



Information for Bidders

Bidding

The following means are available for placing bids:

- 1) Attending the Live Auction in Person: All bidders must register for a paddle, and new bidders must provide references at least three business days in advance of the sale.
- **2) Live Internet Bidding:** Instructions for participating as a Live Internet Bidder are provided on the page opposite.
- **3) Phone Bidding:** Bidders can be connected to the sale by phone and bid through a member of staff. Requests for phone bidding are subject to approval (please contact our office at least 24 hours before the sale). A signed Bid Form is required.
- 4) Absentee Bids. All bids received in advance of the sale, either by mail, fax, phone, e-mail or internet, are Absentee Bids, which instruct the auctioneer to bid up to a specific amount on one or more lots in the sale. Absentee Bids sent by phone, fax or email should arrive at least one hour prior to the start of the sale session. Bids entered through Live Internet Bidding will be visible to the auctioneer during the sale. Written bids should be entered legibly on the Bid Form in the sale catalogue. Email and internet bids should be carefully typed and double-checked. All new bidders must provide references. We recommend calling or e-mailing to confirm that Absentee Bids sent by mail, fax or email have been received and entered.

Pre-Sale Viewing

Subject to availability, certain lots (except group lots) can be sent to known clients for examination. Requests must be made no later than 7 days prior to the sale. Lots must be returned on the day received. Postage/insurance costs will be invoiced.

In addition to regular viewing, clients may view lots by appointment. Our staff will be pleased to answer questions or provide additional information about lots.

Expert Certification

Individual items offered without certificate dated within the past five years may be purchased subject to independent certification of genuineness and our description. Please refer to the Conditions of Sale and Grading Terms for policies governing certification.

Live Internet Bidding is managed by Stamp Auction Network (SAN).

To bid, you must be registered and approved by both SAN and Siegel.

To decide what you need to do, choose the description below that best fits you.

Go to stampauctionnetwork.com/siegel and click on "Register" at the top. Check the box for Robert A. Siegel Auction Galleries (under "R") and submit the form, indicating you are a Siegel client. Once registered at SAN, you're ready for internet bidding.

I've bid through SAN before, but this is the first time I've bid in a Siegel sale

Then you just need to be approved by Siegel. Go to stampauctionnetwork.com/siegel and click on "Update Registration" at the top. Your SAN account information will be sent to us for approval (you might be asked for other trade references). Once approved by Siegel for bidding, you're ready for internet bidding.

I've never bid with Siegel, nor registered with SAN

Go to stampauctionnetwork.com/siegel and click on "Register" at the top. Check the box for Robert A. Siegel Auction Galleries (under "R") and submit the form with your trade references (please, no family members or credit card companies as references). Once registered at SAN and approved by Siegel for bidding, you're ready for internet bidding.

Live Internet Bidding works by allowing registered bidders to observe and place bids.

Live Internet Bidding will work with any browser on both PC and Mac operating systems.

Before bidding by internet for the first time, we recommend finding a sale in progress and listening to the public broadcast or logging in as a registered bidder. This will help you develop a feel for the sale tempo and bidding interface.

Log on to the auction at stampauctionnetwork.com

When you're logged on as a Live Internet Bidder, the bidding interface shows a photo and description of the lot, the current bid (and your bidding status), options for placing competitive bids and buttons with bid increments.

- After you click on a bid amount, the auctioneer is immediately notified of your bid.
- Retracting a bid is usually not acceptable, so please bid carefully.
- If you bid and then decide to stop, the "Pass" button will tell the auctioneer you are no longer bidding.
- You can send messages to the auctioneer (for example, a request for extension).

Conditions of Sale (please read carefully before bidding)

THE PROPERTY IN THIS CATALOGUE WILL BE OFFERED AT PUBLIC AUCTION BY ROBERT A. SIEGEL AUCTION GALLERIES, INC. ("GALLERIES") ON BEHALF OF VARIOUS CONSIGNORS AND ITSELF OR AFFILIATED COMPANIES. BY BIDDING ON ANY LOT, WHETHER DIRECTLY OR THROUGH A THIRD PARTY, IN PERSON, BY TELEPHONE, FACSIMILE, INTERNET OR BY ANY OTHER MEANS, THE BIDDER ACKNOWLEDGES AND AGREES TO ALL OF THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS OF SALE.

