

Information for Bidders

Bidding

The following means are available for placing bids:

- 1) Public Attendance: Attendance is now permitted for fully vaccinated individuals and for unvaccinated individuals who follow all guidelines to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Live bidding will also be facilitated by mail, email, phone or internet.
- 2) Live Internet Bidding: Instructions for participating as a Live Internet Bidder are provided on the page opposite.
- **3) Phone Bidding:** Bidders can be connected to the sale by phone and bid through a member of staff. Requests for phone bidding are subject to approval (please contact our office at least 24 hours before the sale). A signed Bid Form is required.
- 4) Absentee Bids: All bids received in advance of the sale, either by mail, fax, phone, email or internet, are Absentee Bids, which instruct the auctioneer to bid up to a specific amount on one or more lots in the sale. Absentee Bids sent by phone, fax or email should arrive at least one hour prior to the start of the sale session. Bids entered through Live Internet Bidding will be visible to the auctioneer during the sale. Written bids should be entered legibly on the Bid Form in the sale catalogue. Email and internet bids should be carefully typed and double-checked. All new bidders must provide references.

Presale Viewing by Appointment Only

To prevent the spread of COVID-19, presale viewing will be permitted for fully vaccinated individuals or for unvaccinated individuals who agree to follow all protective measures. To make an appointment and receive instructions, please contact us at (212) 753-6421 or by email. We reserve the right to refuse, cancel or postpone a request or appointment.

Expert Certification

Individual items offered without a PF or PSE certificate dated within the past 5 years may be purchased subject to certification of genuineness and our description. Please refer to the Conditions of Sale and Grading Terms for policies governing certification.

Shipping and Delivery

Procedures and charges for shipping lots are printed on the back of the Bid Form. Bidders are responsible for all prescribed shipping charges and any applicable sales tax or customs duties.

Internet bidding works by allowing registered bidders to observe and place bids, either before the sale or in real-time during the auction.

Live Internet Bidding will work with any browser on both PC and Mac operating systems, or with our app..

Before bidding by internet for the first time, we recommend observing an auction in progress. This will help you develop a feel for the sale tempo and bidding interface.

Log in and participate in the auction at bid.siegelauctions.com

When you're logged on as an internet bidder, the bidding interface shows a photo and description of the lot, the current bid (and your bidding status), options for placing competitive bids and buttons with bid increments.

- After you click on a bid amount, the auctioneer is immediately notified of your bid.
- Retracting a bid is not acceptable, so please bid carefully.
- You can track prior realizations from the bidding screen.



Conditions of Sale (please read carefully before bidding)

THE PROPERTY IN THIS CATALOGUE WILL BE OFFERED AT PUBLIC AUCTION BY ROBERT A. SIEGEL AUCTION GALLERIES, INC. ("GALLERIES") ON BEHALF OF VARIOUS CONSIGNORS AND ITSELF OR AFFILIATED COMPANIES. BY BIDDING ON ANY LOT, WHETHER DIRECTLY OR THROUGH A THIRD PARTY, IN PERSON, BY TELEPHONE, FACSIMILE, INTERNET OR BY ANY OTHER MEANS, THE BIDDER ACKNOWLEDGES AND AGREES TO ALL OF THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS OF SALE.

- 1. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. The term "final bid" means the last bid acknowledged by the auctioneer, which is normally the highest bid offered. The purchase price payable by the buyer will be the sum of the final bid and a commission of 18% of the final bid ("buyer's premium"), together with any sales tax, use tax or customs duties due on the sale.
- 2. The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid, to advance the bidding at his discretion and, in the event of a dispute, to determine the successful bidder, to continue the bidding or to reoffer and resell the lot in dispute. The Galleries' record of the final sale shall be conclusive.
- 3. All bids are per numbered lot in the catalogue unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to group two or more lots, to withdraw any lot or lots from the sale, or to act on behalf of the seller. The Galleries will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for the failure to execute such bids or for any errors in the execution of such bids.
- 4. Lots with numbers followed by the symbol ° are offered subject to a confidential minimum bid ("reserve"), below which the lot will not be sold. The absence of the symbol ° means that the lot is offered without a reserve. If there is no reserve, the auctioneer has sole discretion to establish a minimum opening bid and may refuse an offer of less than half of the published estimate. Any lot that does not reach its reserve or opening bid requested by the auctioneer will be announced as "passed" and excluded from the prices realized lists after the sale. The Galleries may have a direct or indirect ownership interest in any or all lots in the sale resulting from an advance of monies or goods-in-trade or a guarantee of minimum net proceeds made by the Galleries to the seller.
- 5. Subject to the exclusions listed in 5(A), the Galleries will accept the return of lots which, subject to the Galleries' sole judgment, have been misidentified or which have obvious faults that were present when the lot was in the Galleries' custody, but not so noted in the lot description. All disputed lots must be received by the Galleries intact with the original packing material within 5 days of delivery to the buyer but no later than 30 days from the sale date. (5A) EXCLUSIONS: The following lots may not be returned for any reason, or may not be returned for the reasons stated: (i) lots containing 5 or more items; (ii) lots from buyers who registered for the pre-sale exhibition or received lots by postal viewing, thereby having had the opportunity to inspect them before the sale; (iii) any lot described with "faults," "defects" or a specific fault may not be returned because of any secondary fault; (iv) photographed lots may not be returned because of centering, margins, short/nibbed perforations or other factors shown in the photos; (v) the color of the item does not match the color photo in the sale catalogue or website listing; (vi) the description contains inaccurate information about the quantity known or reported; or (vii) a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description or on an accompanying certificate.
- 6. Successful bidders, unless they have established credit with the Galleries prior to the sale, must make full payment in cleared funds before the lots will be delivered. Buyers not known to the Galleries must make payment in full within 3 days from the date of sale. The Galleries retains the right to demand a cash deposit from anyone prior to bidder registration and/or to demand payment at the time the lot is knocked down, for any reason whatsoever. In the event that any buyer refuses or fails to make payment in cash for any lot at the time it is knocked down to him, the auctioneer reserves the right to reoffer the lot immediately for sale to the highest bidder. Credit cards (Visa, Mastercard and Discover only) can be accepted as payment, but will be subject to a 3% non-refundable Convenience Fee, which will be added to the total of the entire invoice (including hammer price, buyer's premium, shipping and transit insurance charges and any applicable taxes). The buyer waives the right to dispute all credit card charges.

