY. EXTREMELY UNUSUAL WITH THE MANUSCRIPT ROUTE DIRECTIVE.

This July 1861 cover is an early example of mail carried across the Rio Grande from Matamoros to Brownsville, which entered the C.S.A. postal system and was transported to New Orleans. The route indicated on the cover, "via Berwick's Bay", was the well-established "Texas and New Orleans Great Southwestern Passenger Route" across the Atchafalaya River via Berwick City and Brashear (later renamed Morgan City). This is the only trans-Rio Grande cover we have seen with this directive (a later cover from this correspondence has a "via Corpus" directive).

VERY FINE. AN OUTSTANDING BLOCKADE-RUN COVER AND ONE OF THE FEW KNOWN WITH UNITED STATES STAMPS.

This cover is not listed in the *Special Routes* census. There were a number of blockade runners that arrived in Nassau before the June 7 departure of the Cunarder *Corsica* for New York. This cover was received by the firm of Jervey & Mueller in Nassau and prepaid 8 pence for British mail. The 3c 1861 pair was presumably affixed by them, but 6c U.S. postage was insufficient for the standard 10c steamship rate. The 20c double rate was assessed, and after crediting 6c for the stamps, the cover was marked "Due 14" cents.

This may reach you if the bearer, one of our Steamers, gets safely through the Blockading fleet...", the cover did indeed successfully run the blockade on the Alabama from Mobile, it was carried from Havana to New York where it entered the mails with "Steamship 10" circular 10c due handstamp, small "Received Boston Jul. 28" (1863) carrier department datestamp, light fold in cover at right, slightly reduced at bottom, letter with hinge-reinforced folds

VERY FINE. AN EXTREMELY RARE OUTBOUND BLOCKADE-RUN COVER FROM MOBILE, ALABAMA, TO BOSTON VIA HAVANA AND NEW YORK. OUTBOUND COVERS WITH LETTER CONTENT REFERRING TO THE BLOCKADE-RUNNING ATTEMPT ARE MOST UNUSUAL AND DESIRABLE.

The *New York Times* Marine Intelligence report published July 27, 1863, includes the arrival on Sunday, July 26, of "Bark Jessie Nichols, Nichols, Havana 11 ds., with sugar, etc., to R.P. Buck & Co." It seems likely this is the ship that brought this letter from Havana to New York, since the Boston carrier datestamp confirms arrival on July 28. The *Special Routes* census lists 15 outbound covers via Havana, and we are aware of one additional cover.

Mixed-franking U.S.-Confederate States covers are rare and highly sought after by collectors. As a mixed franking on a civilian flag-of-truce cover, during the short window that some were allowed to use the Norfolk-Old Point Comfort route, this is an extremely important artifact of postal history. Shortly after this cover was mailed, civilian flag-of-truce mail sent North was diverted to the U.S. Dead Letter Office, per U.S. General Order No. 7. This order followed an announcement in the January 1862 U.S. Mail & Post Office Assistant that stated, "The facilities afforded by sending letters to the rebel states under a flag-of-truce are not intended, and cannot be permitted, to cover general correspondence."

This southbound flag-of-truce letter was exchanged on the C.S.A. side at Norfolk, before U.S. forces captured the city in May 1862. Flag-of-truce covers via Norfolk are very scarce, and only a few have evidence of Confederate postage paid by coins. Based on the letter writer's statement and the appearance of the cover, this was apparently part of a group sent from Washington D.C. inside another envelope, and the U.S. 3c 1861 stamp escaped cancellation in the U.S. postal system. When the letter reached Norfolk, the datestamp was applied over the U.S. stamp.

His story contains a riveting series of prison escapes including vaulting over and digging under fences, night travel, recapture and re-confinement — with stays at Camp Ford, Camp Gross Tex. (escaped), Hempstead Tex. (escaped), Camp Boggs and finally back to Camp Ford. In addition to a rare Shreveport-New Orleans route flag-of-truce cover, this is the only recorded cover from Camp Boggs.

Federal defeats in Texas in 1863 left a large number of Union prisoners in the Houston area. The only Union forces near the Confederate prisons in this area were the naval ships blockading Galveston harbor. To facilitate the exchange of released prisoners and mail, a flag-of-truce route developed between Confederate controlled Galveston and offshore U.S. naval ships of the West Gulf Blockading Squadron (*Special Routes* p. 82).

Surviving prisoner-of-war covers from the Houston prison are extremely rare. The Harrison book records only three and outside of that group there are probably no more than a handful others...... E. 3,000-4,000

Lt. Col. Rawley White Martin Correspondence

Lt. Col. Rawley White Martin of the 53rd Virginia Volunteers (Armistead's Brigade) was wounded during Pickett's Charge at Gettysburg and was by certain accounts the first man over the wall during that climactic battle. After three months at the field hospital at Gettysburg he was transferred to Fort McHenry in Baltimore and then to Point Lookout before he was exchanged in May 1864. He survived and lived nearly another 50 years.