- 1. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. The term "final bid" means the last bid acknowledged by the auctioneer, which is normally the highest bid offered. The purchase price payable by the buyer will be the sum of the final bid and a commission of 18% of the final bid ("buyer's premium"), together with any sales tax, use tax or customs duties due on the sale.
- 2. The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid, to advance the bidding at his discretion and, in the event of a dispute, to determine the successful bidder, to continue the bidding or to reoffer and resell the lot in dispute. The Galleries' record of the final sale shall be conclusive.
- 3. All bids are per numbered lot in the catalogue unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to group two or more lots, to withdraw any lot or lots from the sale, or to act on behalf of the seller. The Galleries will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for the failure to execute such bids or for any errors in the execution of such bids.
- 4. Lots with numbers followed by the symbol ° are offered subject to a confidential minimum bid ("reserve"), below which the lot will not be sold. The absence of the symbol ° means that the lot is offered without a reserve. If there is no reserve, the auctioneer has sole discretion to establish a minimum opening bid and may refuse an offer of less than half of the published estimate. Any lot that does not reach its reserve or opening bid requested by the auctioneer will be announced as "passed" and excluded from the prices realized lists after the sale. The Galleries may have a direct or indirect ownership interest in any or all lots in the sale resulting from an advance of monies or goods-in-trade or a guarantee of minimum net proceeds made by the Galleries to the seller.
- 5. Subject to the exclusions listed in 5(A), the Galleries will accept the return of lots which, subject to the Galleries' sole judgment, have been misidentified or which have obvious faults that were present when the lot was in the Galleries' custody, but not so noted in the lot description. All disputed lots must be received by the Galleries intact with the original packing material within 5 days of delivery to the buyer but no later than 30 days from the sale date. (5A) EXCLUSIONS: The following lots may not be returned for any reason, or may not be returned for the reasons stated: (i) lots containing 5 or more items; (ii) lots from buyers who registered for the pre-sale exhibition or received lots by postal viewing, thereby having had the opportunity to inspect them before the sale; (iii) any lot described with "faults," "defects" or a specific fault may not be returned because of any secondary fault; (iv) photographed lots may not be returned because of centering, margins, short/nibbed perforations or other factors shown in the photos; (v) the color of the item does not match the color photo in the sale catalogue or website listing; (vi) the description contains inaccurate information about the quantity known or reported; or (vii) a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description or on an accompanying certificate.
- 6. Successful bidders, unless they have established credit with the Galleries prior to the sale, must make full payment in cleared funds before the lots will be delivered. Buyers not known to the Galleries must make payment in full within 3 days from the date of sale. The Galleries retains the right to demand a cash deposit from anyone prior to bidder registration and/or to demand payment at the time the lot is knocked down, for any reason whatsoever. In the event that any buyer refuses or fails to make payment in cash for any lot at the time it is knocked down to him, the auctioneer reserves the right to reoffer the lot immediately for sale to the highest bidder. Credit cards (Visa, Mastercard and Discover only) can be accepted as payment, but will be subject to a 3% non-refundable Convenience Fee, which will be added to the total of the entire invoice (including hammer price, buyer's premium, shipping and transit insurance charges and any applicable taxes). The buyer waives the right to dispute all credit card charges.