- 7. If the purchase price has not been paid within the time limit specified above, nor lots taken up within 7 days from the date of sale, the lots may be resold by whatever means deemed appropriate by the Galleries, and any loss incurred from resale will be charged to the defaulting buyer, and/or the Galleries may seek any other remedy prescribed by law to enforce payment. Any account more than 30 days in arrears will be subject to a late payment charge of 1½% per month as long as the account remains in arrears. Any expenses incurred in securing payment from delinquent accounts will be charged to the defaulter. A fee of \$250.00 will be charged for a check returned for insufficient funds.
- 8. All lots are sold as genuine. Any lot accompanied by a certificate issued by The Philatelic Foundation or by Professional Stamp Experts within 5 years of the sale date is sold "as is" and in accordance with the description on the certificate. Such lots may not be returned for any reason, including but not limited to a contrary certificate of opinion or change in grade. Buyers may request a certificate for a lot containing not more than one item, which does not have a P.F. or P.S.E. certificate (dated as above), provided that the following conditions are met: (i) the purchase price must be paid in full, (ii) if submitted by the buyer, the lot must be submitted to an acceptable expertizing service with a properly executed application form within 21 days of the sale, (iii) a copy of the application form must be given to the Galleries, (iv) the Galleries retains the right to resubmit the item for reconsideration, without time limit or other restrictions, for the purpose of obtaining a satisfactory opinion, (v) lots submitted for certification will be considered cleared 90 days from the date of sale, whether or not a certificate has been issued, unless the Galleries issues written approval of a further extension of return privileges, and (vi) in the event the lot is determined to be misidentified or misdescribed, pursuant to 5 and 5(A) of these Conditions, the Galleries will issue a refund to the buyer for the full purchase price and actual certification fees, but the reimbursement for certificate fees (and related costs) shall not exceed 10% of the hammer price of the lot. Changes to a grade by the same certification service or a different grade from another certification service are not grounds for returning a lot.
- 9. Until paid for in full, all lots remain the property of the Galleries on behalf of the seller
- 10. Agents executing bids on behalf of clients may also be held responsible for all purchases made on behalf of clients, unless otherwise arranged prior to the sale.
- 11. The buyer assumes all risk for delivery of purchased lots and agrees to pay for prescribed shipping costs. Buyers who receive lots in the U.S. are obligated to pay whatever sales tax or compensating use tax might be due, at any time, and buyers outside the U.S. are responsible for all customs duties.
- 12. The bidder consents that any action or proceeding against it may be commenced and maintained in any court within the State of New York or in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, that the courts of the State of New York and United States District Court for the Southern District of New York shall have jurisdiction with respect to the subject matter hereof and the person of the bidder. The bidder agrees not to assert any defense to any action or proceeding initiated by Galleries based upon improper venue or inconvenient forum. The bidder agrees that any action brought by the bidder shall be commenced and maintained only in a Federal Court in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York or the State Court in the county in which Galleries has its principal place of business in New York. The bidder agrees not to use a public conflict resolution service and not to use any form of social media to publish comments or information about the Galleries and its employees which might harm the Galleries' reputation or business. These Conditions of Sale shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the substantive laws of the State of New York, and shall constitute an agreement that shall be binding on the parties, and their respective heirs, administrators, distributees, successors and assignees.

Grades, Abbreviations and Values Used in Descriptions

Grades and Centering

Our descriptions contain detailed information and observations about each item's condition. We have also assigned grades to stamps and covers, which reflect our subjective assessment. For stamps, the margin width, centering and gum are described and graded according to generally accepted standards (an approximate correlation to numeric grades is provided at right). Although we believe our grades are accurate, they are not always exactly aligned with third-party grading terms or standards for all issues. A lot may not be returned because a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description. Information from the P.S.E. Stamp Market Quarterly and P.S.E. Population ReportSM is the most current available, but lots may not be returned due to errors or changes in statistics or data.

Extremely Fine Gem (90-100): The term "Gem" describes condition that is the finest possible for the issue. This term is equivalent to "Superb" used by grading services.

Extremely Fine (80-90): Exceptionally large/wide margins or near perfect centering.

Very Fine (70-85): Normal-size margins for the issue and well-centered with the design a bit closer to one side. "Very Fine and choice" applies to stamps that have desirable traits such as rich color, sharp impression, freshness or clarity of cancel.

Fine (60-70): Smaller than usual margins or noticeably off center. Pre-1890 issues may have the design touched in places.

Very Good (below 60): Attractive appearance, but margins or perforations cut into the design.

Covers

Minor nicks, short edge tears, flap tears and slight reduction at one side are normal conditions for 19th century envelopes. Folded letters should be expected to have at least one file fold. Light cleaning of covers and small mends along the edges are accepted forms of conservation. Unusual covers may have a common stamp with a slight crease or tiny tear. These flaws exist in virtually all 19th century covers and are not always described. They are not grounds for return.

Catalogue Values and Estimates

Unless otherwise noted, the currently available *Scott Catalogue* values are quoted in dollars with a decimal point. Other catalogues are often used for foreign countries or specialized areas and are referred to by their common name: *Stanley Gibbons* (SG), *Dietz, American Air Mail Catalogue* (AAMC), *Michel, Zumstein, Facit*, etc. Estimates are indicated with an "E." and reflect our conservative valuation in dollars. Reserves will never exceed the low end of the estimate range; they will sometimes exceed Scott Catalogue value for stamps in Extremely Fine condition.

Because of certain pricing inconsistencies in the *Scott Catalogue*—for example, blocks that have no gum, the absence of premiums for Mint N.H. items, etc.—we cannot guarantee the accuracy of values quoted for multiples, specialized items and collection lots. We generally try to be conservative, but buyers may not return a lot because of a discrepancy in catalogue value due to Scott pricing inconsistencies.

What makes a stamp a rarity?

THE ENTIRE CONCEPT OF THE RARITIES OF THE WORLD SALE IS BASED ON THE IDEA OF philatelic rarity. Any collector who has ever argued with another collector about what is rare versus what is merely valuable knows that rarity is in the eye of the beholder.

Any exhibitor who has shown valuable world-class rarities in a competitive exhibition and lost to a display of not-so-valuable "only recorded" items has tasted the bitter pill of *Difficulty of Acquisition*, a judging criteria based on the egalitarian idea that some items are very difficult to find regardless of money, and some are easy to find if you have the dough. The principle of Difficulty of Acquisition ignores the demand factor in the supply-and-demand formula, but it helps level the playing field so that competitive philatelic exhibiting does not become exclusively a rich person's game. I don't know if it creates a bigger tent for more exhibitors to participate or if it skews the results so that collectors with great collections feel they are not being judged fairly. That's a debate for another time.

Returning to the concept of philatelic rarity, ultimately it comes down to a classification system that defines the items and puts them into context. Here are the types of rarities that come to my mind:

Stamp Album Rarities—these are the most fundamental of rarities. It is a stamp that is listed as a major number in the catalogue and has a space in an album. For example, in an album of United States stamps, the key rarities are the rarest of the 1867-68 grilled issues (Scott 80, 81, 82, 85A, 85D, 85F), the 24¢ Continental (Scott 164), the rarest 1875 and 1880-83 Special Printings (Scott 180, 181, 194, 203, 204, 205C, 211D), the rarest coils (Scott 316 and 321), the rarest Compound Perforation stamps (Scott 423E and now 499D), and the rarest Rotary Waste issue (Scott 596). The 2c Compound Perforation 10 x 11, Scott 499D, is a newly listed major rarity and is offered for the first time in this sale (lot 676).

Errors—these are the most recognizable rarities. From the 24¢ Inverted Jenny to the India 4 annas Inverted Victoria to the Japan 500 mon Inverted Value, these are stamps that have instant visual impact. In some cases, the quantities recorded are far higher than the quantities known of much less valuable stamps, but it's the Wow factor that creates demand (and higher prices). In this Rarities sale, the Worldwide section features French Offices in China Inverted "Indo-Chine" Tablet errors, including stamps of which just one example is known (see lots 772-780).

Condition Rarities—in today's market, these stamps generate the most competitive bidding, and yet they are derided by Old School philatelists who cannot understand why a tiny fraction of difference in centering, which distinguishes a 100-point stamp from a 90 or even a 98-point stamp, can exponentially increase a stamp's value. This is why you will find stamps with modest Scott Catalogue values in the Rarities sale. I consider myself Old School in many aspects of philately (and life in general), but I have embraced the graded stamp market, because I understand the desire to complete the "finest" set with stamps at the "top of the Population Report." I also think grading has helped clean up the marketplace.

Multiples—collecting stamps in multiples, such as blocks, is a practice that started in the late 19th century and was first considered to be "excessive." However, blocks and sheets are important philatelic artifacts which often provide valuable clues to the methods used to produce the stamps. Sadly, the demand for singles has resulted in blockbusting and more recently to the division of rare coil pairs, such as Scott 316. The Rarities sales over the years have always featured multiples, and this year's sale is no exception, starting with a fantastic 10¢ 1847 strip of four with original gum, including one Mint N.H. stamp (lot 535).

Postal History Rarities—the world of cover collecting can seem very alien to stamp collectors. In postal history, rarity can be as obvious as a Pony Express cover to Abraham Lincoln, or as arcane as a short-lived postage rate paid with common stamps. Cover collectors frequently enthuse over "colorful frankings" and "beautiful markings," and I always enjoy watching a simple stamp collector puzzle over the appeal. Nonetheless, collecting postal history is a significant part of philately, and it should be easy for anyone to understand the rarity and value of a cover carried by balloon from the besieged city of Paris during the Franco-Prussian War and onwards to India (lot 771).

Flyspeck Rarities—these are the stamps prized by specialists, but sometimes induce a thousand-yard-stare in someone forced to listen to a dissertation on the feature that makes it so important. Auctioneers have to offer unbiased advocacy for consignors, but I must confess there are times when a flyspeck variety is lost on me. If I had to choose one example to make my point, it would be luminescent varieties. I fully realize that saying this will invite angry emails from collectors of tagged stamps—and I don't blame them if they never consign their collections to me—but I would rather get a tan by the pool than from working on a collection of stamps that requires UV light to appreciate.

This the Siegel firm's 60th Rarities of the World sale. That's a remarkable milestone and would not be possible without adapting to changing collector interests while maintaining a standard of admission that makes every sale worthy of the title.

501 St. Augustine, British Florida to Norfolk Va., 1767. Folded letter datelined "St. Augustine 20th April 1767" and addressed to Norfolk Va., red "Charles Town Ship 2ct Sterl." manuscript postmark, sent via ship to Philadelphia where it received a bold strike of red "PHILA/DELPHIA" two-line handstamp and red manuscript "Sh. 6" rate (4p plus 2p ship fee) applied for overland delivery to Norfolk, some minor soiling

VERY FINE. THIS IS THE EARLIEST RECORDED COVER FROM FLORIDA SENT THROUGH THE MAILS AND WITH A POSTAL MARKING. A WONDERFUL EXHIBITION ITEM.

Ponce de Leon discovered Florida in 1513, and it was ceded by Spain to the British in 1763 in exchange for Havana, which the British captured in 1762. According to the *American Stampless Cover Catalog*, no covers are known from this first period. The earliest recorded letter from Florida was datelined "Exiled Pensacola September 5, 1763" but was carried privately and has no postal markings. The cover offered here is the earliest known used from Florida carried in the mails with a postmark.

A HISTORIC AND HIGHLY IMPORTANT COVER. THIS IS THE ONLY RECORDED HAND-STAMPED POSTMARK FROM SPANISH FLORIDA, AS WELL AS THE EARLIEST REPORTED TOWN MARKING FROM ANY FORMER SPANISH COLONY IN PRESENT DAY UNITED STATES TERRITORY.

This cover is accompanied by a photocopy of a letter (with translation included) found in the Spanish archives, dated December 21, 1784, from San Augustine postmaster Manuel Fernandez-Bendicho to his superiors in Havana. In the letter he requests reimbursement for supply purchases he made for the establishment of the new post office, including the postmarking device that was used on this cover. This substantiates that this handstamp was applied to this cover in Florida, not upon its arrival in Cuba.

JOHN HANSON FREE FRANK AS PRESIDENT OF THE CONFEDERATION CONGRESS





John Hanson. Founding father, merchant, first President of the Confederation Congress and sometimes called the first President of the United States, free frank "John Hanson" as President of the Confederation Congress on folded cover addressed to "His Excellency The Governor of the State of New Jersey", also endorsed "On public Service", docketing on bottom flap notes March 20, 1782, expertly silked

VERY FINE. AN EXTREMELY RARE FREE FRANK OF JOHN HANSON AS PRESIDENT OF THE CONFEDERATION CONGRESS.

John Hanson was from a prominent Maryland family. He entered politics, serving in several positions before he was elected to the Continental Congress. He and Daniel Carroll signed the Articles of Confederation on behalf of Maryland on March 1, 1781. He was elected as President of the Confederation Congress on November 5, 1781, and some scholars consider him the first elected president of the United States.

The year on the back of this carte de visite, 1868, is the year Grant was elected to the first of his two terms as President (elected Nov. 3, 1868, assumed office Mar. 4, 1869). The photographer, Henry Ulke, had a portrait studio in Washington, D.C. and painted portraits and took photographs of famous people of the day. He was a personal friend of Abraham Lincoln and photographed Mary Todd Lincoln in mourning after her son Willie's death. Ulke lived in the Petersen House, which is where Lincoln was taken the night he was shot and where he died the following day. Ulke's oil painting of President Grant, painted in 1875, hangs in the White House. One can imagine Grant sitting for a photograph with this famous artist of the day, either just before or after his election as President. A marvelous piece of history............................... 1801 LETTER FROM AMERICAN TRADING VESSEL EN ROUTE TO JAPAN

VERY FINE. A REMARKABLE LETTER WRITTEN FROM BATAVIA BY AN AMERICAN ON BOARD A TRADING VESSEL BOUND FOR JAPAN IN 1801. AN EXTREMELY EARLY POSTAL LINK BETWEEN JAPAN AND THE UNITED STATES.

In his letter written from Batavia on June 19, 1801, crew member Lewis Thatcher informs his uncle that he arrived from Indramayoe with a cargo of coffee for the Dutch East India Company "and we have discharged it and taken in another cargo for the Company to carry to Japan — Where I expect to be gone about 6 months from this place..." He continues, "Capt. Derby has purchased a small Brig and is going to send her to the Isle of France to purchase a ship to return here to take in a load of Coffee for America."

The Margaret was an American sailing ship with a crew of 20 plus 6 guns. Under Captain Samuel G. Derby, she left Salem on Nov. 19, 1800, arrived at Table Bay, Cape of Good Hope, Feb. 4, 1801, reached Sumatra Apr. 10, and finally Batavia Apr. 25. At Batavia Captain Derby agreed to take the annual shipments to and from Japan as a charter for the Dutch East India Company, an agreement reflected in the letter offered here. The Margaret left for Nagasaki on June 20, 1801, the day after this letter was written (it states "we are to sail by 4 o'clock tomorrow morning."). As the letter predicted, the Margaret returned from Japan and back to the United States loaded with trade goods, some of which are housed in the Salem museum.

The Netherlands was the only European country with which Japan allowed trade. The Dutch East India company made annual voyages to the man-made island of Dejima in Nagasaki harbor. Because of the Napoleonic Wars, Holland brought all of her ships home and negotiated with American ships to fly under the Dutch flag from 1797 to 1809. The *Margaret* was the second ship to reach Japanese waters and the first from which the captain and crew toured Japan, 52 years before the Perry Expedition.



VERY FINE APPEARANCE. AN ATTRACTIVE AND RARE HAWAIIAN MISSIONARY COVER. ONLY NINE COVERS WITH THE 5-CENT MISSIONARY ARE IN PRIVATE HANDS, FIVE OF WHICH HAVE THE STAMP USED ALONE.

Ten 5c Missionary covers are recorded in our census and the Gregory census. Included in this total are the Dawson 2c/5c cover and the 5c cover acquired by the Smithsonian National Postal Museum in the Honolulu Advertiser sale, leaving eight 5c covers for collectors. Upon further analysis, however, only five of those have a 5c Missionary used without any other stamps, and of those five, one is a front.

This cover was written at Hilo on January 1, 1853, but it was not postmarked at Honolulu until February 16. It was carried on the American schooner *Sierra Nevada*, which cleared Honolulu on February 16 and sailed the following day. After stopping at Lahaina, it left for San Francisco on February 24 and arrived on March 15. It was carried by the Pacific Mail Steamship Company's *Golden Gate*, departing on March 16 and arriving at Panama City on March 28. The mail was carried across the isthmus to Aspinwall, and from there it left on the U.S. Mail Steamship Company's *Illinois*, departing March 31 and arriving in New York on April 9. The recipient, John F. Rogers of Lowell, Massachusetts, paid the 12c United States postage, which included 10c for the unpaid transcontinental rate and 2c for the ship captain's fee

VERY FINE. ONE OF TEN RECORDED EXAMPLES OF THE RUNNING PONY HANDSTAMP STRUCK IN CARMINE—THIS IS THE EARLIEST OF THE SIX EASTBOUND COVERS AND ONE OF ONLY FOUR WITH 10-CENT ADHESIVE STAMPS. ONE OF THE FINEST PONY EXPRESS COVERS EXTANT.