- 7. If the purchase price has not been paid within the time limit specified above, nor lots taken up within 7 days from the date of sale, the lots may be resold by whatever means deemed appropriate by the Galleries, and any loss incurred from resale will be charged to the defaulting buyer, and/or the Galleries may seek any other remedy prescribed by law to enforce payment. Any account more than 30 days in arrears will be subject to a late payment charge of 1½% per month as long as the account remains in arrears. Any expenses incurred in securing payment from delinquent accounts will be charged to the defaulter. A fee of \$250.00 will be charged for a check returned for insufficient funds
- 8. All lots are sold as genuine. Any lot accompanied by a certificate issued by The Philatelic Foundation, British Philatelic Association, Royal Philatelic Society of London or any other authority recognized by the A.I.E.P. in a specific area of expertise, and dated within 5 years of the sale date, is sold "as is" and in accordance with the description on the certificate. Such lots may not be returned for any reason, including but not limited to a contrary certificate of opinion. Buyers who wish to obtain a certificate for any item that does not have a certificate (dated as above) may do so, provided that the following conditions are met: (i) the purchase price must be paid in full, (ii) the item must be submitted to an acceptable expertizing committee with a properly executed application form within 21 days of the sale, (iii) a copy of the application form must be given to the Galleries, (iv) the Galleries retains the right to resubmit the item for reconsideration, without time limit or other restrictions, for the purpose of obtaining a satisfactory opinion, (v) lots submitted for certification will be considered cleared 90 days from the date of sale, whether or not a certificate has been issued, unless the Galleries issues written approval of a further extension of return privileges, and (vi) in the event the lot is determined to be misidentified or misdescribed, pursuant to 5 and 5(A) of these Conditions, the Galleries will issue a refund to the buyer for the full purchase price and actual certification fees up to \$800.00, but the reimbursement for certificate fees (and related costs) shall not exceed 10% of the hammer price of the lot. 9. Until paid for in full, all lots remain the property of the Galleries on behalf of the seller.
- 10. Agents executing bids on behalf of clients may also be held responsible for all purchases made on behalf of clients, unless otherwise arranged prior to the sale.
- 11. The buyer assumes all risk for delivery of purchased lots and agrees to pay for prescribed shipping costs. Buyers who receive lots in the U.S. are obligated to pay whatever sales tax or compensating use tax might be due, at any time, and buyers outside the U.S. are responsible for all customs duties.

The bidder consents that any action or proceeding against it may be commenced and maintained in any court within the State of New York or in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, that the courts of the State of New York and United States District Court for the Southern District of New York shall have jurisdiction with respect to the subject matter hereof and the person of the bidder. The bidder agrees that any action brought by the bidder shall be commenced and maintained only in a Federal Court in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York or the State Court in the county in which Galleries has its principal place of business in New York. The bidder agrees not to use a public conflict resolution service and not to use any form of social media to publish comments or information about the Galleries and its employees which might harm the Galleries' reputation or business. Grades, Abbreviations and Values Used in Descriptions

Grades and Centering

Our descriptions contain detailed information and observations about each item's condition. We have also assigned grades to stamps and covers, which reflect our subjective assessment. For stamps, the margin width, centering and gum are described and graded according to generally-accepted standards (an approximate correlation to numeric grades is provided at right). Although we believe our grades are accurate, they are not always exactly aligned with third-party grading terms or standards for all issues. A lot may not be returned because a certification service grades a

A lot may not be returned because a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description. Information from the P.S.E. Stamp Market Quarterly and P.S.E. Population ReportSM is the most current available, but lots may not be returned due to errors or changes in statistics or data.

Extremely Fine Gem (90-100): The term "Gem" describes condition that is the finest possible for the issue. This term is equivalent to "Superb" used by grading services.

Extremely Fine (80-90): Exceptionally large/wide margins or near perfect centering.

Very Fine (70-85): Normal-size margins for the issue and well-centered with the design a bit closer to one side. "Very Fine and choice" applies to stamps that have desirable traits such as rich color, sharp impression, freshness or clarity of cancel.

Fine (60-70): Smaller than usual margins or noticeably off center. Pre-1890 issues may have the design touched in places.

Very Good (below 60): Attractive appearance, but margins or perforations cut into the design.

Covers

Minor nicks, short edge tears, flap tears and slight reduction at one side are normal conditions for 19th century envelopes. Folded letters should be expected to have at least one file fold. Light cleaning of covers and small mends along the edges are accepted forms of conservation. Unusual covers may have a common stamp with a slight crease or tiny tear. These flaws exist in virtually all 19th century covers and are not always described. They are not grounds for return.