The St. Joseph Running Pony handstamp was normally struck in black, but the FKW census records ten covers with this marking struck in the distinctive carmine color. They are dated from August 12 to September 13, 1860, and all but two are struck on the backs of the covers. Four have 10c adhesive stamps (Scott 35), all eastbound with the carmine oval struck on the back as a receiving mark.

This cover was sent from San Francisco on August 4, 1860, after the new recalibrated Pony Express rate of \$2.50 per quarter-ounce was announced at St. Joseph. Because news of the rate change took approximately two weeks to reach the West Coast, it was not implemented in San Francisco until the August 15 eastbound trip.

The "U.S.A." designation in the address and "To be forwarded" instructions make it almost certain that this cover originated outside the United States, probably from a travelling member of the prominent Coffin family, several of whom were whaling captains.

The recipient firm, A. A. Low & Brother, was named for Abiel Abbot Low and his brother, Josiah Orne Low. Founded in 1840, the firm became one of the leading importers of China and Japan silks and teas, and operated its own line of clipper ships. In 1850 Low completed the A. A. Low building at 167-171 John Street, now the offices of the South Street Seaport Museum. The firm was situated at its Burling Slip building from 1850 until after the turn of the century. One of the two April 3, 1860, first trip Pony Express covers comes from the A. A. Low & Brother correspondence. The iconic New York City landmark Low Memorial Library at Columbia University was named for Abiel Abbot Low by his son, Columbia president Seth Low.

The FKW census lists five covers with the 10¢ 1857 stamp tied by the San Francisco Running Pony oval, all eastbound: E15, E16, E38, E46 (the cover offered here) and E49.

VERY FINE. ONE OF 21 RECORDED TYPE II EAST-TO-WEST PONY EXPRESS ENTIRES AND ONE OF THE LAST TRIPS BEFORE THE END OF THE PONY EXPRESS ERA.

In Rate Period 3, Wells Fargo & Co. introduced a special franked envelope for westbound mail, but its use was extremely limited. On July 1, 1861, the new contract rate went into effect. On August 12, 1861, Wells Fargo & Co. announced in the New York papers that "Pony Express Envelopes" were "Now ready and for sale at our office." Although this announcement refers only to "envelopes," in fact both the franked entires and \$1.00 adhesive stamps were put on sale in August 1861. The 1861 10c "Pumpkin" entire with the Type II printed frank was ordered from George F. Nesbitt & Co. (New York) by the Overland Mail Company after they obtained approval for the design and imprint from the Postmaster General's office. The earliest recorded Type II envelope is dated August 14, 1861, according to the FKW census.

Based on a newspaper article in the San Francisco *Bulletin* (September 13, 1861, at https://siegel-auctions.com/2013/1038/20_SFB.jpg), the Type II franked envelopes were problematic, because eastern post offices were sometimes sending them in the "through" mail to San Francisco, instead of directing them to St. Joseph for the Pony Express. As a result, they would arrive by regular mail ten days after the Pony Express for which they were intended. This might explain why some examples of the Type II franks are found without a St. Joseph Pony Express handstamp. The presence of the St. Joseph Pony Express datestamp confirms that this was carried by Pony Express riders.

This October 5, 1861, cover was sent from New York City shortly before Civil War demonetization of the old stamp issue began and the new 1861 Issue was released. It entered the post office and was treated as regular mail until it reached the Wells, Fargo & Co. agent at St. Joseph. From there it made the October 10 westbound Pony trip to California, arriving in San Francisco from Placerville on October 22.

The updated FKW census lists 21 examples of the Type II \$1.00 frank, including some that have stamps added or have been extensively repaired.

The last eastbound Butterfield stage left San Francisco on Monday, April 1, 1861 (Walske-Frajola, Mails of the Westward Expansion 1803-1861, pp. 170-171). The Daily Alta California (April 6, 1861) published a letter from the San Francisco postmaster dated April 5 (Friday) announcing he had received instructions from Washington, D.C., to discontinue the Overland Mail, but he stated that he would continue to send mail on stages between Los Angeles and San Francisco (and way stations in between), which was separately announced as "The New Los Angeles Mail." Another letter from the newspaper's St. Louis correspondent, dated May 1, 1861 (published May 16) stated: "We have had no Overland mail since that of March 26th arrived, and the agents inform me today that the remaining ones due in this city have probably been sent to San Antonio, to be brought hence by steamer to Galveston, and so on to New Orleans. By this irregular route, there is no knowing when the letters which left your city between March 25th and April 2d, by Overland Mail, will arrive here."

The town of Arizona City (or Arizona) was established in 1854 by Charles D. Poston and originally named Colorado City. Consisting of adobe dwellings, two stores and two saloons, it was situated on the bank of the Colorado River, opposite Fort Yuma, California. By 1858 the town became known as "Arizona City" or simply "Arizona" (the official post office name). John Blake Dow was appointed postmaster on March 17, 1858, but was replaced by Lansford Warren Hastings three months later, on July 17. The post office and Butterfield station were one small counter in the Hooper mercantile store. Originally part of Dona Ana County, New Mexico Territory, on February 1, 1860, Arizona City became part of Arizona County, New Mexico Territory. Arizona County comprised all the land of the Gadsden Purchase west of a line close to the current New Mexico-Arizona border.

The manuscript postmark was applied by Arizona City postmaster, Lansford Warren Hastings.

This die impression shows the so-called cancellation dot in the oval at left, which was applied to the die in 1860 and reproduced on all subjects in Plates 11 and 12. It also shows two small dots below "C" of "Cents" and a strong horizontal layout line at upper left, which are not found on Plates 1 through 12, but are found on the 1875 Reprint plate. Neinken opined that this impression and the few others like it were pulled from a die prepared for the 1875 Reprint (see Neinken, page 19).

The only other example of this die proof in Blue has a manuscript "X" across the design. There are three in Black. One was offered in our sale of the Eubanks collection (Sale 1242, lot 1). The others were offered in our Wagshal sale (Sale 994, lot 602) and in our 2015 sale of Essays and Proofs (Sale 1113, lot 2093). On one of the Black proofs there is further evidence of provenance, a pencil note on back "From J. E. Ralph. [signed] J. M. Bartels". J. E. Ralph of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing is known to have distributed die proofs in 1910.

The 1c 1851 Franklin, a workhorse postage stamp from 1851 through 1861, was printed from 200-subject steel plates numbered 1 through 12 (Plate 6 was never used, and Plate 1 exists in Early and Late states). Only Plates 1 through 4 were used to print stamps that were issued imperforate. The original 1c 1851 die design has an elaborate ornamental border on all four sides. Several factors affected the designs entered on the plates, which in turn produced variations in the printed stamps. Stanley B. Ashbrook developed the system used to classify design types, based on the premise that Type I should be a printed version that comes closest to the original die design. The completeness of the ornamentation at top and bottom is a requirement for Type I. For imperforate stamps, Ashbrook found only one position among the 1,000 subjects that met this requirement—Position 7R1E—which is why Scott 5, a Type I imperforate stamp, is so rare. Type Ib, Scott 5A, has slightly less ornamentation and was also printed from Plate 1 Early (imperforate only).

The census compiled by Jerome S. Wagshal, available at https://siegelauctions.com/census/us/scott/5, contains at least 98 unduplicated records of Scott 5. There are probably no more than ten examples existing outside of the Wagshal census population. Therefore, the 1c 1851 Type I is the rarest of all United States stamps issued regularly prior to the 1868 Grills.

This stamp was long ago part of an on-cover strip of three of Positions 6-8R1E (Harmer Rooke & Co. sale, 4/28/1965). Sometime after the 1965 Harmer Rooke auction it was removed from the cover and separated from the two Type Ib stamps. It appeared as this single in the 1973 Siegel sale of the Dr. Drew B. Meilstrup collection (Sale 431, lot 29).

Type Ib was produced only as an imperforate stamp. Six positions on Plate 1 Early furnished stamps qualifying as Type Ib—Positions 3-6R and 8-9R—distinguished by the complete design at top and nearly complete design at bottom. When first entered on the plate, these six positions (as well as 7R1E) had the complete design at top and bottom. However, unlike 7R, small portions of the bottoms were ironed out when the entries were made below them.

Only three positions from the top row of the right pane furnish Type II stamps, which are noticeably more complete at top. There are only two possible places that will yield combination pairs — Positions 2-3R1E and 9-10R1E.

The lack of recut inner lines means the stamp is Type I, Scott 10 or 11. The presence of recut inner lines means the stamp is Type II, Scott 10A and 11A. Type I comes from only two plates — 1E and 1i, while Type II comes from five plates. The Scott values are not drastically different—with Type I being slightly higher—but the vast majority of the original gum examples we have sold in the past 30 years were Type II. This sound lightly hinged Type I is very desirable.

Neinken notes in his book on the 10c stamp that it is likely that design and production of the 10c 1855 was rushed. The new 10c rate went into effect on April 1, 1855, and the new stamps were not placed into use until May. The die proof shows slips of the engraver's tool, and the overall layout is slightly skewed. Power Search lists only three full-size die proofs in Green — from our 1999 Finkelburg sale (which was die sunk) and from our 2014 Rarities sale. There are also cut-to-shape die proofs in Green but those are far less desirable.

Engraved stamps printed on both sides usually have a poor impression on one side and a second, complete impression on the other. They probably occurred when a sheet was printed without proper moistening, which prevented the paper from picking up the ink in the recessed lines of the engraved plate. The variety is known on the three denominations issued in 1851—1c, 3c and 12c—but not on the imperforate stamps issued in 1855 (10c) and 1856 (5c).

Reports have varied as to how many copies of the 12c 1851 printed on both sides are known. Brookman reported that he knew of four. We have only been able to locate three complete stamps, plus a bisected stamp, which cannot be verified as a bisect since it is not on a cover. Therefore our census records four, or more accurately three and a half examples of this rarity. It is not known unused. Our census of Scott 17c can be found at: https://siegelauctions.com/census/us/scott/17c. This stamp is one of two, along with census no. CAN-01, which show a clear portion of Washington's face on the reverse. The third complete stamp, census no. CAN-03 has a faint Washington portrait. The bisect, census no. CAN-04, does not include Washington's face.

The 1c Plate 2 was made before perforating was considered; therefore, the spaces between the stamps were insufficient to accommodate perforations. The majority of 1c stamps from Plate 2 were issued imperforate from December 1855 through June 1857. Perforated 1c stamps were issued beginning in July 1857, and Plate 2 (along with Plate 4) was used until replaced by new plates in late 1857.

Plate 2 multiples with original gum are far rarer perforated than in imperforate form. The converse is true for multiples from Plate 4. Although Type II perforated blocks with original gum are abundant from 1861 printings (Plates 11-12), Type II perforated blocks from Plate 2 are exceedingly rare.

At the time of our 1998 Zoellner sale, we determined that this block of 30 was originally joined with the famous 99R2 block (Positions 78-80/88-90/98-100R2) offered in our sale of the William H. Gross multiples (Sale 1200, lot 32). Both blocks were once part of the Caspary collection; another block in the Caspary sale (lot 596) also fits into this large multiple, filling Positions 58-59/68-69R2. There are three or four other blocks (unplated) in the Caspary and West sales that might also be part of the original large multiple.

Gross Multiples sale. 13 used singles are recorded, as are three on covers and two in strips, for a total of 20 known in any form. Virtually all have faults or are very off-center—only three off-cover singles and one on cover are confirmed as sound and not all have decent centering.

The 10c is the only denomination of the 1861-66 Issue that was actually issued in two types. Type I, Scott 62B, was printed from Plate 4. Type II stamps — Scott 68 and its grilled counterparts — were printed from Plates 15 and 26. It has been surmised that Type I was pressed into service to help fill strong demand for 10c stamps after demonetization of the earlier issue. The 10c stamps paid the transcontinental rate, the ship-letter rate and certain rates to foreign countries. The Plate 4 Type I stamps left very little space between the stamps for the 12-gauge perforation holes. Examples of Scott 62B are rarely seen with margins framing the design on all sides.

The safety network overprint essays listed in Scott as 79-E26 are discussed in two important articles by James Lee, Richard Drews and Jan Hofmeyr in the 2016 and 2017 *Chronicle* (no. 251, pp. 260-274 and no. 253, pp. 64-72). Both Abram Gibson and Emanuel Harmon received patents for re-use prevention ideas based on overprinting intaglio engraved stamps with surface printed networks of light wavy lines in various colors. Either the intaglio ink or network ink would be fugitive and wiped away if an attempt was made to re-use the stamp. The essay offered here conforms to the Harmon patent and is so attributed in the first *Chronicle* article. We are aware of only one other example with this Buffalo patent cancel. The August 1867 3c experimental A Grill was the first grilled issue. It was soon learned that the all-over grill weakened the paper and interfered with perforating and separating, resulting in rough perforations and pieces torn out of the margins when split apart. Within two months of A Grill production the apparatus was modified by dividing the embossed area into smaller rectangular units within each stamp (C Grill).

The 3c A Grill, Scott 79, is one of the most distinctive of 19th century United States stamps by virtue of its consistently poor appearance. The Scott Catalogue values this stamp in Fine-Very Fine grade and with perforation faults, the norm for the issue. Any example with complete perforations and in sound condition is valued far in excess of the Scott Catalogue price. The example offered here, which received a clear but not as heavy grill impression as usual—allowing the perfs to remain intact—has realized hammer prices of many multiples of Scott value each time it has been sold.

This cover combines a number of fascinating and unique elements. The overland rate to Mexico was only 3c, which paid postage to the border. Mexican postage was due from the recipient. The postmaster of Arizona City (James Barney) was apparently unfamiliar with this rate and had the cover franked for the 10c ocean mail rate. He compounded that mistake by allowing a 2c revenue stamp to be used to make up the last 1c of the 10¢ rate (overpaid by 1c). Perhaps there were no 1c or 2c U.S. stamps available in Arizona City. Michael Laurence's 10c 1869 book records a total of 13 10c 1869 Pictorial Issue from the U.S. to Japan (all to Yokohama). This is the only one with three stamps paying the triple 10c rate. It was carried by the PMSS *China*, departing San Francisco Oct. 4, 1869, and arriving Yokohama Oct. 30.

The background of the U.S. Flagship *Piscataqua* (later the U.S.S. *Delaware*) and the addressee, John F. Bingham, is summarized in an article by Richard B. Graham in the *Chronicle* 75 (August 1972), from which we quote (with minor edits and deletions): "The U.S.S. *Piscataqua* was launched on June 11, 1866, and first placed in commission on October 21, 1867. She was a screw steamer, 2400 tons, ship rigged, with 20 nine-inch smoothbore guns — similar in appearance and armament to Civil War naval ships such as Admiral Farragut's *Hartford*. On December 16, 1867, the *Piscataqua* left New York for the Far East, arriving at Singapore on April 18, 1868. On May 15, 1869, her name was changed to U.S.S. *Delaware*, as one of several U. S. Navy ship name changes taking place on that date at the Navy Department in Washington... the *Delaware* left Singapore for home on August 23, 1870, reached New York on November 19, 1870, and was placed out of commission on December 5, 1870. This was the only voyage ever made by the *Delaware*, which was broken up in 1877. John F. Bingham was a 2nd Asst. Engineer, assigned to the *Piscataqua* on September 30, 1867, and detached from her, after she returned home, on November 26, 1870."