Catalogue Values and Estimates

Unless otherwise noted, the currently available *Scott Catalogue* values are quoted in dollars with a decimal point. Other catalogues are often used for foreign countries or specialized areas and are referred to by their common name: *Stanley Gibbons* (SG), *Dietz, American Air Mail Catalogue* (AAMC), *Michel, Zumstein, Facit*, etc. Estimates are indicated with an "E." and reflect our conservative valuation in dollars. Reserves will never exceed the low end of the estimate range; they will sometimes exceed Scott Catalogue value for stamps in Extremely Fine condition.

Because of certain pricing inconsistencies in the *Scott Catalogue*—for example, blocks that have no gum, the absence of premiums for Mint N.H. items, etc.—we cannot guarantee the accuracy of values quoted for multiples, specialized items and collection lots. We generally try to be conservative, but buyers may not return a lot because of a discrepancy in catalogue value due to Scott pricing inconsistencies.

The "Dubois" collection is more than just a collection of British North America covers—it is the *history* of British North America. The covers essentially form a historical textbook of the French and British periods from the 1690s through 1860s, reflecting the events and circumstances that shaped the country we now know as Canada. The covers and letters from this formative period demonstrate how mail routes were influenced by the discovery and settlement of new lands, by colonial and international trade, by border disputes, and by land-based and naval warfare.

This sale of the "Dubois" collection provides the intellectually minded postal history collector the opportunity to hold, handle and potentially own a tangible piece of history. While every item is related to British North America, the collection represents a diverse and far-reaching range of subjects. The United States postal historian will be impressed by the remarkable rarities found in cross-border mail, Colonial American mail, Revolutionary War mail and covers carried by various routes through Boston and New York. The military specialist will be intrigued by the concessionary rates from different provinces and

important war-time letters. The collector of ship and maritime letters will be enthused by the numerous rare or unique handstamps and by the unusual rates and markings. Those who collect Hudson Bay Company and furtrade mail have a tremendous opportunity to acquire key pieces, including no less than five examples of the uniquely configured Red River Settlement manuscript postmarks—about half the number thought to exist—and featuring the unique "small circle" postmark.

Over the past 60 years, there have been several awardwinning and prestigious collections containing early British North America postal history—those formed by J. Grant Glassco, Vincent Graves Greene, J. Ronald Saint, Dr. John L. Robertson, Allan L. Steinhart, Frederick R. Mayer, Dorothy Sanderson, "Maritimus," Malcolm Montgomery, A. M. Clark, Alan Griffiths, "Skywalk" and others. In the constellation of these great collections, the "Dubois" collection shines bright, as it was carefully formed by selecting the finest material from each of its predecessor collections, as well as acquiring important items privately through the gravitational pull of wealth, determination, and numerous relationships with leading dealers and collectors. Throughout this catalogue, one will find statements detailing the immense rarity of different postmarks and handstamps—many unique and others with very few recorded—and even if no words were written to describe the quality, it would be obvious that the examples offered here are the finest extant.

On a personal note, I am honored that the Meritus Trust has chosen Siegel International to sell the marvelous "Dubois" collection. I knew the collector who formed the collection over four decades, and he was a true gentleman who assembled his philatelic collections with extraordinary knowledge and impeccable taste.

(Quebec to Montreal, Mar. 5, ca. 1694). Small folded letter datelined "5th Mars 1694(?)", which is affected by wax seal and opening tear, neatly addressed to notary Antoine Adhemar dit St. Martin in Montreal, written by another notary, (Peter) Cabazier, who is thought to have resided in Quebec, Very Fine, New France covers dated prior to 1700 are exceptionally rare with only a small number in existence, the recipient, Antoine Adhemar dit St. Martin (ca. 1639-1714), arrived in New France as a member of the Carignan-Salieres Regiment sent to quell the local Native American conflicts, he was among the roughly 450 who remained behind to settle in New France, ex Sanderson Estimate \$500-750

 $2002 \boxtimes$ Early internal New France cover to the King's attorney in Villemarie (Montreal)

(Quebec? to Villemarie [Montreal], ca. 1710). Folded cover addressed to "Monsieur Raimbault Nottaire Royal en la maison, a villemarie", couple tears and folds mended by tape, otherwise Fine, Pierre Raimbault (1671-1740) received his commission as King's Attorney in 1706 and held this office until 1727, the use of "Villemarie" suggests an earlier use, as in 1705 the official name changed to Montreal, ex Sanderson...... Estimate \$300-400