The 7-page letter contained within this double-rate cover to Japan was written by Charles C. Upham to his friend, James Bassel, while Upham travelled through Colorado and Bassel was in the Far East, following his short-lived service in the Khedive Ismail's army. Upham's letter is full of juicy details about expeditions in Colorado and the Black Hills, as well as references to military officers, Indian confrontations, Fort Garland, etc. Upham also asks Bassel to secure Japanese coins for his collection and laments not asking for Egyptian coins when Bassel was there. The 1875 clipped newspaper articles which accompany the letter refer to the Hayden Expedition.

This was carried on the PMSS *China*, departing San Francisco Sep. 1, 1875, and arriving Yokohama Sep. 26 (Frajola-Perlman-Scamp sailing tables). The 15c treaty rate to Japan was in effect for only one year, from January 1 to December 31, 1875. This is one of two recorded covers with the 24c 1870 Issue paying the treaty rate to Japan, both from the Bassel correspondence. The second cover was postmarked at Del Norte on Sep. 1 (ex Ishikawa).



This wide top Mint N.H. strip, in sound and centered condition is in a class by itself. It is also an excellent alternative to a plate block, of which only one exists (and catalogues \$200,000.00).



One set, with proving room numbers on the face, remained full size and became part of the Hugh M. Southgate collection (thought to be part of a trade with the BEP) and then the Caroline Prentiss Cromwell collection. This proof comes from that set. The other two sets were trimmed to small die proof size.



The Orangeburg coil was made by the Post Office Department in 1911, specifically for use by the Bell Pharmaceutical Company. The Orangeburg coil stamps' use on third-class mail, and the fact that philatelists were generally unaware of their production accounts for their rarity.



AN EXTRAORDINARY OPPORTUNITY TO ACQUIRE A NEWLY LISTED MAJOR SCOTT NUMBER, OF WHICH JUST ONE EXAMPLE IS KNOWN — RARER THAN THE ONE-CENT AND 15-CENT Z GRILL STAMPS, BUT JUST STARTING ON ITS TRAJECTORY IN DEMAND AND VALUE.

The history and significance of this stamp are documented for the first time in this Rarities of the World sale catalogue. When the gavel falls, the successful bidder will be the first to have their name identified with Scott 499D, a new major listing in the forthcoming 2024 Scott Catalogue. This listing is confirmed in writing by the Scott editor-in-chief, Jay Bigalke (his statement accompanies). Accordingly, the 2023 Philatelic Foundation certificate (594886) identifies this stamp as Scott 499D.

The signed notation on back was made by J. Murray Bartels, a German-born stamp dealer in the United States who died in 1944. Therefore, this piece must have reached philatelic hands sometime between 1917 and 1944. However, the existence of a 2c compound perforation 10 x 11 stamp was not noted in Johl's 1937 book on 20th century stamps, nor in Armstrong's 1979 book on the Washington-Franklin series. When the first Philatelic Foundation certificate was issued (#150031, October 2, 1985), the stamp was identified as Scott "499var." At this time, the compound perforation stamps were listed as minor varieties of their respective issues. This changed in 2003 when the Scott Catalogue elevated the Perf 10 x 12 and 12 x 10 compound perforation stamps to major Scott numbers—423A through 423E—but the 2c Perf 10 x 11 from the later issue on unwatermarked paper was overlooked. When this stamp was consigned months ago, we recognized the significance of the 10 x 11 compound perforation. After certification by The Philatelic Foundation and confirmation from the Scott editor-in-chief that it will be listed as Scott 499D, we are now able to offer a new major-listing stamp.

This stamp is a hybrid of the 1916 and 1917 issues. The basic 2c Type I design was printed on unwatermarked paper and perforated with 10-gauge perforations in September 1916. If this stamp had 10-gauge perforations all around, it would be Scott 463. The changeover to 11-gauge perforations occurred prior to March 1917. The 2c Type I on unwatermarked paper with 11-gauge perforations all around is Scott 499. This stamp proves that at least one 2c Type I sheet was perforated on the 10-gauge machine in one direction—from side to side, creating Perf 10 horizontal rows—then the sheet was finished on the 11-gauge perforating machine in the other direction—from top to bottom, creating Perf 11 vertical rows. The postmark date is more complete in the photograph on the earlier certificate, before someone trimmed down the piece, and it is dated June 3, 1917, at Elizabeth, New Jersey. That fits with the use of the 11-gauge perforating machine for sheets released in March 1917.

How many 2c Type I Perf 10×11 stamps exist? That question is very difficult to answer. If Bartels was aware of its significance and collectors such as George Ewing had examples of compound perforations in their collections before World War II, then philatelists should have been on the alert for Perf 10×11 stamps of any 1916 Issue denomination. The fact that only this one stamp is recorded in the P.F. records and we have not seen another Perf 10×11 stamp indicates that it is extremely rare. The odds of finding another Scott 499D are very small, but not impossible. It is also possible another denomination will be found with 10×11 compound perforations.

As for value, the keys to completing a United States stamp collection are well-known: the 1c Z Grill, Scott 85A (two known, one available), the 15c Z Grill, Scott 85F (two known), the 24c Continental, Scott 164 (one known) and the 2c Compound Perf 10 x 12, Scott 423E (one known). Now we can add Scott 499D to the list. We think our estimate is conservative and leave it to the bidders to establish Scott 499D's market value in its first offering. It will be fun to watch the bidders play "keepaway."



The 1c Green, Scott 594, is waste from a horizontal rotary printing used to make coils. At the beginning or end of a coil-stamp print run from the 170-subject rotary plates, some leading or trailing paper was produced that was too short for rolling into 500-stamp rolls. In 1919 the Bureau devised a plan to salvage this waste by perforating and cutting the sheets into panes. They were put through the 11-gauge flat-plate perforator in use at the time, giving the sheets full perforations on all sides. The existence of Scott 594 was not reported until four months after the final sheets were delivered, and the 1c Rotary Perf 11 was soon recognized as one of the rarest United States stamps.

Our census of Scott 594, available at https://siegelauctions.com/census/us/scott/594, contains 100 used singles, 6 stamps in 3 used pairs, and 6 stamps on 5 covers (one with a pair) for a total of 112 used stamps. Another 19 unused stamps are recorded. Many have perforations cutting in on one or more sides, or have faults.

According to the U.S. Postal Service's website (http://about.usps.com/postal-bulletin/2013/pb22371/html/info_003.htm) and other sources, the \$2.00 Inverted Jenny souvenir sheet went on sale nationwide September 22, 2013, and a ceremony was held on that day at the National Postal Museum. The souvenir sheet was printed using the intaglio printing process and plates made from the original dies used to produce the 1918 24c Air Post stamp (Scott C3). The denomination was changed to make it easily distinguishable from the original. The souvenir sheet background depicts the original airmail route, the National Postal Museum, and aviation pioneer Reuben H. Fleet.

A special automatic distribution was done to all post offices. Pre-orders and re-orders through stamp distribution offices or centers were not allowed once original automatic distribution quantities were sold. A total of 13,200,600 stamps were printed, which translates into 2,200,100 souvenir sheets of six. They were printed six souvenir sheets at a time, and their position on the plate is noted on back of each. The sheets were sold individually wrapped in cellophane, which collectors questioned at the time of issue.