An unusual bow-shaped folded cover

(Locally sent within Montreal, ca. 1690s). Letter folded in an unusual knot-shaped bow, without dateline but signed "Marie Chouar" and addressed to "Monsieur boucher", letter is in regard to funds from a recent payment, Very Fine, according to online records, in 1695 there was a "Marie Chouart" who married a "Jean Bouchard" in Montreal—Chouart did not use her husband's name in this address, suggesting that this cover predates their marriage, ex Sanderson.... Estimate \$400-500

$2004 \bowtie$ An early cover sent to Montreal

(Montreal, ca. 1715). Folded cover addressed to "Madame Jacque Vigé, veuve (widow) a montreal", likely a local use cover, Very Fine and scarce, this cover dates between 1715 (year of Jacques Viger's death) and 1726 (when addressee passed), various members of the Viger family went on to become politicians, including their great, great grandson, who became the first Mayor of Montreal in 1833, ex Sanderson...... Estimate \$300-400

(Montreal to Pointe-aux-Trembles, Nov. 30, 1728). Folded letter datelined "montroyal le 30 du nbre 1728" and addressed to "Monsieur Scené, nottaire Royal a la pointe au tremble," carried privately and likely by ship along the St. Lawrence River, signed by "de Repentigny", mentions sending grain by the boat of "Jean Archambault", Very Fine, ex Sanderson...... Estimate \$300-400

The enclosed letter is from Sir David Dalrymple's brother, who was in the British army in Canada, and humorously starts the letter, "this sheet look liker a manifesto than a letter." He goes on to describe British servicemen beginning to leave and describes the flora and fauna of Canada in great detail. His view of the local inhabitants is far less enthusiastic, about whom he writes, "The children curse and swear in English as currently the best Grenadiers in his Majesty's Service, the men drink rum more readily than they did brandy formerly and like it better because it is stronger and the women I wo'nt say have acquired, at least have continued a practice with our troops..."

Captain Wight's letter states: "On the 8th of June the Rebels came to attack us at a small town called the Three Rivers, a very small part of the Army had only got landed some Companys of Grenadiers & Light Infantry with a few others of different Corps. On the first Alarm we was under arms in a twinkling, marched out of town & mett them in the skirts of a wood where during the course of the action a great many was killed. The numbers could not be ascertained & near three hundred taken prisoners with their General (whose name is Thompson). I had only one man of my Company killed, or rather died of his wounds and not a single officer touched. In short we have now drove them totally out of Canada. I was witness two days ago to St. Johns, as well as all the other forts in this country being in flames which was performed by the Rebels before they evacuated them. I am obliged to write this in a hurry on the top of a casket in the midst of noise and confusion." He goes on to state that he had written another letter from his journey to Canada but misplaced it in his baggage—the letter was found and included with the letter in the lot 2011.

The Battle of Trois-Rivieres occurred on June 8, 1776, and was the last battle fought on Quebec soil. After their defeat, the Continental Army retreated to Fort St. Jean, burning the fort and any capable boats on June 17. They eventually retreated back to Fort Ticonderoga......

Charles Terrot (1758-1839) was a British Army officer who fought in Canada during the American Revolutionary War. He later served under Charles Cornwallis in India, eventually reaching the rank of General. A notation in his letter states, "Mr. Allsopp Esquire of Capt. Howe, of the artillery at Quebec will know where Capt. Walkers brigade is & to forward letters. Charles Terrot." At this point in the war, the Continental Army had suffered a major loss at the Battle of Quebec in December 1775, and sought to initiate a siege of Quebec. With limited support, modest reinforcements, the effects of disease and hardships of winter, the Continental Army began to suffer. With intelligence that British reinforcements were awaiting the winter thaw, the Continental Army retreated towards Montreal. This letter was written shortly after the Battle of Trois-Rivieres on June 8, where the Continental Army suffered another disastrous defeat.



The enclosed letter, written by Patrick Ferguson (1744-1780), makes reference to Murray's invitation for him to come to Quebec—quite fortuitous, as Ferguson went on to become a Major in the British Army fighting in the American Revolutionary War. He is known for designing the Ferguson rifle and was ultimately killed in the Battle of Kings Mountain in 1780. The addressee, James Murray, was Ferguson's uncle and served as Governor of Quebec from 1760-1768 and then of Minorca (Spain) from 1778-1782.

The addressee, James Walker, took part in fighting the Continental Army in Quebec during 1775-76. He eventually moved to Montreal, became a lawyer in 1777, and went on to become a member of the Parliament for Lower Canada.



It is believed that the recipient was his brother, another fur trader.



The sender, Charles Le Pallier, was a resident of Michilimackinac, but sent this from Saginaw. While part of the United States, Michigan did not become a territory until 1805. After the Revolutionary War, Detroit was maintained by the British as part of Canada. It was not until the Jay Treaty—signed on Nov. 19, 1794, and ratified on Feb. 26, 1796—that Detroit, along with other territory, was ceded to the United States, and the official border between the U.S. and Canada was established.



This cover, dated at Quebec on January 2, 1788, was postmarked at Montreal on January 7 with the special "AMERICAN PORT" handstamp, indicating it was intended to depart on a British packet vessel from an American port. It was carried on the Lake Champlain and Hudson River water route to New York City, and from there it was carried on the next Falmouth Packet sailing—the *Grantham* on February 20, 1788—which stopped at Halifax on the eastbound transatlantic trip to England (sailing information from John S. Olenkiewicz, Frajola website).

The addressee, Sir John Wentworth, was the Surveyor General of the King's Woods at this time. He eventually went on to become the first civilian Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia in 1791 and was knighted in 1795.



The Aroostook War (1838-39), otherwise known as the Pork and Beans War, was a territorial border dispute between the United States and Great Britain. The 1783 Treaty of Paris did not set clear lines between New Brunswick and Maine, an area rich in timber. Local militias and British soldiers were called to the engagement, but before any blood was shed, a peaceful compromise was found and the 1842 Webster-Ashburton Treaty was signed.

This letter provides fascinating details of the dispute. The letter discusses the writer's travels from Cork to Halifax and Woodstock, and having "travelled on sleighs on the ice on a large river...snow 20 to 30 feet deep...our regiment is 600 strong." He mentions "when we got to Woodstock we expected to go into action every day but the rebels was too great...to make an attack...we fired the guns into the woods." He also mentions an agreement between Sir John Harvey and "the Yankee General" settling the affair.



Col. Peregrine T. Hopson

Peregrine T. Hopson (1696-1759) was a British army officer who earned the rank of Major General. He first arrived in Louisbourg, Nova Scotia with reinforcements in 1746 during King George's War (War of Austrian Succession). He served as Commander of Louisbourg from 1747-49 before formally returning it to the French. At the time this letter was written, he was Governor of Nova Scotia and held this office until 1754. During the Seven Years' War, he was dispatched to the West Indies in the British quest to capture Martinique and Guadeloupe, where he ultimately died of disease in 1759.







For some reason this did not make the January 11, 1795, packet sailing from New York. Based on the London GPO April 20, 1795, receiving datestamp, it must have been carried on the Falmouth Packet *Princess Royal*, which sailed from Halifax on April 2, 1795 (sailing information from John S. Olenkiewicz, Frajola website). The recipient, Adam Lymburner (ca. 1745-1836), was a British militia officer, colonial agent, businessman and politician. This letter is likely from John Crawford, his nephew, who was brought over to assist with his businesses in Canada. The 2sh6p rate covered the 1sh6p postage and 1sh packet rate. We are aware of one other example, with the same Halifax date and also addressed to London (illustrated in Jephcott p. 293).



Nova Scotia covers dated in the mid-18th century are extremely rare outside archival holdings. Halifax was established only one year earlier, with the arrival of Edward Cornwallis on June 21, 1749. This led to the colonial capital's relocation from Annapolis Royal to Halifax. The Steinhart collection contained a folded letter dated July 25, 1752, which was previously recognized as the earliest Halifax letter.