The reason for the odd quantity and cellophane wrapping was revealed shortly after the release of the souvenir sheets, when an upright example was discovered by a collector in Ontario, Canada. The USPS then revealed that 100 had been created and randomly seeded throughout their distribution system. The cellophane wrappers were used to prevent searching through stocks for the upright designs — souvenir sheets with opened cellophane were not returnable.

The Buffalo Balloon stamp, designed by John B. Lillard and engraved by John H. Snively, was printed by Wheeler Brothers Printers in Nashville, Tennessee. Only 300 were printed in tete-beche arrangement from a single die. The stamps were intended for use on a balloon flight from Nashville to Gallatin, Tennessee, which took place on June 18, 1877. Of the 300 that were printed, Lillard wrote that only 23 were used. Two examples of the Black Trial Color proof are recorded. The other was sold in our 1974 Rarities of the World sale and is also ex Rudy.



The census by Alan C. Campbell ("High Value Official Stamps on Cover", *Chronicle* No. 188, Nov. 2000, pp. 287-299) lists four 30c War Dept. covers, including three with singles and the 6c War. Mr. Campbell refers to the pair of War Department covers to Japan offered in this sale as "rivals" to the Commodore Caldwell 24c and 30c Navy Department covers that were previously sold by our firm. The article contains a description of the covers from the late Dr. Lobdell, which we quote below:

"Both covers were sent by the War Department's Chief Signal Officer to 'Benjamin Smith Lyman, Chief Geologist and Mining Engineer to the Kaitakushi.' Lyman was a Harvard graduate who later studied at the Ecole de Mines in Paris and set himself up as a consulting geologist. Between 1873 and 1879 he was chief geologist to the Japanese government, principally working for the Kaitakushi, which was an agency with the responsibility for the colonization and development of the natural resources of the northern island of Hokkaido. (Hokkaido was Japan's version of our frontier in '70s, so that while we were sending homesteaders into our West and killing off the Indians, they were populating Hokkaido with ethnic Japanese and doing a number on the native hairy Ainu.) The pair of 24c War stamps pays four times the treaty rate of 12c per half ounce for mail from the United States to Japan. This cover was prepaid for the quadruple 12c treaty rate, which had been superseded by a 5c treaty rate one month earlier. It was carried to Yokohama by the Pacific Mail Steamship Co. and then to Tokyo. A Japanese official translated the address into Japanese on back for the benefit of the local postman and then applied his seal.

The census by Alan C. 

Only 280 copies of the 12c State Special Printing were sold, but it is not known how the stamps were taken from the sheets or if full sheets were exhausted before breaking a subsequent sheet. 



In August 1842 the privately owned City Despatch Post was bought out and re-established as the carrier department of the New York City Post Office. Stamps sold by Greig for the City Despatch Post remained valid for prepayment of carrier fees and were used months after the buyout, concurrently with the government carrier issues (6LB3 and 6LB5, primarily). The carrier stamp, 6LB1, can be distinguished from 40L1 only when cancelled with the "U.S."-designated cancel or postmark. Such examples are very rare, with 19 covers contained in the Lyons census, as well as ten off-cover stamps. Of the 19 6LB1 covers recorded by Lyons, only 15 are confirmed as genuine full covers (two are fronts or pieces, one is unconfirmed, and a fourth 6LB1 stamp is on an 1844 cover). There are eight *tied* examples, including one large piece and seven covers.

Morris, Jr. (Chronicle 229, February 2011) is the latest and most up-to-date published census. It contains only three Franklin Carrier covers accepted as genuine uses from New York City (two in private hands):

- 1) Undated buff cover to John J. Latting, 85 Fulton St., tied by red "New York" circle, ex Chase, Miller Collection, The New York Public Library
- 2) Sep. 15, 1852 folded letter to David Sands, 141 William St., tied by red New York circle, ex Caspary, Middendorf, currently in Mazza collection
- 3) Oct. 28, 1852 cover to Henry Mathews, Union Hotel, ex Seybold, Golden and Bailar, the cover offered here

The enclosed invitation identifies the addressee, Henry Mathews, as co-proprietor of the Union Hotel at 22nd Street and Third Avenue, where the Complimentary Ball was to be held in memory of Wilsey McGinness, who "was unfortunately run over by Engine 46."

Alabama was one of the first states to secede from the Union and was admitted to the Confederacy on February 4, 1861. By the time this letter was sent, tensions were heating up between North and South. The first shots of the war were fired at Fort Sumter just two weeks prior to the sending of this letter. Postal relations would be severed after May 31. The contents, in Spanish, discuss methods of shipping cotton out of the Confederacy, since a Federal blockade of Southern ports had been declared.

The 3c overpayment of the 21c rate meant that the letter was treated as fully prepaid to England. The recipient was charged the equivalent of the postage due from England to Spain. It was treated as a double-weight letter from England to Spain, and so was charged 4 reales for the postage plus 4 reales penalty for being unpaid.

EXTREMELY FINE PAIR ON AN ATTRACTIVE COVER. ONE OF FOUR RECORDED COVERS BEARING THE ATHENS PROVISIONAL TÊTE-BÊCHE VARIETY.

Only four post offices are known to have produced tête-bêche provisional varieties: Athens, Macon, Memphis and Nashville. In each case the tête-bêche multiple was created by the work-and-turn printing method, as opposed to an inverted cliche among subjects on the plate. All are extremely rare.

Of the Athens 5c tête-bêche, we record four covers and the Crown census at the Civil War Philatelic Society website concurs. They are:

- 1) Nov. 14 (1861) to Capt. George Hillyer, one stamp with piece out, Sale 1146, lot 1594
- 2) Nov. 25 (1861) to Dr. E. D. Newton, ex Brooks, Solomon, Ballard and "D.K." collection, the cover offered here
- 3) Dec. 2 (1861) to Capt. Porter King, ex Brooks, Weatherly, Kilbourne and "D.K." collection (Sale 1022, lot 1004)
- 4) Jan. 6 (1862) to A. H. Stephens, ex Ferrary, Caspary, Lilly and Haub.

There are three additional off-cover tête-bêche pairs. This cover has the same date and address as the cover with a pair listed in the Charles J. Phillips census (Crown book, page 19) as belonging to Harold C. Brooks. The cover offered in Sale 1022 (lot 1004) is also from the Brooks collection, and neither cover was offered in the Laurence & Stryker sale of the Brooks Confederate States collection (April 24, 1943). Some of the collection was sold privately. There is a notation on the back of this cover "C. S. Watson Co." in Brooks' hand.


VERY FINE AND CHOICE COVER. THIS IS THE ONLY RECORDED EXAMPLE OF THE DISTINCTIVE POSTMASTER'S PROVISIONAL STAR-IN-CIRCLE HANDSTAMP OF AUTAUGAVILLE, ALABAMA. ONE OF THE GREAT RARITIES OF CONFEDERATE PROVISIONALS.

Autaugaville, situated on the Alabama River about 25 miles west of Montgomery, had a Civil War population of less than 1,500. Its postmaster, Albert William McNeel, seized all U.S. Post Office Dept. property and turned it over to the Confederacy. During the provisional period, Postmaster McNeel used two different handstamps to make provisional envelopes and both are among the great rarities of Confederate philately. The earlier type is this fancy Star in Circle handstamp and this cover is the only recorded example. The second type is a brass handstamp with negative design similar to the appearance of the Athens adhesive provisional, of which only four examples are recorded (Scott 10XU1, see our Dr. Brandon Sale 1073, lot 211 for a census).

This cover is accompanied by more than 15 documents relating to the Autaugaville Provisional, including correspondence dated between 1897 and 1926, with letters between stamp dealer P.M. Wolsieffer and Andrew H. McNeel (son of the Autaugaville postmaster), letters between McNeel and collector Harold Brooks (who declined an offer to buy one of the covers), a copy of an affidavit from McNeel attesting to the creation of the Autaugaville provisionals by his father, as well as other letters (see complete scans in linked PDF).

Edward R. Ives served as the Lake City postmaster from Mar. 11, 1859, until he was replaced by Arthur S.T. Wright on Sep. 25, 1860. White was then appointed the Confederate postmaster from July 25, 1861, until Ives was re-appointed sometime prior to Nov. 26, 1863.

There are two types of Lake City Provisional control marks — the "E. R. Ives" postmaster straightline as seen on this cover and the undated circular handstamp. Only eight examples of any Lake City Postmaster's Provisional are recorded in the Briggs census, including six with the postmaster straightline and two with the circular control mark. The covers are split between two correspondences, the other addressed to Sparta Ga.

The stereotype plate used to print the Memphis 5c provisional in sheets of 50 was created with ten subjects (two rows of five) at right turned 90 degrees clockwise relative to the other 40 subjects. This arrangement is confirmed by the existence of corner-margin multiples that have precisely the same alignment, which would be impossible if the sideways positions resulted from work-and-turn printing. Only a few multiples exist that show this unusual tête-bêche format. Multiples are also known that show the work-and-turn printing method, including three tête-bêche pairs (vertical head-to-foot, vertical foot-to-foot, and horizontal head-to-foot).

If we count only the tête-bêche printing varieties and exclude the multiples which contain sideways positions on the plate, there are just three recorded examples of the Memphis 5c provisional tête-bêche. Each is a pair on cover, and each shows a unique orientation. The vertical pair on the cover offered here has the impressions aligned foot to foot. The other two are a head-to-head vertical pair and a side-to-side horizontal pair. These tête-bêche multiples were created during the work-and-turn printing process. They differ from the sideways tête-bêche multiples, which reflect the unusual 5c plate layout (see lot 747 in this sale). The sideways multiples are only known in unused condition.

The stamp to the left (as positioned on this cover) shows some of the plate marks of Position 45 (Pratt named this Position 37 in his plating diagram, because he assigned "S" numbers 1-10 to the sideways positions). If we imagine the second plate impression on the same sheet of paper to be turned 180 degrees and aligned below the bottom row, then the adjacent stamp (to the right on this cover) would be Position 47 (Pratt's Position 39). Neither Pratt nor we have been able to analyze Position 47 (or 48) for plating marks (they are missing from the block of 37). However, the alignment between the full impression and the small portion of the adjoining stamp to the right, which is visible in the margin, does not match the alignment of any two of the other known positions in the bottom row. Therefore, by process of elimination, it seems almost certain that this pair comes from one of the two Position 45/47 vertical tête-bêche pairs in the original sheet.

FAIR IN MONTGOMERY.

This cover originated in Brussels, Belgium, on July 12, 1861. It was sent by Mrs. Wyatt Fair to her husband, Gen. Elisha Y. Fair, who was former U.S. Minister to Belgium and left Brussels in late June 1861 to join the Southern cause. Mrs. Fair was unable to return to her native land until June 1862, due to the Federal blockade of Southern ports. This cover and the New Orleans provisional cover offered in lot 753 surfaced in 1999 and provide heretofore unreported examples of mail brought into the Confederacy through diplomatic channels. If this was sent by regular transatlantic steamer, then it was carried on the Cunarder *Arabia*, departing Queenstown July 14, 1861, arriving Boston July 25.

New Orleans postmaster, J. L. Riddell, prepared provisional stamps in June 1861 and advertised them for sale on June 12th. The 2c Red stamps were printed without the marginal inscription "Usable exclusively in the New Orleans Post Office". The 5c and subsequent 2c Blue printings all have the imprint. It is the accepted theory that the 2c Red stamps were printed first, before Riddell added the imprint, and were withheld from use until January 1862 when the supply of 2c Blue stamps was exhausted. The Crown census at the Civil War Philatelic Society website lists 12 2c Red covers.

THIS REMARKABLE COVER IS UNIQUE IN SEVERAL RESPECTS — MOST NOTABLY AS A COVER FROM EUROPE WITH THE NEW ORLEANS POSTMASTER'S PROVISIONAL.

This unusual cover was found with the Mobile cover offered in lot 749 and undoubtedly carried a letter from Mrs. Wyatt Fair in Brussels. If sent on a standard transatlantic steamship, then this was carried by the Cunarder *Europa*, departing Liverpool Jul. 27, 1861, arriving Boston Aug. 9.

The handwriting does not match the Mobile cover, but the use of a U35 entire indicates that the envelope had to have been addressed by someone in the northeast who had access to the new-issue 3c embossed envelope. That person probably enclosed Mrs. Fair's letter for delivery to Gen. Elisha Y. Fair and arranged for it to be carried south to New Orleans via diplomatic pouch. Based on the docketing, it originated in Brussels on July 23, 1861. It was routed through New Orleans, almost certainly through the Belgian consul, J. Deynoodt, or his vice-consul, J. Noblom. The unusual franking suggests that the sender used the new 3c entire and searched for a 3c stamp — finding an old imperforate 1851 Issue — in expectation that the letter would travel via the U.S. post office. The Belgian consul mailed the letter in New Orleans and affixed the two pairs of provisional stamps for the double 10c rate to Montgomery.

There is only one true color error among all Southern Postmasters' Provisionals: the New Orleans 5c Red, which is found on both White and Bluish papers. Each shade of Red is different.

Our records contain the following seven examples of the 5c Red error:

White Paper (62X6): 1) Unused with traces of gum, ex Ferrary, Hind and Brooks; 2) "DUE (3cts)" straightline, partly rebacked over thins, ex Caspary, Lilly, Kilbourne and "D.K." collection, the stamp offered here; 3) Cut in at bottom, tied by "Paid" straightline on part of cover to Mrs. Wm. Reynaud, Baton Rouge, photo by Hiram Deats in P.F. files; 4) Mixture of Red and Brown, corner strike of circular datestamp, partly rebacked over thins and tear, ex "D.K." collection.





According to *Canal Zone Stamps*, one sheet, consisting of four panes of 50, was printed. Three panes were caught by postal authorities, while the fourth pane of 50 was sent to H. E. Harris & Co. as part of a larger order from the Canal Zone Philatelic Agency. At the same time this error was printed, the U.S. had issued the Dag Hammarskjold error in huge quantities. The Canal Zone authorities made plans to do the same, but were successfully sued by H. E. Harris, and the larger printing never took place. Two of the three other panes were laminated and presented to the National Postal Museum. The third was destroyed. The one pane available was broken up in 1969.

Many copies of this error have been hinged over the years. A Power Search review found that approximately half the examples we have offered since 1993 retain their Mint N.H. gum, including this choice example, which came from the previously unique bottom right corner margin block of four.




The accompanying letter was written by Dr. F. de Caumont while at the Scutari Hospital, a British military hospital. He wrote the letter to a colleague in India describing the conditions in the Crimea, treatment of a range of diseases, and a wound inflicted on a solider. The hospital was a converted barracks and not designed to cope with the thousands of sick and injured soldiers who were brought in for medical care. The Scutari hospital in particular was one of the locations that prompted Florence Nightingale to advocate for better treatment of wounded and sick soldiers. To put it into perspective, during the winter of 1854, more than 4,000 soldiers died at Scutari. Reports suggest the death toll from disease and sickness was more than ten times that of battle related injuries.

The boxed wavy-line cancel of Malta was in use specifically for transit mail from covers originating in the Crimea, the Black Sea Fleet or from officers in Constantinople. This mail was sent via Valletta where the postmark was applied. According to Parmenter-Gordon, the cancel is only known used between Apr. 23, 1855, and Sep. 3, 1856 and is **prior** to the period where Great Britain stamps were sold at Maltese post offices. Parmenter-Gordon assigns a rarity factor "H" to covers indicating "very few exist" and provides a price range from £9,000 to £22,000.