Massachusetts Old Tenor currency was used beginning in 1690, due to the scarcity of British shillings and pence. It was initially valued at a 25% discount to British currency, but continued to lose value through 1754, the period in which this letter was sent (1750-51), British postage was converted using an inflation factor of 7.5, which in this case equates to $2 \sin \theta$ in local currency (4p British single letter rate x 7.5 = 30p, or $2 \sin \theta$).

The recipient, Samuel Vernon (1711-1792), was a prominent Newport merchant, along with another brother William. They were known for their utilization of the Triangular Trade—the Vernon'ship *Hare* was a documented slave ship. Vernon is also known as one of the ringleaders of the Stamp Act Riots of 1765 and fully supported the Revolutionary War. His home in Newport was the headquarters for Comte de Rochambeau and housed General George Washington and the Marquis de Lafayette.

The earliest letter (ex Young and Steinhart) is dated Apr. 30, 1748. The dateline of "Feb. 12th, 1750-1" is a double dating of the Julian calendar, which translates to Feb. 23, 1751. The recipient, Thomas Hancock (1703-1764), was one of Boston's wealthiest merchants and the uncle of the revered John Hancock, a Founding Father of the United States. Thomas raised his nephew since the age of eight and bequeathed his entire fortune to him.



The sender, Pierre André de Suffren (1729-1788), was a French admiral who saw action in North America and the Indian Ocean. The letter (in French) states "hostilities committed by the English against our vessels in the neighborhoods...three ships separated in the mist were met by 11 English ships at 45 degrees 57 minutes latitude between Whales' Bank and the Green Bank. They were attacked and the Alcide, which was the only one of the three equipped for war, was captured. The Lis was still fighting at 7pm but it appears that she was also taken. The Dauphin Royal got away on account of its speed and arrived here the 15th of June...P.S. The day of the battle is Sunday the 8th of June...". Admiral de Suffren was on the Dauphin Royal. This battle was one of the precursors and contributing factors to the outbreak of the Seven Years' War in 1756.

The French occupied Louisbourg until June 17, 1745, at which point the British officially took control. The city was handed back to the French on October 18, 1748, under the terms of the Treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle (Treaty of Aachen). The other known French Nova Scotia cover is dated October 29, 1735 (ex "Skywalk").

Nova Scotia and U.S. postal officials shook hands on a mail contract with the steamer *Sir John Harvey* to carry letters at a special rate of 6p or U.S. 10¢, prepaid or unpaid. Research by David D'Alessandris ("The Steamer *Sir John Harvey*," *Chronicle* 207) determined that the "contract" was disavowed by U.S. postal officials, and that no contract mail was sent from the U.S. to Nova Scotia. Only three trips from Halifax to Boston carried contract letters, which bear the "NOVA SCOTIA" scroll handstamp, the only Nova Scotia cross-border exchange marking. The contract round trips commenced with a Boston departure on January 22, 1853, and a Halifax return trip on January 29 (carrying this letter). Four Halifax-to-Boston covers are recorded: 1) Jan. 29 departure (ex Argenti and "Maritimus"), the cover offered here, 2) Feb. 9 departure (ex Young, Dr. Clark and "Skywalk"), 3) Feb. 15 departure (ex Mayer) and 4) Feb. 15 departure (ex "Halifax" and Steinhart).

This letter, written by Joseph Follows to his parents, describes the weather and the "winter lobster (where) I can go and catch within stones cast of our door as large as my leg is round which is very fine eating...". He makes mention of his arrival and of earlier letters being carried back to London via Yarmouth.







The letter contains interesting contents: "Since the arrival of the soldiers here the price of produce is increasing...if you are accustom to reading the newspapers I suppose you have seen the desperate betwixt the Hudson Bay Company and Canada government the expectation of the Red River people is that this place will be united to Canada soon and monopoly of the Hudson Bay Company will soon be finished. The government of Canada already grated £5,000 to make a road between Lake Superior and the Red River...there is no doubt but merchants and settlers will emigrate to the Red River and throughout all the country...". It was about a decade later in 1869 that the Hudson Bay Company's monopoly came to an end when they returned Rupert's Land to Britain.
